



## **Texico** has Homecoming activities scheduled


This has been Homecoming Week at the Texico Schools and everyone is anxiously awaiting the big game between Texico and the Eunice

**Beef Tostadas** 

6 6-inch corn tortillas

1/2 cup finely chopped onion

1 poiund ground round

1/2 teaspoon ground cumin

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon oregano

1 1/2 to 2 teaspoons chili powder 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

Dash hot pepper sauce

1 1/2 cups shredded red cabbage

3/4 cup salsa cruda

3/4 cup shredded low fat cheddar cheese

Preheat oven to 450 degrees F. Place tortillas on a heavy

baking sheet, put another baking sheet on top of tortillas. Bake 8 to 10 minues, or until tortillas are crisp.

In a nonstick skillet over medium-high heat, combine onion and ground round. Saute until meat is browned. Drain off fat and add cumin, salt, oregano, chili powder, garlic powder,

and hot pepper sauce. Stir until mixed well. For each tostada, spread 1/3 cup meat on crisped tortilla. Add 1/4 cup cabbage, 2 tablespoons salsa cruda and 2 tablespoons shredded cheese. Serves 6

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



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## More conservative methods used

The following information is from New Mexico State University:

As farmers in Eastern New Mexico switch to more conservative tilling systems like stubble mulch and no-till, reserves of important nutrients increase in the soil, said Bill Lindemann, with NMSU's ag experiment station.

"Particularly on the eastern side of New Mexico, farmers are switching to more conservative methods of tillage," he said. "The advantages of these systems are manifold, including decreasing soil erosion and conserving fuel, soil organic matter and soil nitrogen."

For five years, Lindemann studied the conversion of farmland from a conventional till system to stubble and notill systems at NMSU's ag science center at Clovis. Under the different tillage systems, he considered the accumulation of organic nitrogen and organic carbon in soil planted in a

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sorghum - sorghum - fallow - wheat rotation.

In conventional tillage, farmers usually use moldboard plows or disks to plow under crop residues each season. Conservation tillage techniques leave at least 30 percent of the residue covering the soil surface after planting.

With stubble till, farmers use many of the same tillage tools as in conventional till, but they try to leave enough crop residue on the surface to reduce soil erosion. In no-till, the soil is left virtually undistured from harvest to planting. Notill requires more chemical inputs than stubble till for weed control.

"We've found that after five years, organic nitrogen, organic carbon and other soil factors have increased in the soil under stubble and no-till systems as compared to conventional systems," said Lindemann. "The stubble and no-till systems had very similar results, but the notill conserved a little bit more organic nitrogen and organic carbon than did the stubble."

The differences were most notable during sorghum planting and growth, he added.

Lindemann said these added nutrients mean the soil holds moisture better and resists erosion. More moisture in the soil is especially important to farmers in eastern New Mexico where lack of water can be the limiting factor for high yields.

Farmers sometimes opt for stubble till over no-till because stubble requires a minimum investment in new farm implements. With no-till, farmers need to invest in no-till planters that can get through the crop residue to plant the seed and apply herbicides, insecticides and fertilizer all at once, said Lindemann.

"I recommend the no-till systems because of the long-term savings in organic matter, fuel and labor costs," he said. "But they will require a little bit more input in terms of pesticides, at least initially, and a little more nitrogen fertilizer because organic debris is not breaking down as fast."



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
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
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
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## More details of 1995 cotton program announced

More details of the 1995 cotton program have been released by the USDA, said Plains Cotton Growers.

PCG officials note that the two most important pieces of information announced were sign-up dates for the 1995 cotton program and the announcement of an estimated upland cotton deficiency payment for the 1995 crop.

USDA is still seeking comments on several other items, including the amount of the estimated deficiency payment to offer in advance to growers and which crops will be allowed to be planted on ACR and Conserving Use acres. Final announcement of these provisions will come at a later

Sign-up dates for the 1995 program will begin Jan. 30 and run through April 28. Producers need to remember that purchase of crop insurance is required for 1995 program participation. Deadlines for purchasing crop insurance are earlier than those for program sign-up.

Crop insurance deadlines are March 15 in most U.S. growing regions, including the High Plains of Texas. Producers and landlords alike should be sure to purchase at least the minimum catastrophic coverage level of insurance before March 15 if they want to participate in any 1995 commodity programs. Failure to purchase at least the basic coverage level will mean they are ineligible for all program benefits.

Catastrophic insurance is available to producers for a processing fee of \$50 per crop up to a maximum of \$200 per county. In cases where a farmer has limited resources, the processing fee may be waived.

crops for which crop insurance is available. Producers and landlords should be sure and find out exactly what they are required to do in order to follow the loss of their primary crop with an alternative crop and remain in compliance with program regulations.

Also announced was a change in the 1995 price election for Upland and ELS cotton insurance policy holders. The Upland cotton price election was increaseed 9 cents per pound and the ELS cotton price election was increased 10 cents per pound. For High Plains cotton producers, the new price election is 62 cents per pound, up from the earlier rate of 53 cents per pound set in October 1994.

Earlier announcements from USDA set the Acreage Reduction Program at zero percent for 1995, meaning producers will be able to plant all of their cotton base acres to the fiber crop but receive deficiency payments on 85 percent of those acres.
