





# Rains delay the appraisals

Dryland cotton producers across the Texas High Plains were dismayed by delays in the release of drought affected acreage following the first measurable rainfall to visit the area in over six weeks.

The rains only delayed the inevitable for many growers. Be-

Fire Calls

In the past 11 days, the Texico Volunteer Fire Dept. has been on 14 calls. Four were ambulance calls varying from someone having difficulty breathing to a possible drug overdose.

The rest of the calls were for fires. The fire department had four hay fires, most of them southwest of Texico. They had three grass fires, too.

The fire dept. also had a call to a structure fire on June 16. Orlando Ortiz's house had caught fire on north Griffin Street.

These calls weren't spread out over the 11 day time either. Most of them happened on the same three days, June 11, 14, 15. and 16.

Meanwhile, the Farwell ambulance was called out twice this week to accidents.

On June 16, it was called at 5:35 p.m. to a vehicle accident east of Farwell and took a person to Clovis hospital. On June 21, the ambulance went to an accident at 3:10 a.m. west of Lariat and took a person to Muleshoe hospital.

#### Boll weevils take a beating

Drought and heat have been Plains have dropped considtough on cotton farmers as erably from worrying highs a the struggle to get a 1998 cot- few weeks ago. ton crop underway. The hot, dry conditions have eliminated much of the dryland production and stressed cotton in irrigated fields.

But the conditions that take a toll on cotton farmers and their cotton are also really tough on the cotton boll weevil. As the heat continues, with no forecast of rain, boll weevil trap catches across most of the High

cause of the rain some will have to wait a full two weeks before they can receive an appraisal of their acreage.

For growers that received rain fall, appraisals will not resume until June 21 in counties with June 5 final planting dates or Jun 26 in counties with June 10 planting dates. Growers that did not receive any rainfall between planting and the final planting date continue to receive timely appraisan service.

Plains Cotton Growers officials were quick to try and abtain relief for producers whose crops were on the verge of being released when the rains occured. PCG initiated a conference call June 15 with USDA Risk Management Agency personnel, congressional staff representatives, and the National Cotton Council in an effort to avoid unnecessary delays in the appraisal process.

PCG officials are taking the lead in the effort to make some aspects of this year's appraisal deviation permanent and to include clearer language regarding final planting dates and requirements.

PCG is seeking permanent changes that would immediately release drought affected cotton acreage the day after the final planting date when no moisture is received on the crop between planting and that date. If moisture is received between planting and the final planting date PCG is recommending a seven day waiting period to allow the crop time to emerge to a stand.

"We think this will significantly improve producer satisfaction with the insurance protection they are buying since it provides a quick response when conditions warrant and builds in adequate protection for Federal Crop Insurance providers to determine if an insurable stand is going to be relized as the result of last-minute weather events," explains PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett.



The Texas Ag Extension Service says the statewide economic impact of the drought in Texas could be more than \$1.7 billion in losses.

All 10 climatic regions of the state received belowaverage rainfall from March through May - a critical time in the production of corn, cotton, wheat and forage in Texas.

As of June 15, the 3.5 million acres of cotton across the southern High Plains was still too young to evaluate. This number adds up to 25 percent of the total acreage in the nation.

A major shortfall in Texas cotton would reduce U.S. production and strengthen market prices, the extension service said.







# Munoz indicted in shooting

The Curry County grand jury on Tuesday indicted Aureliano Munoz of Texico on three felony charges and two misdemeanor charges stemming from the June 11 fatal shooting of Phillip Ortiz, 18, of Texico, the district attorney said.

Munoz, 22, was indicted on his original charges of involuntary manslaughter, shooting from a motor vehicle and felon in possession of a firearm, which are fourth-degree felonies, and misdemeanor charges of filing a false police report and negligent use of a



Munoz is charged with firing the fatal shot from a shotgun that hit Ortiz, while the two were riding in a van with two other friends on a rural dirt road outside Texico, accord-

The places targeted were paying cash to players, said law enforcement officials.


Some machines were confiscated.


Texas Attorney General Dan Morales has said the state constitution prohibits gaming except in a few cases, such as bingo, the state lottery and charitable raffles.

Farwell has an 8-liner business that offers coupons worth \$5 or less.

Parmer County Attorney Charles Aycock said, after the Farwell business opened, he wouldn't take any action against it pending court cases already filed against 8-liner businesses elsewhere in the Texas Panhandle.









# Funds to fight boll weevil okayed

News that both the House and Senate have taken the first steps toward approval of FY99 Agricultural Appropriations bill and funding for the Boll Weevil Eradication Program was met with cheers by cotton producers across the nation.

The news was welcomed by growers on the Texas High Plains who are now in the process of developing budgets for possible expansion of eradication activities in the five zones that exist in this area.

The House Appropriations Committee approved direct funding for the Boll Weevil Eradication program of \$16.292 million and indirect funding of \$100 million through a loan program that can be tapped into by state eradication foundations.

House debate on the Agriculture Appropriations bill could begin as early as June 24. Senate consideration could begin as early as today.

The House action followed Senate Appropriations Committee approval of \$16.292 million in direct funding and \$40 million for the loan program in its Agricultural Appropriations bill.

If approved by members of the House and Senate the bills containing this funding will go to a conference committee to hammer out a finished piece of legislation. Following conference committe consideration the final bill will have to be approvd one more time by both houses of Congress.

If successfully guided through this process the measure would then go to the President for his signature.

## Farwell Schools adopt gifted/talented program

The Farwell Schools have adopted a new gifted and talented program. Unlike the old program it is inclusive. In other words, the student will not be pulled out of the classroom, but will stay in the classroom.

The way to get selected for the new gifted and talented program is as follows. After a student is nominated, the parent must give written permission for the student to be tested.

The testing will occur in the spring semester of each school year. Students will take the Slosson IQ Test and must score a minimum of 125 in order to be further tested. A score of less than 125 will end testing procedures.

The following instruments will be used for further screening if the student has an IQ higher than 125:

1. Renzulli's Scale for Rating Behavioral Characteristics, filled out by student's present and/or a previous teacher.

- 2. Torrance Test of Creativity.
- 3. TAAS Scores (Grades 3 through high school)
- Achievement Test Scores (Grade 2).
- 4. Student Grades.
- 5. Parent Inventory.

The selection is determined by a District Committee based on data from these instruments.

### Two rabies cases reported in Parmer County

There have been two rabies cases found in Parmer County since the beginning of the year. This is a big increase over the norm, according to Dr. Gary Cash, a Friona veterinarian, who says that he hasn't had a rabies case once in all the 28 years that he has been here.

The first of these two was a horse that died on May 10. It was brought into Dr. Cash's clinic to have surgery done on its eye. During its recovery Dr. Cash noticed that the animal was not acting normal.

"He would pick up some straw in his mouth but would not eat it," said Dr. Cash. The animal continued to get worse and was put to sleep. Then it was confirmed that the animal was infected with rabies.

The second of the confirmed rabid animals was a skunk that was found on Roy Miller's place, three miles north of Friona. Dr. Dale Schueler stated that the skunk was alive but comatose when he found it. So he decided to send the animal's brain to Austin to have it tested by the Public Health Service. On June 18 it was confirmed that the animal had rabies.

According to Dr. Cash, an animal can have one of two types of rabies. There is "dumb" rabies and "serious" rabies. When an animal has serious rabies, it slobbers and tries to bite you. When an animal has dumb rabies, it is dull and depressed.

People should vaccinate valuable livestock and definitely family pets for the rabies virus. Take precaution in approaching any unfamiliar animals. It is not worth getting bite just because you are in a hurry. The cost of one rabies shot for a human is \$300 and it normally takes five shots to get rid of the disease.

If you see any animal that is suspicious, report is immediately to a veterinarian or to the county law enforcement.
