After Papa Doc died peacefully in bed, his son, "Baby Doc," took over. He certainly was no Papa Doc. Due to his excesses, the military threw him out and basically have been running the nation ever since.

But they did allow a popular vote last year and Aristide won the presidency. Depending on who you talk to, he's a leftist, centrist, republican, patriot, or whatever. The point is, he was popularly elected and should be given a chance to serve in that office.

I expect that U.S. involvement there will be lengthy. Due to the nation's poverty, you can expect a lot of conflict. The last time U.S. Marines were sent to Haiti, they were there almost two decades. It may happen again.

On the sports front:

I couldn't believe all the tut-tuts I heard about the Dallas Cowboys' "demise" just because they lost a game two weeks back to Detroit.

That was a great game. The Lions played almost perfect football. Barry Sanders is the most elusive running back in the sport.

Now, the Cowboys are 4 - 1, which puts them ahead of last year's pace. As I wrote before the season began, if they stay healthy, they will go about 13-3.

The "big" game will be in the playoffs when they face San Francisco. That'll be fun.

And I'm sick and tired of hearing all the TV broadcasters talk about how great the San Francisco 49'ers are and how they have a lock on the Super Bowl.

After the 49'ers blasted the L.A. Raiders on Monday night football three weeks ago (which actually showed how lousy the Raiders are), some news people felt the race was over and the Super Bowl trophy belonged to the 49'ers. That may no longer be the case after the Eagles whipped San Francisco two weeks back.

What really got to me during that L.A.-S.F. game on Monday night was hearing all three broadcasters extol how great the 49'ers were doing. They showed a replay of one TD pass from 49'er QB Steve Young to end Jerry Rice, calling it picture perfect.

What they didn't say - and what the replay clearly showed - was that all four Raider defensive linemen were thrown to the ground, giving Young more than ample time to complete his pass. I call

Mahaney attends Boys' State

Justin Mahaney was Farwell High School's representative to the American Legion Boys' State in Austin June 4-10.

"It was a lot of fun, and I met a lot of people," said Mahaney of the experience. He also had the pleasure of being on the winning party's teams in the mock elections, and that's always fun, too.

Mahaney arrived in Austin late because the 10 a.m. flight he was scheduled to take from Amarillo had mechanical difficulties. They didn't leave Amarillo until 3:30 p.m. when a plane was re-routed to Amarillo to fly the participants to Austin.

Because he arrived late, he missed some of the orientation meetings and some of the first activities, but he didn't allow that to keep him from joining in.

When he first arrived at the University of Texas, he was assigned to the 10th floor of Jester Hall West, and found that he would have to walk up and down during peak traffic times when the elevators weren't running. "I got lucky," said Mahaney - the dorm had 14 floors, and he could have been on one of the higher floors.

His "city" or group was assigned to early recreation period the first two days. That meant that they had to be awake by 5:15 or 5:30 a.m. for their calisthenics.

During the course of the week there Mahaney participated in the activities designed to teach participants about the election process. He was on the rules committee for one political party which they called the Nationalists. They used the rules actually used in Texas political party conventions as their guidelines for running their mock convention.

Mahaney's party's job was easy, they decided that "we trust these guys to make it the way we wanted it, and accepted it," said Mahaney. "The other was arguing over everything in their planks." When the election was over, 21 Nationalists were elected and 8 of the other party's membership was elected.

According to Mahaney the participants heard a lot of speakers, but he missed hearing Gov. Anne Richards speak due to a conflict. "We heard a lot of good speakers," he said.

Understanding gangs is topic

Farwell Police Chief held a meeting Tuesday night at the Farwell Community Center to give a better understanding of gangs to community residents.

He stressed that the meeting was a preventive measure. "We don't have gangs here and we don't want them here," he said. So he wanted to create an awareness of what to look for.

More than 30 residents attended. McGaa thanked Neighborhood Watch co-chairwomen Frances Kube and Ysleta Kittrell for helping get the good attendance.

McGaa talked about how kids like to imitate and they see gangs portrayed in the movies and on TV. He talked about what gang members wear, and how they wear them, and their slang.

Although McGaa said he wasn't aware of any organized gang activity in Farwell, he talked about seeing graffiti around and how gangs use it to mark their territory. If graffiti is painted on your property, he said, clean it off immediately.

He noted that, per capita, Lubbock and Plainview have

worse gang problems than Los Angeles.

Farwell High Principal Larry Gregory discussed the school's dress code and the fact that school officials have no tolerance for gang indicators.

District Attorney Johnny Actkinson discussed allegations of gang activity in this area but nothing has been proven to date.

And Chris Lopez, a Muleshoe police officer, discussed the problems involving criminal mischief.

Some residents attending said they now realize they saw gang members in Clovis and Lubbock, now that they understood how they dress.

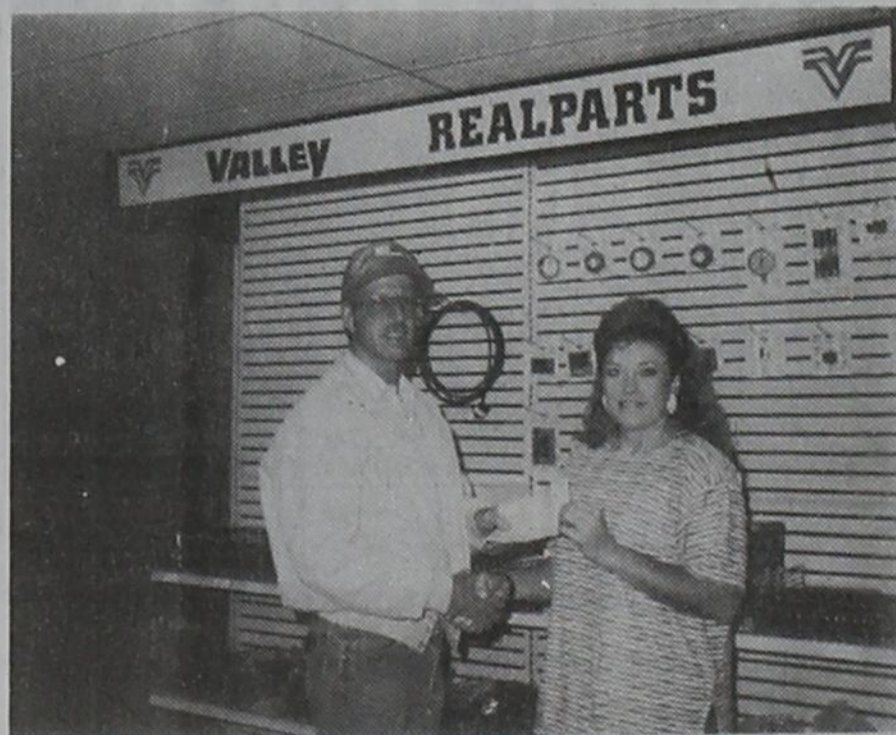

Texico votes to replace Russian olive trees

The Texico School Board Tuesday accepted bids on the track and field project.

General Acrylics, of Phoenix, will be the general contractor. They will begin as soon as possible and completed next march.

The board approved a plan that means removing the the current Russian olive trees and planting junipers in their stead with a state grant. Dick Shaw, of the Curry County Soil Conservation District, supported putting the new trees in. He said Russian Olives' life span was 20 to 25 years.

Two city councilmen - Oran Jay Autrey and Rick Qualls - attended. They supported keeping the current trees.

It was noted that, as part of the project, the track will be

widened, forcing some trees to be removed.

In other business, the board:

- Agreed to provide financial help with 5 students and ex-students who will attend the national FFA Convention in Kansas City this fall. They include Derek Dictson, Dara Jenkins and Chad Cochran, all of whom graduated last May. They won the state meats contest. Misty Barnes won state public speaking contest. And Richie Pierce won a state FFA contest.

- High school counselor Art Salguero presented info on Parent Link. Teachers are using it heavily, said Supt. R.L. Richards.

- Hired Indolina Meza as a new instructional assistant

Texico to raise animal fees

Raising fees for animal violations again topped the Texico City Council's agenda Tuesday.

An updated ordinance likely will be presented at the next council meeting for formal approval. It contains increasing fines for violations this way: for the first offense (per animal), \$25, up from \$15; second offense, \$50, up from \$30; and subsequent offenses, \$100, up from "up to \$100."

Discussion was also held on whether to continue seeking a license fee, since it's not enforced. Councilwoman Carolyn Burrows said that animals are supposed to be licensed (\$3 per animal) each March. She said that, currently, 3 or 4 dogs and 1 cat are licensed.

Mrs. Burrows suggested that if it's not being enforced, it should be eliminated from the ordinance. Councilman Ronnie Warmuth supported her.

But Mayor Butch Tharp noted that it had been enforced years back and needs to be left it. It was.

Mrs. Burrows reported she had talked with Clovis officials about raising the administrative fees charged when residents go to the dog pound to pick up their dogs there. She was told that Clovis legally can't collect fines or penalties and only the administrative fee that's collected is okay.

The council had wanted to have Clovis officials collect more money because they feel that Municipal Judge George Herrington is dismissing too many cases.

Herrington told the Tribune Wednesday that city officials haven't talked to him about the situation. He said he has fined some folks, and dismissed other citations, such as in cases involving a dog that was run over by a vehicle and a man who had difficulty walking. He said he has been issuing 1 or 2 fines a month.

In other business, the council:

- Okayed improving the electrical outlet at KKR Park by awarding the job to American, of Portales, for \$960. It was the lone bidder.

- Awarded a bid to K Barnett for street repairs.

- Received bids from two architects, Eldon Smith and Randall Kilmer, to design the new Community Center. The council will meet with both in a special meeting next Tuesday. The public is invited.

- Discussed the problem with shrubbery blocking traffic signs at street intersections. Letters will be sent to property owners involved suggesting they correct the problem. If note, the city will do it.

- Received 4 bids on the 1978 Dodge pickup: Twin

Notice of Application for Waste Disposal Permit

El Cid Land and Cattle, Inc., P.O. Box 1907, Clovis, New Mexico 88102, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (Commission) for a permit (Proposed Permit No. 03708) to authorize disposal of waste and wastewater from a feedlot which consists of a maximum of 4,000 head of cattle. Stormwater will be retained in one storage pond. Wastewater from the pond will be disposed of by evaporation and/or irrigation on agricultural land. Manure/solids will be removed from the site by a contract manure hauler. No discharge of pollutants into the waters of the State is authorized by this permit.

The feedlot is on a private road, approximately one and a half miles west of its intersection with Farm-to-Market Road 2396. This intersection is one and a half miles north of the junction of Farm-to-Market Road 2396 and U.S. Highway 60 in Parmer County, Texas. This location is in the drainage area of the White River Lake in Segment No. 1240 of the Brazos River Basin.

The Executive Director of the Commission has prepared a draft permit based on the application submitted by the applicant and other information presently available.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the "Texas Water Code" and 30 TAC Chapter 305 of the "Rules of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission."

This application is subject to a Commission resolution adopted August 18, 1993, which directs the Commission's Executive Director to act on behalf of the Commission and issue final approval of certain permit matters. The Executive Director will issue this permit unless one or more persons file written protests and/or a request for a hearing within 30 days after publication of this notice.

If you wish to request a public hearing, you must submit your request in writing. You must state (1) your name, mailing address and daytime phone number; (2) the permit number of other recognizable reference to this application; (3) the statement "I/we request a public hearing"; (4) a brief description of how you, or the persons you represent, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application; (5) a description of the location of your property relative to the applicant's operations; and (6) your proposed adjustment to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for hearing. If one or more protests and/or requests for hearing are filed, the Executive Director will not issue the permit and will forward the application to the Office of Hearings Examiners where a hearing may be held. Commission public hearings are evidentiary legal proceedings similar to civil court non-jury trials. Although general comments from the public may be submitted either in writing prior to the hearing, or orally at the start of the hearing, the law requires that the Commission's decision about whether to approve or deny the application be based on evidence and testimony submitted during the public hearing, presented under oath and subject to cross-examination by the other parties. Public comments are not evidence and cannot be the basis for the Commission's ultimate decision. In the event a hearing is held, the Office of Hearings Examiners will submit a recommendation to the Commission for final decision.

If no protests or requests for hearing are filed, the Executive Director will sign the permit 30 days after the publication of this notice or thereafter. If you wish to appeal a permit issued by the Executive Director, you may do so by filing a written Motion for Reconsideration with the Chief Clerk of the Commission no later than 20 days after the date the Executive Director signs the permit.

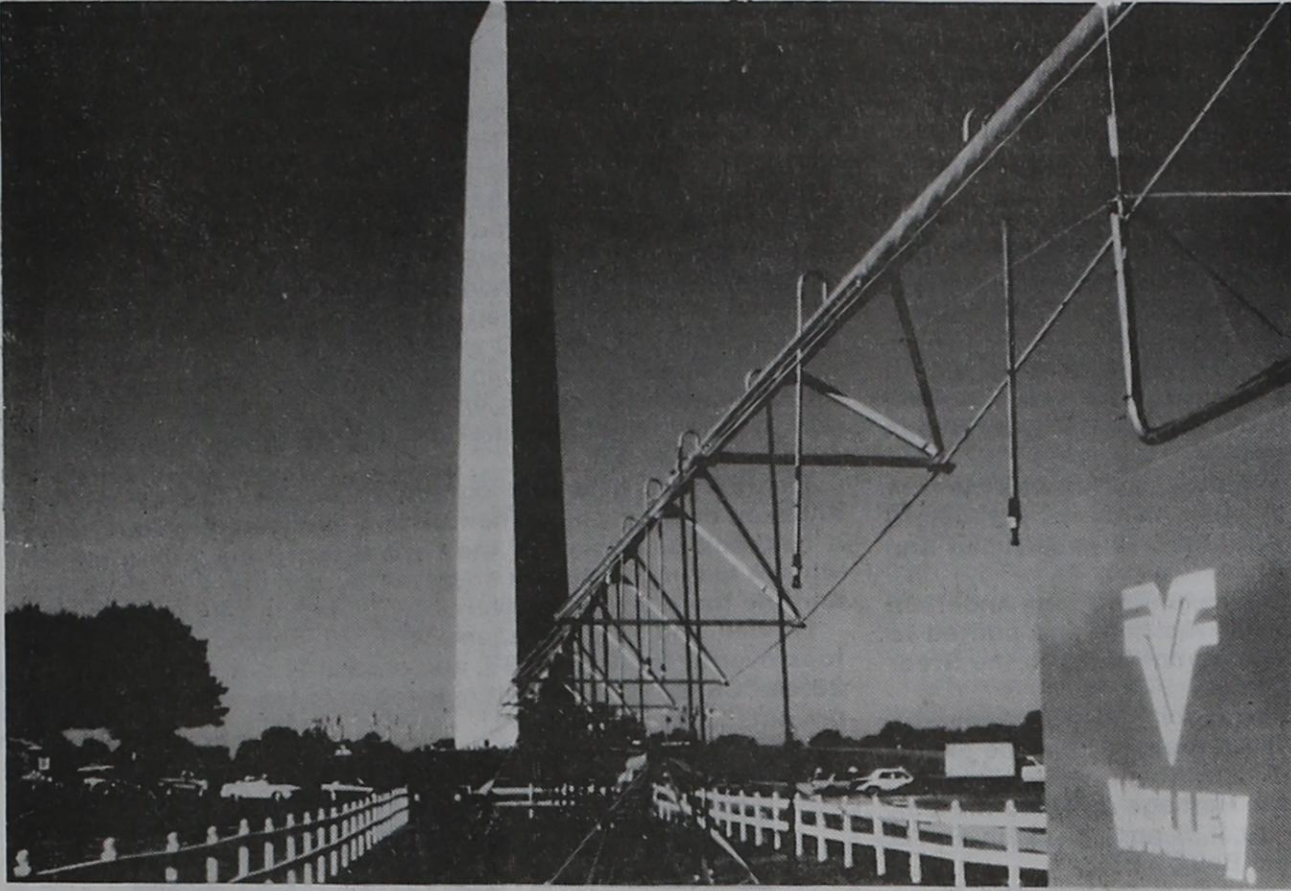

The Farwell Steers used strong defensive play by its secondary to nip the Bovina Mustangs in the first district game of the year last Friday at Bovina, 7-6.

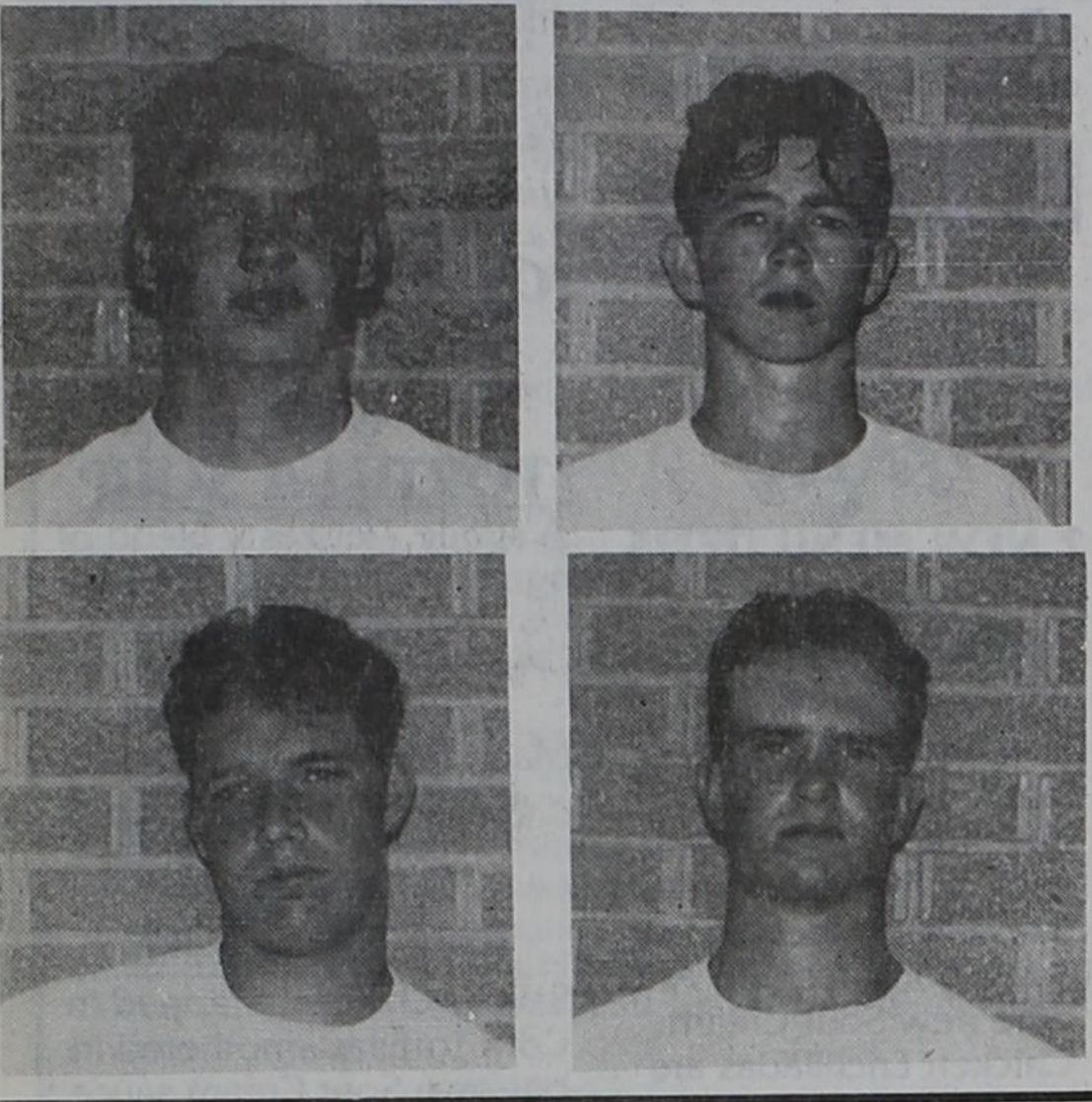
Farwell, 2-4 overall and 1-0 in district, hosts Happy tonight (Friday) at 7.

Notice of Rate Change Request Relating to Irrigation Interruption Credit And Recovery of Power Costs

Notice is hereby given that Bailey County Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service by implementing an irrigation interruption credit applicable to irrigation customers who agree by contract that their service may be interrupted and by revising the Utility's power cost recovery factor ("PCRF"), effective November 15, 1994, or as soon thereafter as may be permitted by law. The proposed changes are not expected to have any effect on the revenues of the Utility. The changes are applicable to all electric utility service, all areas served by the Utility, all customer classes, and all customers.

Copies of the proposed revised tariffs, schedules and supporting testimony and other pertinent data may be inspected in the office of the Utility located at 305 East Avenue B, Muleshoe, Texas 79347, and at the office of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Inquiries should be directed to Mr. Duane Lloyd (806) 272-4504.

The Utility's wholesale power supplier currently allows a credit on the Utility's wholesale power bills in exchange for the ability to interrupt a portion of the Utility's irrigation load. The Utility's existing retail rates, which were established before the wholesale interruption credit became available, apply the interruption credit to all customers of the Utility regardless of whether such customers have agreed that their service may be interrupted. This occurs because the Utility's power cost is reduced by the amount of the irrigation interruption credit from the Utility's wholesale power supplier and the reduced level of power cost is flowed through to all consumers through the PCRF.

The rate revisions are proposed for the purposes of: (1) establishing a tariff authorizing payment of an interruptible credit to irrigators who agree by contract to allow their service to be interrupted, and (2) allocating the irrigation interruption credit received from the Utility's wholesale power supplier to the irrigation customers who have agreed to allow interruption of their load in the event the Utility's wholesale power supplier requires the Utility to shed load. Irrigation customers who agree to have their services interrupted should receive the benefit of the interruptible credit from the Utility's wholesale power supplier. The proposed charges will not increase or decrease the revenues of the Utility, however, the proposed changes are expected to increase the revenues derived from all customer classes other than irrigation.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Further information may also be obtained by calling the Public Utility Commission's Public Information Office at (512) 458-0256, or (512) 458-0221 for text telephone. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is 45 days after the date the application was filed with the Commission.
