This year's major giveaway will be a pickup truck, sponsored by the Texico Volunteer Fire Department. Tickets cost \$20 and are available at local businesses.

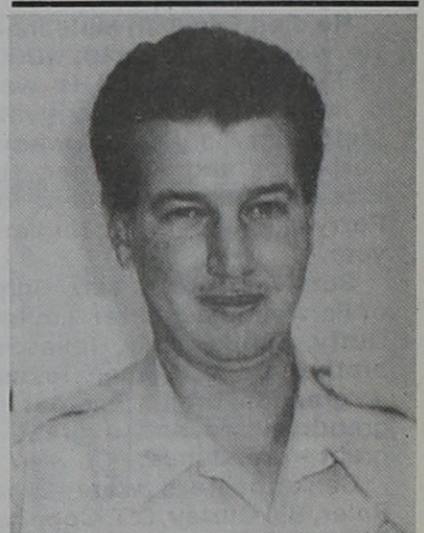
Charlie Phillips Concert

It begins with a Coke Party at the Texico Fire Department at 7:30 p.m. cdt on June 14. This is the deadline for returning the entry forms.

On June 21, there will be a pizza and sash party at the Texico Fire Department at 7:30 p.m. cdt. The contestants will make their sashes, write out thank you notes to the sponsors for their donations and get to know one another.

A style show will be held at the Texico 4th of July Jamboree. A time and the sponsor will be announced at a later date.

On July 19, contestants will go to Amarillo to the Discovery Center, Storyland Zoo and Wonderland Park for a lot of excitement and fun.

July 27 is the time for the dinner and judging. The judges will vote for Miss Photogenic and the girls will vote for Miss Congeniality. A time and place will be given at a later date.

On July 30, the contestants will participate in the Border Town Days parade and the festivities at the park. The girls will be judged on the basis of poise, beauty, talent and the interview. A \$300 scholarship will be given to the winner.

The parade will begin at 11 a.m. cdt. The talent contest will take place after lunch. Contestants will be given instructions concerning the parade and the final events.

The contest is open to any girl attending Texico or Farwell High School next year and living in or outside Texico or Farwell School Districts. Those outside of the district shall be starting their third consecutive school year at either Texico or Farwell.

Miss Border Town Days Queen Contestants' Rules

1. Entries are open to any girl residing in Texico or Farwell school districts and attending Texico or Farwell High School next year. Those who are attending Texico or Farwell High School but live outside the school districts shall be starting their third consecutive school year at one of these schools.

2. She cannot be over age 18.

3. Entrant must be of good health and of good moral character.

4. There will be a scholarship awarded to the queen upon completion of high school and enrollment to further her education or training.

A. She will be given a certificate at the park when she is crowned Queen during Border Town Days activities.

B. The scholarship account will be set up as Border Town Day's Queen with her name and the names of the President and Secretary of Border Town Days.

C. The scholarship must be used within 3 years of completion of high school.

D. The Queen must attend a college, university, trade or vocational school.

E. The scholarship check will be made payable to school or choice of the Queen.

F. The Queen will forfeit the scholarship if she does not maintain a C average through high school, further her education after completion of high school or complete her term as Queen.

G. Interest built up in this account will be used for future scholarships.

5. There will be an automatic forfeit if the Queen does not complete high school, transfers to another school, marries or becomes pregnant during her year as Queen.

6. If substitute serves as Queen, then she cannot be contestant that year, but will be eligible for the next year.

8. Each year the Bordertown Days Queen Committee has the right to set guidelines for judging, activities and prizes.

It's up ... or down

As longtime readers of this column know, I've been harping for the past three years on what I consider the major problem facing the U.S. in coming years: a two-tier economic system.

That means the virtual death of the middle class, which has led America to greatness. Folks will be in either the upper class or lower class, a system more akin to Communism than democracy.

And that's why I always urge graduates to get government jobs - they have the best chance of getting into the upper class that way. I know my advice is ignored, but at least they can't say they weren't warned.

Anyway, I have never offered any documentation for my thesis, other than saying that's the way it looks to me based on the TV and newspaper stories on economics.

So I felt somewhat smug last Friday when I saw an Associated Press story in the Lubbock newspaper that was headlined "Report says salary gap divides U.S."

The story said a report from President Clinton's Commission on the Future of Workers-Management Relations said the American work force is dividing even more distinctly into an upper tier and a burgeoning "underclass of low-paid labor."

The AP article said U.S. Labor Secretary Robert Reich said the report exposed a disturbing trend. "A society divided between the haves and have-nots or between the well-educated and the poorly educated that becomes sharply divided over time cannot be a prosperous or a stable society," said Reich.

Well, how about them apples. And this story was inside the newspaper on the financial pages. I would have put it at the top of Page 1.

And this is the reason why I strongly support health insurance reform. Folks here in the Twin Cities may not see a need for it, but just put it in context of that U.S. report and you will see its need.

Right now, we have about 55 percent of all U.S. workers working for the government. My guess it will be near 60 percent by the year 2000. Something will have to give.

But, as always, I'm optimistic that our government leaders will work at the problem when it gets more obvious to them. That's why I know that health insurance reform will be approved by Congress. And that's why I

* Indictments for misapplication of government funds, including paying non-existent employees.

One of the things I like to do when the thermometer registers above 90 degrees is to curl up in the shade with a good book, and that's just what I did recently.

I read a thriller called, "The President's Man," by Elliott Roosevelt, son of Franklin Delano Roosevelt. It was quite a novel.

In the book, the main character, Blackjack Endicott, is given the assignment of letting powerful gangsters know that Prohibition will end if FDR is elected president, and that threats on his life won't change it.

One footnote to history I learned through this novel is that in 1932 candidates did not actually go to the conventions, they waited at home until they had been notified that they had been nominated. Sometimes acceptance speeches were not given until days or weeks after the convention. FDR broke tradition by showing up at the convention to give an acceptance speech.

It's always fun to read a book by a person who has lived through an exciting era, and who actually knew the people and places he described. There are little nuances that outsiders could never write. Have you ever heard FDR referred to as "Frank"? I hadn't until I read this book.

Elliot was a college student when his father ran for President in 1932. He may have actually heard his father say some of the same sentences that appeared as dia-

log in this fictional account of the events leading up to Roosevelt's nomination.

The novel is filled with speakeasies, gangsters, and politics. It is also filled with some interesting sidelights to history.

Elliot's description of sailing the family yacht along with his wheelchair - bound father and Ms. Rutherford, was quite interesting. So was the description of Elliot's problems flying solo from New York to Chicago in 1932 - airports were not well marked in those days, and airplanes didn't have big gas tanks.

It was also obvious Elliott had not only seen 1932 Packards, LaSalles and Bugattis, but he had also driven them as well.

In 1932, people actually got excited about elections. They stayed up all night listening to radio accounts of the balloting and the ballyhoo of conventions. They were

the biggest shows in town. People felt that they were hearing history being made. The book contained some of this excitement.

But, what was really interesting to me had more to do with what was deleted than what the author added to the book.

No mention was made of Chicago Mayor Anton Cermak, who died in 1933 of gunshot wounds he suffered while standing next to President - elect Roosevelt in Florida. One of the things that made the book a credible tale is the historical fact that Roosevelt's life was actually threatened before he was sworn in as President, yet this incident is not even mentioned in an epilogue.

Others who were not mentioned in the book were the founders of the famous Kelly - Nash Democrat machine which won many, many elections in Illinois for the Democrats.

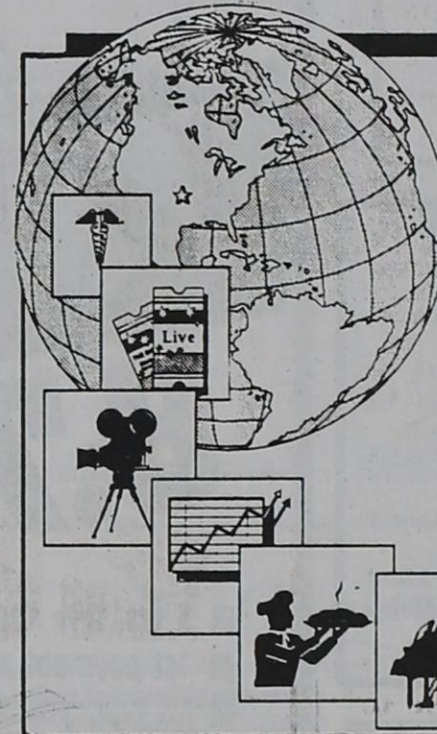

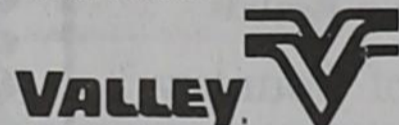

This permit, if approved, will authorize expansion of a Cattle Feedlot and a Feedmill in Bovina, Parmer County, Texas. The location of the existing facility is four miles southwest of Bovina, Texas on U.S. Highway 60. This facility will emit the following air contaminants: odors, particulate matter, and products of combustion from the burning of natural gas (nitrogen oxides, sulphur dioxide, unburned hydrocarbons, and carbon monoxide).

The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the regional office of the TNRCC. Inquiries about the permit application and any information concerning any technical aspect of this application can be obtained by writing Mr. Thomas Weinheimer, TNRCC Office of Air Quality New Source Review Program, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-30897 or the TNRCC Amarillo Regional Office.

You may submit written comments concerning the permit application to the Office of Air Quality, New Source Review Program in Austin. All written comments received within 30 days after the second publication of this notice shall be considered by the Executive Director in determining whether to issue or not issue the permit. All written comments will be made available for public inspection at the TNRCC Central Office in Austin. This notice is to be published on June 3 and June 10, 1994.

Any person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the proposed facility may request the Commission to hold an informal public meeting and/or contested case hearing on the permit application pursuant to Section 382.056(d) of the Texas Health and Safety Code. The Commission is not required to hold a contested case hearing if the basis of a request is determined to be unreasonable. All requests for a contested case hearing must be received in writing within the 30-day comment period regardless of whether an informal public meeting has been held or scheduled on this matter. If you wish to request a public hearing, you must submit your request in writing. You must state (1) your name, mailing address and daytime phone number; (2) the permit number or other recognizable reference to this application; (3) the statement "I/we request a public hearing"; (4) a brief description of how you, or the persons you represent, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application; (5) a description

of the location of your property relative to the applicant's operations; and (6) your proposed adjustment to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for a hearing. Requests for a public hearing on this application should be submitted in writing to Bill Ehret, Assistant Chief Hearings Examiner, Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087, Telephone (512) 305-9087.

Before a permit can be issued for this facility, the applicant must demonstrate that all emission sources are in compliance with all TNRCC air quality Rules and Regulations and all applicable Federal Regulations. This includes the application of "best available control technology" to each new or modified emission source and compliance with all ambient air quality standards.

Parmer ranked 18th in cotton stats

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) the 1994 crop has finally gotten off to a decent start following a series of beneficial rain showers during the month of May.

Current estimates indicate 90 to 95 percent of the acres designated for cotton have been planted and producers are rapidly finishing the job. Some replanting is also being reported because of hail damage that accompanied several of the recent storms.

In general the crop is in good shape and growing well in most areas. A shortage of subsoil moisture continues to loom as a major player in determining how the 1994 crop will fair.

"One of our biggest concerns at this time is the fact that much of the rainfall we have received was not able to penetrate very far into the plants root zone, leaving a dry area between the plant and the deep moisture further down," explains Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President. "For the moment things are looking pretty positive and we are glad to have the opportunity to get off to such a good start."

The delayed start of the 1994 crop was partially caused by the dry conditions left over from 1993's near record crop. The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service (TASS) released final cotton production figures for the 1993 crop June 2.

The 25 PCG counties that make up the High Plains topped the list with the first 11 cotton producing counties. Gaines county once again brought home the title of top producing county with total production of 408,500 bales. Lubbock county was number two with the production of 319,900 bales.

Johnson adds that 1993 was a good crop for producers as well as for other area residents since the farm level value of the crop is expected to total over \$1 billion dollars, most of which goes directly into the area economy.

Final production numbers for the 1993 crop show the 25 county area produced 3,458,800 bales with an average yield of 555 pounds per acre. The TASS figures also show that only 7.75 percent of the acreage originally planted to cotton was lost during the growing season.

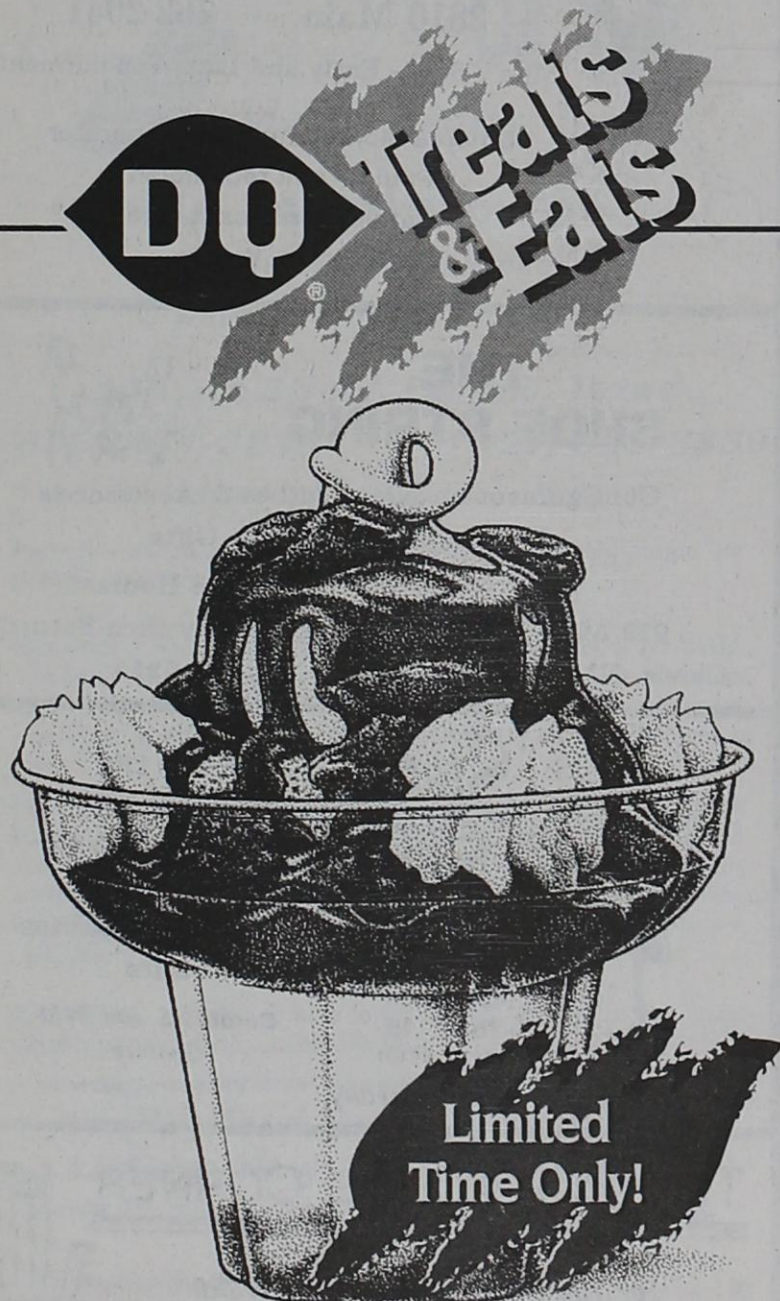
