Mike wrote his advice to graduates recently, and it prompted me to think back on the advice given to the Class of 1962:

- Go to college.
- Strive hard in academic fields.
- Be willing to travel.
- Move up in the corporate structure.
- Learn foreign languages.
- Study science and math.

Today a four year college education is slipping out of the grasp of a lot of middle class folks. There are lots of two year junior colleges around, but it is getting harder and harder for ordinary folks to finance a full four year education for their children.

Of course, in many fields it now takes five or six years of college education to get a job.

The class of 1962 was told to strive hard in academic areas. Read the classics. Know history. Be able to parse a sentence. Achieve, achieve, achieve.

Competitive nation - wide testing became very popular with schools. Scholarships were given on the basis of achievement on those tests. We were in a race with Russia; and we were told that the Ruski's were ahead. We had to have proof that we were working hard to keep up, and those ACT and SAT tests did the job.

After college we were advised to move up the corporate ladder by showing our willingness to move, study, and accumulate profits. Learning foreign languages would help us to understand the complex world situation, and thereby to do business in foreign nations more easily. Science and math, of course were the tools of modern technology.

Now, after four years of college an educated Ameri-

Morgan displays woodworking skills

J.D. "Jim" Morgan of Texico knew that he had his work cut out for him when he looked at pictures of an intricately wooden clock. "I thought it would take me a year or better to make it," he said.

Forty dollars worth of saw blades and 30 days later, Morgan had completed the project which now stands nearly as tall as he does.

For each intricate cut a pilot hole was drilled, and the saw blade was inserted at exactly the right angle. Then it was guided along a circuitous path.

Morgan chose cedar, oak, walnut and white maple to make his creation. He added clockworks complete with a chime that plays the "Westminster Chimes," and finished the project with a fine finish.

"He thought he'd be old and gray headed when he finished this," said Mrs. Morgan. Luckily, he finished it in about 6 weeks' time.

"I had time to kill - I don't go to the coffee shop or the pool hall," said Morgan. Later he added, "I'd rather do something like this (he pointed to the clock) so I've got something to look at when I get through." He spends a lot of his time puttering around the house, and visiting with Mrs. Morgan.

Normally, Morgan does wood projects with much simpler designs. The yard of the Morgan home is filled with two dimensional Western designs. There are cowboys and Indians, gunfighters and maidens in distress scattered about the yard. There is even a cow - wearing polka dot undies.

Inside their home Morgan has many, many projects that he has made in his shop - there are peacock - shaped candle holders, a coffee table made from a slice of a Cyprus log, and a lamp made from pieces of a fence post from Howard Whitener's farm.

"I was a carpenter almost all my life," said Morgan. When he retired from carpentry, Morgan did some custom farm work, but he also did some woodworking for the fun of it. "I just like foolin' with wood," he said.

Morgan makes a variety of items including several types of baskets made from one plank of wood, which can collapse and fold down flat. Mrs. Morgan uses one of those baskets to organize her medications. There are indentations in the bottom of the basket just the right size for each prescription bottle.

Morgan has also made a picture puzzle which doubles as a wall decoration, and several interesting bird houses. There is even a Noah's Ark on the television set that he made.

Morgan doesn't sell his wooden projects in stores or at craft shows. Often he gives them to members of his family as gifts.

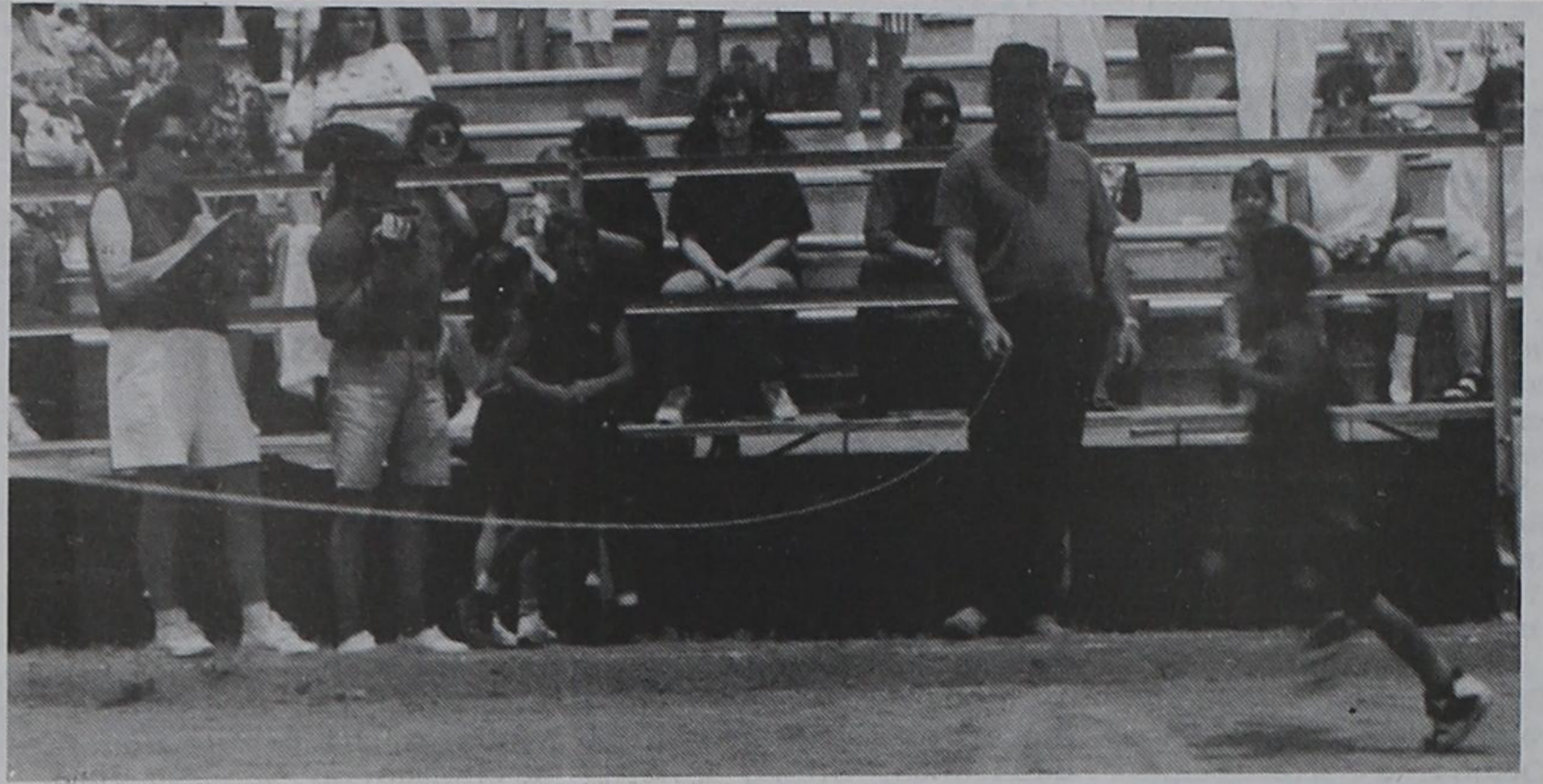

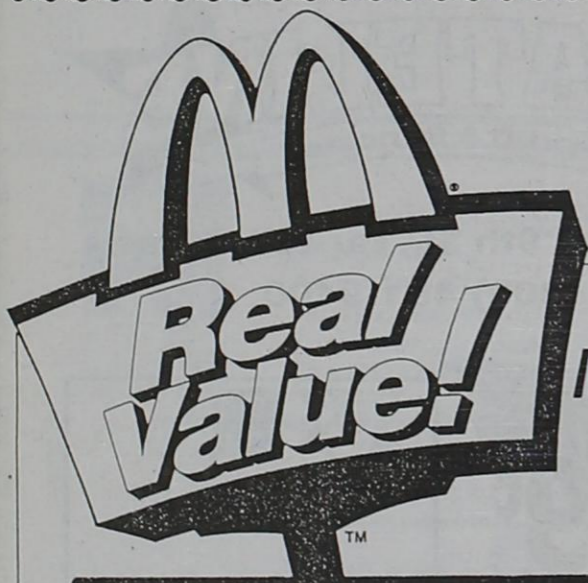

Bake at 400 degrees F. for 13 - 17 minutes or until golden brown. Top each slice with salsa and sour cream. Garnish with lettuce. Makes 5 servings.

AZTX Cattle Company dba Farwell Feedyards, Inc., P.O. Box 390, Hereford, Texas 79045, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (Commission) for an amendment to Permit No. 01665 to authorize an increase in the number of cattle at the feedlot from a maximum of 15,000 head to a maximum of 29,500 head. The proposed amendment will also incorporate improvements constructed after the permit was originally approved. Stormwater will be retained in one (1) storage pond. Wastewater from the pond is to be disposed of by irrigation on 111 acres of agricultural land. Manure and/or solids are to be removed from the site by a commercial compost contractor. No discharge of pollutants into the waters of the State is authorized by this permit.

The cattle feedlot is approximately 1.5 miles south of Farwell on State Line Road in Parmer County, Texas. This location is in the drainage area of the Black Water Draw in Segment No. 1241 of the Brazos River Basin.

The Executive Director of the Commission has prepared a draft permit based on the application submitted by the applicant and other information presently available.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the "Texas Water Code" and 30 TAC Chapter 305 of the "Rules of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission."

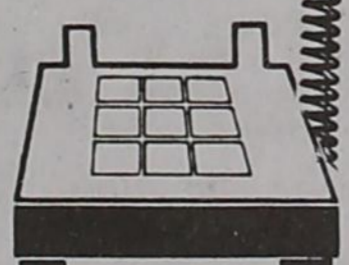
