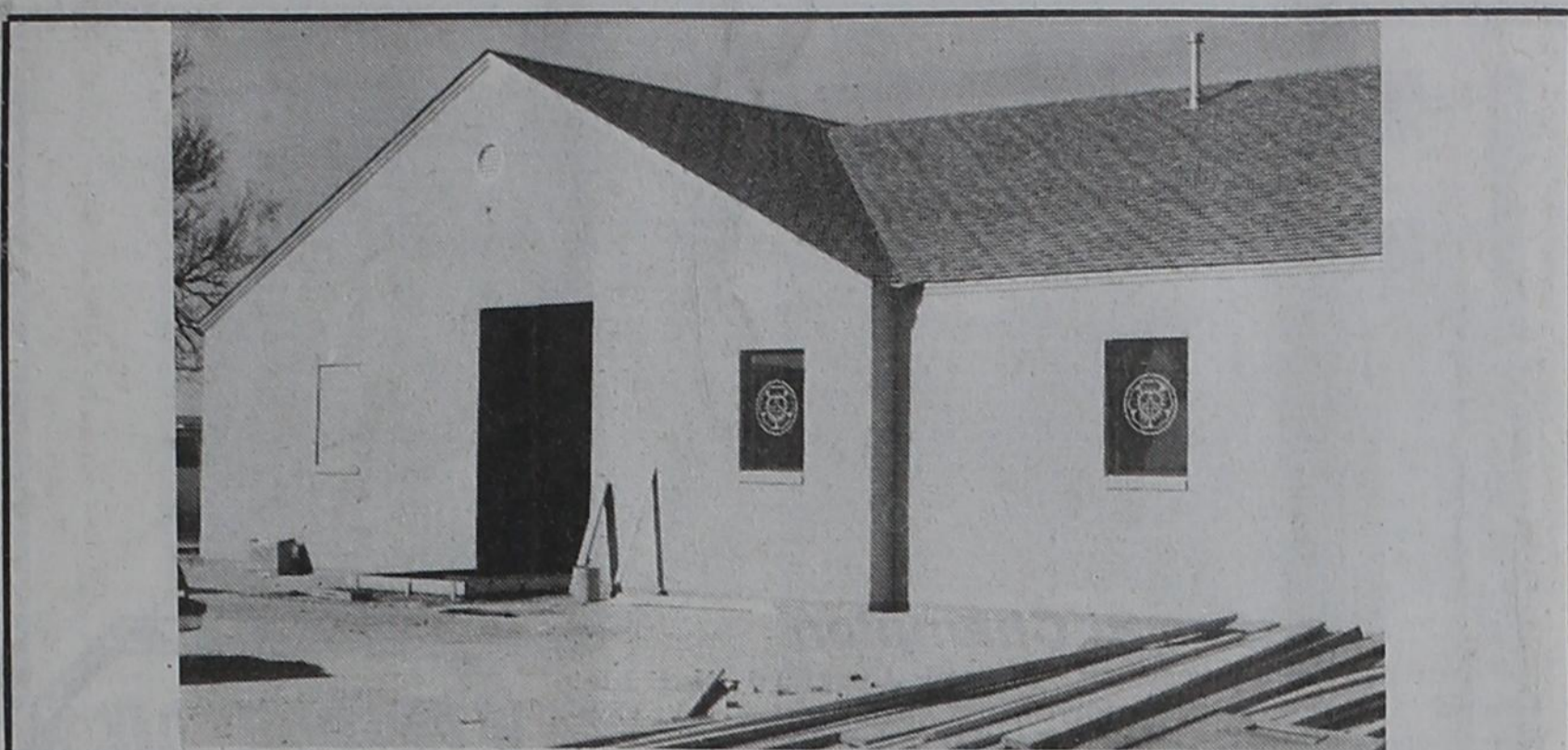

Border Banter

What should school athletic goal be?

Watching a powerful Sudan boys' basketball team play last Friday brought to mind the question of where high school athletes are allowed to play.

Rules in Texas basically let youths play wherever they want as long as they have a legal residence in that district. In New Mexico, all you need is your own transportation (plus some stipulations). That's fine. Both states have good rules, but like with any rules they can be abused.

This allows excellent athletes to congregate at certain schools and build up "powerhouses" and "dynasties." That's legal - and the way it is.

Sudan, some folks say, gets some excellent athletes from other communities, such as Dimmitt and Littlefield. Just last Friday, one of Anton's best basketball players, a junior, moved into the Sudan district, I was told. That's why some folks joke that Sudan belongs in Class 3A or 4A.

Now, Sudan has a lot of attractions. With the Tolk plant, it is in outstanding financial condition, with excellent facilities and it offers a lot of other benefits to students. So I can see why student athletes are attracted to move there.

And for those folks who like to see their teams "win, win, win," this is an ideal situation. Sudan teams are champions.

But there's a flip side to this coin. And I relate to that other side since I had a student athlete who was not a star but had the opportunity at Farwell to be on the varsity teams and contribute. And that meant a lot to his maturation process.

So if these athletes, who may be juniors or seniors when they arrive, move to schools like Sudan (and there are many others - Elida jumps to mind), where does this leave the kids who grow up in the community - and are forced off the team or whose playing time is vastly diminished?

One thing that appeals to me very much about communities like Texico or Farwell is that our kids have a chance to play on the varsity teams. Not just to be on the team, but to get playing time and contribute.

But when kids come from other areas just so they can be starters on the basketball team, for example, where does this leave the kids who were raised in that hometown?

Out in the cold, I'm afraid. I know I would have trouble rooting hard for Texico or Farwell, for example, if 4 of the 5 starters on the basketball team were from other areas but who came here just to get playing time.

My thoughts would be with the Texico and Farwell kids

Church begins Phase II

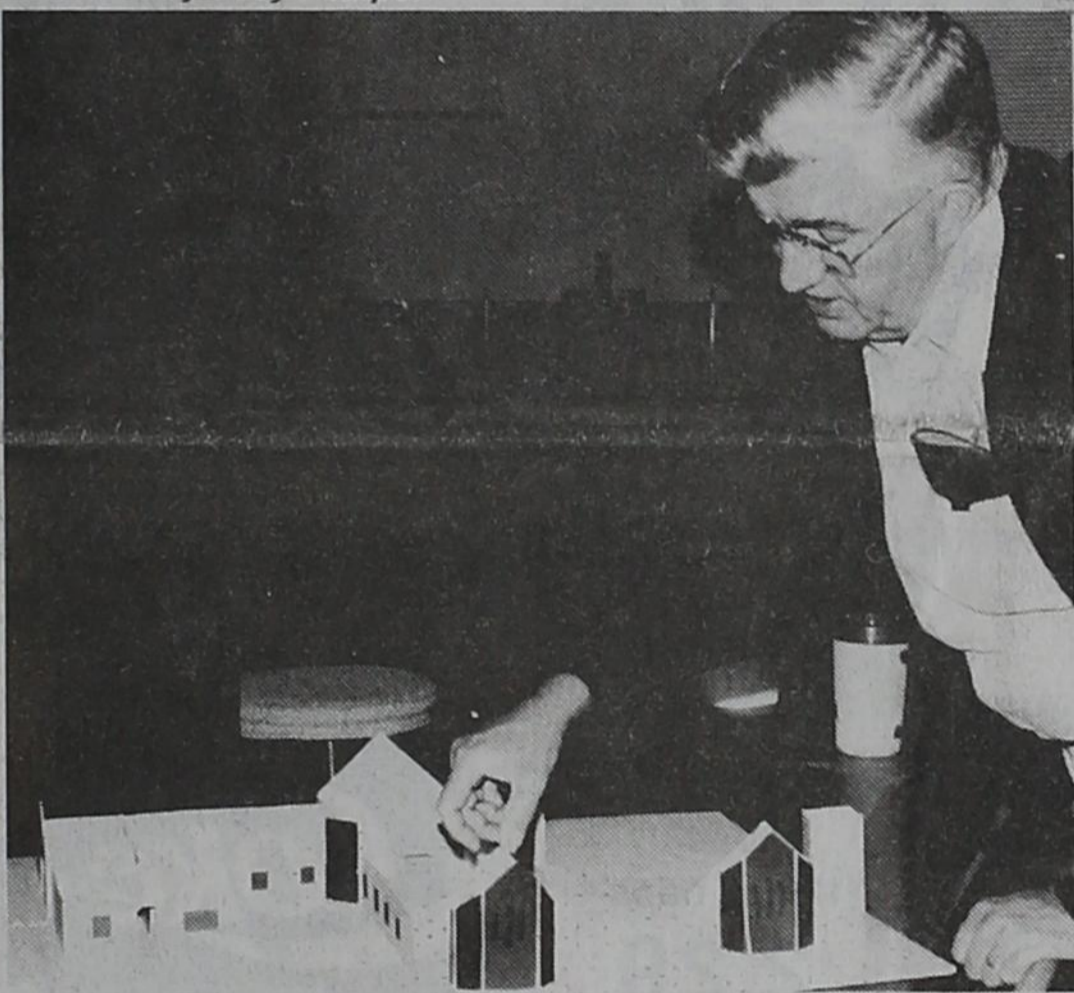
The congregation at St. John Lutheran Church in Lariat has begun its second phase of expansion - a portion of the project which they did not think they would be able to tackle so soon.

The congregation voted last year to expand the church's facilities in two phases. The first phase added space to the structure so that the congregation could have additional Sunday school classrooms, meeting space and a room to house the church's Braille printing facility.

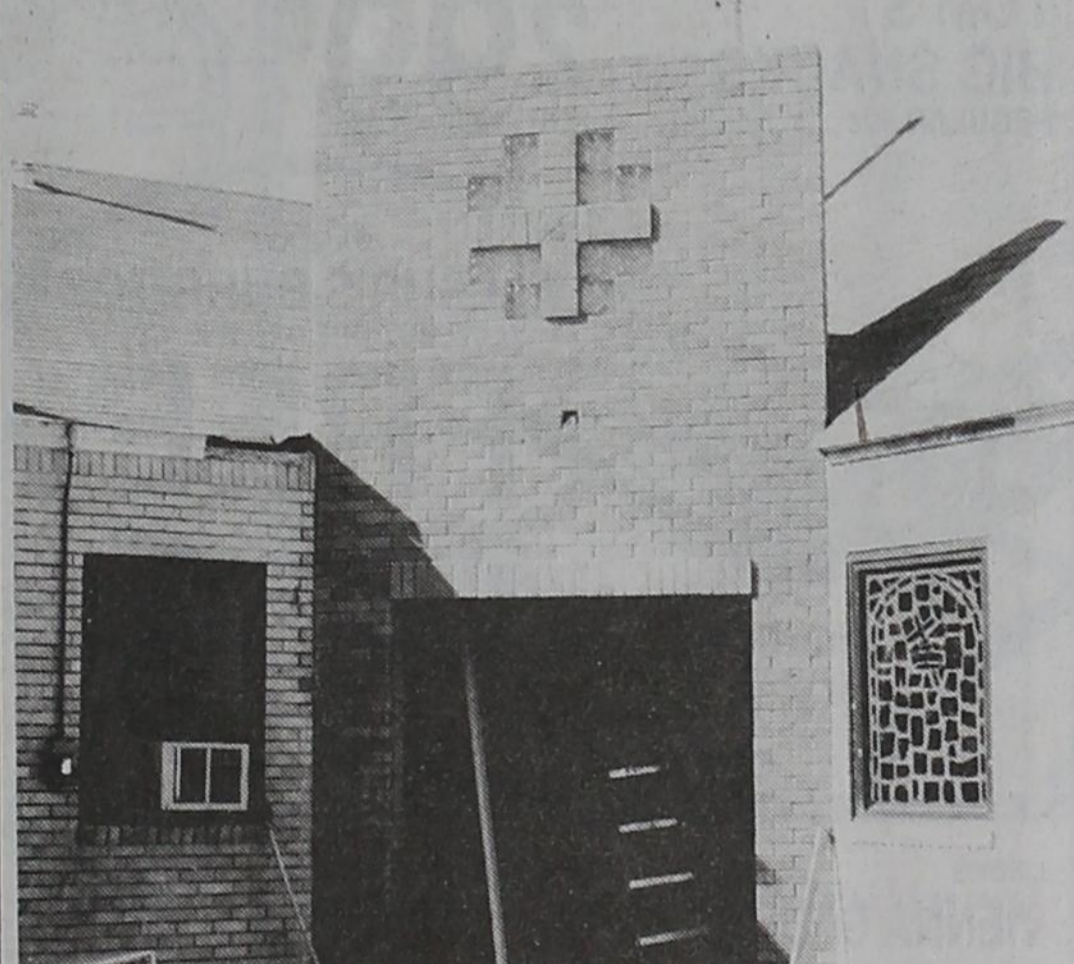
The Braille printing facility prepares Bibles and religious tracts which are sent to blind people the world round. Volunteers from Farwell, Oklahoma Lane, Muleshoe and Rhea join the folks from Lariat once a week to print the raised letters which enable blind people to read scripture. Often these books are written in languages that the printers do not speak, so they do not even know what message they are sending around the world.

City Council to the rescue

The Farwell City Council is about to ride to the rescue of the Farwell School Board.

At Tuesday's City Council meeting, Mayor Chris Gikas announced that he is proposing an area adjacent to the water tower on Third Street (across the street from Farwell City Park) be set up for volleyball courts and a walking trail.

He is working on this at the behest of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. In a nutshell, if the city provides a space for recreational areas equal to that of the space needed for tennis courts, then the state would reconsider Farwell's application for state funds for new tennis courts and baseball fields.

Farwell's original grant request was basically turned down in December by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department because the school's tennis courts, built with state funds, were demolished without state approval. The Wildlife Department was most unhappy because it said such action, without state approval, is prohibited by program guidelines and constitutes conversion of grant assisted property to other than outdoor recreation use.

The tennis courts, which were in bad shape, were torn down to make way for the new gym, now under construction. School officials said they went ahead with their demolition because they were under the impression that it was okay with the state officials.

The new volleyball courts would be used for regular recreational use plus at Border Town Days. Last year, the first annual volleyball tournament was held and more room was needed. At that time, BTD Chairman Mike Pomper talked with Gikas about seeding the area near the Water Tower so volleyball courts could be set up there.

In other business, the council: - Gave an extension of 45 days to Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Robertson Jr. to remove junked vehicles from property they own on the loop between the Church of Christ and Stateline Drugs. They also gave an extension of 45 days to cousins Ray and Leland Autrey to remove junked vehicles from property they own on Third Street near the highway.

Gikas stressed that the city doesn't want to fine anyone but the council just wants the city cleaned up. He said other property owners who have junked and abandoned vehicles, including himself, are on a list that will be contacted later.

The city started its crackdown last year with the most obvious offenders. Most of the junked vehicles involved in the first list have been removed. Junked and abandoned vehicles are not allowed inside city limits - with a hefty fine for offenders.

- Set the city election for May 7. The filing period runs from Feb. 21 to March 23. On the ballot are three council posts currently filled by Martin Kube, Royce Bethel and James Chadwick.

- Received notice from a Clovis law firm that it was considering lawsuits in the case of Bouakhanh Thavonesouk, of Clovis, who was killed when his vehicle was struck by a Santa Fe train in Farwell (near the Dairy Queen) on Sept. 1, 1993. The law firm's letter said there were no mechanical arms at that site, plus there were other blinking lights in the area at the time (due to highway construction). The law firm represents Thavonesouk's heirs.

City officials turned the letter, which indicated lawsuits will be filed, over to City Attorney Charles Aycock.

A representative of the law firm (Doerr & Knudson) told the Tribune Wednesday that similar notices are being sent to Parmer County, the Santa Fe Railroad, Texas Department of Transportation, etc. No suits have been filed yet.

- Received the monthly report from Police Chief Roy McGaa. In January, he issued 20 warnings, gave 18 citations and no arrests. His calls included 2 vandalism, 1 theft, 2 domestic, 1 loud music, 6 parking violations and 12 traffic violations. He was called for officer assistance backup four times - to help in Bovina when shots were fired New Year's Day, to assist the sheriff's office in an inmate shakedown at the jail, to assist New Mexico state police and Border Patrol in an attempt to serve a warrant, and to assist the Texico marshal's office during a domestic dispute when a man took his wife as hostage for awhile.

- Heard water supt. Dee Hammit report that city employee Joe Servin has been certified in "sewer" by the state health department. The state requires that a city like Farwell must have two certified persons to operate the water and sewer departments. Servin received a pay raise by virtue of getting certified. He now will go after "water" certification. Hammit is certified in both areas.

- Agreed to pay this year's county taxes (\$358) on the former Rose Drugs building that Pudge Rose deeded to the city. Gikas said Rose didn't want to pay the taxes and if the city didn't accept the donation, the city eventually would have to pay the taxes anyway if it took over the building at a sheriff's sale, for example.

Gikas said the roof will need to be redone, and that the interior can be used. He said a square dance group has contacted him about using it once a week and paying \$15 per usage. Gikas hopes the building can be used for smaller groups, and relieve the heavily-used Farwell Community Center.

- Heard Gikas ask McGaa to be especially watchful for motorists who drive around railroad arms when they are down. The fine is \$58.

- Gave McGaa approval to order 250 McGruff Crime Biter Badges (\$105) to be given out during elementary school classroom visits.

Texico telephone exchange sold

U. S. West has agreed to sell its Texico telephone exchange to Vista Grande Telecommunications, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Penasco Valley Telephone Cooperative, Inc., of Artesia, N.M.

Texico is one of seven exchanges involved in the sale. Others are Carrizozo, Cloudcroft, Dexter, Hagerman, Penasco and Tularosa. The number of lines in the seven exchanges is about 6,400.

The State Corporation Commission will be asked to approve the sale around March 1. Then the transfer would be made later.

The sale would have no rate impact on residential and business customers in Texico because Vista Grande will adopt the existing U.S. West rates when it begins providing service.

"We are looking forward to becoming the service provider in these communities," said John Metts, Executive Vice President and General Manager of Penasco Valley. "Once this transaction is completed, we plan to be a valuable asset to these communities and we will continue our history of quality service."

Penasco Valley has provided service in New Mexico since 1949.

Vista Grande will target service improvement in areas such as the reduction of multi-party service, replacement of aerial open wire lines with buried cable, closer customer contact and introduction of new features made possible through new technology.

Hog Show on tap

The Texico Spring Hog show will begin at 9 a.m. mst Saturday.

Bill Morrison of Clovis will be the judge.

FFA sponsor Kenneth Taylor expects about 25 head of crossbred hogs will be shown. He expects they will be divided into 3-4 classes.

The building will open at 7 a.m. mst Saturday for pen assignment.

Sam Drager weighed the pigs for their official show weight during the week of Feb. 15-18. Exhibitors have been asked to wash their pigs at home before bringing them up to the school.

A showing demonstration will be given this year as part of the teaching aspect of the show.

Belt buckles will be given to the Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Senior Showmanship winner (over age 14) and Junior Showmanship winner (under age 14).

Cash awards will be given for the Junior and Senior record books. Record books must be submitted by Friday. Entry fees of \$5 are due today (Friday.)

Surviving is a sister, Dollie Young, Long Beach, Calif.

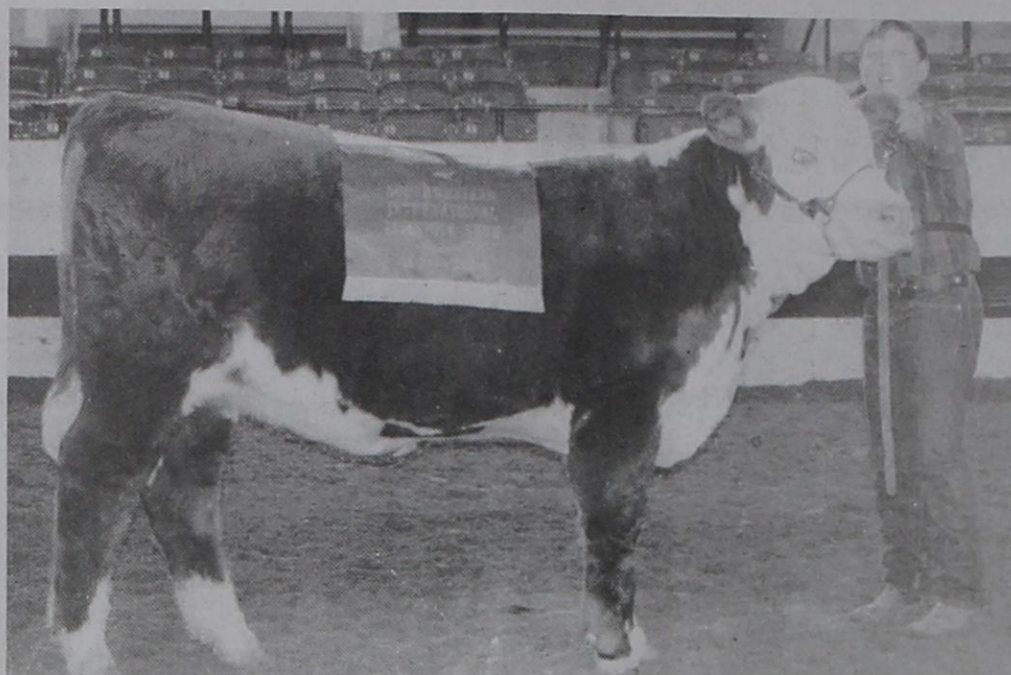

From Judy:

One of Mike's Christmas presents was an audio tape of John LeCarre's spy novel, "The Night Manager."

After he listened to it, I had a chance to enjoy it myself.

The "verbal class distinction that by now should be extinct" is alive and well in LeCarre's work. And, if British English and American English continue to move apart in the next 50 years as they have in the past 50, authors like LeCarre may have to prepare American language editions if they want to sell to this market.

The first thing I noticed was the difference in Amer-

ican and British pronunciations of common words.

LeCarre's voice, as he read his own words, was redolent with a rich, round ah sound like the sound a patient makes when a doctor examines his tonsils. Father became "fahhther." Garage sounded like "gahhrage." Can't sounded like Imanuel Kant's last name.

Then I heard some accents fall on what sounded like the wrong syllables to my American ears. Issues sounded as if the accent mark had fallen firmly over the "u." Stationery was pronounced without any vowel sound between "station" and the "ry" suffix. Americans usually make stationery sound as if "air" had been written between "station" and "ry."

LeCarre chose the French pronunciation of chamois (with a "wah" sound at the end), instead of the pronunciation that is more common here (with an "ey" sound).

Once I got past the pronunciation, I realized that LeCarre used many words which appear in our dictionaries, but which Americans rarely use. When was the last time you used these words: aegis, levity, tweaking, churlish, truculently, purport and

forthcoming?

When was the last time you used fancied to mean thought or imagined? When did you last pick wit or jot to mean a little bit? Do you refer to the wooden cabinets in your home as chandlery?

England's long-standing ties with former members of the British Empire were reflected in terms that LeCarre used: wallah, pasha and bazaar are just a few.

As a child growing up, I became familiar with some of the differences between British English and American English because I had friends whose mothers had been "War Brides." I knew that a pram was a baby buggy, a wind screen was a windshield and a loo was a toilet.

Here are a few items I heard in LeCarre's tape which were less familiar:

Burch, Sowder re-elected at 5 Area Co-op meeting

Incumbents Kirby Burch of Lazbuddie and Mickey Sowder of Needmore were re-elected to the Board of Directors of the Five Area Telephone Cooperative Board at the annual meeting in Muleshoe on Feb. 12.

Nina Landers was recognized for 16 years of service to the company and Catherine Taylor for 15 years of service. Each will be retiring.

Board President Don Seales was recognized for attending 10 different telephone courses in the past 11 years in an effort to keep abreast of a swiftly changing industry.

"Our focus is on the members; they need the best service at the least cost," said Five Area Manager Hubert Kidd as he addressed the assembled members. He told them that Five Area offers one of the most modern telephone companies for its size in the country- which is quite a challenge in these times of changing technology.

"Once you fall behind in this business, you won't catch up," he said.

Kidd told the group about some of the changes which have occurred in the past few years.

- All of Five Area exchanges are now tied together by fiber optic cable. "We did it all without borrowing any money; we did it all in-house," he said.

- Equal Access, which allows subscribers to use any long distance carrier they want has become a reality. Kidd said "It was a law that we could not tell you which carrier to use," he said.

- Wiring and equipment now belong to the telephone subscriber, not to the company. "You don't call Bailey County Electric if you iron doesn't work. You call an electrician," said Kidd. If telephone equipment doesn't work, the subscriber purchases new equipment or pays someone to fix the old equipment.

- Cellular Telephones. Four years ago Five Area joined with other telephone companies in the area to offer cellular telephone service, a service that it couldn't afford to offer itself. "We fought open wire for years," said Kidd. "Any time you've got a man-made product, you're going to have problems."

- Satellite television is a service which Five Area has decided not to enter. "We didn't see how we could keep up; we're not television people. If a satellite doesn't work, we've got no one to volunteer to go up and fix it," Kidd joked. "The competition is too tough; we didn't want to butt heads with one of those big companies that can really take you out."

Kidd talked about two major changes that are going on currently.

- Rural Electric Authority's regulatory process: The federal government tried to eliminate REA, but decided to re-name and revise the federal program instead. The changes were not finalized as Kidd spoke.

- Kidd indicated that the administration wants to build high tech information superhighways across the country. This is in the early planning stages.

Following the meeting the members enjoyed a luncheon prepared by the Needmore Community Women's Club and a drawing for prizes.

Soil moisture readings taken

Parmer County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 need two to eight inches of water from precipitation and / or irrigation to bring the five foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before the 1994 spring planting, according to pre - plant soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the USDA-Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS).

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently - installed aluminum access tube at each monitoring site in the Water District. These sites are chosen based upon the soil type, the variations in the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates possible well yields, and typical farming operations in the area.

Soil moisture sites were also analyzed by crop type. For

cotton, soil moisture readings indicate an average of 0.20 inches per foot in the top three feet, increasing to 0.70 inches at the five foot depth.

Sorghum shows an average of 0.35 inches of available soil moisture per foot in the top three feet, increasing to 0.75 in the next two feet. Wheat shows 0.70 inches available in the top foot of the soil, 0.40 inches at the three foot level, and 0.70 inches at the five foot layer.

Corn has the highest available soil moisture due to irrigation. The top foot of the soil shows 0.90 inches of available soil moisture, 0.60 at the three foot level, and 1.10 inches at the four and five foot levels.

Generally, each foot of soil holds two inches of soil moisture or a total of about 10 inches in the five foot root zone soil profile.

Data was collected at the Parmer County soil moisture sites in mid - to - late - November. Since then, very little precipitation has fallen to replenish the soil moisture. Recent snows have added small amounts of moisture, but farmers are encouraged to check moisture conditions at the two and three foot levels.

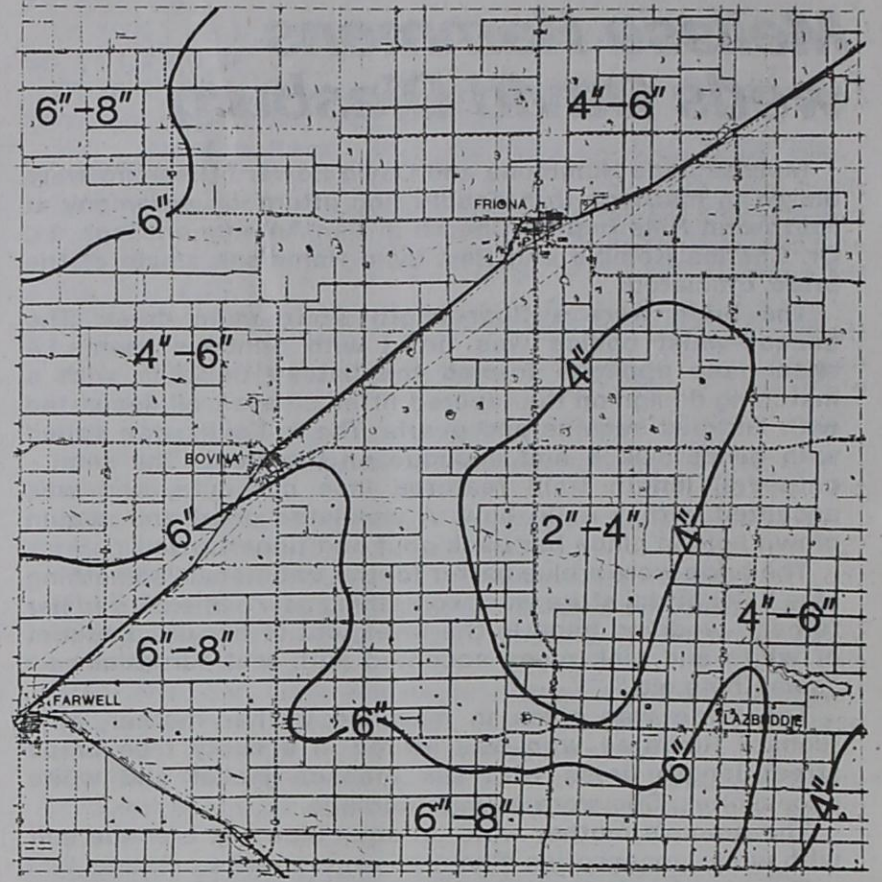
Historical data shows that above - average crop yields are more likely when the five foot root zone soil profile is at or near field capacity at planting. Any precipitation received between now and the start of planting will improve soil moisture conditions and influence prospective crop yields.

Furrow diking will help maximize the benefits of any rainfall that occurs prior to spring planting. Maintaining furrow dikes during the growing season will continue to benefit crops by keeping rainfall on the field to be soaked into the soil.

The annual pre - plant soil moisture survey data informs irrigators about general plant - available soil moisture conditions across the 15 - county Water District service area.

"Irrigators can use this information to estimate the amount of water needed to bring their soil to field capacity without over - irrigation. Producers should remember that this information reflects general soil moisture trends and should not be used in place of individual testing on their farms," says Wilfred E. "Willie" Crenwelge, USDA SCS Soil Scientist.

Lazbuddie votes to borrow \$125,000

The Lazbuddie School Board voted Feb. 9 to borrow \$125,000 under a 5 year Capital Acquisition Project loan from Texas Association of School Boards to provide for a bus, an agricultural pickup truck and trailer, a van and to update the computer labs in the next three years.

"It's a 3.5 percent loan, and we can get 1 to 1.5 points on the money if we will put it into Lone Star Investments until needed," said School Supt. Phil Warren. "With rates so low, it's time to get involved."

In other business, the board:

- Voted to buy a water pump and equipment out of a previous capital acquisition loan fund.
- Reviewed the property evaluations made by the County Tax Assessor's office. Warren said the board would appeal the evaluations that have been made.
- "We retrieved \$3 million in property tax evaluations last year," he noted. "This time it looks like we may have a chance to appeal \$9 million worth." Warren explained that the more that local residents pay in property tax, the less the state pays toward the cost of educating children.
- Approved two-year contracts for principals Rick Copp and Hardy Carlyle. No salary has been set at this time. The duties required of each principal will be announced later.
- Approved the 1994-95 school year calendar.
- Set the school open house schedule during the week of March 14-18. Parents will be invited to eat lunch at the school on March 15. Grandparents will be invited to lunch at the school on March 16. There will be an Open House at 7:30 p.m. and a band concert at 8:30 p.m. on March 17.
- Appointed Susie Sterling as the early voting clerk and Kim Puckett as the assistant early voting clerk for the upcoming school election May 7.
- Heard that the Lazbuddie computer programming teams had taken 1st, 2nd, and 4th places at the Texas Computer Education Association meet in Lubbock Feb. 5. These results were scored against all the schools that competed from Region XVI and XVII up to class 3A. The Lazbuddie top team actually tied Amarillo High - a 5A school in points.
- "We would have beaten every 5A school except Lubbock High, which is a magnet school," said Warren.
- Jarrah Redwine, Rachelle Rice and Timmy Smith were on the first place team; Matt Elliott, Jeremy Jones and Travis Barber were on the second place team; and Gina Jarman, Dawnda Magby and Jessica Burch were on the team that tied for third but got fourth on a default.

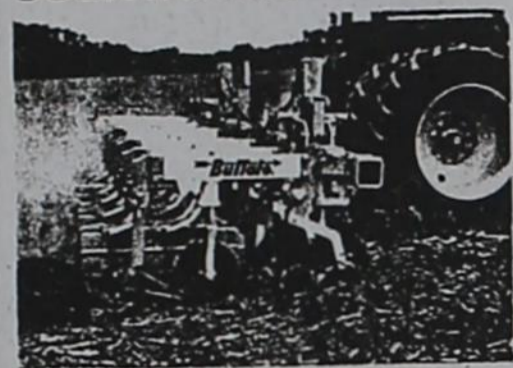

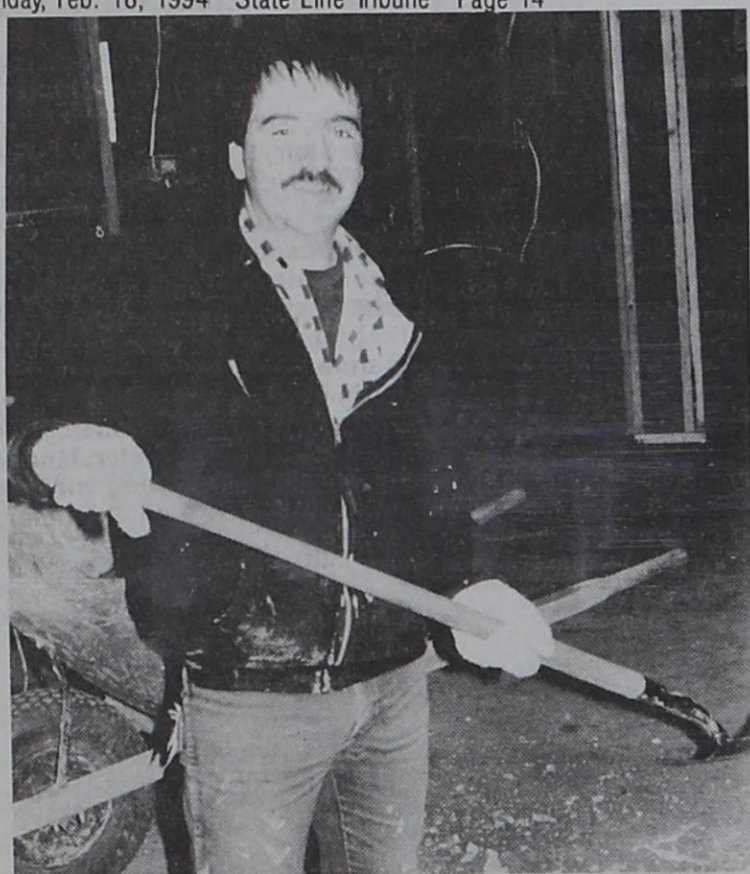

The first phase of the expansion project went so well that the congregation voted to go ahead with phase two, which will enlarge the nave of the church and move the chancel from one end of the building to the other.

Currently the chancel, or space around the altar, is located next to the fellowship hall. Part of the space is used to house Braille printing supplies. This space would become part of the central nave of the church.

A new chancel will be constructed on the opposite end of the building.

Many local workers are busily working on the project. Some are professional contractors and some are ordinary members of the congregation who are volunteering their services. By using volunteers, the project can be carried out as cheaply as possible.

The congregation at St. John hopes to raise \$75,000 for this project. In one sense it is only the expansion of a building, but in another one way - through its Braille writing project - St. John's expansion may have worldwide impact.

- 2 apples
- 8 oz. can apricot halves
- 1 jar maraschino cherries
- 2 oz. toasted pecans

Drain pineapple, reserving syrup. Slice banana and apple. Dip pieces in pineapple juice. It will stop the fruit from turning dark. Peel and slice kiwi. Arrange the fruit on a plate. Top with toasted pecans.

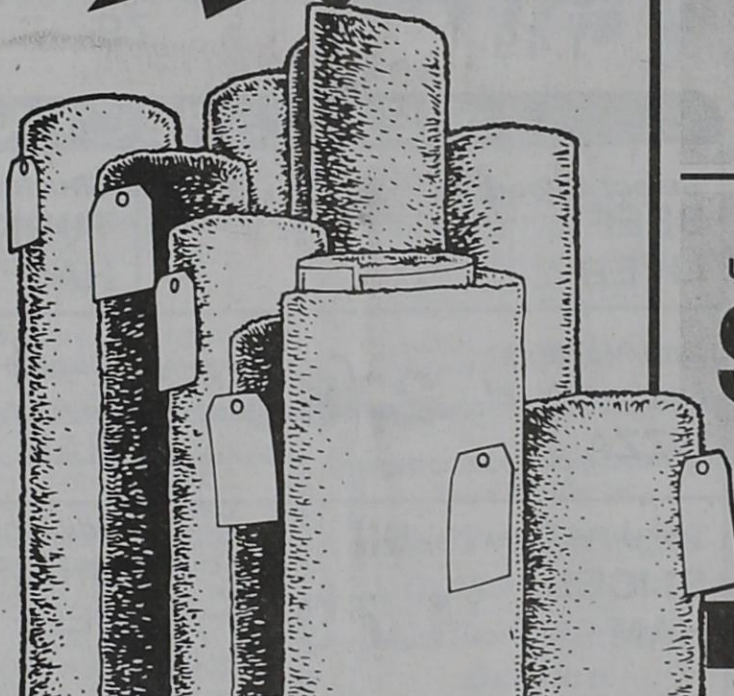
