Five candidates sought the three posts.

Kube, an incumbent, got 62 votes. Mrs. Kittrell, a former councilwoman, led with 77 votes. Mace got 67 votes.

Others to get votes were Jesse Cantu, 53 and incumbent James Chadwick, 49.

"Ben ordered the tickets for the trip three months ago," she said. The trip was designed to be a special gift. The tickets were ordered before Ben knew when the Chamber Banquet would be scheduled. Neither Ben nor any of their children knew about the award she would receive when the tickets were ordered.

When family members were informed that Mary would be honored, they struggled with the question of what to do. They couldn't return the tickets. But going on the trip meant that Mary would miss both the Farwell Chamber of Commerce Banquet and the Farwell Convalescent Center Auxiliary luncheon – something she had not done before.

After a long discussion, the family decided that Ben and Mary would go on the trip as planned. They would keep the award a secret from Mary, but it would go along with them hidden in a suitcase.

At 7 on the evening of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce Banquet, Ben drew a large brown envelope from a suitcase stored in the closet of their hotel room. Ships come to the harbor in groups of four or five ships at a time, bringing swarms of tourists with them as they come. One ship that arrived when the Mesmans were there was filled with people from the Netherlands.

Some tourists come from Europe. And, some ships come loaded with tourists from cold Yankee cities. All are looking for a warm, sunny place to vacation.

"The beaches are beautiful; they're clean. It's lots different than some places," said Mary.

Tourists can stay in hotels or rent little houses or time - share properties for two to three weeks at a time. Ben and Mary stayed in beautifully decorated quarters that came complete with kitchen facilities. "We got one - - all blue and white decorations, (her favorite colors). It was so wonderful," Mary exclaimed.

According to Mary, food is expensive on St. Martin. "It is very, very expensive on the French part," she noted. Most of it has to be brought in by ship from other places.

The residents of the island make their living serving the tourist trade. They run the taxis and deep sea fishing boats and work in the hotels and shops.

Mary enjoyed shopping in the many and varied shops on the island. Wood carving is a specialty of the island, and so is jewlery. Mary told of a beautifully carved wooden hope chest that one islander had carved. She nearly bought it, but she decided against it when she found out what the shipping would entail.

She was also impressed by the jewelry on the island. "Gold is well known in the island; you get better gold for the price than in the States," said Mary.

"People are so trustful, so truthful, and they help you rather than worry about selling you souvenirs," says Mary.
"I don't have to worry about my purse over there."
