

LIVE CATTLE: Cattle prices are trying to find a bottom we believe? Technically, there is a double bottom an the charts around the \$72.75 level which continues to hold. Cash beef prices have remained around an \$88 cash equivalent as cash fed cattle prices trade at \$78. There is currently a wide spread between cash cattle and cash beef. The bulk of the numbers of fed cattle should be behind us now. Although there are still large numbers due to come over the next few weeks, demand should help to support a turn back up into the Fall time frame.

FEEDER CATTLE: Although the nearby May contract remains under pressure, the back months are beginning to show more strength because of the optimism reflected in the back months of the Live Cattle contract. The Cash Feeder Index remains weak and the May contract will be tied directly to this Index from now into expiration. The market is looking for a bottom at this time!

CORN: Long term trends turned down this week after topping during the first week of April which is also a normal seasonal tendency. The difference between this year and last are fairly important. This year's carryout is almost 1 billion more bushels and prices were almost 50 cents higher basis the December than year ago levels. Estimates of planted acres also increases on a daily basis. The normal trend for corn is down from now into late June. Weather may cause a some glitches?

SOYBEANS: Long term trends turned higher this week, but it's difficult to say how long the rally may last? Seasonally, the market has a strong tendency to top in early May and move lower. Estimates are that soybeans are losing some acres to corn, but weather will be the key into Summer.

WHEAT: This market has rocked along inside a trading range for several weeks with little or no direction. For a while, rain, then no rain created some volatility, but no direction. Prices jumped up strong on Friday after a report released by Sparks Commodities estimated a significant drop in world wheat stocks. The USDA will need to confirm their figures next week or back down we go.

COTTON: So far, the market has held well around the 50 cent level. Long and short term trends are still down. A break below 50 cents basis the July contract would only lead to lower prices. Some projections point towards the \$48.50 area. Funds are heavy net short with little fear of drought condition in the South Plains of Texas. Momentum remains down at this time.



He was a laborer and member of San Jose Catholic Church.





Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor.

As an employee of the hospital and having actively campaigned for the new hospital facility, I have heard numerous questions from area residents regarding the issue of remodeling the existing facility vs. replacing the facility. An obvious area of concern is the increase in taxes to a level sufficient to replace the facility, an increase that is estimated to be about 10 cents. How does that cost compare to the cost of remodeling the facility?

If the two proposals on the May 13th ballot do not pass, as I see it, there are three options:

- 1. Do nothing. We could just "put our heads in the sand" and hope Medicare ignores our situation. Since we know that Medicare is becoming more and more restrictive in their quidelines. I don't see this as a viable
- 2. Wait until next year and try again to pass the propositions necessary to build a new facility. Why wait? Each year we put off the building process, we are increasing the construction costs.
- 3. Remodel the existing facility. With a current tax cap of 25 cents and a current tax rate of 18 cents, the hospital district has 7 cents remaining under the cap. If the hospital were to remodel the existing facility, they would most likely need all of the 7 cents remaining under the

If the hospital district were to use 7 cents to remodel the existing facility and they are estimating the need for 10 cents to completely replace the facility, we are only talking about a 3 cent difference between remodeling vs. replacing the facility. How does this relate to the actual tax dollars we will pay? For every \$100,000 in property value, a 7 cent tax increase would amount to \$70 and a 10 cent tax increase would amount to \$100 - a \$30 difference annually. For such a small difference, I would rather have a new, modern facility.

To me, it just doesn't make sense to put \$7-8 million dollars into remodeling a facility that would still be 50plus years old! For a few dollars more each month we can have a new, state of the art facility that will serve Parmer County and the surrounding area for decades to

To me, the math is simple! Respectfully,




