All band students in grades 7-12 are encouraged to participate.

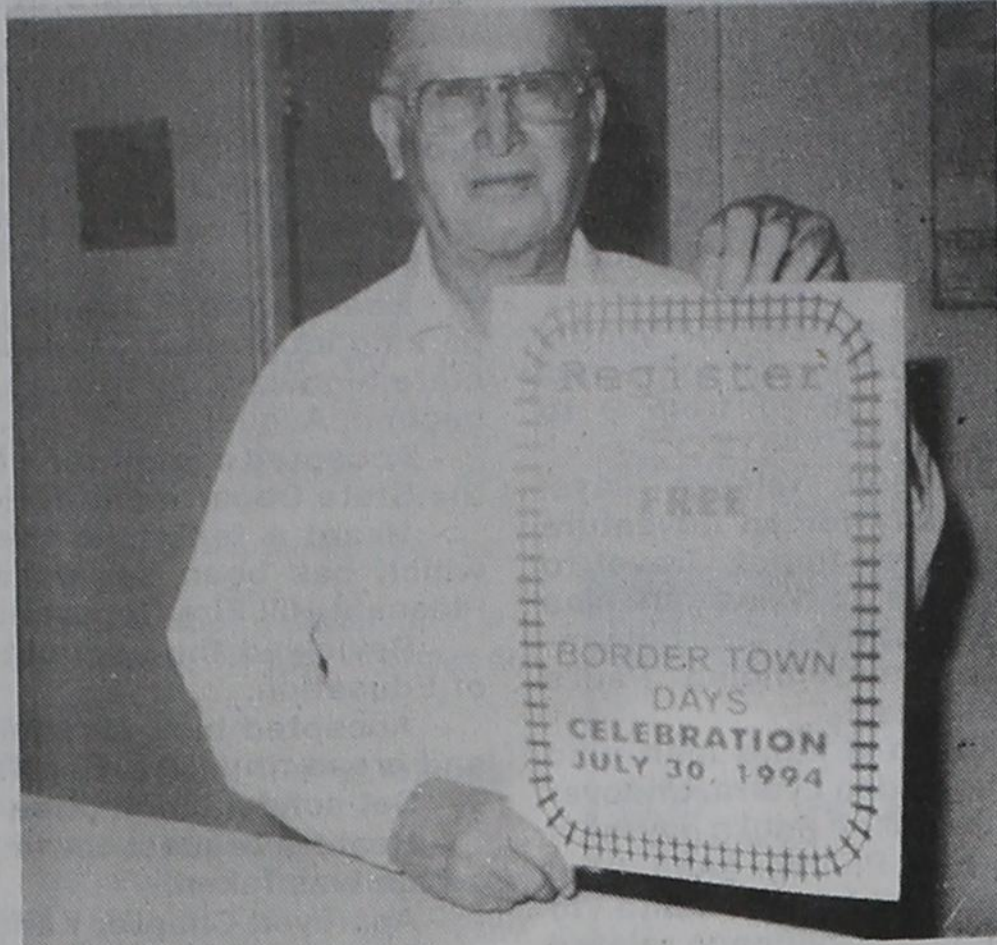
"We practiced a little bit at the end of the school year with some songs that all of the students can play," said Henry.

## BTD Merchants' Giveaway starts

## Frona officials present potential sites for annex

Frona officials presented three site options to the Parmer County Commissioners Monday for a courthouse annex in Friona.

The presentation was made by Teresa Buske, Chamber of Commerce executive director, and Bill McCoy, Chamber president. They had appeared at the June 13 meeting to ask the commissioners to offer more county services in Friona.

Needs they pointed out were: motor vehicle registration and title transfer, county extension services, early voting elections, hunting licenses, marriage licenses and a posting board for duplicates of notices posted in the county courthouse.

The three options were: 1. The building at 715 Main, owned by Frances Euler, and currently housing the Mental Health Mental Resource office. It has 1,575 sq. ft. The owner is

## Bicycle contest registration starts

All area youngsters are reminded that registration starts Monday for the Border Town Days Decorated Bike Contest.

Youths must sign up at Texico City Hall.

This year offers a special incentive: Ted Lopez of Tedson Trailers in Texico is donating a brand new bike to the winner of "Best of Show" - the bike judged as best decorated regardless of age category.

This year's BTD theme is "Once Upon a Time ... Children's Stories." It's important to follow the theme since that is a large portion of the judging.

Also, an anonymous donor has provided funds for cash prizes in each category.

"Everything is ready at Texico City Hall for registration," said Rhonda Qualls, who, along with Linda Moss, is in charge of the bike contest.

The registration deadline is 3 p.m. July 29.

Mrs. Qualls said that youths planning to enter the decorated bike contest in the parade need to register, giving their name and age, to be eligible for the cash prizes.

No motorized bikes are allowed in the contest. All riders must bring their decorated bikes to Anderson Street (between Texico City Hall and the flea market - across the street from Citizens Bank) by 9:45 a.m. Texas time, and line up for judging there on July 30.

Larry Garrison, deputy Texico marshal, will be on hand to help escort youths across Wheeler Avenue, if needed.

The portion of Anderson Street where the judging will take place will be closed to vehicle traffic.

"You must be on time or you will not be judged," said Mrs. Qualls. Three Clovis residents will be the judges.

"Contestants need to be sure to stick to the theme ("Once Upon a Time ... Children's Stories") if they're going to be counted," said Mrs. Qualls. The judges will be looking for adherence to the theme.

Other rules are:  
- All participants ride in the parade (their folks can go with, too, if they wish), and must continue to Farwell City

asking to sell it for \$12,000. The rent of \$300 a month would include \$100 toward the purchase price. Utilities ran about \$1,200 in 1993. Repairs would be needed.

2. The building at 914 Main, adjacent to the Friona Star. It's owned by John Bingham and has 2,000 sq. ft. The sale price is negotiable. Rent is \$300 a month. Utilities ran about \$1,350 in 1993. Partitions would be needed for offices.

3. The building at 610 11th St., currently Cattle Finance. It's owned by Billy Wayne Sisson and has 1,700 sq. ft. One office is currently being used. The sale price is \$50,000. Rent would be \$500 a month, with \$250 going toward the purchase price. Utilities ran about \$1,500 in 1993. It has 6 enclosed offices and 1 larger receiving office.

The commissioner decided to visit the three site during its next meeting on July 25.

Currently, the county offers some services in Friona. Folks can get vehicle stickers at the Friona Federal Credit Union, where early voting for elections also takes place. And the county rents an office for the Department of Public Safety and Justice of the Peace.

The county now pays \$200 a month to rent the office for the DPS and JP. The county also pays about \$100 a month to the Friona Federal Credit Union for its service (50¢ per license sticker). And the county also currently pays \$100 a month toward the MHMR center. Thus, the county is now paying about \$400 a month toward rent and services in Friona.

During its discussion, it appears that the commissioners prefer that the MHMR office stay separate, remaining in its present location.

But offices considered for an annex include county extension, DPS, JP, motor vehicle registration, sheriff and adult probation. Some of these departments would only use the annex offices part-time.

Before a decision is made, the commissioners have to decide which site to pick, which offices would be housed there, the cost including rent, utilities, telephone and renovation. Funds would need to be budgeted. August is when the budget is put together.

Mrs. Buske noted that larger sites are also available in Friona, such as the former Hurst Department Store building (6,500 sq. ft.), but it appears that the size of the buildings offered is in the commissioners' ballpark range.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Renewed its Blue Cross insurance coverage for county employees at a 9 percent increase. There were no other insurance bids.

- Received a plaque from the Texas Association of Counties for safety in the workplace among Parmer County employees.

- Re-appointed Christine Cupit, of Bovina, as the county's representative on the board of Central Plains MHMR.

**Texico Schools hire two teachers**

The Texico School Board Tuesday accepted the resignations of Cheryl Scott, who has accepted a position in Crosbyton, and Nona Beth Holloman, who is retiring after 24 years of teaching.

Carolyn Ferrell was hired to teach 4th grade, and Ronnie Dunsworth will teach junior high geography and English and coach.

The board set a new policy that all certified teachers must earn either a master's degree or a bachelor's degree plus 45 hours within six years of initial employment. "Most of our teachers already have this," said Supt. R.L. Richards.

The architect hired for the proposed track and field project reported on the project. It is expected to begin after the football season ends. Anyone who has suggestions for this project is asked to contact the school. Bids are expected to be let by September or October.

The board also:

- Heard a report from the engineer who is working on the parking lot project. The board has received a grant from the state highway department for it. The project is expected to begin in August.

- Accepted a grant for a telephone messaging system from the State Department of Education.

- Heard a report on the Adam Burford scholarship fund which has been set up at Citizen's Bank of Texico. The Pleasant Hill Fire Department is organizing this.

- Reviewed the accreditation report from the State Dept. of Education.

- Accepted bids for the purchase of milk from Bell Dairy and bread from Mrs. Baird's Bread.

- Set school lunch price at \$1.50 for next year.

- Heard a request for uniforms from the cheerleaders. No action was taken.

- Approved Chapter I and Chapter II budgets.

- Revised medical leave policies to reflect mandates made in the Federal Family Medical Leave Act.





## The Chief's Corner

Legal searches and arrests are based on probable cause. Most of the time the "cops don't do nothing," it is because there is a lack of "probable cause."

It might be that "everybody knows old Billy Bob Snortcoke deals in drugs," but that won't work in court. Someone has to testify in court about personal knowledge. A person can tell a cop that Billy Bob is dealing drugs and give lots of useful information, but if that person will not swear to the information in a statement, then it is "hearsay evidence" and not acceptable in court. Simply put, a cop cannot testify as to what you know, only you can do that.

If, for whatever reason, a person feels that they can't sign a statement, they should not feel that their information is useless. When a person gives a peace officer information, not supported by statement, it is considered a lead. The peace officer then has to follow up, first try to substantiate the information from another source, then obtain evidence of the crime. This can be a long process, I have spent five years trying to build a case against a drug dealer.

The above is an outline; there are too many variables to accurately cover every situation. If you have a question about what you can do, or about what I can do, consider this your invitation to drop by my office and ask. If you ever have a question as to your status in my office, remember this, YOU are a peace officer's most valuable asset in the fight against crime.

Any Texas law enforcement officer, whether it's the Farwell police chief or Parmer County sheriff, can enforce the state law.

If a ticket is given out, the fine can be up to \$200. And the fine is paid in the appropriate court.

Thus, if the Farwell police chief handed out the fine, the case would be heard in municipal court - with the fine levied going to the city coffers.

And, thus, if the county sheriff levied the fine, that money goes to the county treasury.

Once again, congratulations to Ronnie Warmuth and the Texico Chamber of Commerce on their successful golf shootout. It raised a bunch of money.

There were too many folks who assisted to name here; I'm sure to leave someone out. Suffice it to say that it was an overall Chamber effort - and an excellent one.

And the help that Chris and Jan Fontanilla, of the Farwell Country Club, gave was vital to its success.

An idea like a golf shootout probably could only be held once every 10 years. But it was a doozy. It was something different and a lot of fun. Even a golf duffer like me could try it (my closest ball was 20 feet away).

Don't look now, but the Area Merchants Football Contest is just around the bend.

The Tribune is happy to say that we have gotten confirmation on our package to offer the winner of this year's event: overnight lodging at the excellent Radisson Hotel and two tickets to the Dallas Cowboys - Cleveland Browns game on Dec. 10.

I received some interesting information from Joe Riccardi, of Riccardi's Italian Restaurant in Clovis, about pasta, which I thought I'd share with our readers (especially since I love pasta).

What Joe wrote was that pasta, if eaten properly, doesn't add more weight to you, but rather less. What makes a pasta meal fattening are the rich sauces that Americans choose to put on it.

A one-cup serving of cooked spaghetti, which weighs about 5 ounces, has only about 200 calories, less than half the calories in a steak of the same weight. In fact, 10 ounces of cooked spaghetti still has fewer calories than that steak.

So the point that Joe made is that folks who worry about pasta being fattening shouldn't - as long as they watch what sauces they use on it.

Joe also sent some historical information about pasta, including the Yankee Doodle Dandy who went to town on his pony, "put a feather in his cap and called it macaronie."

The Greeks and Romans routinely made "pastas" of ground grain and water. On an Etruscan tomb of 400 B.C. is a bas-relief showing the utensils used to make pasta - a sack of flour, a water jar, a ladle, a table, a rolling pin, a pastry wheel and a knife.

Pasta is mentioned in the writings of Cicero and Horace, and several recipes for pasta dishes are included in a 1st Century cookbook. And an Area geographer described spaghetti making in Sicily in the 11th Century.

Meanwhile, evidence shows that a type of noodle was the staple of the Chang Dynasty in China in 1700 B.C., and there are Chinese records dating back to 5000 B.C. of eating noodles.

Tom Jefferson played a role in introducing pasta to the U.S. While ambassador to France in the late 1700s, he traveled to Naples, Italy, and was so impressed with the pasta there he ordered crates of "macaronny" sent back home with a pasta-making machine.

The first American pasta factory was opened in Brooklyn in 1848 by a Frenchman who harnessed a horse to power the mning and

kneading machines.

But it was in the late 20th Century that pasta took off here. Since 1977, there has been a 67% increase in total pasta consumption in the U.S.

Today, there are at least 80 different shapes of pasta and various flours and flavorings from which pastas are made.

What brought this column piece about was that Joe had sent us about a six page letter pointing out that pasta is a health food. I don't have room for all that information here, but if you are interesting in reading the facts, I have a copy at the Tribune office.

Or, better yet, stop by and see Joe at Riccardi's.

From Judy:

I watched a TV show the other night about the Civil War. The episode was about the Battle of Fredericksburg, so it caught my attention. About 10 years ago we lived closer to the Fredericksburg battlefield in Virginia than we live to Friona today.

Once I took more than 300 7th grade students on a tour of "The Town Where America Grew Up." They toured James Monroe's law office, the Fielding Lewis home and the battlefield. Most enjoyed a picnic in the park more than the history lesson. I think we were the biggest invasion that sleepy little town had seen in a century or better.

John Paul Jones once lived there, and so did Mary Ball Washington. The Washington family homestead, Ferry Farm, is located nearby at Pope's Creek Plantation. If you ever

visit Virginia, Fredericksburg is worth an afternoon of your time because of its variety.

The TV show brought back many memories of the area. Normally battlefields aren't my thing, but the show jogged a few memories that were different from the way they told the story.

First of all, it was my understanding that there were seven battles fought in Fredericksburg during the Civil War, not just one. The Yankees had quite a time crossing the Rappahannock River and keeping anything on the Southern side of the river for any length of time. They invaded the town on several occasions.

The engagement at the Stone Wall on St. Marye's

Heights was a focus of the TV program. (They pronounced the site of the battle as Saint Marie's Heights, but I have usually heard it pronounced Saint Mary's.)

This battlefield shows graphically that people who fight from behind a strong wall are less likely to be hurt than people who fight without cover. About 17,000 men died that one day, and most of those who died were out in the open, and not behind cover.

Of course, today a stone wall would not protect anyone from the kind of weapons that are being made.

Bruce Catton's books tell lots of little details about the battles in that part of the country. He told stories of

cousins and brothers in opposing armies swapping coffee for tobacco, and floating the swapped items across the river to one another. He also told of that engineering marvel - the pontoon bridge - which was used to cross the river.

On a visit to Kenmore, once the home of George Washington's sister Mrs. Fielding Lewis, visitors to Fredericksburg are told that the home was used by the Lewis descendants as a field hospital during the battles. The parquet covered floor was covered with blood. But, at least the wounded received emergency surgical care before they traveled 50 miles back to either Washington or Richmond.

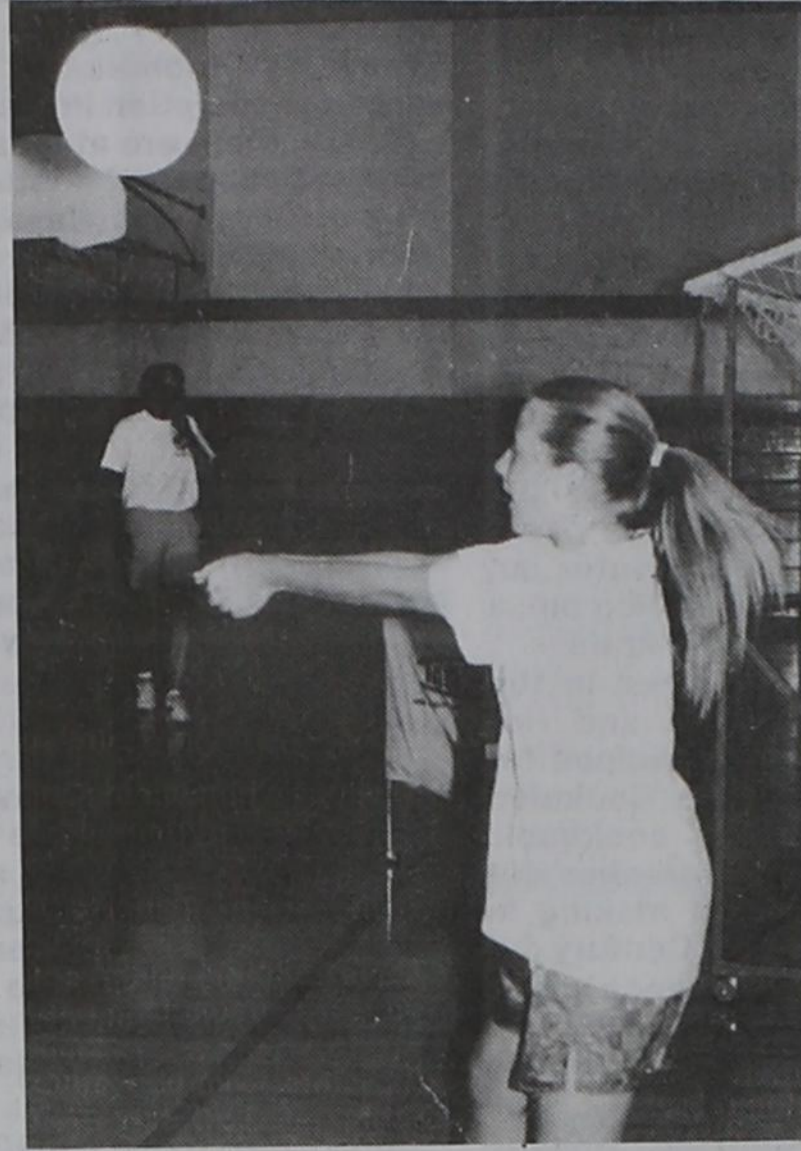

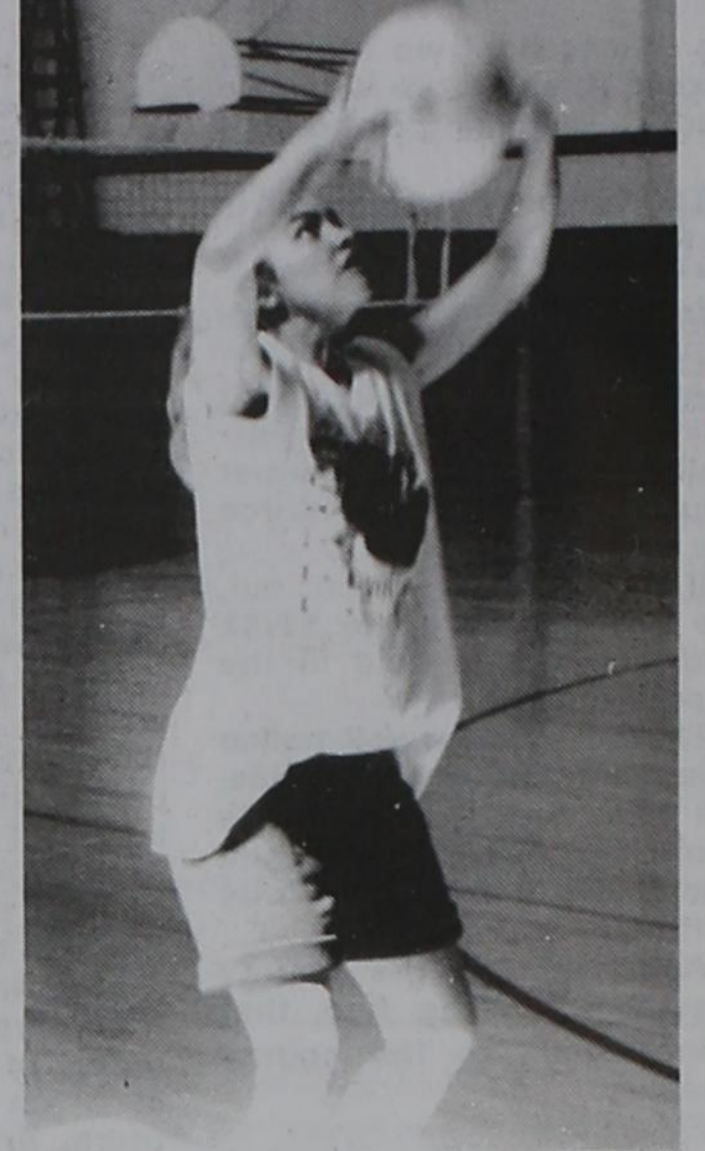

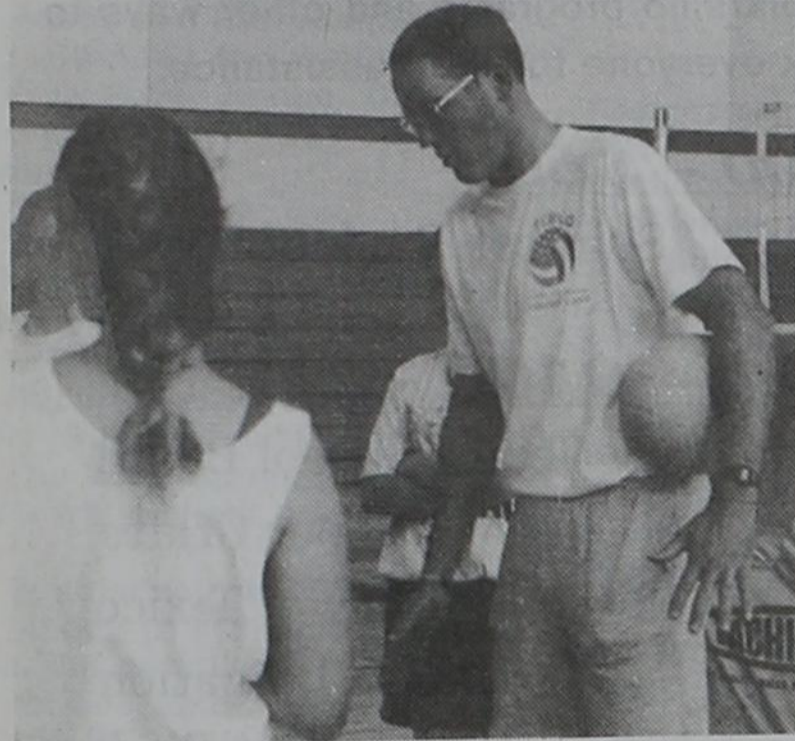

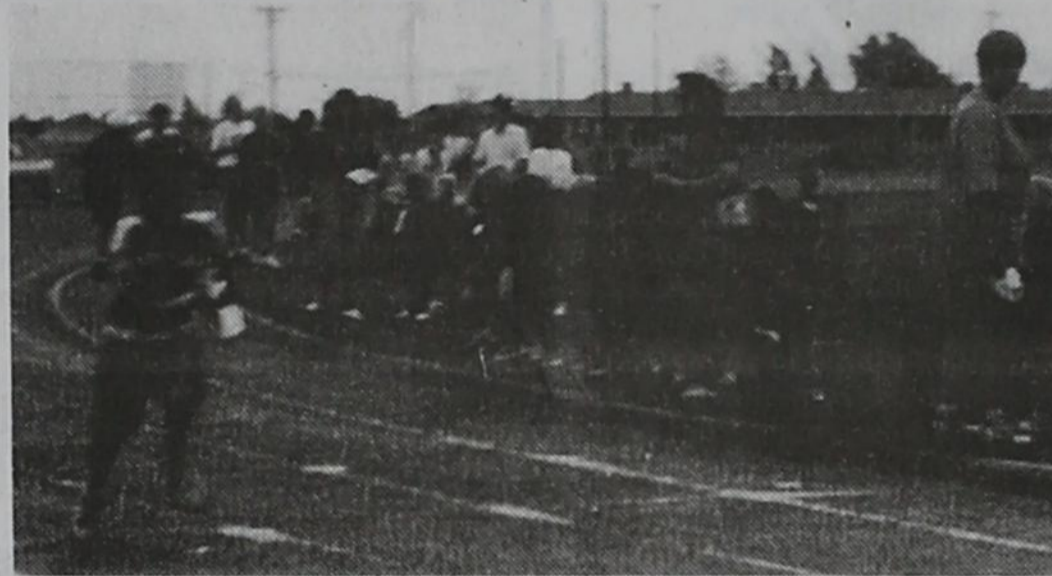

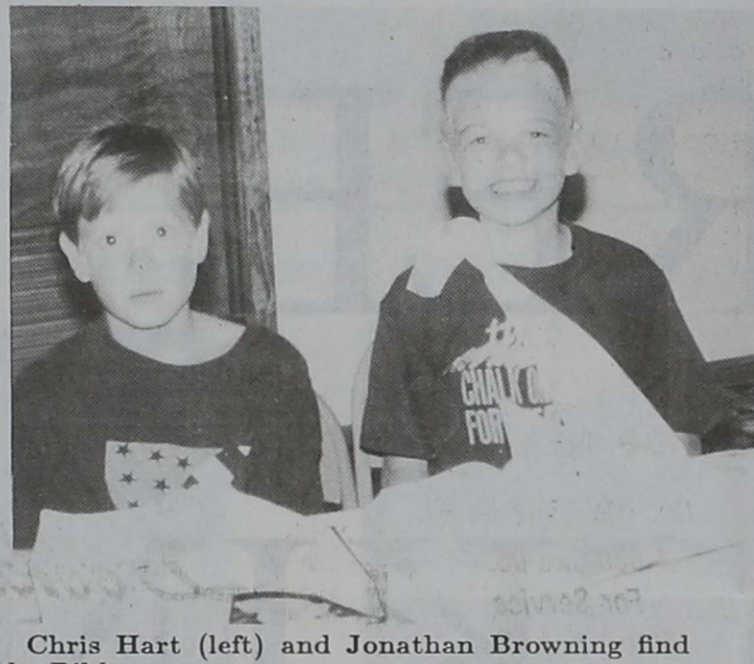

- Noted that all employees have been hired at this point.

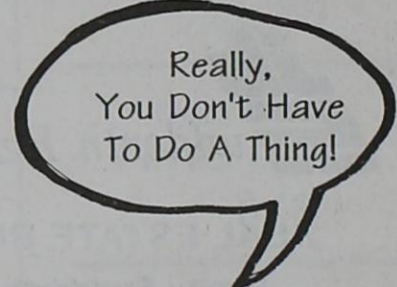
