And those are the attributes of this year's Wolverine team.

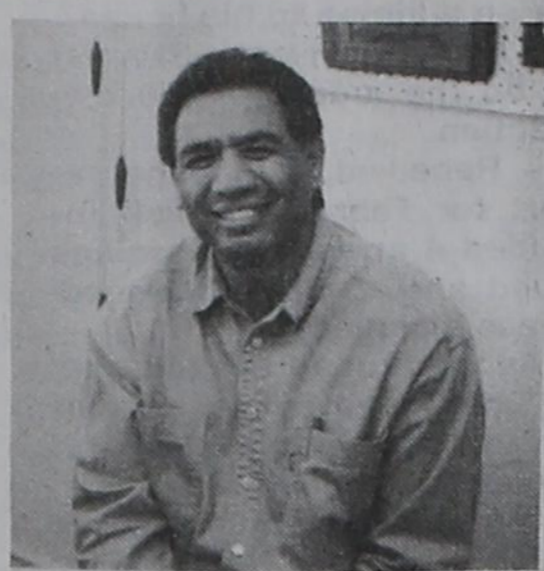
My compliments to Coach Richard Luscombe and the Texico Wolverines on a fine basketball season. And I'm sure they will be back at state next year!

A man with a mission

Jesse Cantu, Jr. is a man with a mission.

His mission is to teach the gospel of the Lord to all who will listen. His primary focus is to bring the Good News to Hispanics in the area that don't have a church home or that may be seeking one.

Pastor Rick Sullivan originally came up with the idea for a Spanish mission and then turned the project over to Jesse when he moved back to Farwell.

The mission will be called "Mision de la Puerta Abierta," - "Mission of the Open Door." The only obstacle to this mission opening its doors is the need for a building to house the mission.

"We are currently looking for a place to buy or rent, that would serve as the mission," Jesse stated.

"We are currently having a Spanish home Bible study that meets every Wednesday night at Lupe Coates' house," Jesse said. "We have bi-lingual Bibles and we're inviting anyone who is interested to join us." For those interested in the Bible study, Lupe Coates' address is 410 6th St. in Farwell. The study begins at 7 p.m.

Jesse received his call to the ministry while he was in the Army and stationed in Colorado Springs, Colo.

"I had begun to really think about my faith when I was stationed in Germany. It was here that I decided to get really serious about God," Jesse explained. "I transferred to Colorado Springs and moved into an apartment complex that was close by the Nazarene Bible College," he said. "In fact, it was right between my home and where I went to work. I would pass by the college and glance over at it and think about being a student there."

Jesse enrolled in a class at the college called "A Minister As A Person." He firmly believes that it was only three or four weeks into the class that his own call to the ministry was confirmed.

He went on to receive a Lay Ministry Diploma from the Nazarene Bible College and also retired from the Army. He and his family moved back to Farwell and Jesse has continued his studies at Wayland Baptist University in Plainview. He makes the drive to Plainview every Tuesday and Thursday. He will complete his studies in one more year.

Jesse's wife is Son-Ok and his children are Raquel, 15, Marcos, 14, and Daniel, 5.

After graduation, he hopes to continue on to seminary at either Dallas Baptist Seminary or in Ft. Worth at the Southwestern Theological Seminary.

Jesse is somewhat following in his father's footsteps by pastoring a Spanish mission. Jesse Cantu, Sr. has been involved as a preacher of missions at Forrest Heights Baptist Church in Clovis, the Pleasant Hill mission and is currently at the Baptist Mission in Bovina.

"If we can get a building for the mission, our policy will fit the name of Mission of the Open Door - we will always have our door open for those that want to hear and share the word of God," Jesse explained. "Our Bible studies also have an open door policy. The studies are non-denominational, so it doesn't matter what your background is. We are all coming together to study the word of God."

Registrations set

Registration for Farwell Schools' kindergarten and pre-kindergarten / Head Start classes for the 1995-96 school year has been scheduled.

It will be held on April 13 from 1 to 4 p.m. in the elementary school library.

All children who will be four and five years of age by Sept. 1 and live in the Farwell School district need to register.

To register, a child must have immunization records and a birth certificate. See the legal ad this issue of the Tribune for details.

Students will not be allowed to enroll for the fall classes at Farwell without their immunization records and a birth certificate.

Lazbuddie Elementary School will hold its pre-kindergarten and kindergarten registration on April 7 in the school library from 9 to 11:30 a.m.

The only criteria for a child to be eligible for kindergarten is that the youth be 5 years old by Sept. 1.

To qualify for pre-kindergarten, the child must be 4 years old by Sept. 1, must lack English language skills and must qualify for free or reduced lunches.

Also, parents must furnish a state birth certificate, immunization records and Social Security number when they register their children.

The children will visit their classrooms, take a short bus ride, tour the school and will be given refreshments in the cafeteria.

Anderson has article published

Dr. Ron Anderson, of Sandy-Lands Crop Consulting & Research of Farwell, had an article published in the February issue of "Cotton Grower" magazine.

The article was entitled "Increase Yield Potential" and included a sidebar story headlines "Strategy for Success."

Anderson discussed earliness management, noting its importance on the South Plains due to the elevation and short growing season for cotton.

In the article, Anderson said the optimum planting time is about May 17 because of the soil temperature. "I look for 65-degree soil, but if it's 61 or 62 degrees in mid-May, we'll go ahead and plant and take our chances. We'll take a chance on cool temperatures to get an early start."

In his strategy for success, Anderson lists 9 steps. Anderson said his growers in Parmer County averaged 2 to 3 bales per acre in 1994, their second consecutive bumper harvest. "In this case, earliness is the No. 1 factor in making a crop," he said.

Election ballots all filled up

The lineup is set for the spring election in May. Here's what it looks like:

Farwell School Board

Vying for two posts are incumbent Ronald Byrd, plus Gary Patterson, Michael Woods and Richard Miller.

Lazbuddie School Board

Only incumbents Tommy St. Clair and Rick Seaton have filed for re-election.

Farwell City Council

In the race for mayor are incumbent Chris Gikas and councilman Jimmie Mace.

Three candidates are seeking two council posts - Lupe Vidaurri and incumbents Jerry Stover and John Carlson.

Farwell Hospital

District Board

There's going to be a race for Farwell Hospital District Board this year.

There are five posts open - and six candidates.

Joe Haseloff filed last week for the board. Others who have filed were the five incumbents - Mike Ratke, Annette Black, Jerry Monk, Jack Allen Kirkland and Rick Sullivan.

Loading dock gets a cold reception

A possible railway potato loading dock in Farwell got a cold reception at Tuesday's Farwell City Council meeting.

Cramer Produce, Dimmitt, wants to set up a dock along the Santa Fe tracks between 6th and 8th streets. They say it's the only spur that's certified for loading for the Santa Fe they can find anywhere in the area. Currently, they use a spur for the Burlington Railroad in Dimmitt but need one in this area for the Santa Fe.

Gary Gallagher appeared on behalf of Cramer.

Also attending were Robert White, owner of Tri County Tire, and Jerry Monk, owner of Kelly Green Seeds. They, along with Sherley-Anderson-Pitman grain elevator, are the adjacent property owners to the section that Cramer wants to use.

Monk and White strongly opposed the potato loading facility. They pointed out problems that occur when potatoes become rotten, for example.

"There's no way you can clean it up 100 percent," said Monk.

Monk asked Gallagher what advantage to Farwell would accrue from allowing Cramer Produce to use the site.

"None," Gallagher replied. The street in question has only been used by the involved property owners, who have spent funds to keep it up.

Gallagher was told by Mayor Chris Gikas that unless Gallagher can get approval from the three adjacent property owners, he couldn't get city

Pleasant Hill, Texico may get state grants

Texico and Pleasant Hill received a bunch of money during the recent state legislative session.

But all funds are still tentative, pending whether Gov. Johnson approves them.

Here's what has been recommended:

Pleasant Hill

It appears that some additional state funding will allow the Pleasant Hill Volunteer Fire Department to enlarge their firehouse.

But Fire Chief Richard Kelley isn't quite sure yet. Here's why:

Last year, the Pleasant Hill fireboys asked for a \$100,000 grant to enlarge the station. The state legislature approved \$75,000, but the language got mixed up and it ended up saying it would be a matching grant and Pleasant Hill would have to come up with the rest of the funds.

Anyway, the fireboys were told that the \$75,000 would stay available for them until this year's legislature met. This time, the legislature apparently approved the remaining \$25,000 - so the total would be \$100,000.

That's what it seems. But Kelley is trying to check first to make sure that's correct and that the state isn't just going to give \$25,000 to Pleasant Hill. Once he gets word, he'll let the Tribune know.

If it turns out the \$100,000 has been approved, then the fireboys plan to add a 60 x 100 ft. building. This will give added truck space and provide a meeting area.

This meeting area could be used by other Pleasant Hill groups, such as the Senior Citizens and 4-H.

Texico City

Another \$100,000 was given the Texico Community Center, in addition to the \$200,000 received last year, thus totalling \$300,000.

Texico folks had asked for \$350,000 this year, but are glad to get the \$100,000.

Lewis Cooper said the funds are enough to provide for the start of construction this year. The architect is Eldon Smith & Associates.

The center will be built on land purchased by the city the past two years just east of KKR Park.

Texico Schools

Texico Schools had two grants approved - \$92,000 for land acquisition and \$142,000 for a high school lab and greenhouse.

The land acquisition would be for an agricultural farm. The Texico School Board last year made this a priority item. A farm would help the ag program and give students who live within the city limits a place to raise animals.

No site has been picked yet. If approved by Gov. Johnson, then school officials would look for a site.

The grant for the lab and greenhouse primarily would go for the lab. Two years ago, the junior high school science lab was upgraded. Now the School Board would like to renovate the high school science lab. There would not be new construction but rather improvements within the current facility.

Also, the city council approved closing Sixth Street, north of Avenue A, upon receiving a petition from the three adjacent property owners. This was requested by White and Monk.

In other business, four owners of a second-hand store on Avenue A at Third Street appeared to protest the ban on parking in front of their store. They were Corrine Ortiz, Rebecca Delgado, June Ortiz and Mrs. Celestino Hernandez.

They asked why parking had been banned all along the north side of the street, where their store was, but only part of the block on the south side. And they asked why the area is now considered hazardous when traffic has been allowed all these years. They noted that they have lost customers due to this ban.

Councilman Jimmie Mace said there has been a huge increase in traffic due to the Texas lottery.

Gikas said he would talk with ENMR Telephone, which has an office adjacent to the ladies' business, about allowing it to be used for parking during the week. It is being used on weekends when the office is closed.

And the council voted to ban parking along both sides of Avenue A throughout Farwell.

The council also:

- Approved the annual past control bid to Mack Heald.

- Okayed a building permit for David Ancira, 108 7th St., for an addition to his house.

- Appointed Roene Stewart to be the judge for the city election.

- Received the police report for February which included 4 arrests, 4 warnings issued and 1 citation issued. These included:

An unfounded suicide call; an unfounded sexual assault charge involving a child; an arrest on domestic violence; 2 arrests involving alcohol being available to minors; an arrest of a minor for consuming alcohol, and 3 juveniles warned on curfew violation.

Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa also said that Keevin Hall, of Hub, a licensed police officer, wants to help out and be a "reserve officer." He wouldn't be paid by the city but would help at events like ball games, said McGaa.

The question of liability was raised and will be checked into before a decision is made.

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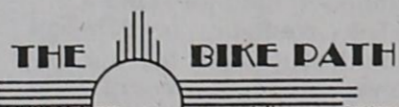
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Texico falls in state tourney

Texico's Wolverines were defeated March 16 in the semi-finals of the Class AA basketball tournament in Albuquerque by the Tularosa Wildcats, 58-52. Scoring for Texico were Pat Chumley, 16; Tyrone Gooden, 11; Clyde Jenkins, 2; Johnny Salinas, 7; Ruben Escamilla, 10, and Nathan Ketterling, 4. It was another see-saw game with Tularosa getting hot in the last few minutes to get the win. The game started with Texico moving ahead by a 7-2 margin after a Jenkins basket. Tularosa gained an 11-11 tie with a 3-pointer. Then Chumley canned a layup plus free throw to put Texico ahead 14-11 at the end of the first quarter. Chumley had 10 of Texico's points in this quarter. Tularosa took its first lead early in the second quarter, 15-14. After a 17- all tie, Texico pushed ahead to a 6-point lead on a basket by Chumley. Tularosa then went on a run, taking a 24-23 lead. Tularosa stretched its margin to 7 points with a minute left in the half before Texico took its turn at scoring. Steals by Gooden and Salinas resulted in baskets and Texico was down by only two at the half, 30-28. The first half saw a lot of turnovers by both teams - about 30.

The third quarter also was nip and tuck. Once again, Texico moved out to a 6- point lead on a pair of Ketterling free throws, 40-34. Then Tularosa scored a couple of baskets, followed by a 3-pointer at the buzzer to knot the score at 41-all going into the final quarter. An Escamilla jump shot put Texico up by 2. Tularosa responded, and it was tied. Then Salinas scored on a layup, and Tularosa tied it again. Midway through the final quarter, the game was tied on a Gooden layup. Texico grabbed its last lead with just over 2 minutes left in the game when Ketterling canned the front end of a 1 and 1 from the charity stripe - 48-47. But Tularosa hit a 3-pointer, followed by another basket to move ahead, 52-48, with 90 seconds left. Texico then began fouling to try to get the ball back. With 40 seconds left, Escamilla scored to close the gap to 52-50. Tularosa scored to up its lead to 4. Escamilla scored again to narrow it to 2. With 20 seconds left, Tularosa made 2 free throws, and added another pair from the charity stripe with 7 seconds left to make the final score 58-52.

Wolverines take third at state

The Texico Wolverines finished their season last Friday with a win over Dexter, 67-58, to take third place in the state tournament. Texico finished the season with a 22-7 record. Scoring were Pat Chumley, 19 (including a trio of 3 pointers); Johnny Salinas, 3; Ruben Escamilla, 6; Nathan Ketterling, 20; Bobby Russell, 7; Tyrone Gooden, 5; Clyde Jenkins, Mel Askew and Aaron Stanley, 2 each; and Cody Drager, 1. All the Wolverines got a chance to play. It was sweet revenge for the Wolverines, who had lost to Dexter at the beginning of the season, 74-69. Texico maintained a lead the whole way, with the third quarter proving decisive. After leading 27-24 at the half, the Wolverines won the third quarter 17-11 to keep ahead. Both teams scored 23 points piece in the final quarter. But the Wolverines actually increased their lead to 19 points in the final period before Coach Richard Luscombe cleared his bench.

Texico stats released

Season basketball stats for the Texico Wolverines have been announced. The Wolverines, 22-7, outscored their opponents by an average of 73-60. Texico had good consistency, averaging 17.5 points each first quarter, 18.6 in the second, 18.4 in the third and 18.5 in the fourth quarter. Top scoring averages were: Tyrone Gooden, 13.3; Pat Chumley, 12.5; Ruben Escamilla, 9.2; Nathan Ketterling, 15.3; Johnny Salinas, 9.8; Clyde Jenkins, 6.9; Bobby Russell, 5.8. The top 3-point shooters were: Chumley, 38 of 108, 35.2 percent; Russell, 26 of 76, 34.2 percent; Escamilla, 15 of 60, 25 percent, and Gooden, 21 of 71, 29.6 percent. The top 2-point shooting averages were: Ketterling, 61.9 percent; and Russell, 62.5 percent. Top free throw percentages belonged to: Salinas, 80.7 percent; and Russell, 69 percent. Top rebounders were: Gooden, 6.3 per game; Ketterling, 7 per game; Salinas, 5.8 per game; Jenkins, 4.9 per game. Escamilla led in steals with 102. Chumley had 73 and Ketterling 76. Chumley led in assists with 112. Escamilla had 77.

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It's been 34 years since law was enacted designating the third week of March as National Poison Prevention Week. In 1972, the National Center for Health Statistics noted that the number of deaths reported due to household chemicals in children was 216. In 1990, that number was 49 - a 77 percent decline. Adults may jokingly comment that children can more easily open "child-resistant" containers than they can. However, the Consumer Product Safety Commission's act requiring child-resistant packaging on aspirin products reduced the number of deaths in children attributed to aspirin from 46 in 1972 to only 1 in 1990. Child-resistant packaging should always be used properly. Products, such as over the counter and prescription medications, required to be in special packaging should never be transferred to other containers. If you have trouble opening child-resistant containers, and have no small children in your home, just ask for "easy open" closures from your pharmacist. Donna Ratke

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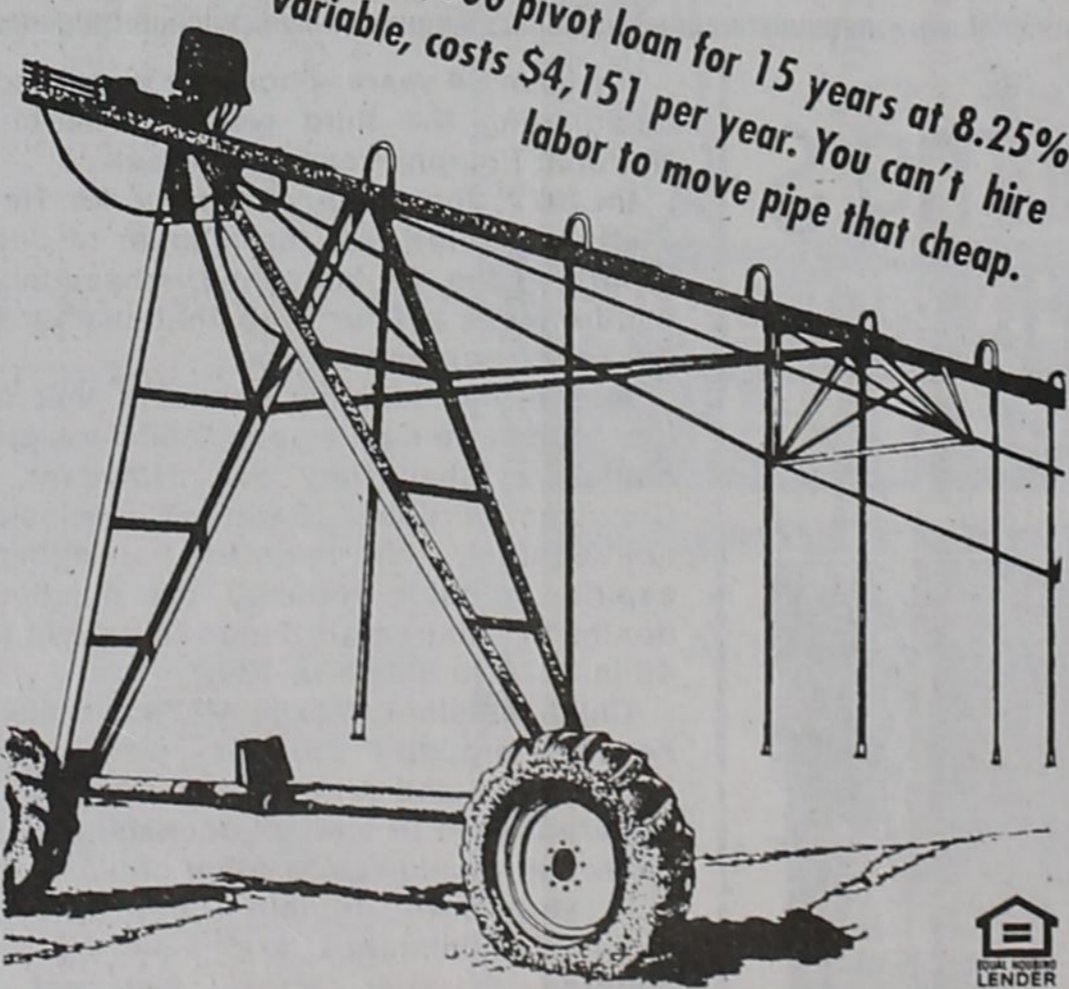

- Congress is now under some of the same laws that everyone else in the nation has already been under.

That bill was passed and signed by the president about a month ago.

I wish I could be like a normal columnist and write millions and millions of words about all the proposed changes, what they mean, who's involved, how it's happening, etc., etc., ad nauseum.

I just can't do it.

Remember when I wrote that Cong. Larry Combest was ready to do an interview on Jan. 20 about the upcoming Congress and all their nifty plans? Other area newspapers interviewed him at that time. I said I would prefer to wait 100 days and then interview the congressman about what has, or hasn't been, achieved.

Get ready, Mr. Combest. In 40 more days, I'll be a-calling.

I started getting violent again during a friendly discussion about politics with a couple of friends last week.

I realize that I come across as very down on our nation's leaders and political processes. I'd like to explain why:

- No. 1, the Vietnam War. Enough said on that subject.

- No. 2, the need for real reform which, in my opinion, can't happen.

One example: the nation's legal system needs reform but since it's the lawyers who make the laws (i.e., the vast majority of our Congress are lawyers), no group can successfully reform itself.

- No. 3, the inability of our nation's leaders to attack the worst problem facing us - the shrinking of the middle class and beginning of a two-tier economic system, rich and poor.

Heavens knows, I've written enough about this topic the past several years to choke a horse. Suffice it to say that our nation's leaders lack the will power to attack the fundamental source of a forthcoming multitude of major problems that could destroy our nation. No, I'm not joking.

Just last Sunday, I was watching a news show on the Black Entertainment TV Network and, sure enough, one panelist stated exactly what I've harping about.

- No. 4, our priority on making the U.S. a better place to live went awry in the 1960s and is continuing. What went wrong is so simple

that it's ridiculous, especially when you would like to think that intelligent folks run this country.

What happened was this: our leaders forgot, or ignored, that famous lesson from the Bible: (to paraphrase) it is better to teach a man to fish than to continually give him free fish.

Well, we chose the easy way, LBJ's Great Society, which doomed our future. I could write at great length explaining this in more detail and may do so in a future column.

Sorry I have to be so blunt. I really do wish I was like other political columnists and could write about things that are of more immediate interest to folks.

It's a lot easier to look at the little pictures.

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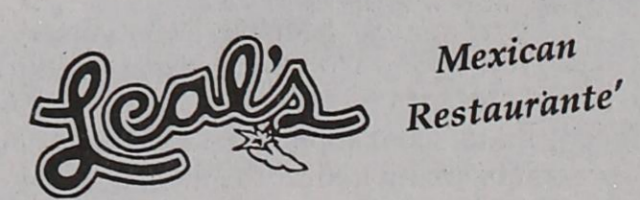
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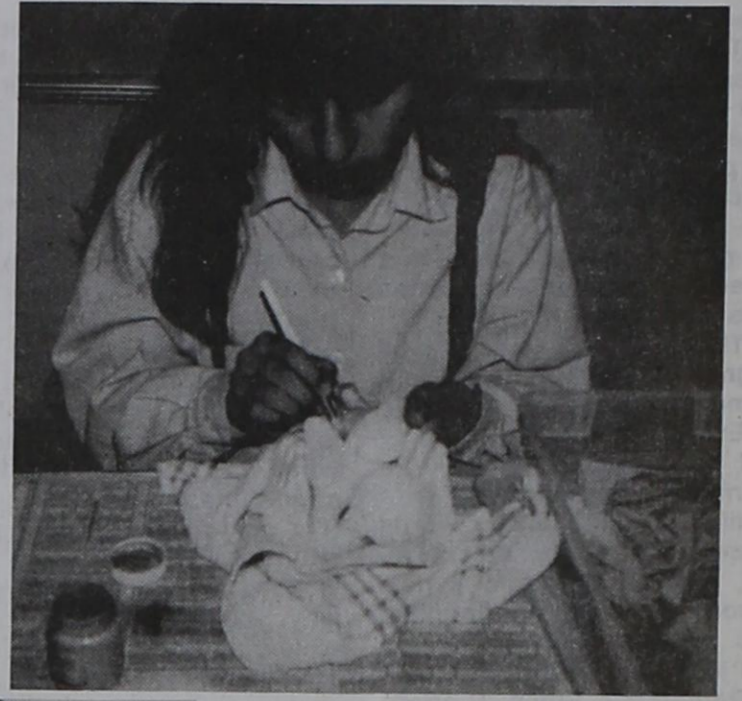
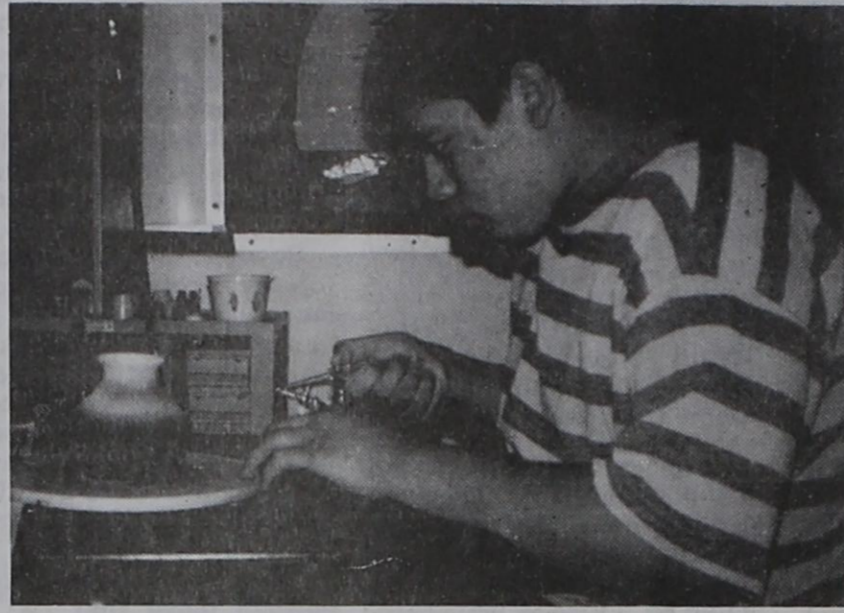

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Some grain stats

Australia recently purchased 22,500 metric tons (886,500 bushels) of U.S. grain sorghum, enough sorghum to fill approximately 975 large semi-trucks, according to the U.S. Feed Grains Council. Recent sales to Australia indicate that a significant amount of U.S. - produced sorghum may be moving into this non-traditional market.

According to the U.S. Feed Grains Council, the People's Republic of China (PRC) for the first time recently purchased 35,000 metric tons (1.6 million bushels) of U.S. malting barley. The sale was due to the efforts of the Council, who, for over five years, has sponsored numerous market development activities, including malting and brewing demonstrations in China. Beer output in the PRC reached 12.25 million metric tons in 1993, making China the second largest beer producing country in the world, just behind the United States.

Indonesia recently purchased 120,000 metric tons (4.7 million bushels) of U.S. corn, bringing year-to-date purchases to 190,000 mt (7.5mbu); Indonesia bought 70,000 mt (2.8 mbu) of U.S. corn in August 1994, their first purchase since 1987. Total corn imports in 1994 are estimated at 1 million metric tons (39.4 mbu), according to the U.S. Feed Grains Council.

Even with 200 million acres in set-aside programs, the United States has more arable land to place in production than the former Soviet Union, Australia, Canada and China combined. The amount of U.S. corn, sorghum and barley exported annually is equal to 1 in every 3 acres, reports the U.S. Feed Grains Council.

According to the U.S. Feed Grains Council, the top-10 importers of corn were Japan, Taiwan, Korea, Mexico, Algeria, the People's Republic of China, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Colombia, and Venezuela. These countries imported a total of approximately 35 million metric tons (1.4 billion bushels) of corn in 1994, worth about US \$3.5 billion.

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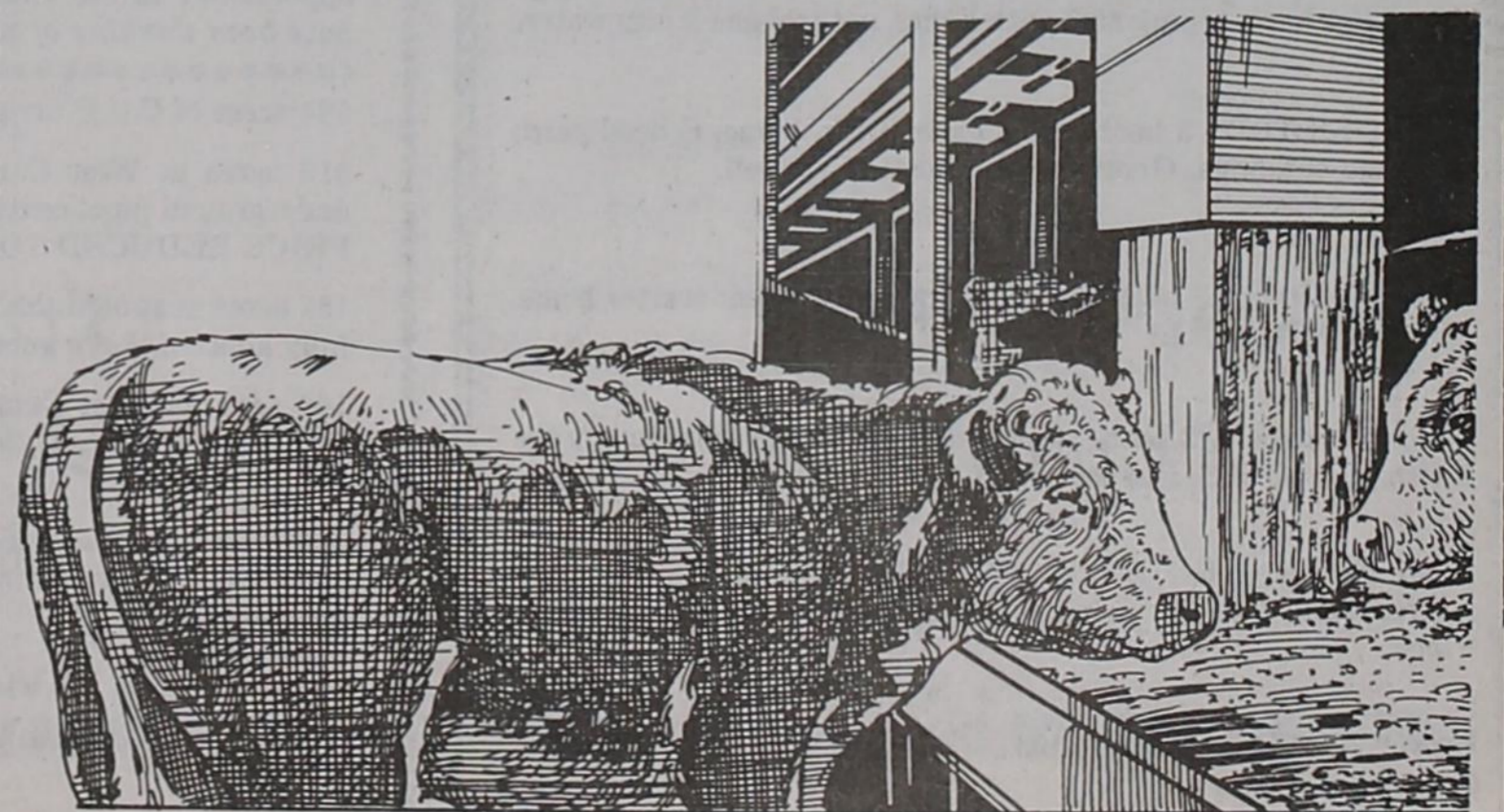
