I thought things went rather well. We had a super turnout for the decorated bicycle contest, run by Linda Moss. The judges, three ladies from Clovis, said it was really tough judging these kids because the entries were so excellent.

The parade moved smoothly and took about 45 minutes. That amount of time is what we shoot for. Nothing I hate more than a parade that lasts for hours and tires everyone out - and gets boring. Forty-five minutes is long enough.

We had lots of neat entries, some super floats, and both Farwell and Texico High School marching bands participated. Thank you, band directors!

As usual, the selection of food was varied enough for everyone's palate. The Rotary Club served barbeque to about 1,000 folks.

We also had varied entertainment, ranging from the Billy the Kid troupe to a Hispanic band to the Kitchen Band from Clovis. Actually, there are two Clovis Kitchen Bands, but don't ask me which one appeared here!

Thanks to Sue Scioli and her committee, the queen's contest was the day's highlight. I am always amazed at how talented our young people are. This contest always draws the largest crowd to the gazebo, with good reason. Hats off to all our contestants this year.

And, as always, Fred Chandler did a sparkling job as emcee. He just needs to bring along his guitar next year. Fred is an excellent singer and musician.

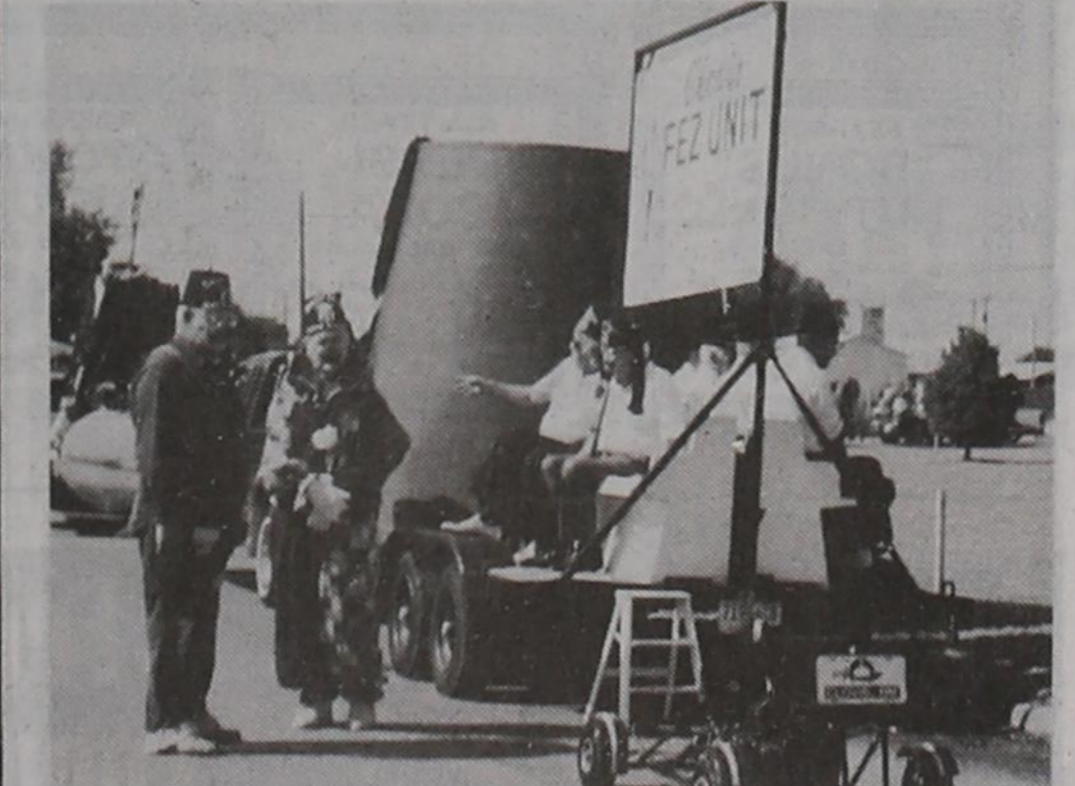

### Volleyball tourney

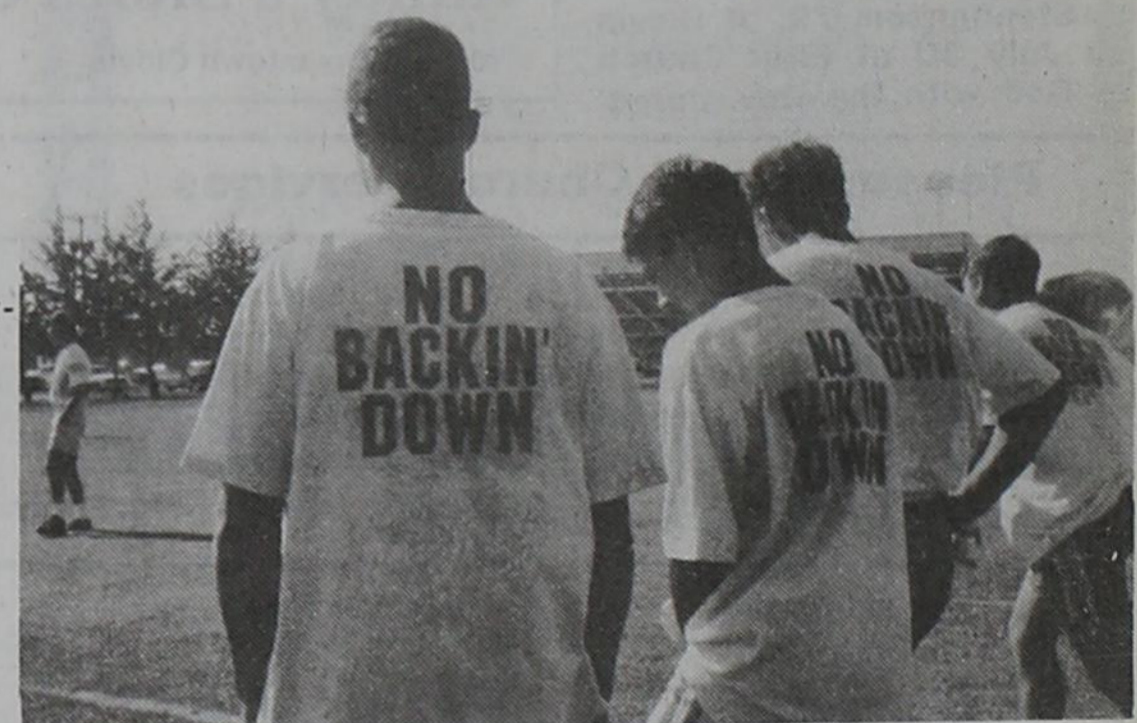
Twelve teams participated in the volleyball tournament, organized by Richard Carpenter. The winning teams were:

**Farm tour conducted**

More than 50 area farmers participated in the Llano Estacado Farm Tour at Lazbuddie School on July 29.

Gary Patterson and Brant Baugh of the Parmer County Extension Service were featured speakers at the forum which addressed major issues facing agriculture today. Two important issues discussed before the tour began: economic competitiveness for Texas agriculture and communities and water quality and conservation.

"The dry air and sunshine in this part of the state helps to keep corn disease down," said Dr. Cloyce Coffman from Texas A & M. He spoke about many factors involved in corn disease management such as picking the right hybrids, and watering and fertilizing them correctly. Even air temperature can affect the outcome of the crop.

Dr. Rosemary Seymour, an Extension Service Engineer from Lubbock spoke about "Chemigation Safety and Equipment." Pesticides, fertilizers and other chemicals may be applied care to do it correctly. Knowing which chemicals to use and when and how to apply them is part of the skill of modern farming. Dr. Seymour explained some of the important aspects of this.

James Esty, an inspector from the Texas Department of Agriculture in Littlefield, talked about worker protection. Farm labor issues are often of importance to producers.

The group boarded buses to tour local fields where they could see examples of products grown, and of agricultural efficiency. Seeing actual examples of the work being done can help educate farmers better than talking in generalities.

After lunch, Patterson and Extension Agronomist from Amarillo, Dr. Brent Bean, explained the grain sorghum silage performance tests being done in Lazbuddie. Sorghum needs less irrigation than corn does. It is a good feed for livestock.

Andy Williams, Extension Entomologist from Castro and Lamb Counties, and Dennis Pietsch, a Research Agronomist from Texas A & M talked about the corn performance tests in Springlake - Earth.

**Spinach Dip**

16 oz. sour cream  
1 box (10 oz.) frozen spinach  
1 c. mayonnaise  
1 small can water chestnuts, chopped  
1 rib celery, chopped fine  
1 pkg. dry onion soup mix or vegetable soup mix  
Thaw and cook frozen spinach in microwave as directed on package. Drain thoroughly. Stir in remaining ingredients. Chill and serve. Best made 1-2 hours in advance. Serve with crackers or rye bread.

A Neighborhood Watch program is just like anything else - first you work at it, then it becomes second nature.

Criminals know a neighborhood watch is unfair. After all, they are just trying to make a living by stealing your property. All of the time and energy they have spent making sure you are not home just gets blown out the window because your neighbor called the police.

Citizens employing a neighborhood watch become the eyes and ears of the police department. Farwell is a small town but it still takes an hour or a little more to cover the town at patrol speed. When a neighborhood watch is in effect, it puts a police officer on every block and in every house. Criminals then need to fear anyone just up for a few minutes to go to the bathroom and who just happen to look out the window. They need to fear the grandmother who is unable to sleep because her arthritis is acting up. Especially dangerous to the criminal is the teenager - they are alert, inquisitive and know who to expect and where.

When should you call the police? Anytime anything doesn't look or feel right to you. Cops are naturally suspicious, the citizen normally is not; therefore if something bothers you it is certain to bother me. I want to check it out. From time to time, in future articles, I will point out things to watch for that may indicate a crime is being planned or is occurring.

# Rain, rain, rain...
