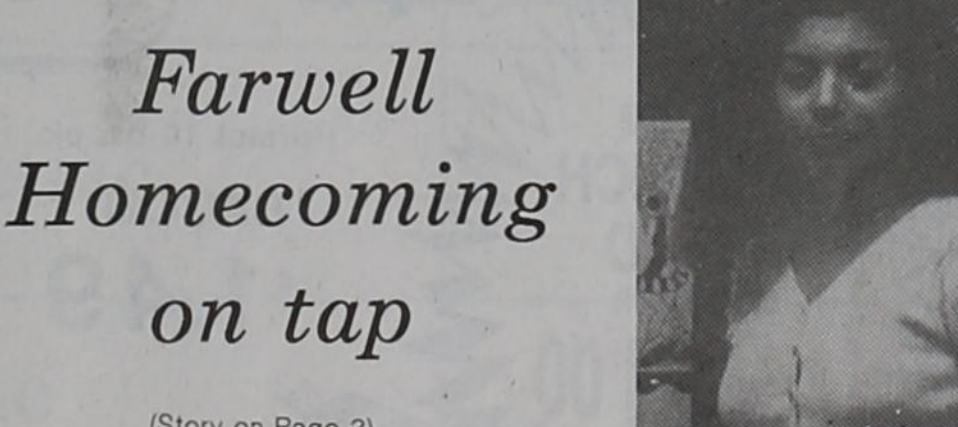

Farwell outlaws U-turns; okays youth curfew

The Farwell City Council Tuesday unanimously adopted a "no U-turn ordinance."

And the council approved a juvenile curfew ordinance, pending final okay on its legality from City Attorney Charles Aycock.

And the council is considering banning the use of BB guns and air rifles within city limits.

And dog pound fees were doubled and tripled.

After the legal ad is published in next week's Tribune, this means that motorists making U-turns anywhere in Farwell can be fined up to \$500. It will be enforced by police chief Roy McGaa.

The topic of U-turns arose at the August council meeting due to a problem in the 100 block of Fifth Street due to lottery participants. At that time, it was asked that a "no U-turns" policy be put into effect in that block.

Instead, the council decided to put an ordinance into effect for the whole city. The ordinance was drafted by Aycock. The council made no amendments to it.

El Cid Futurity has \$250,000 purse

The third year of the El Cid Futurity will be held at the El Cid ranch northeast of Farwell Sept. 19-25, with a purse expected to exceed \$250,000, of which \$100,000 is added money.

The public is invited to view the competition. Each day begins at 8 a.m. and a concession stand is in the grandstand area. There is a sign along the Amarillo highway just outside Farwell showing where to turn to the El Cid ranch.

There were 280 contestants in 1993 competing for a purse of \$200,000.

A new class - the 7-Up - will be held this year in conjunction with the outdoor cutting horse event. Horses 7 years and older are invited to compete in an Open and Non-Pro Class.

The 7-Up class has been added to many MCHA-sanctioned events because there has been no competition for this age horse in the past.

The National Cutting Horse Association in Fort Worth is the governing body for the cutting horse industry. Lonnie Allsup is a member of the NCHA board of directors. He and wife Barbara own the El Cid ranch and are owner-operators of the Allsup Convenience Store chain.

Other classes in the 8-day competition are Futurity (3 year olds), Maturity (4 year olds) and Classic-Challenge (5 and 6 year olds). There will be \$30,000 added money in each of these events. There will be 2 go-rounds and a final for each of these classes.

Four classes will be offered for non-professional riders. These classes are based on money earned. One go-round will be held Saturday with the finals on Sunday.

Competition will begin on Sept. 19 with finals in the 7-Up division scheduled for Sept. 21. All other final events will be held Sept. 25.

The El Cid is offered in an outdoor arena that will seat several hundred spectators. Other features are an adjacent, outdoor practice area for live cattle work and a nearby mechanical cow for the adventurous cutters.

The Farwell School Board passed a resolution Tuesday to allow high school students to skip their final exams.

Students will be exempted from 3 final exams per semester if they have: 1) not more than one absence with a score of 85; 2) not more than 2 absences with a score of 90; or 3) not more than 3 absences with a score of 95. Three tardies count as one absence.

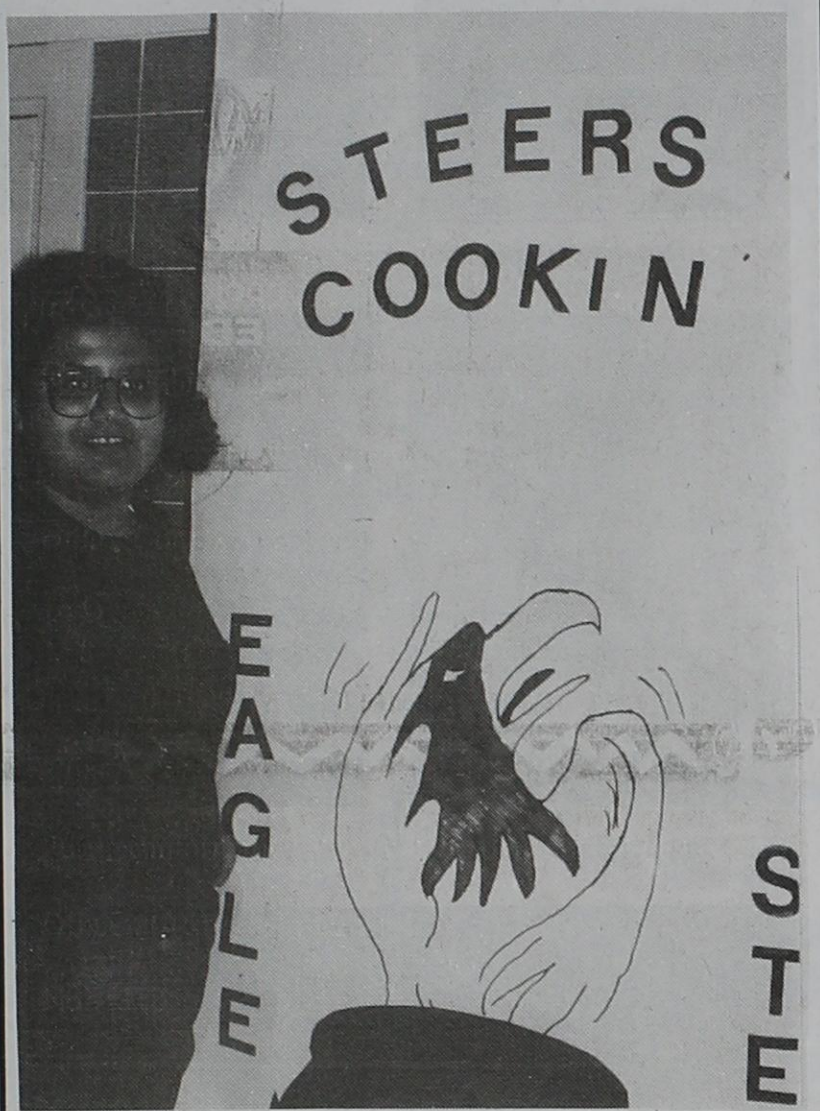

Steers score 4 TD's, but lose to Olton

The Farwell Steers fell to 0-2 on the season when they lost to the Olton Mustangs in an away game last Friday, 54-29. But the score didn't reflect one of Farwell's most exciting games in quite awhile. The Steers were down by 3 TDs but when they scored twice within 12 seconds, they gave Class 2A Olton quite a scare.

The difference in the game was an Olton running back named Wilborn, who had blinding speed and is a major college prospect. He scored 4 TDs.

The game opened with Chase Hardage returning the kick to the Steer 39. Olton intercepted and Justin Mahaney tackled the Olton player. On defense, Blaze Hardage had a strong tackle and Nic Ketcherside broke up a pass, and Farwell took over on its 31.

Farwell was held and punted. On defense, Jason Miller and Blaze Hardage had good tackles. But Wilborn broke through for two long runs, and Olton scored on a QB sneak at 4:37. The kick made it 7-0.

Farwell was held again and Chad Martin had a strong punt against the wind. Martin punted well all game. Olton was stopped and Farwell got the ball back. Olton recovered a Farwell fumble at midfield. On defense, Brock Anderson had a nice tackle. Olton completed two long passes and scored on a 1-yard run at 10:20 of the second quarter. The run for extra points made it 15-0.

Farwell was held and punted to the Olton 40. Michael Phillips had a QB hurry, and Jason Miller and Phillips had good tackles. But Olton scored on a 63-yard pass to go ahead 22-0 at 6:26.

Blaze Hardage returned the kick to the Farwell 35. Anderson hit Chase Hardage with a pass over the middle, good for 22 yards. Farwell was stopped and punted into the end zone.

Olton was held and a bad snap on the punt try gave Farwell the ball at the Mustang 3. On 4th and 5, Anderson hit Chase Hardage with a TD pass at 2:42. The kick made it 20-7.

Less than a minute later, Wilborn ran 52 yards for a Mustang TD. The kick made it 29-7.

Chase Hardage had a nifty, twisting return of the kick to the Steer 40. Anderson hit Chase Hardage with passes of 6 and 7 yards. 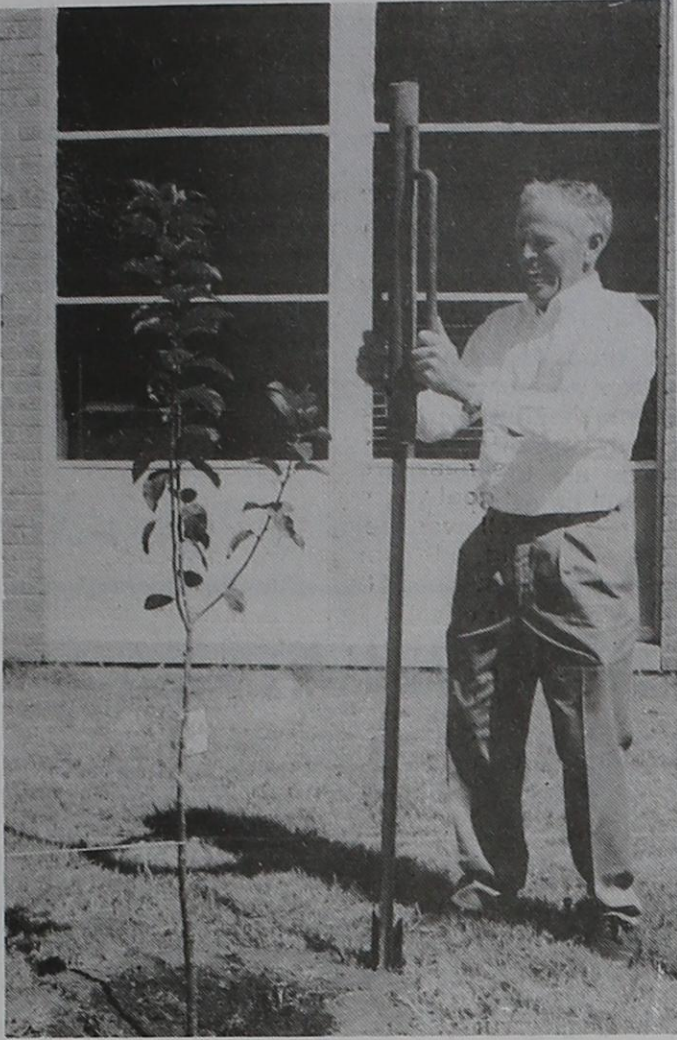

Alpha Rho Lambda voted to sponsor the arts and crafts show at Christmas On Parade this year.

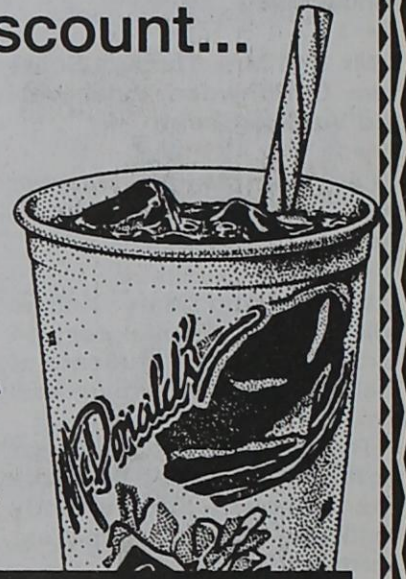

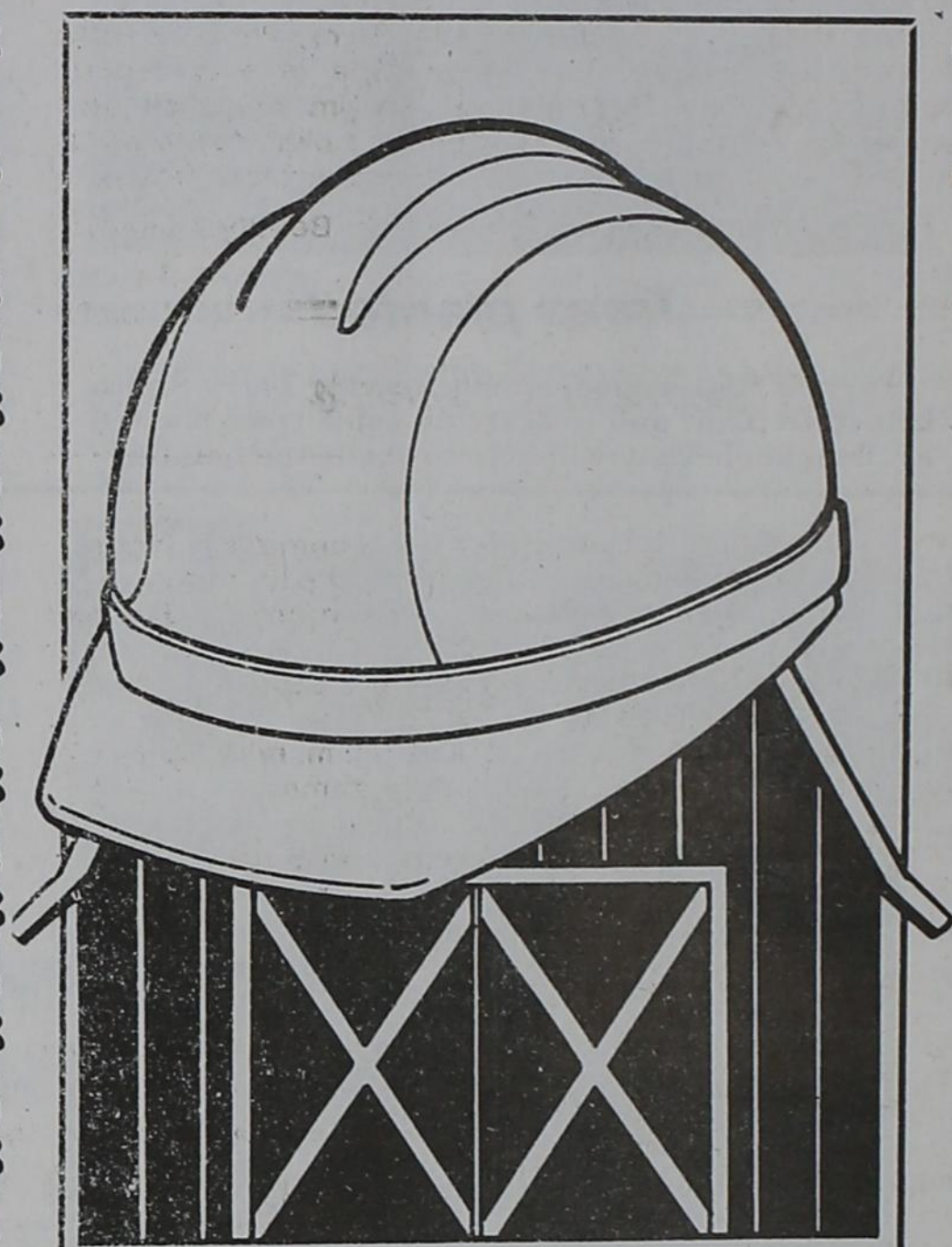

Texico discusses vicious dogs

Problems with animals running loose were discussed at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

It was reported that animal control officer Dan Walterscheid has picked up 54 animals so far. He is being paid \$400 a month.

It was stated that the problems are that animal owners aren't that concerned because the fines have been inexpensive (\$15 for the first time the animal is picked up, double the second), and that folks are getting rid of their animals, thus not having to pay a fine, then getting a different animal.

The council voted to publish a legal ad in this week's Tribune so they can discuss at their next meeting increasing

these fees.

Marshal Gil Holguin said he received two reports of vicious dogs running loose last week. A discussion was held about one resident who has pit bulls that sometimes have gotten out of their fenced-in yard. Two dogs chased one lady to her home, it was said. The council discussed amending the animal control ordinance to outlaw pit bulls.

In other business, the council:

- Approved relacing 24 stop signs.
- Hired Marion Ty Rutter, of Clovis, as the new city attorney.

- Held a community input hearing on suggested capital improvements that the state would fund. A fire substation was added to the top of this "wish list."

- Heard a presentation on recycling from Elizabeth Thomas, who runs Clovis' program. That program is funded by grants. Councilwoman Carolyn Burrows will work with Mrs. Thomas on seeking grants for a Texico recycling program.

- Approved buying 7 traffic control batons (with blinking lights) with state funds. Texico will keep two, and five will be donated to the area DWI Task Force.

- Heard that bids are being received for a better electrical system for the air stripper building at KKR Park.

Texico adds a teacher

The Texico School Board Tuesday hired Ivy Bradley to teach first grade. "There was an overload problem at that grade level," said Supt. R. L. Richards.

Texico's enrollment is up slightly from last year to 566 students. Parents visited Tuesday's meeting to express their concerns about class overloads, so the board reviewed schedules and discussed possible solutions.

Two parents expressed concerns about school bus routes. One route change which the board approved would require the Texico school bus to travel 30 miles per day extra to pick up four children south of the Kakahuati Road. This change will be made because the children live within Texico's boundaries. The other school bus route change was not in Texico's jurisdiction.

The board also:

- Approved the proposed changes to the track and field area.

- Accepted a bid from K. Barnett to extend the school parking lot. This will be done with matching funds from the state. The state will provide 60% and Texico will provide 40%.

- Heard that there will be training for the Parent Link messaging system Sept. 29-30. Each one hour session will explain the new system which will enable the parents to call the school and hear messages such as the time the buses will return from ball games.

- Approved student handbooks, and discussed the possibility of a 2 mill tax levy. The last 2 mill levy was approved in 1983. This money would be used for equipment, building repairs, replacing buses or technology. It could not be used for teacher salaries.

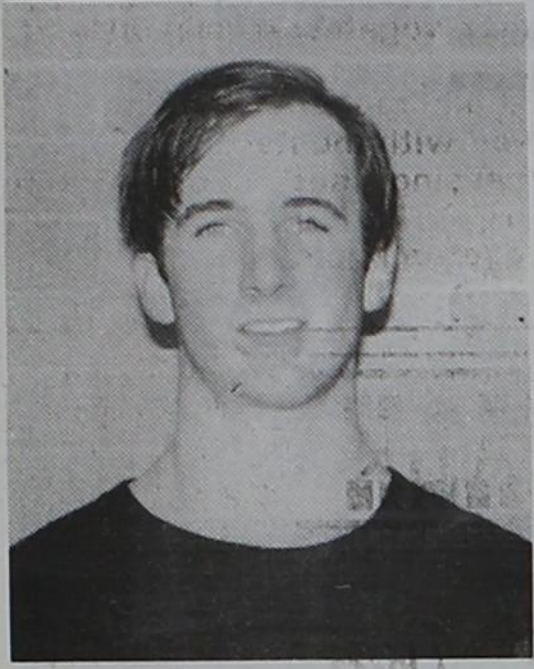
And Head Coach Barry Partain commented, "We played hard, but we're still making those mistakes from inexperience."

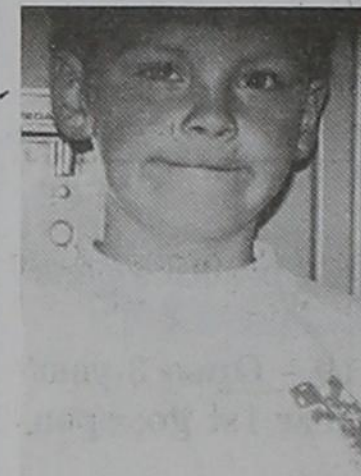

Lazbuddie to get extra money

The Lazbuddie School Board Tuesday heard that the community expects to receive about \$40,000 in additional funds from the state this year because the state lowered the property valuation from \$50 million to \$44 million.

Supt. Phil Warren received a verbal commitment last Friday from the state to decrease property tax valuations. "The more tax valuations increase, the more local government is responsible to pick up the cost of education."

Warren estimated that Lazbuddie has about a 98% tax collection rate.

The board voted to draft a resolution like the one written by Cedar Hill School District to oppose state mandated changes which would give teachers a 5% pay hike un-funded by the state and up to 20 un-funded staff development days.

In other business, the board:

- Accepted Travelers Group insurance with a \$55 rate as the school's portion.
- Set Oct 29 for the Harvest Festival.
- Appointed Barbara Lust and Debra Hall as the two At Risk Coordinators.
- Discussed trash collection.
- Accepted the transfer of four students, 2 from Muleshoe and 2 from Friona.

Marshal's Report

The marshal's office was called to investigate a case of suspected criminal damage to the Texico ag shop where a window was broken over the weekend of Sept. 3-6. The investigation is continuing.

Another case investigated at the school on Sept. 6 involved a broken windshield on a vehicle in the parking lot. It was classified accidental damage to property because there is so much loose gravel in the area.

Farwell City Council

- Set the tax rate for 1994-95 at .3304 cents per \$100 valuation, up from .3221.

- Heard a report on the animals running loose problem from city clerk Cynthia Thigpen. She said that Mayor Chris Gikas, who missed the meeting due to illness, had talked with Texico dog catcher Dan Walterscheid, a Farwell resident, about also catching dogs in Farwell.

Texico is paying Walterscheid \$400 a month, and he was interested in doing the job for Farwell, too, at the same amount. They didn't discuss a "per animal" price.

The council voted to buy an another animal trap and let current city employees continue to handle this chore.

- Voted to amend the dog and cat ordinance to double and triple the animal pound fees.

Currently, if you bail out your animal the first day, it costs \$15. If you wait until the second day, it costs \$16, and so on.

The amended ordinance doubles these fees for the first offense. For a second offense, the fees are tripled.

- Agreed to seek bids on a new pickup for the water department. And the engine will be replaced in the current pickup.

- Will talk with Cherokee, the Clovis artist who designed the Farwell mural on the side of City Hall, about refurbishing it.

- Will study a recommendation from McGaa to require city residents to have permits for using BB guns and air rifles within city limits.

McGaa said he is receiving more complaints on this, including two doors shot out at the Baptist Church causing several hundreds of dollars damage.

He suggested one exception in the proposal - to issue free permits to adults with a legitimate purpose, such as population control of pigeons.

- Will check into buying a cellular phone for McGaa.

- Approved a juvenile curfew ordinance. After the legal ad

is published, juveniles (under 17) will have to be off the city streets by midnight on weekdays and 1 a.m. on weekends. There will be exceptions to this curfew in the ordinance, such as for youths working at a night-time job.

- Held a long discussion on police department policies.

- Received three bids for the city's insurance contract - Blackwell & Associates, Town & Country Insurance and TML, the present carrier.

Councilman Jimmie Mace made a motion to award the contract to Town & Country, of Farwell, noting it was the only bidder licensed and regulated by the state.

Their bid, though, was \$11,000 higher than TML, which has a self-insured program. Mace's motion was not seconded and the council voted 3-1 to accept TML.

- Heard a presentation from a Panhandle Regional Planning Commission representative on collecting used oil. The council voted to accept the supplies (containers, cage, etc.) from PRPC and talk with Robert White, owner of Tri County Tire, about placing the collection point at his business.

- Discussed "911" calls. Councilwoman Ysleta Kittrell said she heard a complaint from a resident that when she called 911 it took 10 minutes to get an ambulance and that the Friona dispatcher called back first to verify the call.

It was stated that the problem with the 911 situation is that these callbacks are necessary; but the sheriff's department says that callbacks aren't made.



Councilman Jerry Stover said he followed up on a 911 complaint last year and found it had no basis. He said the system works okay but the dispatchers need proper training.

It was suggested that Farwell residents call the sheriff's department at 481-3303 instead of 911 in an emergency.

- Heard a report from Frances Kube on the Neighborhood Watch program. The council established a fund of \$500 for the Watch's first year. New signs will be bought and other older signs refurbished at a cost of about \$100, and decals and Watch information will be distributed with the water bills.
