Small gas rate hike approved

The Farwell City Council Tuesday approved a small rate increase for Southern Union Gas, but not until after a lengthy discussion and the realization that it was the cheapest way to go.

A Southern Union Gas official told the council that the cost of service adjustment they were seeking would add about 42 cents a month to the average customer's bill. This would total about \$6,000 annually in proceeds.

He pointed out that last year, customers' bills went down about 42 cents a month.

Basically, these adjustments been. are determined by the amount of time crews need to come to Farwell from Borger, Texas, where they are stationed, to repair and work on gas leaks. If crews aren't needed much,

the expense goes down.

After 45 minutes of discussion, the council voted 3-2 to deny the adjustment. Against the hike were Pat Howard, John Carlson and James Chadwick. In favor were Martin Kube and Jerry

> Calhoun Property Management, of Mansfield, La., plans to seek an FmHA loan of more than \$700,000 to build 24 units (12 duplexes) for senior citizens on three acres of the Jean Travis property just south of Farwell (at its intersection with State Line Road).

The 1- and 2-bedroom units, with 900 to 1,000 sq. ft., would be brick, plus have carports. Persons must be 62 years old or older to qualify. These are not low-income subsidized units. The rent would be based on 30 percent of the renter's income after his basic neds are taken care of.

Once the 12 units are filled, Calhoun would build more, with a maximum of 72 duplexes. Calhoun has built 88 other projects, with 2,600 units, as those proposed here.

Calhoun would provide the curbs and gutters, and water and sewer lines, for the subdivision. The city would have to annex the area and provide city water and sewer services. That capability is available.

Gene Copeland, development manager for Calhoun, said Farwell is one of 14 targeted cities in Texas for these subdivisions, due to marketing studies done in Texas. Others include Floydada, Spur, Memphis, Stanton, Presidio and Sierra Blanca

Copeland said it normally takes 4 to 6 months to get FmHA approval, an 18 to 20 step process. The Amar-IIIo FmHA office will handle it. He said the Amarillo office only has a couple of other such applications at present, meaning Calhoun's application should be handled promptly.

Copeland said the Calhoun developments have a very high occupancy rate. They hire a local manager to handle each development. He said senior citizens normally take good care of their property. Also, a rec room will be

port for Calhoun's plans. They told none were available. said if Calhoun needs them, they would be glad to go to the FmHA office to show support for the development.

Councilman James Chadwick was concerned about whether the project, since rents would be lower than some other private housing, might devalue nearby properties. Copeland said the subdivision will enhance property values, since the company keeps strong maintenance and high occupancy.

Copeland said the company is also considering placing 1-, 2- and 3-bedroom family units behind the senior citizen complex.

Calhoun has been in business for 18 years, he added.

Farwell seeks rec grant

The Farwell City Council Tuesday approved seeking a grant through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to build two new tennis courts, a walking trail and expansion of the baseball field near the school - or a new baseball

Courtney Sharp, a PRPR representative, held a public hearing on the park development project at the meeting. He estimated that the PRPC will seek \$148,000 for the courts, trail and baseball field expansion - new bleachers and lights.

After some discussion, PRPC will also ask for funds for restrooms, concession stand and a second baseball field. The grant request calls for Farwell to match the grant funds. But Sharp said the city's match could be mostly done

in donated material and labor. The tennis courts are needed to replace the two that were

demolished to make way for the new school gym. In other business, the council:

- Approved a mobile home variance for 111 9th St. for R. L. May, who plans to put a mobile home behind his house for his son to live in. Six letters were sent out; none were returned. City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen said one person called to say theree was no objection.

- Approved five building permits: Bob Anderson, 704 3rd, housing addition; Herman Geries, 905 5th, storage building; Turner Paine, 805 4th, carport; Joe Hernandez, 300 2nd, chain link fence; and Jimmy Franse, 409 8th, housing

- Gave a solicitor's permit to Joe Fodor, Amarillo, to sell

balloons and novelties at Border Town Days. - Agreed to send a letter to Pudge Rose, of Throckmorton, Texas, owner of the former drug store building adjacent to City Hall, noting that the property is being considered for condemnation. The building is flooded, it was stated, and is a health hazard.


Cozbey, **Brockman** star

An album of his biggest hits is planned for release in the United Kingdom in the future. He has performed on the Grand Ole Opry and toured the country with folks like Jim Reeves, Marty Robbins, Johnny Cash, Willie Nelson and Brenda Lee.

"The Sugartimers" band members are Vick Ashmead, steel guitar; Jimmy Young, fiddle; Chet Calcote, bass; Prof. Frank Hardcastle, lead guitar, and Ted Czahowski, drummer. Young and Calcote once played with the legendary Bob Wills and his "Texas Playboys" band.

Although Amarillo has been his home for a number of years, Phillips enjoys coming back to Farwell and "doing something for my hometown".
