### Did the end justify the means?

Does the end justify the means?

That's one of those old-age philosophical questions.

I've always believed, that in most cases, it doesn't. But that in some cases it may, especially in decisions involving large numbers of people.

Every one of us is usually faced with that dilemma at least a few times in our lives.

I bring that question up because I believe it is significant when discussing the political life of former President Richard Nixon, who died last week.

There is no question that Nixon had several important foreign policy achievements during his tenure, including "opening" China, and ending the Vietnam War as best as could be done in a difficult situation.

Nixon also had prominent political success on the home front, helping nurture a real two-party system in the South. For example, a friend told me, before Nixon it was hard to find a Republican in Texas.

So it's obvious that Nixon had some major accomplishments as President. The "end" worked out well for the U.S. - as long as you don't think about Watergate.

If Nixon had just gone on TV and said he was sorry and had goofed up, Watergate wouldn't have amounted to a hill of beans. But by that time, his paranoia had created a "surround the wagons" complex and caused his political disgrace.

But just how did Nixon get to be President?

It started in 1946 when he won a seat in the U.S. House of Representatives by defeating Democrat Jerry Voorhees.

He didn't just defeat Voorhees. He beat him up as a left-leaning liberal.

Nixon followed that up in 1948 when he won a seat in the U.S. Senate by beating Democrat Helen Gahagan Douglas. To say he slandered her as a neo-Communist is to put it mildly. It was one of the most vicious political races in U.S. history.

The rest you know. As a result of his leadership in the Alger Hiss espionage case (in which Nixon did an excellent job), Dwight D. Eisenhower picked him as his running mate in 1952.

He lost elections in 1960 and 1962, but kept making the rounds throughout the U.S., boosting the Republican Party. When 1968 rolled around, the party workers repaid Nixon with the GOP nomination. He won, then was re-elected in 1972.

I will admit never to being a Nixon fan. I was a teen when John F. Kennedy faced off with Nixon in the 1960 Presidential election. And like most teens, I was enamored with JFK's charisma. That was a most exciting campaign.

That election showed that Nixon, who had "dished it out" in 1946 and 1948, also could take it.

The fact is that the 1960 election was stolen from Nixon by Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley. Enough phony votes were cast in Chicago to barely put Kennedy ahead in Illinois. If Illinois had gone to Nixon - and an honest recount would have shown that - than Nixon would have been elected President that year.

But Nixon, even though he knew he had been robbed, thought it best for the U.S. not to have a recount for the Presidency. I consider that

The Texico City Council Monday heard Mayor Butch Tharp appoint two persons.

Cindy Meeks will be the pool manager this summer. She was one of three applicants.

Dan Walterscheid was named animal control officer. He was one of 12 applicants.

The announcements were made after an executive session.

In other business, the council:

- Will seek bids on selling the city's Dodge pickup.

- Gave approval to Fire Chief Lewis Cooper's request to purchase a used ambulance which is much larger than the current one. The fire department will get a loan

from Citizens Bank, and repay it through proceeds from the pickup truck giveaway at Border Town Days.

- Heard Tharp say that he talked with state engineers about North Griffin between Eunice and Craig and they said the work needs to be redone.

- Approved participating in the summer youth program run by the state. One or two kids may be assigned to Texico for 25 hours a week work between June 13 and July 29.

- Heard Tharp say that the pump and motor at the new water well are not right for it. He said buying an electrical panel, with the city's share \$4,300, may be the answer.

### Campbell gets scholarship from Farmers' Electric Co-op

William Tate was elected to the board of Farmers' Electric Cooperative Saturday.

Tate represents District 1, including Texico. He replaces Pete Davis, who retired from the board after 17 years, including serving as board president for the past five.

Board members re-elected were Richard Marquez, District 4, and Pat Woods, District 6.

All three were unopposed. Guest speaker was Lawrence Ingram, chairman of the New Mexico Public Utility Commission.

Among the students who received \$500 scholarships from the cooperative's Edu-

cation Foundation was Chesna Campbell, of Texico.

Revenue in 1993 was \$11,775,621, up from \$10,089,976 in 1992.

General manager Jim Heron reported a record-breaking amount of kilowatt hours

sold, much of it due to a hot, dry summer last year.

Member equity increased from 3% to 40% of total assets. Patronage capital refund payments of \$321,000 were sent made to members.

The cooperative has over 3,700 miles of line serving about 9,700 meters in 7 New Mexico counties and 3 Texas counties.

She grew up loving animals and has always been involved with them. Before she was old enough to be in 4-H, she had rabbits and baby calves in the back yard.

Her first year in 4-H she bought one lamb and was given another lamb that she named Molly. When Molly was having her first lamb, she had some complications. Daddy usually did the doctoring himself, but she wanted a vet for Molly. They talked to the vet's wife and she told them the 4 S's of sheep - sick sheep seldom survive. This one did, though. While in FHA, she received the FFA Sweetheart Award. It was a little difficult sawing the boards with a broken thumb which happened while playing ball.

She was involved in 4-H as a student and has been a 4-H leader for 10 years. She helps with all the 4-H parent-leader activities in Curry County.

She was a member of the Texico Women's Club; served as treasurer; and helped with all their projects.

She has helped with the community cleanup days and, along with her husband and their 4-H Club, spent a cold, windy day cleaning the new cemetery this spring. She is always willing to bake a cake, make ice cream or sit on the dunking board to help raise funds for some organization.

She loves people as well as animals and will help them any way she can by visiting in the hospital, taking food to their house, or just sitting and listening. Her daughters often

### Lazbuddie request approved

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday approved a request from Lazbuddie Schools to take \$32,000

from the County Permanent School Improvement Fund to buy new windows and doors for the elementary school.

Lazbuddie still has \$71,900 left in its county account. Friona Schools has \$224,224 in its account. Farwell and Bovina schools have used all their funds.

In other business, the commissioners signed a contract with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to get a state grant of \$3,000 for its 911 work.

After the commissioners' meeting, a meeting was held to continue planning the new 911 emergency phone number system in Parmer County. This year, east-west roads will be lettered and north-south roads will be numbered.

The planning committee, commissioners and road hands went over the county map to make sure its completely accurate before the numbering and lettering begins.

### Football field to be moved

Texico Schools will move ahead this summer on major renovations in its football field area, thanks to a \$350,000 state grant.

The football field will be moved to the north, and the practice field moved from north of it to south of it. This means that if school facility expansion is needed later, it will have space available (where the practice field will be).

Also planned are new lighting and a new all-weather track. The high jump, long jump and pole vault areas will be put together north of the football field.

And, depending on the overall cost, school officials would like to buy new bleachers. If not, the current bleachers will be moved. And the "home side" will be located on the west side of the football field.

### Texico trash routes changed

Waste Management has new trash collection routes in Texico.

Trash will be picked up from the west side of Garwood and points west on Thursdays after April 28.

Trash will be picked up on the east side of Garwood and going east and also across the rail road tracks on the south side of town on Fridays starting April 29.

A copy of the route is available at City Hall if you have any questions.

## Farwell tourism center discussed

The Farwell Chamber of Commerce Tuesday discussed possibly using the former Rose Drug building as a

tourism center. Chamber President Ralph Franse said the Panhandle Regional Planning Commis-

sion may have some grant funds available to repair the building.

The building is now owned by the city. The roof is in bad shape and a ballpark estimate for fixing it is \$9,000. Also, a lot of interior work would be needed to be done, but Mayor Chris Gikas said city employees could handle this.

Gikas, who attended the Chamber meeting, also said the city could put in a parking lot across the alley on property it owns.

Franse will check into the grant possibility.

In other business, the Chamber:

- Picked a Farwell High senior as its boy athlete of the year. Jason Lusk was picked by secret ballot of those present. No girl athlete was eligible this year under Chamber guidelines.

- Approved the audit presented by Kirkland, Crozier & Co., CPA.

- Was told the annual banquet had a preliminary estimated profit of \$588. The Chamber voted \$300 toward the Farwell Elementary School PTA playground project and \$200 toward an ESA Sorority project.

All written comments will be made available for public inspection at the TNRCC Central Office in Austin. This notice is to be published on April 22 and April 29, 1994.

Any person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the proposed facility may request the Commission to hold an informal public meeting and/or contested case hearing on the permit application pursuant to Section 382.056(d) of the Texas Health and Safety Code. The Commission is not required to hold a contested case hearing if the basis of a request is determined to be unreasonable. All requests for a contested case hearing must be received in writing within the 30-day comment period regardless of whether an informal public meeting has been held or scheduled on this matter. If you wish to request a public hearing, you must submit your request in writing. You must state (1) your name, mailing address and daytime phone number; (2) the permit number or other recognizable reference to this application; (3) the statement "I/we request a public hearing"; (4) a brief description of how you, or the persons you represent, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application; (5) a description

of the location of your property relative to the applicant's operations; and (6) your proposed adjustment to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for a hearing. Requests for a public hearing on this application should be submitted in writing to Bill Ehret, Assistant Chief Hearings Examiner, Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087, Telephone (512) 305-9087.

Before a permit can be issued for this facility, the applicant must demonstrate that all emission sources are in compliance with all TNRCC air quality Rules and Regulations and all applicable Federal Regulations. This includes the application of "best available control technology" to each new or modified emission source and compliance with all ambient air quality standards.
