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Primary has low turnout

Parmer County had a very low turnout for the Texas Primary Tuesday due to the inclement weather.

Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren reported that 299 folks cast Democrat ballots and 199 cast Republican ballots.

There were no major races locally and statewide favorites won as expected.

There were no official results in Tuesday for who will be the Parmer County Democrat and Republican chairmen since many ballot boxes were not brought in to the courthouse due to the weather Tuesday night.

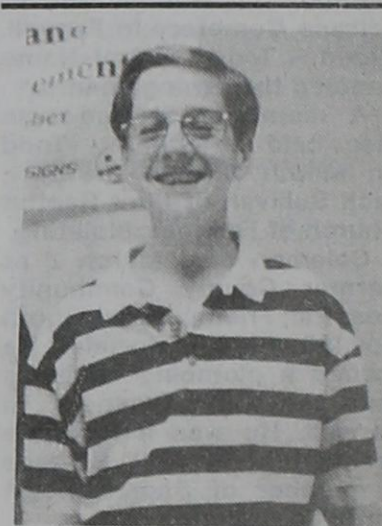
Phil Garrett, county Republican chairman, recently moved to Bailey County (Progress) and is no longer eligible to stay as Parmer County chairman.

Wendol Christian, who has been Democrat county chairman for several years, did not seek re-election. He said Tuesday he heard that Bert Williams may have received the most votes for that position.

On the Republican ballot was a proposition, asking voters if the Texas Department of Public Safety should be authorized to adopt rules for licensing and training qualified citizens to carry handguns for self-protection. Voting "yes" in Parmer County were 115; voting "no" were 41.

Republican U.S. Senate incumbent Kay Bailey Huthison won big here. And George Bush got a huge majority to be the gubernatorial candidate in the fall election.

Connie Parker of the Sherley Anderson Pitman Grain Elevator in Farwell said that manager Fred Chandler estimated a total of about 1" of moisture at the elevator.

Scott Brown, manager of the Sherley Anderson Grain Elevator in Lazbuddie, estimated .42" of frozen water at the elevator there.

Whatever the final total was from Tuesday's storm, the moisture was all appreciated.

- Tabled the adoption of math textbooks.
- Heard that the school system had received a budget increase of \$43,369 due to an increased number of students and an increased unit value of students.
- Accepted bids on the following items: doors for the high school; floor tile for the elementary and high school; carpet for the elementary school library; and painting of lockers in the high school.
- Voted to purchase a new pickup for the high school.
- Heard that the school has four student teachers this semester: Sara Jaramillo, Cheryl Wilkens, Kelly Jones, and Jo Ann Hill.
- Heard that several teachers had attended a special education meeting about attention deficit disorders.
- Heard that the school auction had generated \$1,569.

- Heard a Sports report: Tatum has dropped out of EPAC and joined the Road Runner Conference, another conference to which Texico also belongs. The Land judging team placed 5th there. (4) Students attended a law enforcement program about the dangers of Driving While Intoxicated.

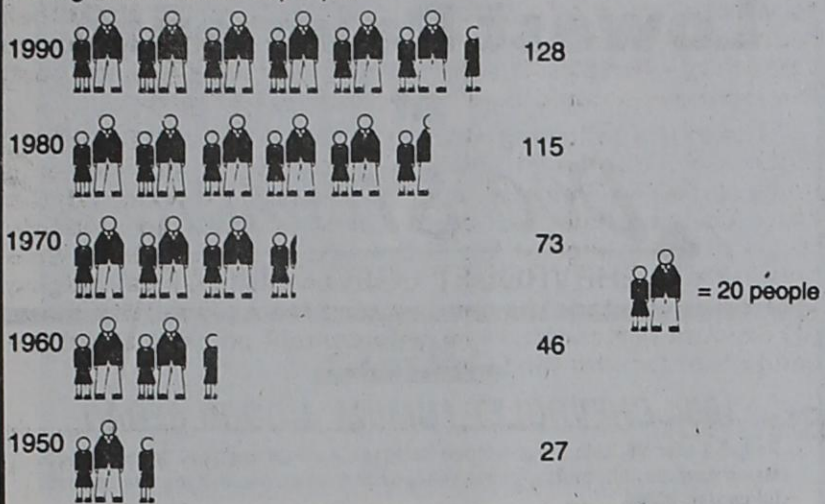

Productivity of the Texas Agricultural Producer

Productivity of the Texas farmer and rancher is almost five times what it was in 1950, with each producer providing enough food and fiber for an even greater number of people.



Farm stats explained

In Texas, an average farm or ranch grossed about \$78,000 in 1992, but after paying expenses of nearly \$59,000 saw a profit of about \$19,000, according to the latest economic figures, Agriculture commissioner Rick Perry said.

"With these figures showing roughly that for every \$3 spent in production on a Texas farm, only \$1 is netted in profit, it's not hard to understand the frustration farmers and ranchers have with their expenses continuing to rise while their earnings drop," Perry said.

Gross income included money earned from crop and livestock sales, property rentals, home consumption of production and other farm-related income.

Expenses include on average about \$8,400 for feed; \$8,400 for livestock; \$4,600 for interest payments on land and equipment; \$4,400 for labor; \$2,300 for fuel and oil; almost \$1,000 for electricity; and \$1,700 for property taxes.

Despite low returns, each Texas farmer continues to feed and clothe an enormous number of people - 128 people - 94 domestically and 34 overseas, Perry said.

"U.S. and Texas farmers now make up less than 2 percent

of our population but continue to provide for the remaining 98 percent through technology and increases in efficiency and production," Perry said.

The Texas farmer creates one in every five jobs in the state, and agriculture is the second largest industry in Texas - just behind oil and gas. Each year, Texas agriculture earns about \$12 billion in cash receipts and generates more than \$36 billion dollars in economic activity across the Lone Star State. However, at the supermarket, farmers earn only about a quarter for every dollar spent.

In Texas, agricultural production more than likely involves cattle, cotton, hay, sorghum, and winter wheat, Perry said. Other major Lone Star State crops include barley, corn, grapefruit, oats, oranges, peaches, peanuts, pecans, potatoes, rice, rye, soybeans, sugar beets, sugarcane, sunflowers, sweet potatoes and vegetables.

The state's 185,000 farms and ranches encompass 130 million acres with each operation averaging more than 700 acres. Each acre of land including buildings in Texas is valued at \$470 on average.

Ag is major state business

Agriculture is big business in Texas. In fact, it is the state's second largest industry, generating more than \$36 billion in economic activity and providing a paycheck for one out of five Texans.

"National Agriculture Week is the one time of the year we officially salute these producers who have a significant impact on the Texas economy and help make Texas the leader it is," said Texas Ag Commissioner Rick Perry said. "But we should remember their outstanding efforts and honor the hard work of all our producers every single day."

National Agriculture Week is March 14-20. Texas stats include:

* Texas has about 130 million acres in agricultural production and rangeland, approximately 78 percent of the state's total land area.

* Texas leads the nation in upland cotton production and during 1993 produced 5.1 million bales, about one-third of the total U.S. crop. That was enough cotton to make almost 2 billion pairs of denim jeans.

* Texas also ranks No. 1 in the nation in the total number of cattle and calves (14.8 million head); all sheep and lambs (1.71 million head); and all goats (1.96 million head). There are more cattle in Texas than the human population of Florida, and more sheep and goats in the state than there are people in Arkansas.

* Texas farmers and ranchers add about \$12 billion to the state's economy through sales of crop and livestock commodities.

* Texas producers harvest 118.4 million bushels of winter wheat during 1993, enough to bake more than 8 billion loaves of bread.

* Texas ranked fifth in total agricultural exports in 1992 with a total of \$2.6 billion. Each \$1 billion in export sales creates 27,000 new jobs. Production from one in three acres of cropland is sold overseas.

* Value of Texas fresh market vegetable production was more than \$270 million in 1993. Spring and summer onions added more than \$90 million to the total.

* Texas corn production hit a record high 212.8 million bushels in 1993, enough for a most 4.5 billion pounds of cornflakes.

It's been 33 years since law was enacted designating the third week of March as National Poison Prevention Week. In 1972, the National Center for Health Statistics noted that the number of deaths reported due to household chemicals in children was 216. In 1990, that number was 49 - a 77 percent decline.

Adults may jokingly comment that children can more easily open "child-resistant" containers than they can. However, the Consumer Product Safety Commission's act requiring child-resistant packaging on aspirin products reduced the number of deaths in children attributed to aspirin from 46 in 1972 to only 1 in 1990.

Child-resistant packaging should always be used properly. Products, such as over the counter and prescription medications, required to be in special packaging should never be transferred to other containers.

If you have trouble opening child-resistant containers, and have no small children in your home, just ask for "easy open" closures from your pharmacist. Donna Ratke



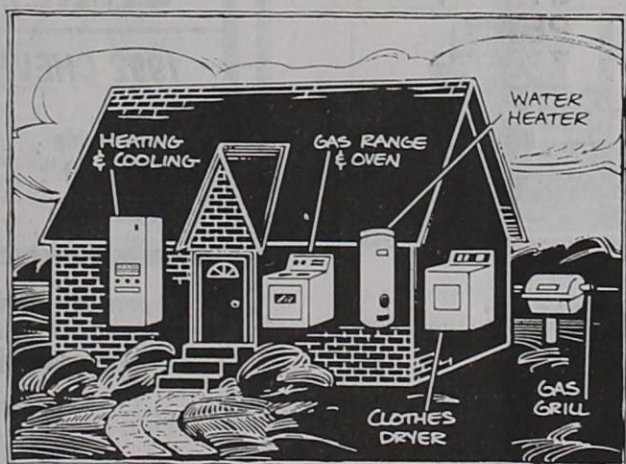

in the nation. The fund has been described as "a giant money - market fund" for local governments.



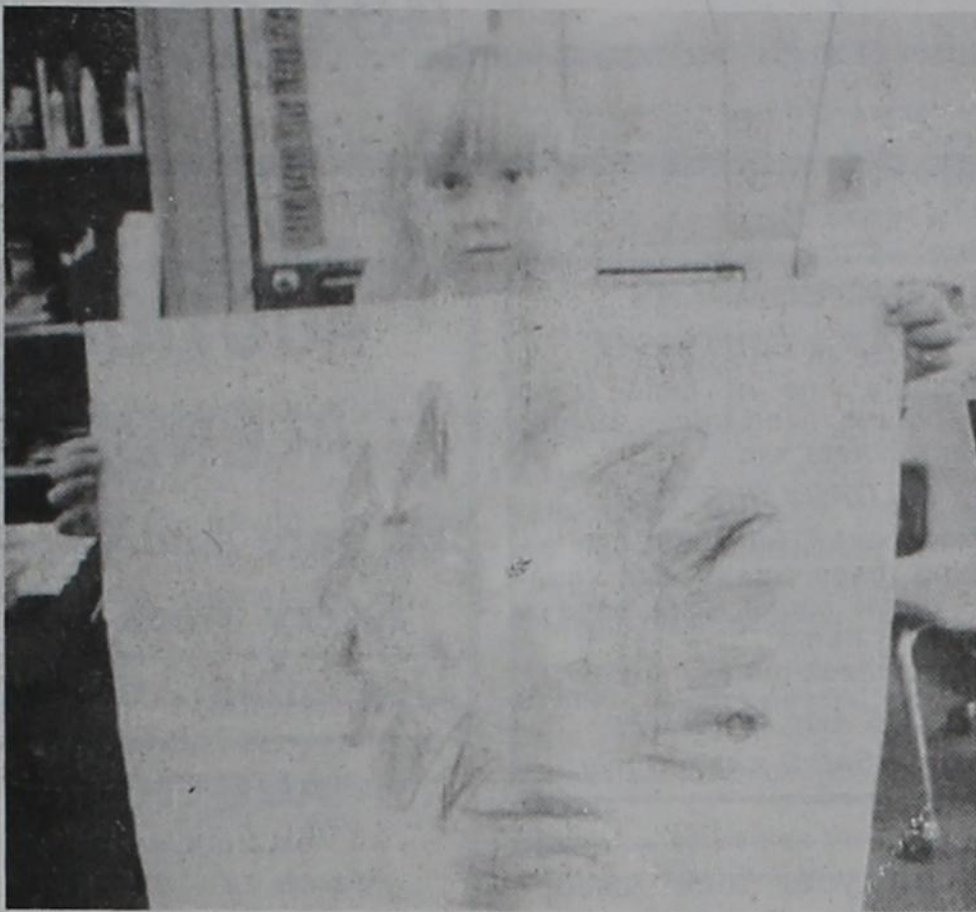

Mites a concern

Mites continue to be a major insect problem for High Plains corn producers. And through more than \$25,000 in producer checkoff-supported funding, the Texas Corn Producers Board is continuing its longterm goal of controlling and hopefully alleviating this damaging insect problem.

Three mite-control research projects are part of nearly \$120,000 in statewide corn research approved by TCPB directors for 1994. Entomologists for the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center in Lubbock and the College Station campus will be involved, along with a private research and consulting service in Plainview.

TCPB directors Bert Williams of Farwell and Jerry Don Glover of Lazbuddie point out that mites can strike heavily when corn is drought-stressed and cause severe damage to plant and ear development. TCPB has worked for years to assure that safe and effective pesticides were available to farmers to help manage the pests.

This year's research will include a major study of the emergency pattern of Banks grass mite. It will be conducted by Robert Glodt of Agri-Search Research and Consulting, Inc. in Plainview and Dr. F. E. Gilstrap of College Station.

"Though much is known about controlling spider mites, we know very little about their movement," says Glodt. "It seems that the mites move each year from wheat or CRP (conservation reserve program) land to corn in the spring. This research seeks to develop understanding of this movement between plants and to document the role of natural enemies (predators)."

Wheat, roadside grasses and corn will be sampled intensively for mites and mite predators this spring.

Also the insecticide Comite, commonly used in mite control, will be applied in part of the research to determine its impact on predators.

Glodt will also lead another checkoff funded project aimed at determining the impact of plant banding on mite control. Dr. Tom Archer, a research entomologist at the Texas A&M Lubbock station, is looking into mite resistant corn varieties, which he says could be just over the horizon.

Corn inbreds have already been established that are resistant to the pests. Archer will be involved in development of a special mite resistance research nursery.
