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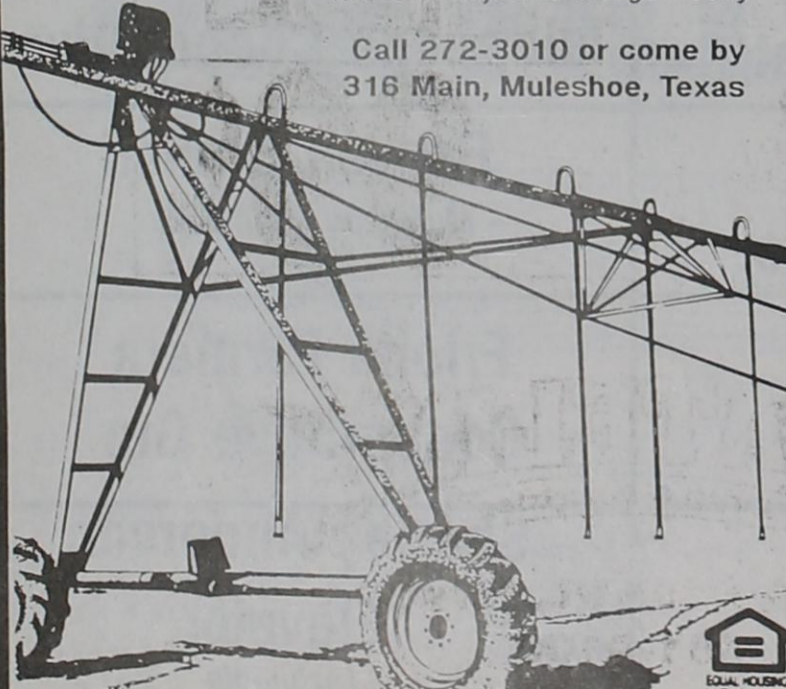
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A return to his roots

Texico resident David Parmer is digging into his roots. Recently Parmer brought in a newspaper article which had been in his family for many years. It is about an Eastland County ancestor, William "Bill" Lafayette Parmer, who was born in November 1862. David Parmer says that Bill Parmer was his great-grandfather. David Parmer is trying to find out if his ancestor is related to Martin Parmer, the man for whom Parmer County is named.

The article was a re-print of an interview that was done in 1935. David Parmer indicated that the late Bill Parmer was kin to the Martin Parmer for whom Parmer County was named. The exact kinship is not clearly stated in the article.

Parmer County Historical Society member Hugh Moseley offered the opinion that Bill Parmer may or may not have been a direct descendent of Martin Parmer because most of Parmer's descendent's preferred to use the family's original last name of Palmer because Martin Parmer was like his nickname: "a ring-tail panther."

The Parmer County history book quotes Martin Parmer as saying, "I am a real ring-tail panther and I feed all my children on rattlesnake hearts fried in panther's grease." Martin Parmer was an Indian fighter and revolutionary leader.

Martin Parmer was an early settler of Texas in the early 1820's. He was an active participant in the Fredonia Rebellion which preceded the Texas War for Independence from Mexico, and he became the first president of the Fredonia Republic. Later he participated in the Texas War for Independence.

The county history book tells that Martin Parmer fathered about 16 or 17 children by his four wives. So he may have left many, many descendents.

David Parmer's article includes some facts which might indicate a relationship to Martin Parmer. First, Bill Parmer mentioned the Capitol Land Syndicate's acquisition of land in the Panhandle in his article:

It quotes Bill Parmer as saying: "The first land I owned was state public land, which I homesteaded from the state, contracting to pay \$1.00 per acre, with 40 years to pay for it at three per cent interest. But I settled with the state before the 40 years was up. In fact, I paid the last payment the year that the present state capitol building was completed in 1887, and received an invitation to attend the state ball celebrating the completion of the building."

"Texas gave three million acres of land, located in the panhandle of Texas, to Farwell and Associates to erect the state house, and the contractors later offered to deed the land back to the state for considerably less than they estimated it to be worth under the building contract. However, the legislature turned down the proposition, unwisely, as this land would have furnished farm homes for thousands of people, and the state would have reaped a handsome profit, for soon after this offer was declined land values increased rapidly."

David Parmer has other reasons to believe that he is related to Martin Parmer. One is that some of Bill Parmer's children were named after Martin Parmer. Bill Parmer's 1935 interview states: "I was married March 30, 1889, to Miss Mary Agnew, a sister of the Agnew boys now living in and near Cisco. This family lived where Rising Star is now located, and they preceded us to this country a few years."

"We were the parents of ten children, eight of whom are still living. These are Ernest and Martin A. Parmer, now living in Lamb County. Our second child was a girl, Mrs. Grover Cleveland, who lives nine miles north of Cisco, in the Cottonwood school community. The others are Mrs. Vera Phillips, wife of Oliver Phillips of Cisco; Mrs. Ora Van Eman of Cisco; M.L. (Doc) Parmer, engineer for the Lone Star Gasoline Co. at Breckenridge; Mrs. Morace Mangrum of Harlingen; and Miss Pearl Parmer of Henderson, Texas. There are about 30 grandchildren."

The news article later relates that Travis Parmer was born of Bill Parmer's second marriage.

In addition to the news article, David Parmer also has a letter which was written to him years ago by one of his relatives. It refers to one of David's ancestors as Morton Parmer and also as Mortain Parmer.

Years ago public records were not always kept as systematically as they are today. Frequently abbreviations and nicknames were used. Folks sometimes waited several years before they rode into town to record things like births and deaths.

David Parmer will have to do a little digging to find out if he is related to the Martin Parmer for whom Parmer County is named. He will probably find himself digging through birth certificates, death certificates, tax records, church records and old letters before he is through with his quest.


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Farwell PTA discusses fund-raisers

Sky Byrum kicked off and Springer started on its 25. Joey Winkles had two tackles. On 3rd down, the Texico defense broke through the line causing a 1-yard loss and a punt.

Texico was held and punted to midfield. Bobby Winegeart and Leroy Salinas combined on a tackle for a 2-yard loss. Then Clyde Jenkins sacked the QB for an 8-yard loss. A tackle by Joel Barba forced a punt, which went into the end zone, Texico starting on its 20.

Hadley Gilbert ran for 12 yards. But a clipping penalty was called pushing Texico back. Johnny Salinas then ran for good yardage. Gilbert ran for a first down, while two Springer players hung on to him.

Texico continued moving the ball, with carries by Gilbert, Byrum, Johnny Salinas and Barba. But Texico lost a fumble to half their drive.

Springer got off a long pass, which was incomplete, just before Kyle Stamps got to the quarterback. Good tackles were recorded by Johnny Salinas and Byrum. But Springer scored on a 2-yard run with 3 seconds left in the first quarter. The kick made it 7-0.

Johnny Salinas returned the kickoff to the 30. Barba broke loose for 19 yards. Runs by Johnny Salinas and Gilbert got another first down. But the drive stalled and Texico punted into the end zone, Springer starting on its 20.

Corey Horner, Johnny Salinas, Winegeart and Winkles recorded tackles. Then Winegeart recovered a fumble. Gilbert gained good yardage on a 3rd down play to the Springer 20. Johnny Salinas gained 3, followed by Gilbert for 6 more. Barba gained another first down.

It looked like Texico was going to settle for a field goal try. Instead, they faked and it and got into the end zone. But the refs called the ball down at the fake, which killed the TD and gave the ball to Springer with 21 seconds left in the half. On defense, Horner, Jenkins and Gilbert had tackles as the first half ended.

Johnny Salinas returned the third quarter kick for good yardage. Barba and Gilbert moved the ball well on the ground.

But the Red Devils recovered a fumble. Tackles were made by Johnny Salinas and Jenkins. Winegeart and Byrum broke up a pass, as Texico got the ball back. Texico was held and punted back.

Then a good break went Texico's way as Gilbert recovered a Springer fumble deep in Texico territory with 2:21 left in the 3rd quarter. Byrum ran for 6 up the middle. Then Barba

hit a long pass to Winegeart, good for a 75-yard TD. Byrum kicked the point after to tie the score at 7-all with 1:23 left in the quarter.

In the fourth quarter, Springer was held after tackles by Leroy Salinas, Horner and Jenkins, plus an outstanding tackle by Stamps. Texico was held and punted back. Johnny Salinas, Gilbert and Winkles had tackles, then Texico recovered a fumble at midfield.

Barba ran for around 20 yards. A penalty against Springer put the ball at the Red Devil 10. Gilbert plunged in from the 1 to put Texico ahead. The Byrum kick made it 14-7 with 3:34 left in the game.

Winegeart tackled the Springer kick returner at the Texico 40. Springer took to the air in an attempt to knot the game. Winkles intercepted and ran back for big yardage. But the runback was nullified due to a penalty and Texico started on its 25. Texico was stopped and had to kick with 1:19 left in the game.

Again, Springer took to the air. They gained when Texico was called for pass interference. Leroy Salinas had a good rush on the QB, forcing an incomplete pass. With about a minute left, Springer got down to the Texico 20. Then they passed for a TD with 55 seconds left, making the score 14-13.

Springer tried to run for the two extra points which they needed to win the game. But they were met around right end by Jenkins who made a bulldog tackle, while assisted by other Wolverines.

Springer then tried an onside kick but Jeremy Stanton covered it for Texico. Texico then ran the time out.

Individual stats included: rushing - Gilbert, 14 for 71; Barba, 21 for 131; Byrum, 8 for 28; Johnny Salinas, 6 for 11; passing - Barba, 1 for 4 and 75 yards.

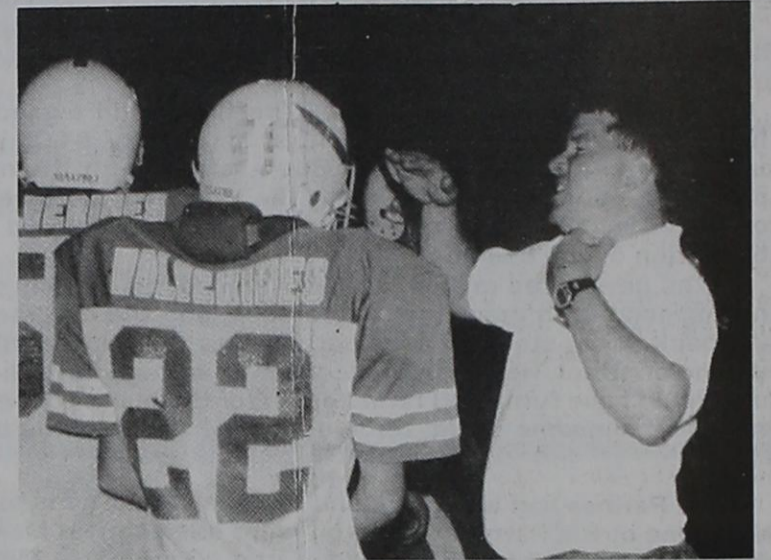

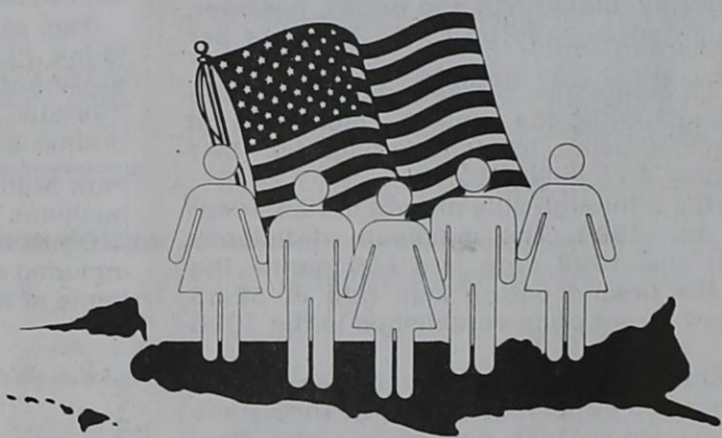

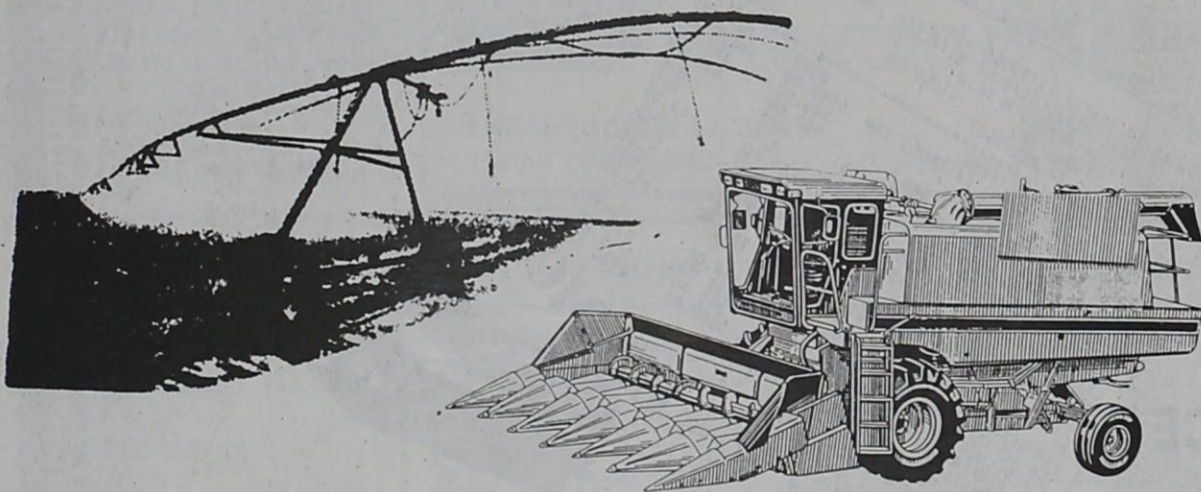

Longhorns rally to beat El Paso Jesus Chapel, 44-34

The Lazbuddie Longhorns had a pleasant Homecoming last Friday as they rallied in the final period to whip El Paso Jesus Chapel, 44-34.

The Longhorns, 4-1, open district play tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. at Amherst.

The Longhorns started quickly against Jesus Chapel, opening a 14-0 lead early in the first quarter. Lazbuddie scored on a 39-yard run by Jonas Hernandez and a 41-yard pass play from Brett Thomas to Troy McBroom. And Matt Elliott added two points on a points-after kick.

Then Jesus Chapel came back roaring. They tallied four straight touchdowns to take a 28-14 lead at the half. Scores came on 34-, 11- and 64-yard runs, and a 39-yard return of a fumble.

The third quarter saw both teams score once - Lazbuddie on a 25-yard TD return of an interception by Jon Colby Miller, and Jesus Chapel on a 13-yard run. Elliott added 2 more on the kick and Lazbuddie was behind 34-22 at the end of this quarter.

But it was all Lazbuddie in the final period. Miller brought the Longhorns closer with a 19-yard TD run, followed by an Elliott kick. That made it 34-30. Then Lazbuddie took the lead for good when Clark scored from the 5, followed by an Elliott kick. A 58-yard TD run by Miller ended the scoring.

Coach Scisson noted that Miller had an outstanding ball game, both on offense and defense. On offense, he rushed 6 times for 110 yards and 2 TDs. He also caught passes for 69 yards. He returned an interception for a TD, giving him three TDs in all. On defense, Miller was credited with 9 unassisted tackles and 16 assisted tackles.

"We were behind 28-14 at the half, and the kids decided they wanted to come from behind to win. It shows the type of character these kids have to come from behind like that," said the coach.

This time of the year they are processing pumpkins, mini pumpkins, Indian corn, feather corn, blue corn, finger corn, mini - white pumpkins, gourds, and strawberry corn. Most of these items are decorative items that a housewife might use to beautify her home.

Some years they grow regular corn at their place; other years they grow the decorative varieties.

"We used to process it in the fields, but most years it's wet," said Ronnie Puckett. They still process regular corn in the field, but they do the unusual varieties inside the building.

The company leased the Country Market building and added a loading dock in front. "We've got to be on a highway when a truck comes in," Puckett said.

The produce is cleaned and sorted when it comes into the plant. Some of the tiny decorative pumpkins and gourds are waxed to make them more attractive. Then it is packed into boxes for shipping to grocery stores and flower shops that sell it to the public. Locally, "My son sells it; it's his business," said Puckett.

Some of the items they handle are really unique breeds of common produce. The ears of strawberry corn are about 2" long, and each kernel is bright red and sharp. Feather corn kernels grow inside of a papery protective covering.

Blue corn and Indian corn are ancient varieties of corn like those that Native Americans grew; today they are grown both for decorative purposes and for foods.

Mini - pumpkins and white pumpkins are grown for decorative uses. Gourds are also used in decorative arrangements, and they are made into dippers and rattles.

For years seed companies bred seeds of some of these plants so that they could produce only bigger, prettier varieties. Later they learned that some of the ancient varieties had value, too. They also found that people liked some newer varieties simply because they were unusual or different.

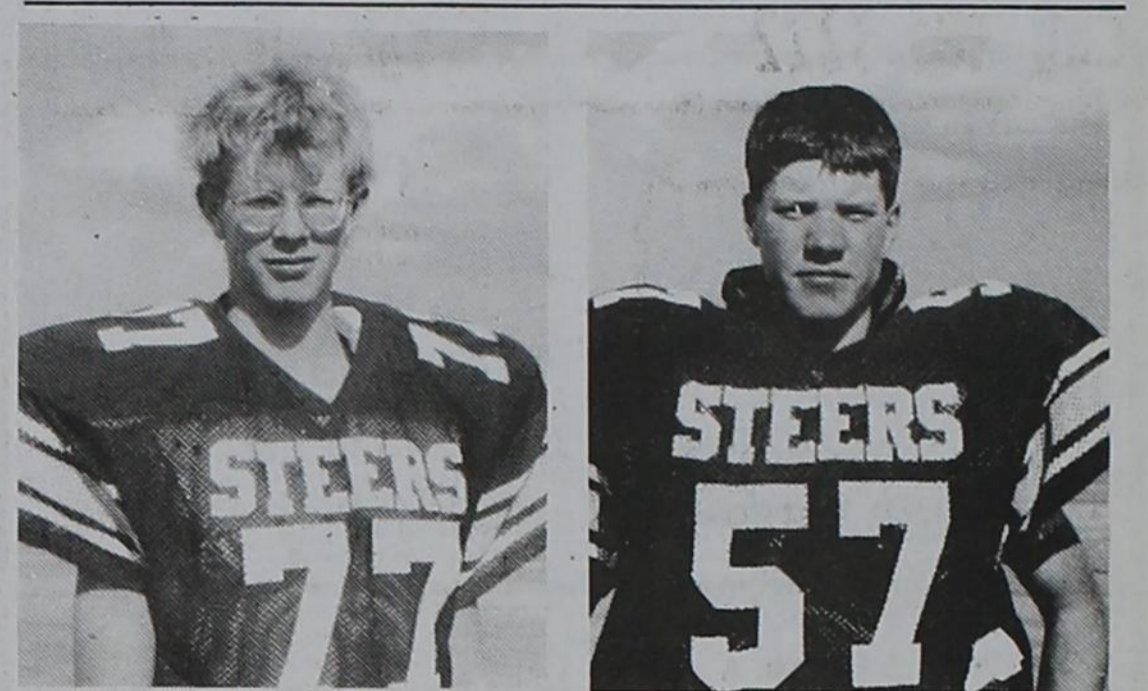
In the third quarter, Anton missed a 41-yard field goal try. But near the end of the stanza, Anton scored from the 1. The






