I went to the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show sale Monday for the first time.

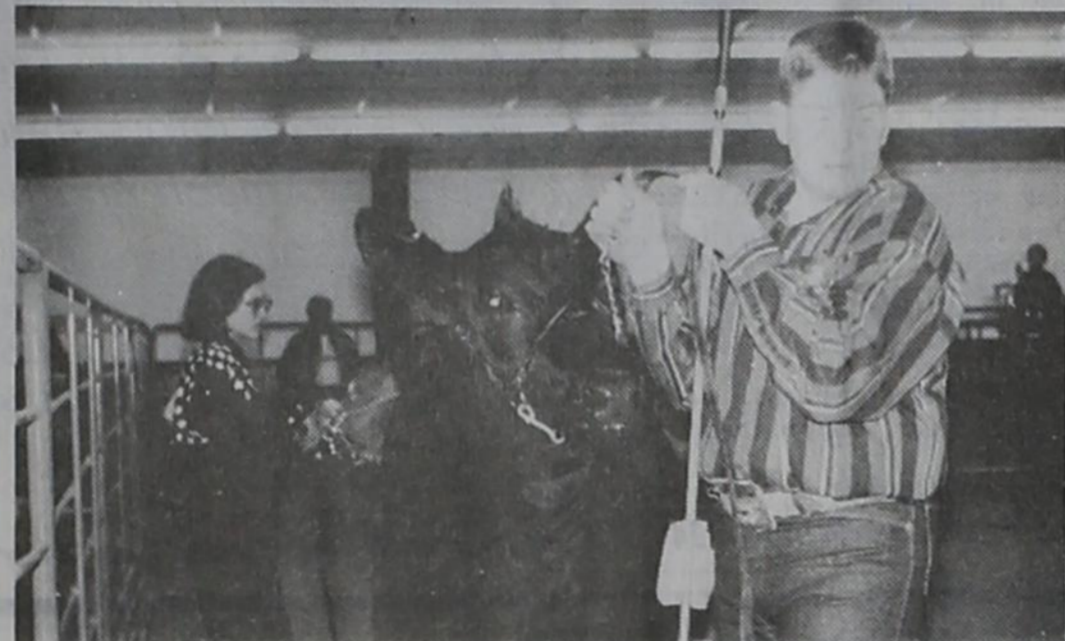

## 'Largest total ever spent'

The largest total ever was spent on animals exhibited by Farwell youths at Monday's Parmer County Livestock Show Sale, according to Robert White.

About \$16,000 was spent on Farwell kids. The total for all the county youths was about \$72,125.

Farwell youths' animals were purchased at the premium sale by the Farwell Buyers Club along with several local and area businesses. Every animal sold by a Farwell youth got at least \$500. Some of their animals sold at below that, but White had the Buyers Club put a "bump" on those animals to get them up to the \$500 floor.

Actually, the animals are not sold to buyers. The animals are kept by the exhibitors. The sale is a way of honoring the youths for their outstanding work.

Prices at the sale included grand champion steer, \$925; grand champion lamb and reserve champion lamb, both at \$750; reserve champion steer, \$625; grand champion swine, \$750; and reserve champion swine, \$425.

## '911' changes coming

"Everyone in the state of Texas is eventually going to have to re-address," said Pamela Nielsen, of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, when she met with the Parmer County 911 Mapping and Addressing Committee Monday.

Ms. Nielsen said the committee will gather maps and lists of names of residents from a variety of assignments and compile a computerized map of the county which would be used by emergency vehicles, fire departments, and law enforcement agents when an emergency arises.

County Judge Bonnie Clayton assigned committee members to get maps from local school bus routes, post offices, and the county tax assessor's office so that information could be compiled on one map.

"We've already voted to letter the east-west roads and number the north-south roads starting in the north-west corner of the county," said Judge Clayton.

Parmer County will be divided along section lines, and houses will be numbered within each section with up to 100 addresses per one mile section.

"I promised the postal service and the highway department that they needed to approve them," said Ms. Nielsen. Once she has all approvals, there will be a public hearing to let people know how the system will work.

A listing will be made of old addresses and new addresses.

Residents would be notified of the address changes, and will be given time to change the addresses they use on checks and stationery.

Once this is done, a new map book will be made up for all emergency personnel.

New road signs will have to be made up and installed over the 900 square mile county.

County Commissioner Robert White noted, "It looks like somebody is going to have to drive every road in the county."

Ms. Nielsen said the county will have to check with the state highway department before they made any new signs. They have regulations concerning the size, shape and color of the signs which can be used.

Sheriff Rex Williams said new signs will have to be at least 6 feet off the ground so they could be seen above weeds and corn.

Ms. Nielsen said once the signs are made, the highway department will put them up and attach them to posts that already exist.

The new numbering system will skip highways and recognized farm to market roads. It will simply affect the county roads.

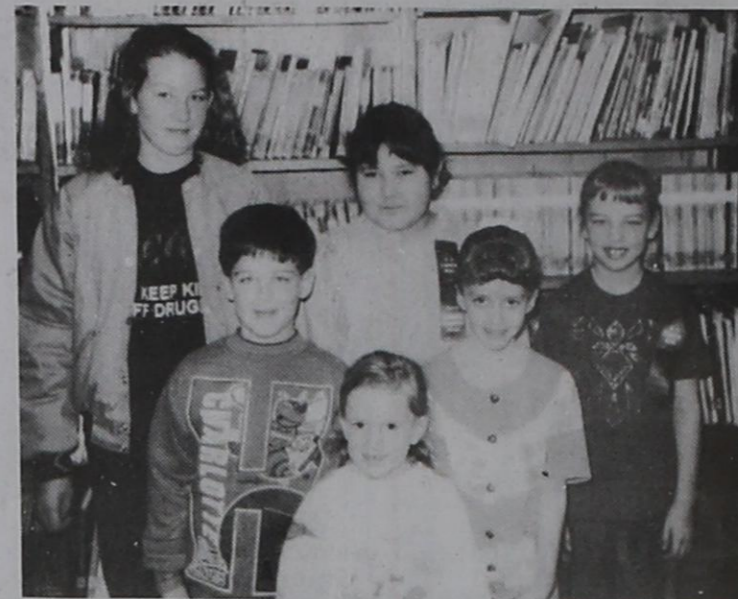
Seth Daniel Meeks was born Dec. 29 at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

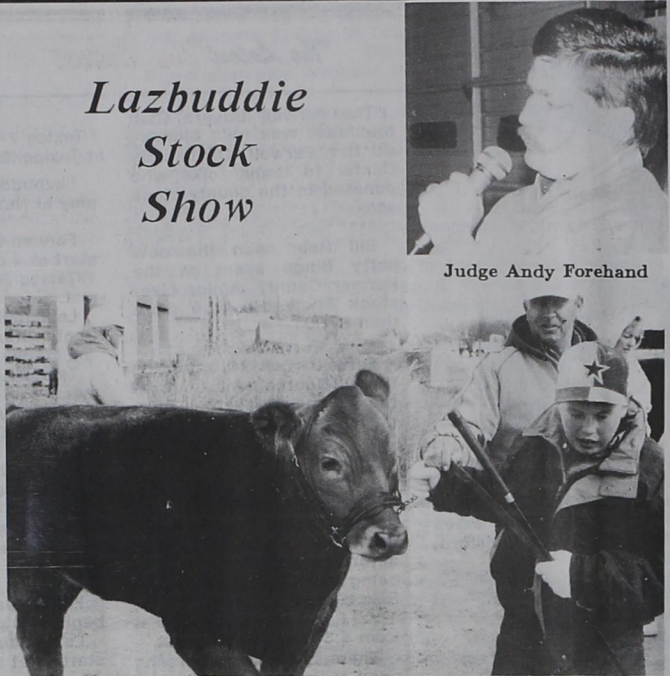

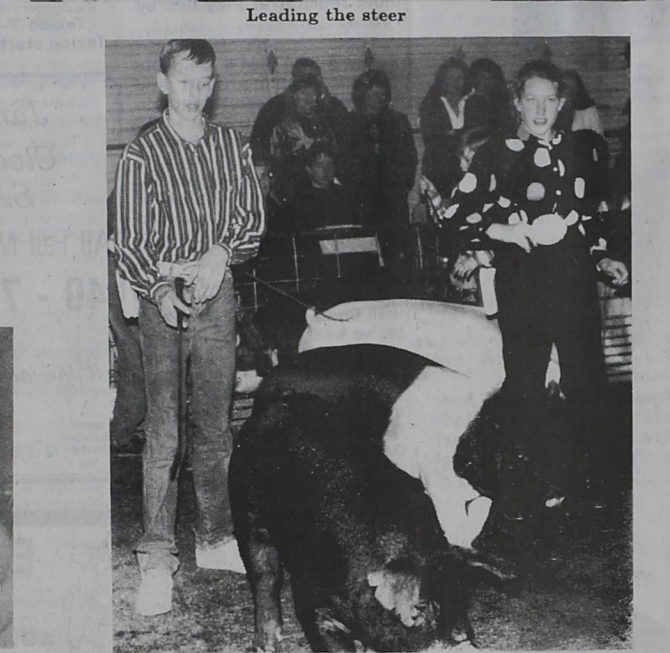

### WTRT's fiber optic cable links Parmer, other counties

West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative will soon complete a project to link its central offices in Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro Counties via fiber optic cable.

The latest round of fiber optic installation projects for the cooperative began with a route from the Frio central office to the Summerfield central office in Castro County.

Laying of cable along routes from the Oklahoma Lane central office to the Tharp central office in Parmer County is in progress.

Brooks Construction Company of Shawnee, Okla., a firm which specializes in cable installation for utilities, and which has performed extensive work for WTRT, is the contractor burying the 40 miles of eight - fiber cable to a depth of five feet.

The construction crew will face the daunting task of installing cable along a route passing through the city of Bovina. That portion of the project is expected to be slow work. Brooks has laid cables in downtown Lubbock and El Paso.

Central offices at Westway, Milo Center and Dawn, in Deaf Smith County, Summerfield, in Castro County, and Hub and Tharp in Parmer County, have been connected via fiber-optic cable for some years. WTRT management planned from the start to complete a total fiber link of central offices as resources allowed.

Tom Hyer, WTRT general manager, says that completing the fiber link will mean greatly expanded carrying capacity for the telephone network serving WTRT customer/members.

Fiber optic technology sends signals streaking at the speed of light via glass filaments that are the size of a human hair. One pair of fibers can carry 32, 256 messages simultaneously, without overloading the system. Traditional copper telephone wire, carrying digital signals in radio waves, handles a maximum of only 24 conversations on a pair of copper lines.

Signals carried via fiber have greatly reduced interference from outside noise and static, providing much clearer sound and expanded ability for sending information.

The technology allows making use of two-way interactive video for educational and medical applications, and could also open the way for delivery of cable television programming to rural residents via telephone cables. The technology works with data alarm and monitoring systems.

"Completing this fiber link will mean more and better service to our members. Improved service could even include video, if the time comes," says Hyer.

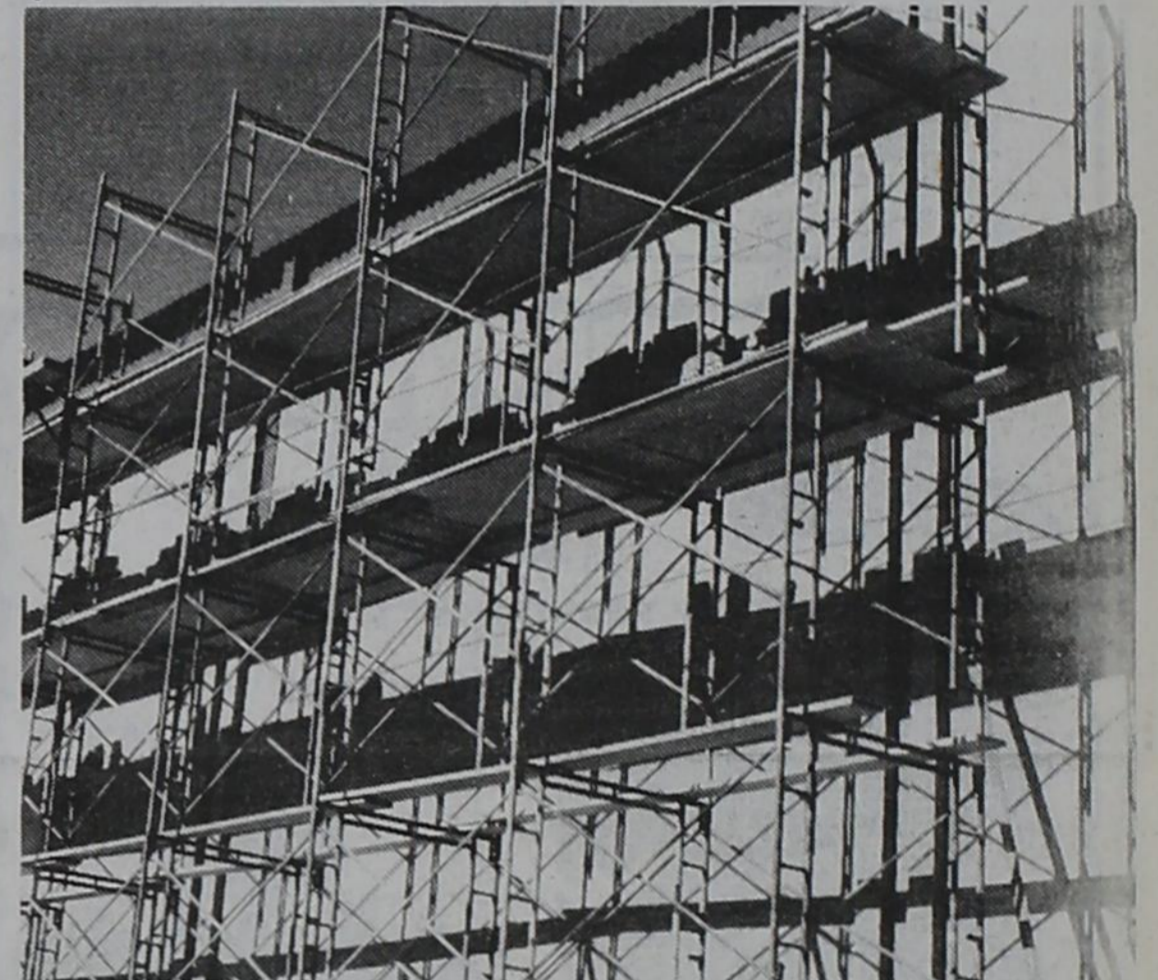

## Crisis hot line for youths suggested

Gary and LaWana Stone appeared at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting to discuss the possibility of starting a crisis hot line for youths in Texico.

Mrs. Stone is an aide at Texico Elementary School. Stone is an airport maintenance man employed by the City of Clovis. They live west of the Port of Entry and have two children attending Texico Elementary School.

Stone said he has been meeting with some Texico High students who would like to see a crisis hot line started. There are three youths involved but more are interested. Stone said the school has been sending the youths to seminars to get training on this topic.

He told the council that a building was needed for the operation. He said youths would man the phones with adult supervision. City Marshal Gil Holguin suggested that a phone be placed in the Texico Community Center for this.

Mayor Butch Tharp told the Stones that since the topic wasn't on the agenda, state law prevents the City Council from taking action on the request. But it will be on the next council meeting agenda so action can be taken.

Stone said the next meeting of his group will be at 3:30 p.m. Feb. 7 in the high school library.

In other business, the council:

- Heard councilwoman Carolyn Burrows volunteer to be Texico's representative on the Curry County Crimestoppers Board.

- Discussed buying new chairs and tables for the council chambers.

Tharp noted that Texico has been on the state's surplus property list for seven years and some excellent inexpensive chairs recently were available - but they were sold to someone else and Texico wasn't notified. He wasn't happy about that.

- Discussed the recent request by Manford Turnbough to get the property cleaned up at 501 Wheeler (just east of the flea market). A certified letter sent to the property owner was returned to the city and City Attorney Duane Hamar said the next step, if the council wanted to pursue it, would be to file a lawsuit.

Mrs. Burrows noted the property is an eyesore but there also are other eyesores in the community and the city doesn't have the money to file lawsuits against all of them. She said the city shouldn't take action unless they go after all of them. Councilman Oran Jay Autrey agreed.

The council voted 3-0 to take no action unless they could do so against all the eyesores.

- Heard Tharp discuss the regional landfill which is in the works. When work begins on this project, the sanitation cost to Texico residents will go up. But if Texico doesn't participate, and tries to go solo, the cost would be much higher to Texico residents.

- Noted that two bids were received from persons seeking the animal control post, Raymond Askew and Stewart Williams. Williams was the low bidder. The council wants to discuss the post with Williams before making a decision.

- Amended the animal control ordinance to put the fee

structure in line with Clovis since the two communities are working together on this.

- Authorized Autrey to spend up to \$750 at a Cannon Air Force Base auction on a used pickup for the city. Stone will help with this project.

- Agreed to ask Mae Stone to be judge again at the city election.

- Heard Tharp note that a cul de sac will be placed at Hereford at State streets as part of the Amarillo highway widening project. The council will be asked to approve a resolution backing the cul de sac in February.

- Heard Lewis Copper, a member of the cemetery board, thank the Texico 4-H for an excellent job in cleaning up the new portion of the city cemetery. About 20 kids and adults turned out Jan. 15 for the workday.

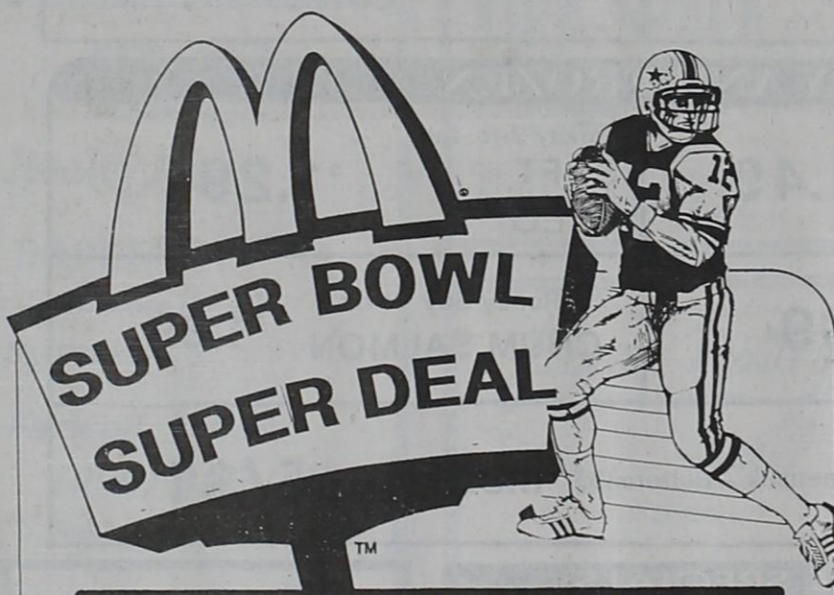
