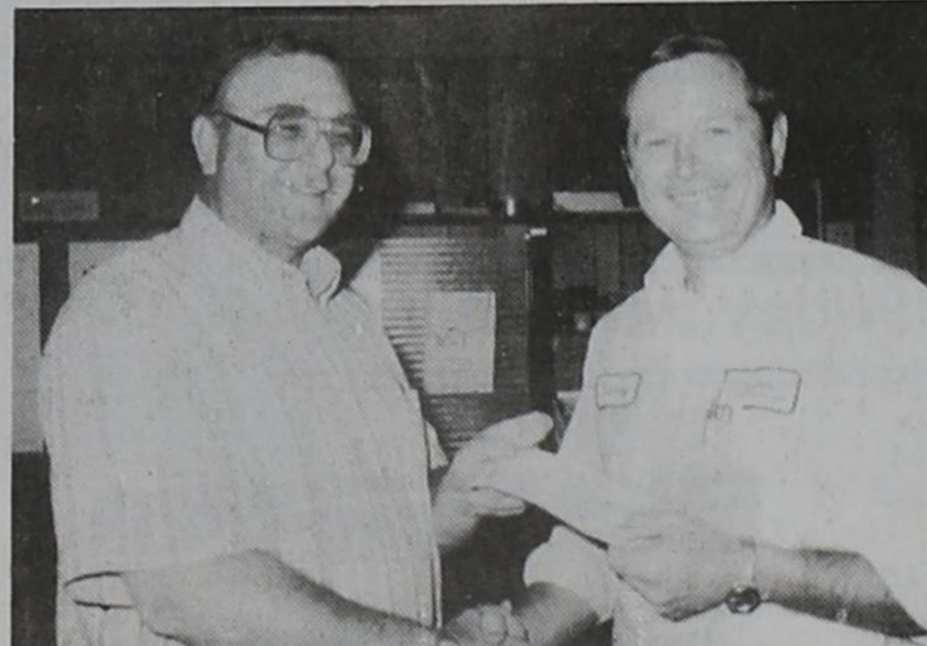

Family Fun Run planned

Farwell Elementary Schools annual Family Fun Run will be held at 7 p.m. on Oct. 4.

This year's route will begin at the front of the Elementary Building. Runners and walkers will go north on 7th Street, west on Avenue F (around the playground) to 4th Street. Then they will go south along 4th Street to Avenue I. Then they will go east to 5th Street. From there they will go north on 5th to Avenue G and east on Avenue G to the School.

The Farwell Fire Department has been asked to block off streets along the length of the course. And, a pickup truck will follow the participants in case someone needs assistance.

Services extended to Friona

The Parmer County Commissioners Tuesday expanded a county service into the Friona area.

The commissioners voted to pay the Friona Federal Credit Union \$1 for each auto license sticker sold. Previously, the payment was 50 cents per sticker.

In doing that, the union was allow county tax assessor - collector Doris Herington to place an office in their building. The county tax assessor office will be open there each Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Herington said the office opening in Friona will occur after Nov. 1.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Voted unanimously to accept the 1995 budget and tax rate. The tax rate will be .3246 cents, up from .3181 in 1994.

County Treasurer Anne Norton reported that "property re-appraisal took place in 1993-94 for the Friona area. This caused the tax dollar figure to increase and the effective tax rate to decrease. After the re-appraisal the effective tax rate for the county was .3152."

- Renewed the janitorial contract with Mary Ann Ancira. Bids were not needed because it was under the cut-off.

- Received one bid, from Leaway Roofing, Hereford, for roof repairs on the courthouse. Leaway bid \$35,047. It was tabled.

- Received one bid, also from Leaway, for roof repairs on the law enforcement building. Leaway bid \$42,637. It also was tabled. The commissioners plan to seek bids for a metal roof for this building.

- Voted to computerize all jury selections in Parmer County. This will go into effect early next year.

Currently, names of potential jurors are chosen manually by the turn of a wheel. But the state has a software program available which allows the computer to pick the names from a list of all Parmer County registered voters, all licensed drivers and folks issued ID cards.

- Named the same election judges as last election.

Texico tackles dog problem: raises fees

What to do about the problem of dogs running loose was the main topic at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

A problem has been with the fine system. Councilman Ronnie Warmuth said the city council needs to encourage the city judge, George Herrington, to enforce penalties, saying too many cases are being dismissed.

But a problem is that the animal control officer, Dan Walterscheid, because he is not a law enforcement officer, cannot give out citations, but just pick up animals. The city police officers can give out citations, but only if they are with Walterscheid to see a crime being committed. This is virtually impossible to achieve, said mayor Butch Tharp.

Another problem is that folks are not going to pick up their animals at the Clovis pound (where Texico animals are taken), but getting new animals instead.

Currently, the fine for a first offense is \$15; second offense, \$25, and third offense, up to \$100.

So here's what the council voted to do:

Texico will ask the Clovis pound officials to collect these fees - \$25 for a first offense, \$50 for a second offense, and \$100 for a third offense. Texico would be reimbursed these fees even if part of the fees go to Clovis as an administrative fee. Councilmen Warmuth and Carolyn Burrows will talk with Clovis officials about this proposal. If they agree, the city animal control ordinance will be amended to say it. This bypasses the city court problem.

While discussing the animal problem, it was noted that most residents ignore the ordinance requiring animals be licensed in Texico. Tharp said he has been told that requirement is not enforceable, but will check into it.

And Tharp said Walterscheid has been told to cease being too lenient.

In other business, the council:

- Voted to seek a state grant to set up a recycling center.

- Heard Warmuth report that the Texico Schools planned to tear down many Russian olive trees to make room for construction of a new track and football field. Warmuth stressed the importance of trees and the council voted to send the school board a letter asking them not to tear down the trees.

School Supt. R.L. Richards told the Tribune Wednesday that one alternate bid, among several alternates, that is being sought on the construction project calls for keeping the trees. Also, a questionnaire that will be given parents attending Monday's Open House asks their opinion on whether the trees should be kept. Also, the school system has received a \$3,500 state grant to plant new junipers around the new track and football field to take the place of the current trees.

- Discussed a problem at some intersections where tree limbs blocked the line of sight and stop signs. After checking on the legality of the city cutting those limbs, the city will take care of the problem.

- Agreed to sell its 198 Dodge pickup and a water pump. For more information, see the classified ad in today's Tribune.

- Agreed to buy two used street sweepers from state surplus, for \$700. Tharp said the city's gutters need cleaning. The sweepers are broom-types, pulled by a tractor.

- Agreed to upgrade the electrical system at KKR Park. The cost is expected to be more than \$1,000.

From Judy:

The El Cid Cutting Horse Show was unlike any horse event I had ever witnessed. It was not a romp 'em stomp 'em rodeo event. It was not a lightning quick race. It was not a bouncy circus act, and it was not like the plodding workhorses pulling a plow.

Allsup's annual cutting horse show was a demonstration of the synchronization between man and animals. The rider communicates his wishes to his mount with the slightest visible movements. This isn't an event filled with spurs and bits and reins; it is about invisible controls.

The rider is told which cattle in a herd are to be singled out. It might be one or more, but usually it is one. He and his horse and his dog work as a team to single out the animal from the herd and move it away from the others.

There is no whipping or spurring. There are no lassos or ropes. Commands are hardly noticeable to the viewers in the stands. Yet it is obvious that everyone involved knows exactly what each movement means.

Points are deducted if the commands are overt or visible. Commands are very, very subtle.

The rider's dog works to keep the herd together. It seemed to be filled with eager anticipation. Not one word was spoken to the dog, but it knew its role, and the cattle obeyed.

The smallest steer in the herd could easily have trampled the dog if it had been out of control. Each outweighed the dog by hundreds of pounds. Yet each remained huddled in the herd while the dog lay in wait. It didn't bark or nip or jump on the cattle. It barely moved.

The horse moved up to the herd with purpose and strength, and it singled out one animal from the middle. How it knew which one to single out I do not know, but it did. The rider hardly moved a muscle to communicate his will to his mount.

At times the animals' movements reminded me of St. Francis calling the birds. It was beyond my comprehension and skill.

The Chief's Corner

Concerning the proposed curfew: Here are some answers to questions that have been asked or anticipated.

Before taking any enforcement action under this section, a police officer shall ask the apparent offender's age and reason for being in a public place. The officer shall not issue a citation or make an arrest under this section unless the officer reasonably believes that offense has occurred and that, based on any response and other circumstances, no defense is present.

Exemptions to Curfew: If the minor: (a) is accompanied by or on an errand at the direction of the minor's parent or guardian, (b) is in a motor vehicle involved in interstate travel, (c) is engaged in an employment activity, or going to or coming from such activity, without detour or stop, (d) is involved in an emergency, (e) is on the sidewalk abutting his residence or the next-door neighbor's residence, if neighbor does not object, (f) is attending an official school, religious, or other recreational activity supervised by adults and sponsored by the City, civic organization or similar entity that takes responsibility, or going to or coming from such activity without detour or stop, (g) is exercising First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution, such as free exercise of religion, freedom of speech, and the right to assembly, or is married or had been married or had the disabilities of minority removed in accordance with Chapter 31 of the Texas Family Code.

Notice is hereby provided that on September 15, 1994, Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, Inc. filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas a Notice of Intent to Apply for A Certificate of Convenience and Necessity for Construction of A New Generating Facility. Golden Spread proposes the construction of four 100-MW simple cycle gas turbine units. Natural gas will be used as a primary fuel. The estimated cost of the facility is \$140 million. The estimated in service date is March of 1998. A final site selection has not been made, but two preferred sites are currently under consideration. October 2-8, 1994, is National 4-H Week.

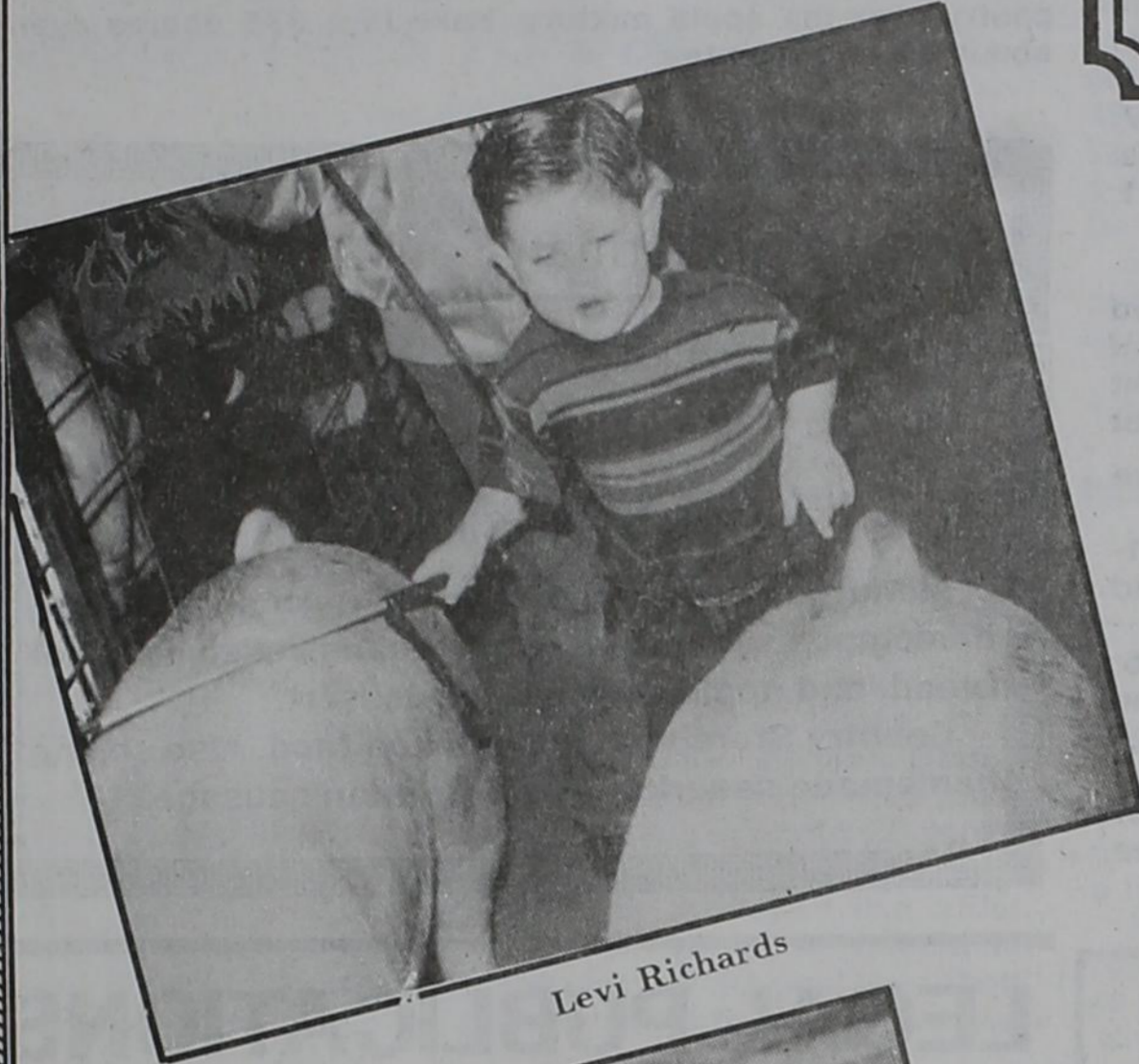

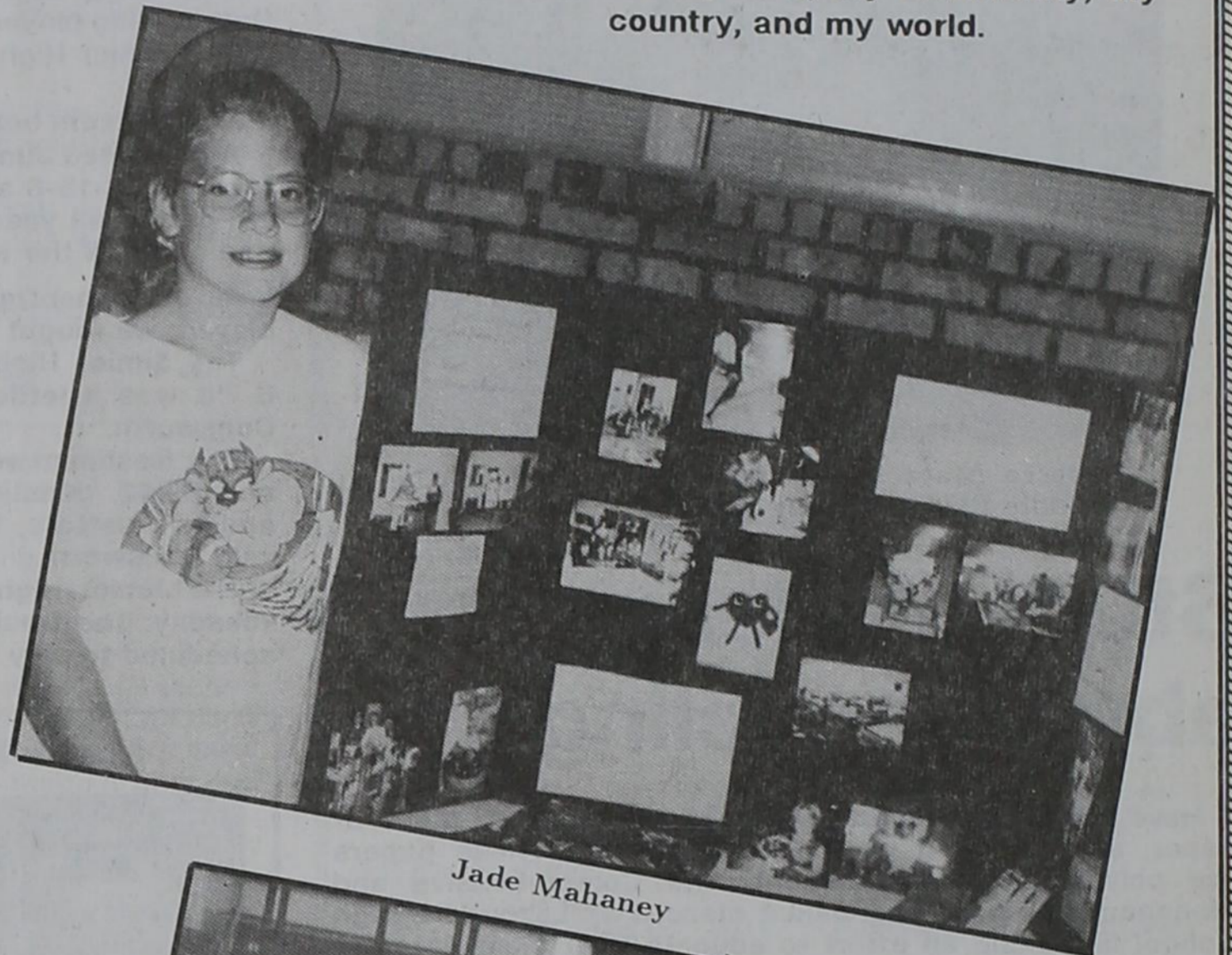

The 4-H program has expanded steadily for the past 25 years, with our numbers totalling up to more than 5 million 4-H'ers throughout the United States.

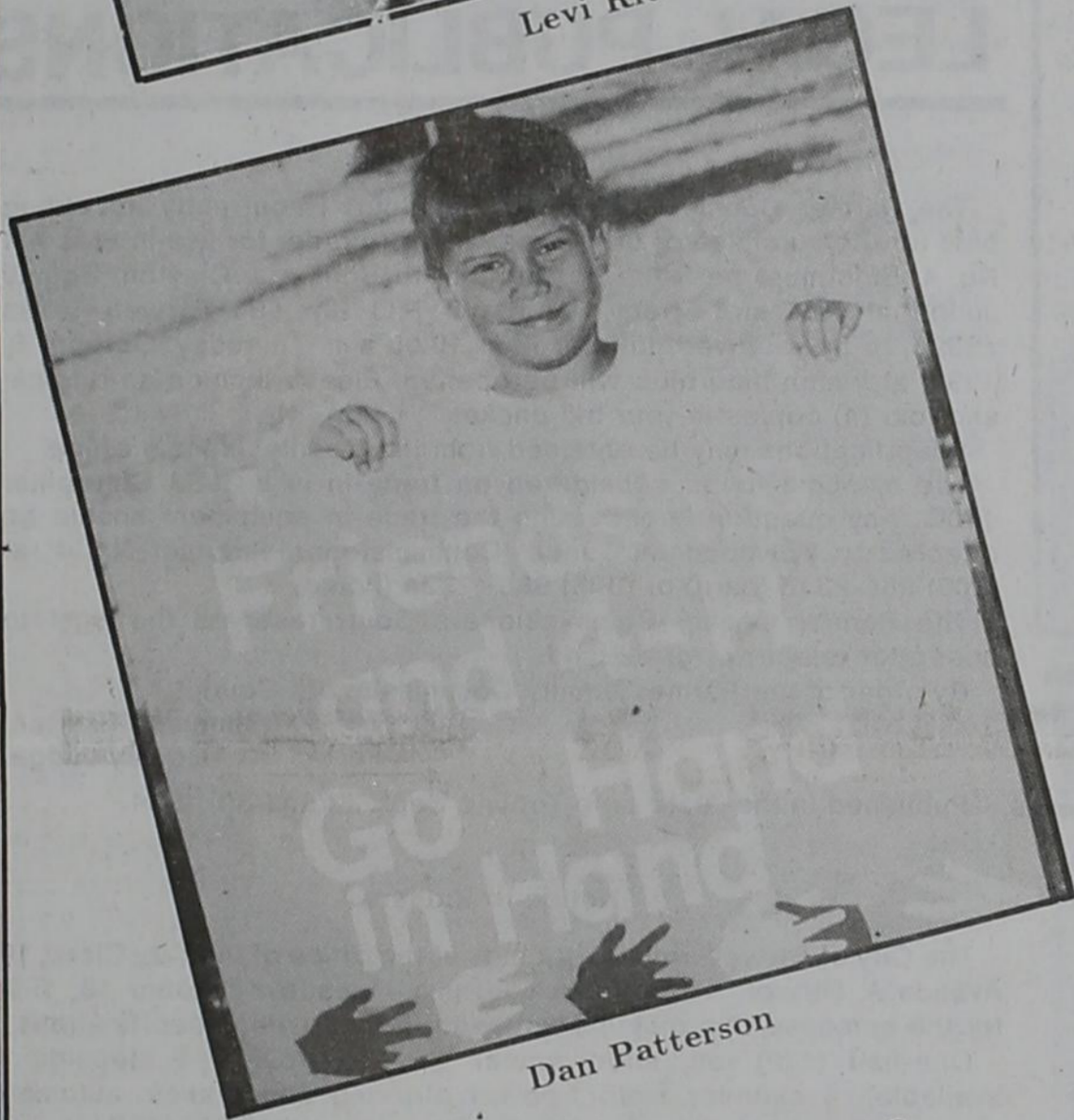

Students learn about recycling

Have you ever wadded up a seemingly useless piece of paper, and hurled it at the wastebasket? These papers are polluting our environment. The Comprehensive and Management Home Economics classes at Lazbuddie High School is making an effort to educate their classmates at school on the benefits of recycling.

Blanca Pacheco, Heather Hudson, Melissa Aguirre, Katy Jones, and Rebecca Mata have asked teachers and administrators to sign an agreement to help encourage all students to put flat paper into a labeled box. "The students felt this was a good way to put into practice some of the things they are studying about resources in class," stated Barbara Lust, home economics teacher. Flat paper takes up much less space in a land fill or dump.

The paper and aluminum are collected for their value as recycled materials. "This project will not only help the school, but the environment as well," says Rebecca Mata, student and helper in this project at Lazbuddie.

Stormwater is retained in one playa lake. Wastewater from the playa lake is disposed of by evaporation. Manure/solids is disposed of by contract manure hauler for application as fertilizer on approximately 4,000 acres of agricultural land. The Executive Director of the Commission has prepared a draft permit based on the application submitted by the applicant and other information presently available.

Legal Authority: Section 26.02B of the "Texas Water Code" and 30 TAC Chapter 305 of the "Rules of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission."

This application is subject to a Commission resolution adopted August 18, 1993, which directs the Commission's Executive Director to act on behalf of the Commission and issue final approval of certain permit matters. The Executive Director will issue this permit unless one or more persons file written protests and/or a request for a hearing within 30 days after publication of this notice.

If you wish to request a public hearing, you must submit your request in writing. You must state (1) your name, mailing address and daytime phone number; (2) the permit number of other recognizable reference to this application; (3) the statement "I/we request a public hearing"; (4) a brief description of how you, or the persons you represent, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application; (5) a description of the location of your property relative to the applicant's operations; and (6) your proposed adjustment to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for hearing. 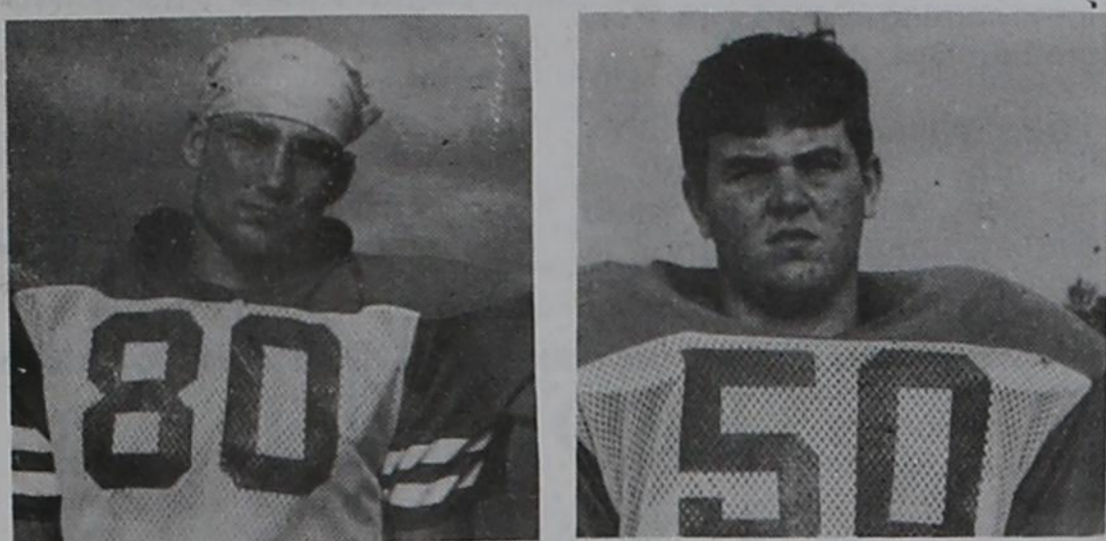

On defense, Blaze Hardage had a good tackle and Mahaney hurried the QB into a bad throw. Whiteface punted to the Steer 37. As the ball rolled dead, Jesse Chilton scooped it up and ran to the Whiteface 47 - an 18-yard carry against a surprised Whiteface team.

Farwell was held and punted into the end zone. On defense, Jason Taylor had a QB hurry. Whiteface punted to midfield. Farwell went for it on 4th and 3 but was stopped short by a yard. Whiteface moved into Steer territory. With 2 minutes left in the half, the Antelope QB was sacked by 2 Steers, dropped the ball, and Troy Chadwick picked it up and rambled 60 yards for the second Steer TD. A bad snap caused the kick for extra point to fail and it was 13-0.

On defense, Landon Lunsford tackled the kickoff returned at the Whiteface 30. Mahaney and Steve Miller combined on a QB sack. And Miller had another QB sack as the half ended.

Opening the second half on defense, Taylor and Jason Miller had good tackles. Chad Martin blocked a Whiteface punt try, and Anderson picked it up and ran 20 yards for a TD at 10:19. The run for extra points failed and it was 19-0.

Farwell got the ball back quickly when Kip Atwell recovered a fumble at the Antelope 20. Nic Ketcherside had runs of 9, 3 and 6 yards. The Steers were on the Antelope 1

when they fumbled, but Mahaney recovered the loose ball in the end zone for a TD at 7:48. The kick missed and it was 25-0.

After holding Whiteface, the Steers moved again on a 17-yard pass from Anderson to Taylor. But a 4th and 9 pass failed. On defense, Mahaney had yet another QB sack. After the teams exchanged punts, Whiteface scored on a 20-yard run at the end of the third period. The pass for extra points failed when Mahaney sacked the QB, making the score 25-6.

In the fourth period, Anderson hit Michael Phillips with a 9-yard pass. Farwell went for it on 4th and 2 at their own 33, and Anderson kept for a first down. Farwell was held and punted. On defense, Chadwick had a QB hurry. Both teams exchanged punts. Then Anderson intercepted an Antelope pass and ran 30 yards for a Steer TD at 4:27. The Jason Miller kick made it 32-6.

Ketcherside was in at quarterback for the Steers' next offensive series. He had runs of 3 and 7 yards. Lunsford ran for 5. Then Lunsford broke loose on a 31-yard TD scamper at 1:00. The Miller kick made it 39-6.

On defense, Chilton had a nifty tackle as the game ended. Comments from Coach Stan Stroebel: "It was a good game for us. The breaks went our way, and we capitalized on them."

It did a lot for the morale of the team to put an entire football game together. Both the offensive and defensive players played well."

The defense scored 3 TDs. Stats: The Steers had 213 yards total offense - 31 yards passing and 182 yards rushing. Whiteface had 131 yards total offense.

Anderson had 77 yards rushing and 31 yards passing. He was 3 for 9 in passing. Ketcherside had 55 yards rushing. Lunsford had 41 yards rushing.
