Girls' track and cross country - Jarah Redwine, MVP; and Krista Smith, Jennifer Hill and Julie McDonald, Most Improved.

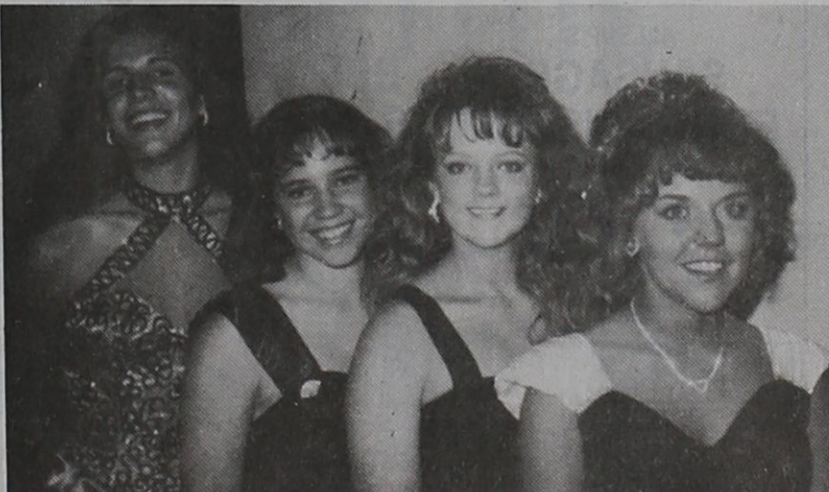

Deluge hits Twin Cities

A deluge hit the Twin Cities area Sunday night. Reports of over 6 inches of rain occurred in Parmer County.

Heavy rains flooded streets and bar ditches, but brought needed moisture. There were some reports of hail and crop damage, but other farmers benefited from the moisture.

In Texico, some residents lost telephone service until noon Tuesday after lightning hit a transformer. Walter Curd of Texico reported 3.7 inches of rain fell at his home. He said he had heard reports of between 3 and 4 inches of moisture in that area.

L.L. Harris reported 3.8 inches of rain at his Texico home. He said reports from south of the Clovis Airport were about 5 inches of rain. The Truman Kittrells reported 4.20 inches of rain at their place. One Pleasant Hill farmer reported about 3.7 inches of rain.

The underpass at FM 145 was closed part of Sunday night, and some Oklahoma Lane residents were without electricity for many hours. 6.2 inches of rain was reported at the Mitz Walling farm.

Three feet of water were reported at the underpass and one vehicle, carrying three people, was stranded for awhile. No one was hurt. The Santa Fe Railroad is expected to begin work next week on renovating the underpass, said county commissioner Robert White.

In Farwell, Fred Chandler measured 3.2 inches of moisture at the Sherley Anderson Pitman elevator. Lonnie McFarland reported 3.5 inches of rain at his Farwell home.

McFarland said he measured 3.1 inches of moisture at the Sherley Anderson Grain Elevator in Lariat.

Shirley Steinbock measured 3 inches of moisture at the Sherley Anderson Elevator in Lazbuddie. The heavy rains caused a cave-in of several graves at the Lazbuddie Cemetery but County Commissioner Raymond McGehee had workers out earlier this week to repair the damage.

Frona to seek expansion of county services

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday received information from the state statutes dealing with the legality of broadening county services to other cities within the same county.

The information was passed out by County Judge Bonnie Clayton.

At the next commissioners' meeting, Friona Chamber of Commerce executive director Teresa Buske will make a presentation asking the commissioners to expand county ser-

vices into that community. Currently, Friona area residents can get their license tags at the Friona Credit Union, which has an agreement with the county to sell county tags there. Also, early voting takes place at offices in Bovina and Friona each election.

In other business, the commissioners checked the courthouse first floor renovations, which were recently completed.

Texico approves budget with 5% pay increases

The Texico City Council had a short, quick session Tuesday night.

The council approved a working budget, which goes to the state for final approval. It includes 5 percent across-the-board pay raises for city employees.

City Clerk Marie Christian said the city's raises have been below the cost of living for several years. In other business, the council approved closing a half block of Anderson Street, next to City Hall, for a 2-hour period on July 30 for the Border Town Days bicycle contest.

Also, deputy marshal Larry Garrison will be on hand at that time to help escort kids and their parents across the highway to the contest.

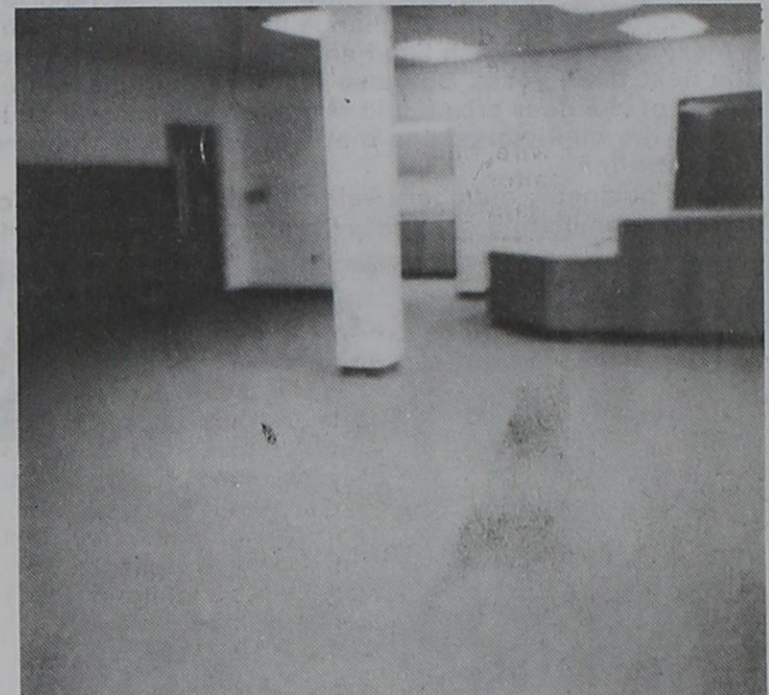
bound together in a circle of life and love, without beginning, without end.

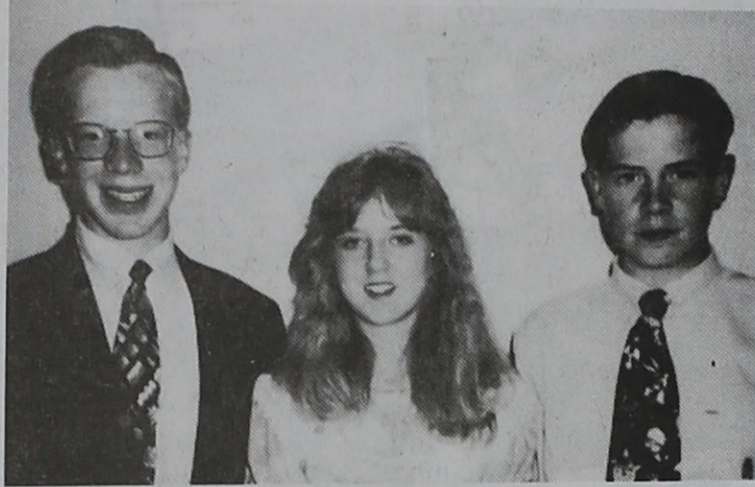

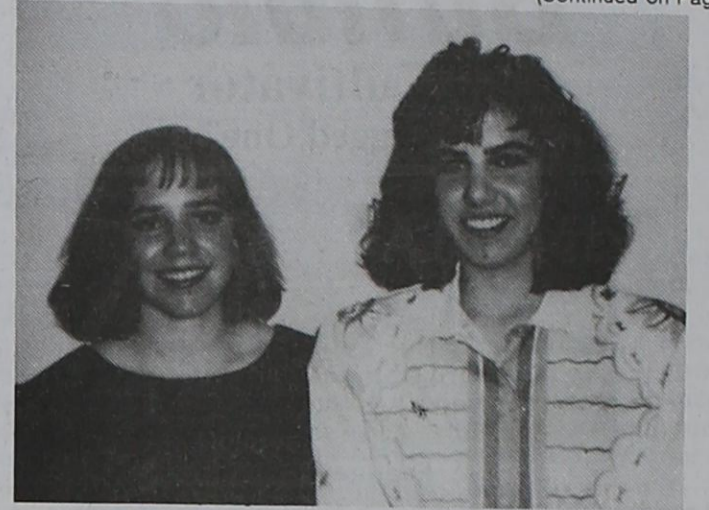

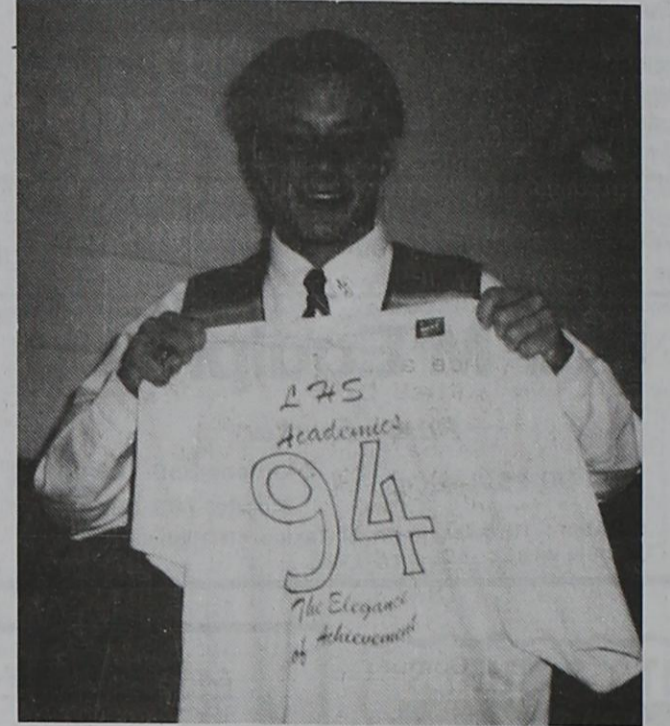

'Much is at stake'

Dear Editor,
 More and more, it seems, one is judged for making judgement calls about anything or anyone at anytime. The argument is that we're all fallible; thus to make hard, objective calls is presumptuous (a judgement call itself); we just "don't know all the facts." This pernicious precept; heard and heeded, effectively eliminates, annihilates decision making! In a very real sense, we cannot judge, we cannot decide!

Contemporary examples are immediately numerous and obvious. And in each of these examples we see wrongdoing excused on the ever-growing ground of non-judgementalism. In mid-1993 facts (these facts were never denied) disclosed that 83 percent of the students at Massachusetts Institute of Technology had cheated at least once on a homework assignment or test during the previous year. A spokesman (or should we say "spokesperson?") for the institute replied when questioned about the incidents: "...we cannot say people who do this are bad and that they're beyond helping." Judgementally, what are they? Paragons of virtue, honorable, trustworthy? Are they beyond help? No. Were they involved in wrongdoing? Most definitely.

A homosexual (using the term is judgemental in part and completely "politically incorrect") discussing the AIDS crisis insisted, "...AIDS isn't caused by homosexual promiscuity, it's caused by a virus." Never, never be judgemental in pointing out the chief cause of its spread!

Criminals are now offenders. The majority (but not all) of those called homeless are what we used to call vagrants and bums. Those once labeled perverts and queers are now called gays. Oh, how we have ruined a perfectly fine English word! Kids are now hyperactive whose counterparts 30 years ago were brats. Could the medical cure (for at least some of these) be less sugar and more stick?

A very recent example of the foregoing comes from Singapore. An American citizen (of all people) was involved in auto vandalism (breaking the law). After several appeals to avoid caning (getting whipped), a final appeal brought forth the plea that the young lad was sick when he committed the crime. Seems he has ADD (Attention Deficit Disorder). Can you say, "We can invent diseases faster than you can spray paint a car?" In days of yore the disinterested child was told to pay attention and parents and teachers saw that he did or paid the consequences.

The infamous Menendez brothers brutally and sadistically murdered their parents with a volley of shotgun blasts. Sympathizers of the brothers cry out that the brothers are the victims; they being allegedly abused as tots. After the murder, the eldest brother, pur-

chased a \$15,000 Rolex and a \$70,000 Porsche which apparently aided in recovery from his distressful childhood!

And now, at the very pinnacle of our civil government comes the long excuse. Wrongdoing a long time ago or a long distance away doesn't count. Somehow, some way, time and distance justifies and makes everything all right. Sadly, very sadly, the populace appears to be buying this liberal drive.

Our legislators have now imposed a ban on certain assault weapons. Has anyone, anywhere, at anytime ever stopped to consider that there has never been any gun, anywhere at anytime that manufactured itself? The assailant is not the gun, but the person with the gun! Whether it be accidental or purposefully planned, any maiming or murder with a weapon has a person involved who is responsible. It is amazing how we have now become a society that refuses to take responsibility for any attitude or actions! The cry is "Never, never, never take the blame. Excuse yourself, or at least use euphemisms in your defense.

More and more we are told that societal or racial status is the reason for crimes against society. If we're slighted in any way, such justifies or post - actions. It is interesting to note that during the Great Depression in this country, with poverty, injustices and gun possession on the increase, crime decreased. Moral and ethical issues then were black and white (uh-oh), and not soothing, conscience anesthetizing shades of gray. Factual history tells us that we cannot use racial or social inequities as cop-outs for our actions, Affirmative Action and Now to the contrary not withstanding.

Someone has poignantly pointed out, and rightly so, "There will be no excuses in heaven." The inspired wise man of old wrote: "Righteousness exalteth a nation: but sin is a reproach to any people," (Prov. 14:34). Wake up America! We are being reproached on every side, the world over. Much is at stake.
