They never got a title during his tenure due to the Bills' lack of a firstrate quarterback. But we all remember when he became the first running back to break the 2,000-yard barrier - by six yards!

Over the years, he has become an American Hero. A handsome looking, great running back who also made his mark in movies (the "Naked Gun" comedy series). And with a monicker like "O.J.," how can you go wrong?

Now comes the sadness. It turns out he was a wife-

beater, and worse. How sad. I suspect that the jury will find him guilty although his defense team seems topnotch. They are pulling out all the stops and may sway the jury (or at least one or more members of it) his way.

Regardless of the verdict, the sadness will stay with us. Nobody likes to see a man, or woman, who has been placed on a pedestal ripped down. Heroes don't come along very often.

Texico approves 2-mill levy

Texico School District voters narrowly approved Tuesday a 2 mill levy for the school system, 116-106.

In the school board races. the verdicts were:

- Deborah Autrey unseated incumbent Paul Dee Barnes for the Position 1 post. Mrs. Autrey received 137 votes. Barnes got 67 and Jackie Don Hoberts got 43

- Incumbent Bruce Mayfield, unopposed, got 172 votes for the Position 2 post. Incumbent Byron Mayfield, unopposed, got 181

votes for the Position 3 post. Barnes has served on the board for the past 10 years. He currently is board presi-

School officials have said that the 2 mill levy would equal a \$20 increase in property taxes based on a house with an assessed valuation of \$30,000 and a market value of \$33,000.

For every \$1.06 the local tax generates, the state will match it with \$1.

The tax provides money to maintain, repair and furnish buildings, buy equipment and for improving school grounds. No decisions have been made yet on how to use it.

Clovis school district voters also approved Tuesday continuing its 2 mill levy.

Here's a forecast of cotton plantings

U.S. cotton producers intend to plant 15.587 million acres of upland and extra long staple cotton this spring, according to the National Cotton Council's annual planting intentions

The survey reveals intentions to boost upland plantings 13.8 percent to 15.422 million acres, while ELS acreage is seen declining 2.3 percent to 165,000 acres.

The change in the Upland Acreage Reduction Program requirement from 11 percent in 1994 to zero percent for 1995 would allow program-eligible acreage to rise 12.4 percent.

The National Cotton Council also reports that in contrast to a 26-year downward trend, the U.S. cotton industry should enjoy its highest offtake of cotton ever - 20.4 million bales - in the 1994-95 marketing year (August to July).

Offtake is the combination of domestic textile mill use and exports of raw cotton.

The projections are for 11 million bales of domestic mill use and 9.4 million bales of exports in the current marketing year and 11.3 million bales of mill use and 8.5 million bales of exports in 1995-96.







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Deficiency payment calculations made

From Plains Cotton Growers:

Final calculations for the 1994 crop Upland Cotton Deficiency Payment have been made following the release of final marketing figures for December.

December marketings of 5.091 million bales helped push the final payment rate down to 4.6 cents per pound. Producers who received the 6.45 cent advance payment in 1994 now have until July 31, 1995, to repay the 1.85 cent difference between the advance and final payment rates.

PCG executive vice president Donald Johnson said producers will be able to offset the repayment against other program payments they will receive before the end of the

current marketing year, July 31. Deficiency payments are calculated as the lesser of the difference between the target price and either the commodity credit corporation loan rate or the average price

received by growers weighted by total marketings for the

preceding calendar year. The December figures, released by USDA Jan. 31, show that U.S. cotton producers marketed over 5 million bales and received an average price of 73.2 cents per pound during the month.

The new figures produced a calculated total Deficiency Payment rate of 4.6 cents through December, 1.85 cents below the advance payment rate.

The cumulative volume of cotton marketed through December climbed to 18.598 million bales and the weighted average price received by growers also increased to 68.3

Here's some information from the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservatioin District:

If you would like to improve wildlife habitat, some of the best improvements that could benefit the playa lake areas, would be to plant food plots around the outer areas. This could include milo, millet, corn or native grasses.

From a wildlife standpoint, the greatest benefits would be in the development of nesting and brood-rearing habitat for pheasants, quail, rabbits and a wide variety of nongame

The nesting period for most wildlife in the area is the period from April through August. These are the critical times and spraying, mowing or other disturbances should be kept to an absolute minimum. At this time, the S.W.C.D. has available wildlife packets from the Texas Forest Service. These are for quail and pheasants, deer, turkey, or squirrel.

The deadline to order trees or wildlife packets is March 1. For more information, call 247-2220 or come by 1306 W. Ninth St. in Friona.

Panhandle Regional Housing Finance Corporation

Panhandle Regional Housing Finance Corporation (the "Issuer") hereby announces its sponsorship of a program to reduce home loan financing costs within its jurisdiction. The Issuer has established a mortgage credit certificate program which will entitle first-time homebuyers and borrowers of qualified home improvement loans and qualified rehabilitation loans to a federal income tax credit. A tax credit is a direct reduction of taxes due. Under the program, a homebuyer would receive a mortgage credit certificate entitling homebuyers to reduce their taxes (up to \$2,000 per year) by thirty- five percent (35%) of the amount of interest paid on their home loan. The tax credit is available each year that the borrower continues to live in the home financed under the program.

In order to qualify for the program, federal law requires that a homebuyer satisfy each of the following guidelines:

1. Principal Residence. The homebuyer must occupy the home financed under the program as his/her principal residence within a reasonable period not to exceed 60 days after the financing is provided. A principal residence is a home occupied primarily for residential purposes. A principal residence does not include a home used as an investment property, as a recreation home or a home 15 percent or more of the total area of which is used in a trade or business.

2. First-Time Homebuyer. Each homebuyer must be a first-time homebuyer. Any person who has not owned his/her principal residence at any time during the three years prior to closing a loan under the program is considered a first-time homebuyer. This requirement does not apply to loans in certain areas or to qualified home improvement loans and qualified rehabilitation loans.

3. <u>Purchase Price</u>. In addition to income, federal law also imposes limitations on the purchase price of homes financed under the program. The current maximum purchase price for a new one-family home is \$94,716 and for an existing home is \$59,877. The maximum purchase price for one-family homes in certain areas of the Issuer is \$115,765 for new homes and \$73,184 for existing homes. The current maximum purchase price for two-family homes is \$67,422 (\$82,405 in certain areas of the Issuer); the maximum price for four-family homes is \$94,906 (\$115,996 in certain areas of the Issuer). These limitations are periodically adjusted. The purchase price limitation does not apply to qualified home improvement loans. There are special rules that apply to qualified rehabilitation loans.

4. New Mortgage. The mortgage loan financed in connection with issuance of a mortgage credit certificate is required to be a new mortgage and may not replace a prior mortgage on the home (whether or not previously repaid).

5. Income. Because the program benefits low and moderate income persons, federal law imposes limitations on the annual gross income of homebuyers (except with respect to a portion of the residences in certain areas of the Issuer). The current limit on annual gross income for households or families of 2 or fewer persons and for households or families of 3 or more is as follows:

These limitations are subject to adjustment each year and have not yet been adjusted for 1995. Gross income includes salary and wages, including overtime, as well as dividends, alimony, public assistance, social security, unemployment compensation and investment income.

6. One- to Four-Family House. The residence financed must be a one- to four-family residence. A one-family residence includes a detached home, one unit of a duplex, a townhouse or a condominium unit. Manufactured housing or mobile homes qualify only if the unit has at least 400 square feet of living space, if it is more than 102 inches wide and if it is of a kind customarily used at a fixed location. If the residence is a two- to four-family residence, one unit of the residence must be the principal residence of the owner of the units and (with limited exceptions) the residence must have been first occupied for residential purposes at least five years before the mortgage loan financed in connection with the issuance of the mortgage credit certificate is executed. Land adjoining the home is considered part of the home only if it maintains the home's livability and is not, other than incidentally, a source of income to the owner.

7. Program Area. In order to be eligible for a certificate, the home financed under the program must be located in the Cities of Booker, Darrouzett, Follett or Perryton, Texas, or Carson, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman or Wheeler Counties. 8. Home Improvement Loans. Hom

8. Home Improvement Loans. Home Improvement loans of up to \$15,000 are also eligible for a mortgage credit certificate. To qualify, the home improvements must substantially improve or protect the livability or energy efficiency of the home; such as new or renovated plumbing or wiring, renovation of the kitchen, or a new or improved heating or cooling system. Installation of a swimming pool, tennis court, hot tub or other recreational and entertainment facilities will not qualify.

9. Qualified Rehabilitation Loans. Qualified rehabilitation loans are also eligible for a mortgage credit certificate. Qualified rehabilitation loans are owner-financing provided in connection with a qualified rehabilitation or the acquisition of a residence with respect to which there has been a qualified rehabilitation, but only if the mortgagor to whom such financing is provided is the first resident of the residence after the completion of the rehabilitation. A "qualified rehabilitation" is a rehabilitation of a building that meets certain specific requirements as to the building's age, the amount of the structured retained in place and the expenditures for the rehabilitation as a percentage of the mortgagor's basis in the residence.

Under the program, mortgage credit certificates will be issued to eligible borrowers on a first-come, first-served basis. The certificates are available in connection with any type of mortgage loan (except loans from tax-exempt bond programs), including fixed rate and adjustable rate mortgages. Any lending institution is eligible to provide loans under this program.



Here's how much water Parmer County producers need

Parmer County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area need 2 to 10 inches of water from precipitation and/or irrigation to bring the five foot root zone profile to field capacity before the 1995 spring planting, according to pre-plant soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service.

"We found that six percent of the Water District service area will need from 0 to 4 inches of moisture to bring the soils to field capacity. About 45 percent of the area will need 4 to 6 inches of moisture and 48 percent will need 6 to 8 inches of moisture. One percent of the area needs 8 to 10 inches



of moisture to refill the soil profile," says Gerald Crenwelge, **USDA-NRCS Soil Scientist.**

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube at each of the 301 monitoring sites within the 15-county Water District service area. Each site is chosen based upon the soil type, the variations in the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates potential well yields and typical farming operations in the area.


Plant available soil moisture varies according to the previous crop produced at the site. For example, soil moisture at cotton sites averaged about 0.4 inches at the one foot soil level, 0.3 inches at the two foot level, 0.3 inches at the three foot level, 0.4 inches at the four foot level and 0.5 inches at the five foot level.

Sites in corn producing areas had about 0.6 inches at the one foot level, 0.6 at the two foot level, 0.6 inches at the three foot level, one inch at the four foot level and one inch at the five foot level.

Available soil moisture for grain sorghum and wheat sites was found to be between that of corn and cotton.

Generally, each foot of soil has a capacity to hold about two inches of soil moisture, or a total of about 10 inches in the five foot root zone soil profile.

Historical data shows that above-average crop yields are more likely when the five foot root zone soil profile is at or



near field capacity at planting.

"We hope the area will receive significant precipitation that will help reduce these soil moisture deficits prior to planting," say Crenwelge. Rain gauge readings taken by Water District staff at the soil moisture sites in Parmer County show 12.91 inches of precipitation during 1994.

Use of furrow dikes will help keep any moisture that falls between now and spring planting on the field so that it can soak into the soil.

The annual pre-plant soil moisture survey data informs producers about general plant available soil moisture conditions across the Water District. "Irrigators can use this information to estimate the amount of water needed to bring their soil close r to field capacity without wasting water by over- irrigating. This information reflects general soil moisture trends and should not be used in place of individual soil moisture testing on farms," says Crenwelge.
