Reflections of the riot

The recent riot in Los Angeles' ghetto brought back a flood of memories to me.

When I worked in Michigan City, Ind., for several years during the 1970's, blackwhite problems were my major concern.

Looking back, I feel I had some successes, and some failures. Overall, I feel I "made a difference," but in a very small way.

I worked to stabilize our city's neighborhoods by renovating the inner city schools, scattering public works throughout them, and improving services. This was done to help stabilize the middle class folks there. Because once they (and their money) leave - the deterioration begins and slums develop.

This was one of the successes.

I covered a race riot there once and got shot at. But I'll leave that for another column. Today, I want to give my view of the L.A. outburst.

When I came home from work the day of the Rodney King verdict, my son, Rob, who was watching the news, said, "Dad, the cops in the Rodney King incident were found not guilty."

I replied, "Well, L.A. is going

to burn tonight." Yet, apparently, the police chief in L.A. was very surprised by the reaction to the

Rodney King verdict. Just awful.

I realize that virtually all the readers of this newspaper have moderate to excellent incomes. None live in a ghetto situation. So it's hard for you to fully understand the depth of the animosity of black folks who are stuck in ghettos.

It isn't pretty. What it causes is a huge amount of rage. Blacks who grow up in inner cities feel virtually like they are in prison.

More often than not, they live in one-parent families. This is due to really stupid government rules that affords single mothers welfare funds - if the father is absent. There have been efforts to reform our welfare laws for years, but Congress is grid-locked.

Really awful.

I'm not smart enough to fully explain why a permanent underclass has developed in the inner cities. I do realize there is a tremendous lack of decent-paying jobs there (unless you get into orime).

Years ago, we should have had a working system where companies would get massive tax breaks by relocating in the inner cities. Instead, it's now in the talking stage due to the L.A. riot.

Presidents Reagan and Bush have done a fantastically poor job in this area.

Just awful.

Politicians care about where the votes are. Today, that means suburbia. And suburbanites aren't hot about having higher taxes to improve inner city situations.

The money simply isn't

Texico's Torres remembers World War II

Raymond Torres of Texico has a souvenir of World War Il that still evokes deep emotions in the hearts of many observers - a swastika which once hung on the wall of a Nazi headquarters in Berlin. "There's a lot of history behind it," says Torres.

"I went through holy hell and muddy water to get his flag," says Torres.

Torres was stationed about 20 miles from Berlin on May 15, 1945 (one week after the end of the war) when he and a friend went into the city alone. They took the flag, a dagger and watch from an abandoned Nazi headquarters building which they were told later had once belonged to Field Marshal Erwin Rommel. They ripped the flag from the wall, leaving the gold braid behind.

"When we went in there we knew it was a headquarters building; later some Germans told us it had once been Rommel's headquarters," he said.

Rommel, The Desert Fox, had led German armies in north Africa before he returned to Germany. Then he realized just how Adolph Hitler and a few cronies had destroyed his homeland. Just before the fighting moved to Germany soil, he is said to have participated in an attempted assassination plot. When the coup failed, Rommel took his own life in 1944.

The dagger and watch were lost many years ago, but Torres still has the flag as a memento of the war which took the lives of his brother, Rosando Torres, who died at Normandy and an adopted brother, Gene Torres, who was killed during the occupation period that followed World War

Torres said that he still had the flag because his mother had kept it under her bed.

Torres was born in California and grew up in Clovis. He volunteered to go into the service because a friend said to him one day, "Raymond, why don't you come with me?" After they were on their way to Europe his friend showed up with big thick glasses and told every one that he was trying to get out of the service. "We called him Peter Lorrie," said Torres.

Torres went from Clovis to El Paso to Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., to New York before he arrived in England, where he spent 4 1/2 years.

In England he was assigned to a combat engineering unit. "I wouldn't trade combat engineers for anything. They are the first ones in and the last ones out," said Torres. He was a corporal with the First Army 112 Combat Engineers. "We put up Bailey Bridges and pontoons."

He says that he arrived in England at night, and before the sun was up his unit was building bridges.

"We'd put them up at night, and B company would take them down during the day."

It seemed for a while that all he would do is practice, practice, practice. "In war you have to train. You can't use signs, and you can't talk or anything. You have to know your job backwards and forwards," says Torres.

Torres was the "pin man" in the unit. Six men would raise the 2,000 lb. bridge pieces into place, and he would fasten the pieces together with a huge pin. Once, and only once, he

put his hand into the pin hole. Luckily he still has a hand. Torres also received extra training as a demolitions expert while he was in England.

During World War II many of the units in the U.S. Army were made up of men from the same town or the same area. Units were usually racially segregated. Torres, though, was not assigned with other people from the Clovis area.

He says that although he only had a fifth grade education prior to entering the service, he was assigned to a unit with, "15 white guys who all had high school educations." The experience forced him to improve his English speaking skills.

Some of Torres' friends from New Mexico who were assigned to units with a high percentage of Spanish speaking soldiers did not improve their English skills as much as he did because it was too easy to speak Spanish with their friends. "I met a guy I knew from Clovis in the chow line, and I

couldn't talk to him in Spanish. I said to him, 'I want to talk' to you in Spanish, but my tongue gets kind of stuck." Before the D-Day invasion of Europe, the officers tried hard

to make the practice maneuvers seem realistic. "When the real thing happened, I thought it was just another practice. They told us to go to church and get ready beforehand. But when I was on the barge-like boat with all the tanks and trucks, I felt the water and I knew it was the real thing." he said. "Then I saw an arm sticking out of the water, and I knew it was the real thing."

Torres said that he had 50 pounds of TNT on him when he landed on the beach at Normandy. He stepped off the boat into water up to his neck. He made it to shore, but much of what he was carrying did not.

He remembers going up to a foxhole on the beach were he saw a dead lieutenant. "Half of his face was blown off,"

Farwell's 1st state track title

Foster wins state

Matt Foster brought home the first track and field state championship ever in the history of Farwell Schools Sunday, reported athletic director Rex Cumpton.

And Farwell's Katrina Stewart placed second in the 100 m. run with a time of 12.6 at the state track meet in a photo finish.

"It took about 30 minutes to decide this race," said coach Jimmy Taylor.

Stewart also finished 4th in a photo finish in the 200 m. run with a time of 27.0.

"That one took about 20 minutes to decide," said Tay-

Foster jumped 6'8" at the State Track Meet in Austin, breaking the school record of

6'6" he set earlier in the year.

The competition was exciting from the beginning. Foster cleared the first two heights with no misses. At 6'2" and 6'4", he missed on his first and second attempts. He had to stay alive in the competition by making both of those heights on his final attempt. He succeeded both times.

At 6'6", Matt had a super jump and cleared the bar on his first attempt. Foster then proceeded to go into uncharted waters and clear both 6'7" and 6'8" on his second attempts to win the championship.

After clearing 6'8", Foster attempted 6'9", almost clearing this height on his second attempt.

Cumpton noted: "Foster's performance is clearly outstanding, not only from the physical but also from the mental standpoint. He had to jump higher than he ever did before in the fiercest competition of athletic career. He also had to perform in front of a crowd estimated to be up 15,000 spectators, adding even more drama to the situation. The school and the community should be very proud of Matt Foster."

Between rain delays and a photo finish, Stewart did not finish her performance at the state meet until about 11:30 p.m. Saturday. It was a long but productive day.

Stewart also finished fifth in the 400 m. with a time of 60.8. "She did a great!" said coach Taylor proudly.

He said that all of the kids who went to state enjoved themselves. Attending were: Becky Donaldson, Alicia Smith, Stewart, Foster and Cody Monk, as well as Taylor and Cumpton.

Somehow Torres says of his unit, "We went through it and all of the original men came back.'

Torres was stationed in Europe from June 6, 1944 until Jan. 26, 1946 - a very long time for a combat soldier. Part of the reason is that he had received extra training as a demolitions expert. Had they told him in advance that the training would mean longer combat time, he probably wouldn't have volunteered. "In the Army you never volunteer for anything," he says.

The other reason is that when he was due to return to the U.S., he became ill. He he had gotten yellow jaundice and hepatitis, casuing him to spend two months in the hospital.

Then he was given a weekend pass so that he could visit Paris before returning home, but the medics forgot to tell him that he could not drink any liquor after his illness. He got sick again, and had to spend another two months in the hospital. The swastika flag is the only souvenir that Torres still has

of his experiences in World War II. He had kept a map marked with the names of towns where he had fought, but it went into a pile of Army jackets "a mile high," at the military base where returning soldiers turned in their equipment. It was a visual reminder of how many men

To some people of Torres' generation, the swastika is an emotion-laden symbol of death, destruction and genocide, but to him it is just a souvenir. "That flag never killed anyone," he says, implying that people kill, symbols do not.

Torres saw combat again in Korea. He says, "Here in the United States we've got it made. We haven't had all the bombing and destruction that other people have had," (except at Pearl Harbor). "We don't know how lucky we are."

He summed up his hopes that the U.S. will remain a peace with by relating what his mother used to tell him when he was a boy growing up, and thinking about fighting: "It's better that there be one crazy than two crazies," she used to say.





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
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

Tree problems?

Many of us are experiencing tree problems this year. The most common question is about the red or orange waxy looking stuff on the bark of willow, cottonwood or poplar

This is the result of a fungal disease called cytospora. The fungus generally infects through wounds or other openings in the bark caused by frost, drought, mechanical or herbicide damage. Unfortunately, there is no treatment for this disease. You can prune off infected limbs but chances are it is through the entire tree. Providing water and fertilizer will help the tree live longer but the disease will eventually kill the tree.

Another common concern is white, foamy and smelly substance oozing from the trees. This is also usually associated with willow trees. Many times this is also associated and is probably the entry point for cytospora. If the tree doesn't also have cytospora, treatment may help. This is the result from the freeze damage plus a localized

fungal infection. If the area affected can be pruned away, this is the best treatment. If the area cannot be pruned away, treatment involves cleaning and applying an anti- fungal agent. Cleaning can be done by attaching a nozzle to a host, allowing a direct stream of water, wash area, then apply an anti-fungal treatment. Common bleach diluted with water works well. This will need to be done daily or every other day

until area dries out and no longer seeps the substance. Other problems range from browning of evergreens to apricots that suddenly are dying or have limbs dying. These are the result of freeze damage that occurred in October. Many of our trees can tolerate cold temperatures once they have hardened off or become acclimatized to cold weather. This is achieved by cooler temperatures occurring in the fall followed by cold in the winger.

Last October, when the first cold occurred, daytime temperatures were still warm and many trees still had green

leaves and that is why do much damage was done and is now showing its face. No treatment can be done except to prune out dead branches and continue to water and fertilize.

A Farwell boy visits a cradle of civilization

Editor's note: Will Anderson, a Farwell resident, is in the U.S. Navy and is stationed at the U.S. Embassy in Islamabad, Pakistan. He has written some articles from life there for the Tribune.

When I graduated from Farwell High School in 1972, I would never have predicted that 20 years later I would find myself in a Navy job, on the fringe of the Himalaya Mountains, several hundred miles from the sea, working with a Third World country's military.

But here I am and here I shall stay for two years and it promises to be a very peculiar stay from what I've seen so far. I arrived in Pakistan's capitol city, Islamabad (The City of Islam) in November. I joined the Navy years ago in part to get away from sand storms, so it seemed only natural that I have spent most of my time since 1987 in Southwest Asia, which is mostly desert and sand-blasted rock.

Pakistan was formed in 1947 after the British granted India its freedom, and the area was partitioned into the Hindu-dominated Indian subcontinent, and the Moslemdominated areas of East and West Pakistan. The Hindus and Moslems killed many of each other during Partition, and India and Pakistan have fought three wars since then. In the 1971 War, the Moslems of East Pakistan (Bengal) were aided by India in breaking away from West Pakistan (Punjab, Sindh, Baluchistan, Northwest Frontiers) because the Bengalis felt dominated by the Moslems to the West. The new nation is today called Bangledesh.

This part of the world is one of the cradles of civilization, with homo sapiens living here as far back as 50,000 years ago. By 9,000 years ago, man here had tamed some animals and was farming. And by about 3000 B.C. one of the greatest of the world's ancient civilizations arose here on the banks of the Indus River, at the same time as the civilizations were rising in Egypt and Mesopotamia.

For centuries, this was part of the rout of the Silk Road

which traded the goods of China with the civilizations of North Africa, and later, Europe. The caravan routes traveled from the Mediterranean, across the Holy Lands and the deserts east through Persia (Iran) on the way to the high passes through the Himalayas in what is now northern Pakistan. Islamabad is build on this ancient route with the Margalla Mountains rising to the North and the rolling sand and grassland of the Punjab to the south.

A battleground for all for recorded history, waves of invaders swept in and civilizations arose, only to be overcome by new warrior kingdoms a few centuries later. The Aryans, forerunners of the Hindus, destroyed the ancient Indus civilization about 1700 B.C., but by 600 B.C. it was part of the Persian Empire of Darius the Great. This was the most eastward expansion of Alexander the Great, who destroyed Taxila fortress near Islamabad on his march down the Indus.

Buddhism arose afterwards, and wave after wave of invader followed. First came Bactrian Greeks, descendents of Alexander's armies who settled in northern Afghanistan. Then came the Sythians from the steppes of Central Asia, then the Parthians from near the Caspian Sea, who defeated Roman invasion efforts in 53 B.C.

By A.D. 200, Kushans arose, to be overcome by the White Huns, who were overthrown by the Sassanians and Turks, who fell to the Hindu Shahis about 870.

Then, in 711, the Moslem armies invaded and began mass conversions to Islam. Wars with Genghis Khan and his Mongols followed, and with Tamerlane and his Golden Horde. and by A.D. 1600, the Mogul Empire was established. The Persians invaded again, and most of the Punjab and Kashmir were absorbed into the Kingdom of Afghanistan by 1739. The Sikhs, a militant offshoot from Hinduism, pushed the Afghans back out of the Punjab by 1830, but by this time the British Empire was already far advanced in its effort to invade and dominate the whole area.

The period of the British Raj ended in 1947 with Partition. and the chaos which has followed in the years since then. Then, in late 1991, I got here, so it seems like these unfortunate people continue their record of grief and despair.
