



Stanley takes 5th contest



Cooperatives' anniversary celebrated

October is the month to honor our nation's cooperatives. It's special this year in that 1994 is the 150th anniversary of co-ops.

This area is fortunate to have many strong cooperatives providing essential services to our folks.

We received some information about co-ops and we would like to share it with you today:

Cooperatives date back to the first one that was incorporated in 1844 at 31 Toad Lane, Rochdale, 12 miles north of Manchester, England. It was founded by 28 folks, mostly weavers but also a shoemaker, tailor, cabinet maker, hatter, printer, etc. Their aim was to make their meager wages go farther by cutting expenses.

The co-op's two first employees agreed to take nothing for their services if the store didn't show a profit in the first three months. However, if it did, they were to receive 3 pennies per hour for a total night shift payment to them of nine pennies per night.

The co-op board authorized the sale of four items - butter, flour, oatmeal and sugar. When the gas company refused to light the store, the staff bought candles for opening night - buying them in bulk and selling the remainder.

The opening inventory was 16 pounds, 11 shillings and 11 pennies – about \$26. Initially, the shop opened two nights a week from 8 until 10. By March of 1845, they were open every night except Sunday and Tuesday. After a full year in operation, the store had 74 member households, had raised \$181 in capital, had registered \$1,100 in sales and had netted \$22 in savings / (Continued on Page 2)

One camp resident found me on patrol and reported that individuals were fighting with chains, knives and clubs. When I arrived, I was confronted by two men, one armed with a homemade mace (ball and chain with handle). He began swinging it and yelling. He ignored my order to drop the weapon. I fired a .12 gauge riot gun over his head, causing the man's companion to pull him into this apartment, where the situation was contained pending the arrival of backup.

Texas Highway Patrol's Craig Hunt arrived within 5 minutes and began checking the injured. He called for the Farwell ambulance to take two injured men to the Clovis hospital.

Texico Marshal Gil Holguin arrived and began talking to the suspect in Spanish, trying to get him to give up. Holguin was able to convince him to surrender and several arrests were made.


When Parmer County Deputy Sheriff Roy Smith arrived. I turned the situation over to him as it was under county jurisdiction.


The Texico ambulance was called to transport the man who had been armed with the mace. He suffered an injured wrist and hand, apparently during the fight.



Cowboys hold off the Steers

The Farwell Steers lost to one of the state's top-ranked teams, the Plains Cowboys, in an away game last Friday, 56-

Unbeaten Plains has two All-State candidates, at end and running back, and both did severe damage to the Steers. Plus the Plains' quarterback threw several perfect long passes, hitting his receivers while in full stride.

Farwell, 1-4, begins its district campaign tonight (Friday) at 7 p.m. at Bovina.

The game opened with Farwell kicking off, and Justin Mahaney tackling the returner at the Plains 20. On the first play, Plains hit on a long pass for an 8-yard TD. The kick made it 7-0.

Farwell was held and punted. On defense, Chanse Stephens had a QB hurry and Plains punted. Farwell had two more possessions, including one gained by recovering a fumble, but couldn't move the ball. On defense, Blaze Hardage had a strong tackle.

With 5:20 left in the first quarter, Plains scored again on a 52-yard TD pass. It was now 14-0.

Farwell started moving the ball for the first time. Brock Anderson hit Chase Hardage with an 8-yard pass. Then Anderson ran for the first down. Anderson ran twice more for 9 yards but on 4th and 1 at the Steer 40, Farwell went for it but was stopped short.

On defense, Nic Ketcherside had a good defensive play. And Jesse Chilton recovered a fumble at the Steer 37. Anderson broke loose on a twisting 63-yard TD run, shedding two tacklers in his wake. Jason Miller kicked the point after to close the margin to 14-7.

Plains started at its own 30. Jason Miller had a good tackle. But Plains scored with 39 seconds left in the first quarter on a 52-yard TD pass. It was now 21-7.



Here's background on tree decision

From Texico School superintendent Dr. R.L. Richards: "Recently the New Mexico legislature appropriated \$350,000 to Texico Schools to build a track and football field. During the Track and Field Committee's deliberations, priorities were given to improving the track, the football

field and new lights. A decision was also made to move the football field north. Statutorily, 1% of the allocation (\$3,500) must be spent on a visual art project. Also, architect's fees must be paid from the appropriation.

Texico Schools are very excited to receive this new project. Texico Schools feel the project would not be a tax burden to the patrons, and it was a chance to re-coup some of these tax dollars going to Santa Fe. It appears to be a great opportunity to provide a track and field for our students and community with little or no cost to the local agency.

arose concerning the possibility of a tree grant to improve the appearance and the wind break at the football field. The school board approved the tree grant proposal. Since the possibility of new trees was a variable, an alternate bid for tree removal was placed on the track and field specifications.

The tree grant was developed by Texico Schools and the Soil Conservation Service. The planning allowed for 340 Kettler Junipers to be planted around the football field and west of the elementary school. The grant proposal included drip lines and a weed barrier. The Soil Conservation Service group recommended these trees and encouraged community and student participation in the planting of the trees. Texico Schools pursued the grant with vigor, thinking this would be a great extension of the track and field allocation, and provide a good wind break for our field, track, and school buildings. The Soil Conservation Service spokespersons say, "The Kettler Junipers are a deeper rooted evergreen, better windbreaks and are less susceptible to insects and disease."

On Sept. 27, Texico Schools received one of the 23 tree grants awarded from the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department. The grant includes 340 Kettler Juniper trees, a drip irrigations system and a weed barrier.

The School Board will take action on this grant at the Oct. 11 meeting. The Texico Schools feel the new Kettler Junipers will be a handsome addition to the elementary and the track and field. (See attached diagrams.)
