McGaa seeks 2nd officer

Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa made another strong plea to the Farwell City Council Tuesday for the city to hire a second police officer.

McGaa said he didn't have enough time to handle fulltime patrol plus fulltime paperwork. He discussed the amount of time it took to handle paperwork after a crime occurred. As an example, he said he had to go to places like Olton, Muleshoe (several times) and Portales to talk with folks about criminal incidents that had occurred in Farwell.

McGaa said three officers were needed to provide Farwell with correct police enforcement, but he was only asking for one more.

Mayor Chris Gikas said he would check to see if any state or national grants were available to fund a second officer. The pending national crime bill that is supposed to put another 100,000 police officers on the streets was pointed out.

In other business, the council:

- Heard Ysleta Kittrell report that she and Frances Kube, Neighborhood Watch co-chairmen, have scheduled a town meeting at 7 p.m. on Aug. 22 to find out if the community wants the program reinstated. Lubbock police will send over a specialist team that helps organize such programs to this meeting.

- Held a public hearing on an ordinance dealing with restrictions on truck parking. Mrs. Kittrell had suggested it. At the hearing, any such ordinance was opposed by Gene Christian, and Mr. and Mrs. Cotton Robertson. It was noted that several businessmen who live here use trucks. No action was taken.

- Approved a variance for a mobile home at 306 Seventh st.

Agreed to poll the neighbors before allowing John Vidaurri to move a 4- bedroom home from rural Farwell to

8th and Avenue D. - Changed the meeting dates for the August and September meetings to the second Tuesdays of those

Agreed to seek a state grant for used oil collection with

the stipu'ation it be placed at Tri County Tire. - Approved the proposed 1994-95 budget. Everything is still tentative, but due to a leftover budget surplus, it's hoped there will be no tax increase next year. Included within it are salary hikes for city employees that are tired to the national cost-of-living index. This is estimated between 4

and 5 percent. Agreed to seek bids on liability insurance for 1994-95. - Received two bids for the annual street work, from Eastwood Construction, Clovis, and Donahue, Lubbock. They

were taken under advisement. - At councilman John Carlson's suggestion, made a rule change involving persons seeking variances. Previously, persons seeking the variance had to come to two meetings - first to be told how to seek the variance, then to be there when the council made a decision. That first meeting is now eliminated; city clerk Cynthia Thigpen will explain to the person seeking the variance how to go about it when they

Lusk buys 'cannon'

Farwell's Terry Lusk was quoted in an Associated Press story on the front page of Monday's Lubbock newspaper.

It seems Lusk Onion in Clovis, operated by Terry, his father and brother, has received the first American installation of an Anti-Hail Cannon made in Canada.

The \$130,000 system was installed to protect some 200 acres of onions.

The AP story said about 350 similar cannons have been used the past 15 years around the world, mainly protecting French vineyards and Mexican apple orchards.

The cannon hurls gas from a dozen acetylene tanks at the speed of sound into into the cloud that has potential hail. Using a hand-carried device, the farmer can start the cannon by remote control.

The sound waves, fired six seconds apart into the air for 30 minutes, block the formation of hail, according to the company. Also, they said the accumulation of shock waves and vibrations created by the cannon accelerates thawing.

soap. Bandage the mixture to the area where the splinter in imbedded. By morning it may be ready to be drawn out.

- Asthma attack: Drink a couple of cups of strong coffee or hot cocoa.

- Athletes Foot: Soak your feet in hot salty water. Dry the feet and rub them with baking soda. Keep feet clean and dry.

- Tick bites: Try to brush the tick off before it gets embedded. If it has taken hold, apply kerosene or benzine to the area to irritate the critter. Once it's gone, wash the area and apply iodine.

- Blisters: Sterilize a needle with alcohol. Prick the blister with the needle; drain fluid. Wash and apply antiseptic and a bandage.

- Hives: Dab on Milk of Magnesia or baking soda.

- Colds: "Starve a cold; feed a fever," the old-timers would say. What the meant is: If you have a runny nose or

cough it might be an allergy. Cut back on foods and see if the symptoms go away. If there is fever present, it's probably an infection. Give the body the food it needs to fight infection.

Chicken soup is the medicine prescribed by grandmothers the world over to relieve cold symptoms. It helps to unclog the nasal passages.

Other suggestions would have included: gargle with salt water; drink a hot toddy; rub your nose with petroleum jelly if it gets sore.

Treat has seen many congregations over the past several years: He was born near Arch, N.M., and moved from there to Deming. After college at New Mexico State and Southern Methodist University, he has pastored 9 different church congregations, and has spoken to many, many others.

Each congregation had its own individuality. "Churches in a normal pattern are cyclematic," he said. The age and experience of the members affect the church dramatically.


"In some places they have to start over and bring in younger people," he noted. Churches can take an active role in eradicating urban blight.

Treat likes being in a small community like Farwell, "In bigger communities people don't all work on the same wave length. They don't all have the same value systems," he noted. Churches, families, schools and organizations all help to re-enforce the basic value system, and put the

members on to the same path. "The way to change America is to strengthen our American families," he said, with a Yoda-like twinkle in his

Mrs. Treat enjoys sewing and arranging flowers. "I like crafty things," she says. Painting sweatshirts for her grandkids has been a recent hobby. She plays the piano and sings in the church choir. He husband says proudly that she, "is involved in the work and the life of the church.

'Our goal is to help the church to continue to be a loving, accepting community. That's a basic understanding of what the Kingdom of God is all about," he said.



Mammography unit coming to Farwell Medical Clinic

St. Mary of the Plains Hospital Mobile Mammography unit will be at Dr. Nancy Chasteen's office at the Farwell Medical Clinic on Monday to help area women discover breast cancer early. Please call the clinic at 481-3200 for an appointment.

According to the American Cancer Society, one in every nine women will develop breast cancer in her lifetime. The most successful weapon against it is early detection, and the most effective tool for early detection is mammography. Also, the hospital recommends that a breast self-exam be performed monthly and that a breast exam be performed annually by the patient's physician.

Most women procrastinate on having a mammogram for two reasons: the inconvenience and the cost. Taking the mobile unit to a convenient location and charging a modest fee eliminates both of these reasons.

Each patient receives a mammogram by a registered radiologic technologist. Information on breast self-exam is

provided on the mobile unit.

The patient and her physician receive a written copy of the radiologist's report. If the report is positive and requires follow-up, the reports are sent by certified mail.

The screening mammogram is designed for asymptomatic patients. A screening mammogram can be provided without a physician's order for asymptomatic women over the age of 40.

A patient who fits under any of the following categories does <u>not</u> qualify for a screening mammogram on the mobile

A patient under the age of 40; a patient with a palpable lump; a patient who has had a mastectomy; a patient who has had implants; a patient who has had breast surgery within the last year; a patient who has had a mammogram within the last 12 months.



It began in 1761

In February 1761, in a crowded Boston courtroom, a group of merchants denounced the general warrants which gave the English soldiers authority to search any ship, store or house. At that time the person, property and premises of the individual were subject to practically unlimited searches and seizures. These "General Warrants" were used indiscriminately and no showing of "probable cause" was

The former attorney general of the Colony of Massachusetts, James Otis, represented the merchants. He described the general warrants as "the worst instrument of arbitrary power, the most destructive of English liberty, and the fundamental principals of law, that was ever found in an English law book." John Adams heard the arguments and after he became President of the United States said, "Then and there the child of independence was born."

Fifteen years later, 1776, the colonies declared their independence. In 1789 the Constitution was ratified, and in 1791 the Fourth Amendment was adopted to ensure that the personal security and private property of the individual would be protected against invasion by the federal government. It reads: The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.
