

Lady Wolverines win state opener

The Texico Lady Wolverines used their strong defense and some clutch 3-point shooting to win their state guarter-final game over the Mora Rangerettes on Friday at Albuquerque Eldorado High School, 56-46.

The Lady Wolverines, seeded No. 2, move into the state semi-final at 4 p.m. mt on March 9, vs. Hope Christian at Albuquerque Cibola High School. If Texico wins, they play for the title at 4 p.m. mt on March 10.

Scoring for Texico were Lori Richardson, 12; Krystal Williams, 15 (on 5 3-pointers); Stephanie Bailey, 7; Faith Martin, 9 (8 of which came in the final quarter to keep Texico in the lead); Bryn Mayfield, 11 (with a pair of 3-pointers); Brooke Bailey, 2; and Erika Autrey, 2.

Texico hit on 10 2-point baskets and 8 3-pointers.

The big quarter for Texico was the 2nd, as the Lady Wolverines outscored Mora, 16-7. And that shows how close the other 3 quarters were.

The game opened with Richardson scoring on a Mayfield assist. But Mora surged ahead to take a 7-4 lead at the 1st quarter midway mark. Kyrstal Williams answered with her first 3-pointer at 3:00. After Mora scored, Richardson put in a rebound to tie the score at 9-all. Then Stephanie Bailey's free throw at the end of the quarter gave Texico a lead it never relinquished.

As stated, the 2nd quarter was owned by Texico. They shot quickly ahead on a pair of 3-pointers by Williams, free throws by Martin and Stephanie Bailey, and Bailey jumper to move ahead, 21-10.

The teams traded buckets the rest of the quarter, as the Lady Wolverines went into halftime ahead, 26-16.

Texico kept on the pressure early in the 3rd quarter behind 3-pointers by Williams and Mayfield. A jumper by Brooke Bailey gave Texico a commanding 37-21 lead with 2:30 left. But Mora fought back, closing to within 11 as the quarter ended.

Mora was able to close the score as Texico went through a 4 1/2 minute scoring drought. But Martin's strong performance in the final quarter kept the Rangerettes, who finished the season at 18-11, at bay.

After Mora closed to within 9 with 6 minutes left, a Martin layup answered back. The

Clayton, Hodnett to have runoff

As expected there was a low turnout for the Parmer County primary elections, especially on the Democrat side, since there was only one contest (on the Republican side).

Parmer County Clerk Colleen Stover reported there were few problems with the new electronic voting machines for the handicapped -- just paper jams at Rhea and Friona polling places.

First a look at the Republican primary:

The one race in the primary was for nomination for Pct. 2 county commissioner. Vote totals were: Galen Carson, 16; James Clayton, 119; Larry Hodnett, 82, and Ben Osborn, 69.

Since none of these candidates received at least 50 percent of the vote, there will be a run-off election to pick the GOP nominee between the top two vote-getters --**Clayton and Hodnett on April 8.**

Altha Herington, unopposed for re-election as Parmer County Treasurer, got 420 votes.

Elvis Powell, unopposed for re-election as Pct. 4 (the Lazbuddie area) county commissioner, got 22 votes.

Sandra Warren, unopposed for re-election as 287th District Clerk, got 456 votes. Valton Howard, unopposed for re-election as Pct. 1 (the Friona area) Justice of the

Peace, got 224 votes.

Pam Haseloff, unopposed for re-election as Pct. 3 (the Farwell area) Justice of the Peace, got 67 votes.

Colleen Stover, unopposed for re-election as Parmer County Clerk, got 443 votes. Incumbent Vi Hutto got 147 votes in the primary as the GOP candidate for Justice of the Peace for Pct. 2. She will face Democrat Gaylon Rhodes in November.

Jody Lewellen got 363 votes as his party's nominee for Parmer County Judge.

Services for Hurshel Harding were held on March 2 at Steed-Todd Chapel in Clovis with Pastor Kyle Medlock officiating. Burial was in Sunset Terrace Memorial Cemetery.

He died Feb. 25 in Taylor County, Texas.

He was born 6 1/2 miles south of Texico to N.R. and Ethel Harding on Oct. 22, 1929. He graduated from Farwell High School in 1947.

He received a law degree in 1954 from Baylor University. He served in the U.S. Air Force. He married Joyce Hart, of Portales, on Nov. 10, 1954. In 1957, he joined the Aldridge & Aldridge law firm in Farwell, and later became a senior member of the firm. He was Parmer County Attorney for 17 years.

Upon moving to Brownwood, Texas, in 1995, he became a member of North Ridge Baptist Church.

He was a 50 year member of the Muleshoe Masonic Lodge, past president of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club and Farwell Chamber of Commerce, a longtime member of the Baylor Bear Foundation and director of the Char-Swiss Cattle Breeders Association.

He was preceded in death by his parents; his wife, and 2 brothers, J.D.

Nearly everyone who owns a pet has to find a vet for routine and emergency care. Many also need the services of a pet groomer, a boarding facility or training aid. Finding these pet pros is not really all that hard.

The phone book will list veterinarians in your area, and you can also ask friends and neighbors for their recommendations. Some vets specialize in certain species and others are known for dealing with certain breeds.

Does your pet just need regular preventive care, such as vaccinations and de-worming? Or does it need ear cropping or dental work? Your pet's breeder, if local, can also recommend they vet they use.

Before choosing a vet, go to their hospital or clinic and visit with the doctor and staff. Do they make you feel comfortable? Are they willing to answer questions? Do you like the individuals? We all have different comfort levels, and a vet is a person you have to trust with your pet's welfare. Find out if this clinic has emergency care, of if you have to call someone else on weekends or at night. You might even ask prices for routine care and payment options, if those things are important.

Once you have a vet you like, then he or she can recommend trainers, groomers or boarding kennels. Again, friends and neighbors can help in this way, too. If you see someone whose dog has a haircut that you find attractive, ask where they had the dog groomed. Most people would love the compliment on their pt, and we all love to talk about our dogs.

Feel free to visit pet care facilities before you take your pet there. Grooming shops should be clean -- west dog smell doesn't count! Try to watch the groomers. Would you want your pet in their hands? Ask prices, and see what is included.

Some places seem to be cheaper but that is because they charge extra for nail trimming, and glands, ear cleaning, and extra bushing. Pet grooming is not regulated like a barber or hairdresser, so anybody can set themselves up as a groomer.Some groomers know how to do traditional cuts on many breeds, while others may only know a couple "one size fits all" styles. Then there are those who just know how to buzz the hair off, and that is it.

Boarding kennels should also be clean and inviting. Don't call before you visit. Just pop in and ask to see the facilities. If you are refused, it may be because the owners have something they don't want you to see. Most kennels are proud and happy to show you around, and to answer questions. Make sure you know the hours of the kennel, and if they allow early or late drop-offs and pickups. Ask what food they feed, and if you are allowed to bring your pet's own food, toys or blanket. Make sure that everything looks to be in good repair.

With a dog trainer, again ask folks you know for recommendations. Go watch the lessons. Are you comfortable with the training style? Does the trainer seem interested in what your goals are for your dog? You, as the owner, should always be either the trainer of your dog, or work very closely with the trainer.

Some sports, like bird dog training, are handled by professionals, but you, as the owner, need to know the commands and how your dog has been trained. With basic obediance, it's always best if the dog's owner does the training with guidance from the trainer. That way, a bond develops between the two of you. Dogs love the time they get to spend one on one with their person, and will actually learn to anticipate class day.

Always remember, you have to make the best choices for your pet. If you care, you will pick your pet care professionals carefully and both of you will be happy with the results -- a healthy, well behaved, well adjusted, loving member of your family.
