

## Firefighters learn their trade

"I'm a little nervous," said rookie fire fighter Missy Garrison before her first firefighting experience. She wasn't alone. All the rookies probably felt a few butterflies in their stomachs before they crawled into the burning building located at the corner of State and 6th Street in Texico on Aug. 4. For most of them, this was their first experience with the heat and smoke of a fire.

Twenty-two fire fighters from Texico, Farwell, Clovis, Pleasant Hill, and Cannon Air Force Base were present at the training session. Some were professional firefighters helping to conduct the training, and many were volunteers.

Generally, volunteer firefighters do not have the opportunity to go to state firefighting academies. They attend lots of short training sessions instead. The Texico training session was conducted by the Texico Fire Department.

Unlike a real fire, the pace of this training session was slow and deliberate. The fire trucks all left the Texico fire station when the firefighters got off work from their regular jobs, and they drove to the training site at the same time.

Because the participants knew that this would be a controlled fire situation, the volunteers did not don their gear as soon as they left the fire station. They wore their boots and pants, but the left their jackets, helmets and gloves off until the last minute.

The fire trucks were parked in pre-arranged positions so that they would block traffic to the area. All the Texico equipment and some Clovis equipment was called into action.

It was obvious when the rookie firefighters arrived that they had already learned a few things about firefighting. They knew how to handle their equipment. They knew where to find the hoses, and how to hook the hoses up to the trucks and to the fire hydrants. They also knew where to find tools like the wrench used to turn the hydrants on.

Those things may sound silly, but they are things that trained firefighters must know how to do quickly and efficiently. They are also things that ordinary, untrained folks might not know how to do.

Training officer Jeff Queener had spent about three weeks planning this exercise. The firefighters had to know in advance what to use and when to use it.

"I never know when they might have to come to my house, and I want them to know what to do and when to do it," said Texico fire chief Lewis Cooper. He indicated that the training session had met all of the objectives that they hoped to achieve.

Shortly after they arrived, the firefighters used fire hoses to dampen the grass around the structure. They didn't want the fire to spread beyond the training site, a building scheduled for demolition.

Then preparations for a controlled burn began in earnest. A large oil drum filled with wood was carried into the structure. A container of tractor fuel was delivered. Crystal Foreman brought a hay bale to spread inside the structure. David Kube set up a fan outside the front door of the building to fan the flames.

Cooper checked the building to make sure that nobody was inside. At one point during the set-up, a child wandered in to see what was going on. She was sent out

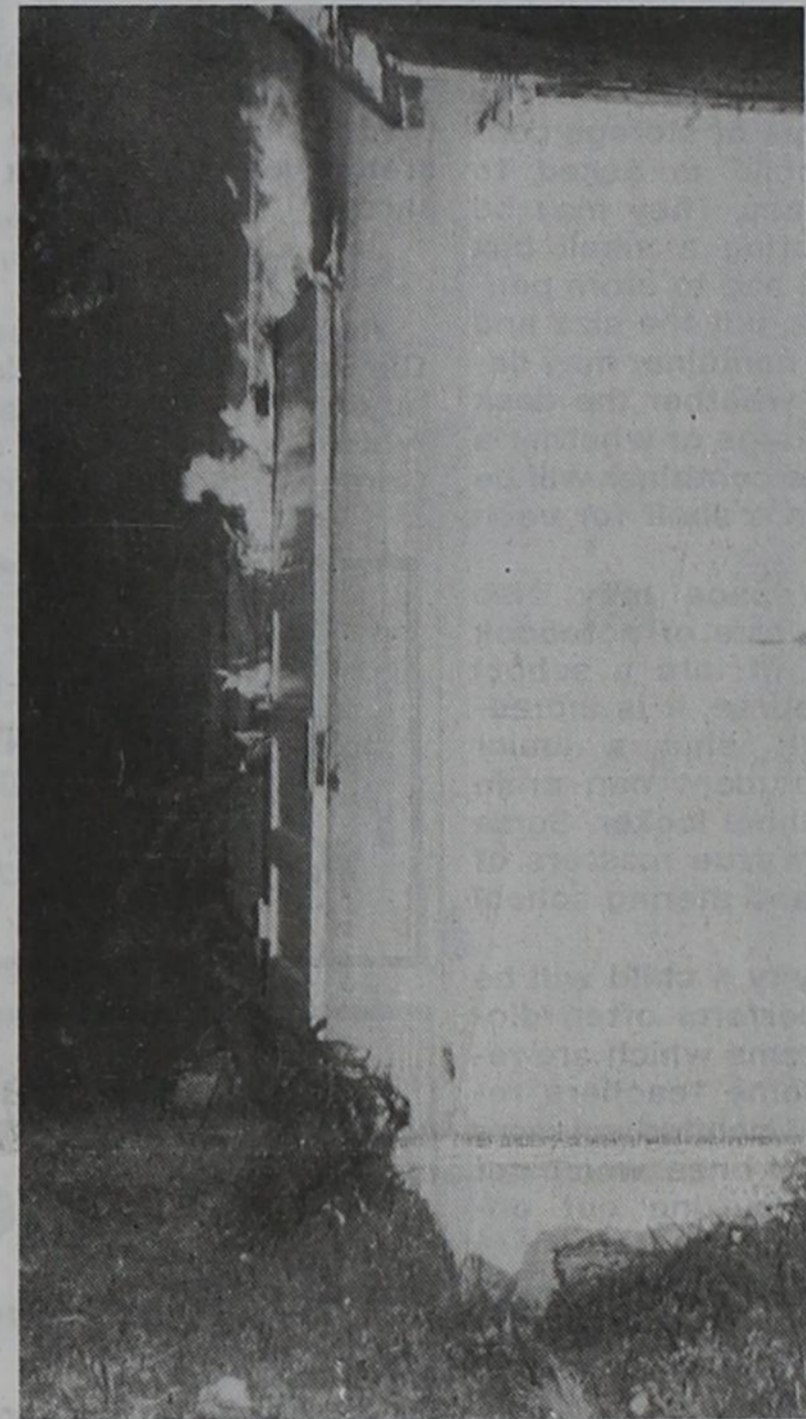

## Lazbuddie Schools approve some pay increases

A 5 percent raise was approved for all secretarial, custodial, and bus driving staff by the Lazbuddie School Board Tuesday.

Teacher salaries were not approved at this meeting, but the board did approve \$1,500 overages for teachers who live in their own homes and \$500 overages for those who live in school supplied teacher housing. This is the same as last year.

In other business, the board:

- Hired Adeana Carlyle to teach 1st grade and Elaine Walker as a cafeteria worker. Mrs. Carlyle replaces Verena McAdams who will teach in Sudan this year. Ms. Walker replaces Robbie Davis.

- Will hold a public hearing at 8:15 p.m. on Aug. 16 to review the proposed budget for the 1994-95 school year. They will meet to approve or reject the budget immediately after the hearing. Bids for a pickup truck will be opened at the meeting.

- Approved state mandated changes in their handbook concerning sexual harassment and drug testing. The board approved new handbooks for the elementary, junior high school, high school, bus drivers, faculty and staff with the proposed changes.

- Approved some proposed changes in the cafeteria procedures as recommended by the cafeteria management.
- Discussed improvements in the elementary school. New windows and doors are being installed, and new blinds have been ordered.

- Set the teacher appraisal calendar. All observations will be made between October and February. None will be scheduled for days before or after holidays.

- Discussed the possibility of purchasing an ag department trailer.

## Commissioners discuss annex financial cost

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday decided to seek bids for roof repair, and for first floor air conditioning repairs at the county courthouse.

The commissioners spent much of the meeting on preliminary budget discussion. The public hearing will be held in September.

No action was taken on the proposed county courthouse annex in Friona. The commis-

sioners are still looking at funding, and waiting to hear from the state on its computerization of the county tax assessor's office and how that would impact on an annex.

A rough ballpark estimate appears to be in the \$30,000 range for opening an annex. And if the state makes the county pay for another computer for the tax assessor, that's another \$12,000.

## Texico Schools to install phone messaging system

Supt. R.L. Richards told the Texico School Board Tuesday that the state grant for a telephone messaging system has arrived. The system will be bought next month.

Some of this system's uses are:

- Teachers can record messages, so parents can call in to find out about assignments for their children who miss a

class due to illness, etc.

- Teachers can send messages to parents.

- Coaches can call in to the system from their cellular phones when coming back from away games and record a message letting parents know exactly when the team bus will arrive back.

In other business, the board:

- Discussed the new bleachers with architect Eldon Smith,

of Clovis, who is working on the plans. It will go to bids after the current football season ends. An alternate bid will be put out for new bleachers, which would be bought if money is available. New lights will be bought. The plans are available at the superintendent's office if folks would like to see them.

- Discussed class schedules and our handbooks.

- Approved the special ed policy and procedure manual.
- Reviewed the teacher in-service program.

- Set up a teacher support system, with veteran teachers assigned to new teachers in a "buddy system."

- Have two student teachers - Sheree Montgomery, in business, and Kip Defoor, in art.

- Discussed a grant to put trees outside the track.

- Will seeks bids soon on expanding the high school parking lot.

## Texico Council okays mobile home variance

The Texico City Council Tuesday approved a variance request to put a mobile home at 622 State St.

Fourteen letters were sent out to neighbors. Five letters were returned, all in favor.

In other business, the council:

- Approved a curb cutting requested by Dwayne Hill.

- Noted that the dog catcher has caught a bunch of animals and several citations have been issued.

- Heard deputy marshal Larry Garrison commend the Texico Fire Department for their fine work in containing the fire at the Steele home (see story elsewhere in today's paper).

which teach the names of the basic colors. They have to color certain shapes red and others blue as learning activities. They use the same colors all year long, so they need more than one box.

Older children are often asked to bring more colors because the activities they need to do are different. They don't color as often, but they do it for different reasons. They might need a variety of colored pencils or markers for maps, charts or graphs.

Little children are often asked to bring a mat or rug or blanket because nap time is a necessary part of the school day for pre-schoolers; and sitting on the floor to listen to a story is more comfortable if there is a rug or a blanket to sit upon.

Some teachers ask the little ones to bring a backpack so that notes which need to go home may be slipped into the backpack during lunch time or recess. This way the teacher can be sure that the notes will get home. Other teachers know that they do not have storage space in their classrooms for backpacks, so they discourage their use.

Storage space in certain classrooms often dictates the size and type of storage container a child is asked to bring to class. They may be asked to bring a small box or zippered bag to store pencils or pens, but the size and type of the container may depend upon whether the desk is small or large or whether a tote storage container will be stored upon a shelf for each child.

Storage space may also dictate the size of notebook which can fit into a school desk. Of course, it is incredible to see what a junior high age student can cram into one school locker. Some of them are true masters of collecting and storing school supplies.

The activity a child will be asked to perform often dictates the items which are requested. Some teachers request round pointed scissors so that little ones won't get hurt while cutting out objects. Others ask for sharp pointed scissors because the children have to cut out detailed projects.

Some teachers want children to bring several small bottles of glue rather than one large one because there isn't room in the school desks for a big bottle. Others request the same thing because glue dries up before it is used up. Other teachers prefer the children to use glue sticks, tape or other products.

Some teachers are very specific about the sizes and types of pencils, pens, and markers that are used and about the type of eraser that is used. Frankly, I haven't figured out all of the reasons for their choices. Maybe you have.

Some teachers have unusual requests which relate to one specific activity that the children will be doing. For instance, Farwell 1st graders are asked to bring a recipe box, note cards and dividers. This is done because the children will be cutting out pictures of objects that start with certain letters of the alphabet and filling the cards in their file boxes.

Older children may be asked to bring rulers with certain types of measurement, protractors, compasses, graph paper, or computer discs, depending upon the school. One teacher asks that the children have multiplication flash cards.

before she could be hurt.

Cooper also counted each firefighter as he entered or left the building. As chief, Cooper has responsibility for the men in his unit.

Texico Marshal Gil Holguin showed up to help with crowd control. "When I respond to a fire, I'm there because they are going to need somebody to enforce the perimeter," said Holguin. He was needed - many neighbors set up lawn chairs so that they could watch the show. He also had to ask children to keep their bicycles off the hoses.

All of the equipment was checked one more time before the fire began.

The first time into the building, the rookies found only a small fire had been set. Their objective was to become accustomed to the heat and the smoke and the breathing equipment. Firefighters crawled close to the floor to learn to use their breathing equipment in a smoky place. They learned to find the source of the fire in a smoke filled room.

"We're starting out with a little smoke training," said Rick Potter of the Clovis Fire department. "We'll light one room at a time, and they will have to find the fire. Then we'll have some steam training."

"My knees got a little sore, but it didn't get as hot as I thought it would be," said Larry Garrison on his first time into the structure. Later in the evening, as the ferocity of the fire increased, Garrison came out of the building and called it a "sweat factory."

The trainers waited until after the sun went down for one part of the training session so that the rookies could experience what it is like to crawl into a completely black, smoke filled room.

Mrs. Garrison, who doesn't like confined spaces to begin with, crawled into the smoke filled building the first time with some trepidation. The thick smoke gave the rookies the sensation of being inside a confined space. It was hard for firefighters to see even a few inches in

front of themselves.

Mrs. Garrison found the source of the fire just as she was supposed to, but suddenly a loud alarm bell sounded. The incessant clanging meant that her breathing equipment wasn't functioning correctly. Because Mrs. Garrison knew that this was a training session, she went through the experience calmly and efficiently. And

because she had handled the fear once, she gained confidence from the experience which will help her in the future.

The veteran firefighters set controlled fires in one room at a time. At first the rookies only experienced what a burning room is like, later they had to try to put out the fire.

During steam training, the rookies really learned to handle the heat. Water from the fire hoses turns to steam in a raging fire. Steam increases the heat sensation, and the chances of being burned. Firefighters must know how to handle these situations.

The firefighters learned to handle the force of the water from the fire hoses. The hoses can do a lot of damage if they are not used correctly. They can also cause a fire fighter to lose his balance.

At one point they practiced using a pike to move burning objects or to knock out windows or doors. Open windows increased the air flow inside the building, and that increased the ferocity of the flames.

According to Cooper, the firemen learned what to look for by watching the smoke. Experienced firefighters must know when to leave a burning building before it collapses. Part of the experience was watching the color and density of the smoke under various conditions.

When the practice session ended, the firefighters rolled up the hoses, stowed the gear and returned the fire trucks to the fire station. It was about 11 p.m. when they headed back to the fire station to clean up. It had been a long but productive evening.
