BTD Merchants' Giveaway starts

at 8:30 a.m., said Henry. Those participating are asked to wear school colors blue and white.


Texico plans band rehearsals

Area police participate in chase

A high-speed car chase, with speeds in excess of 100 miles per hour, occurred in the area last Friday.

The chase started in Lazbuddie and ended near Cook's Truck Stop in Clovis. It included Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams shooting out the two front tires of the suspect's car 5 miles east of Farwell, and the stopping of the vehicle near

Arrested was Christopher Stephans, 20, of Fort Worth, on charges in New Mexico of aggravated assault, evading a police officer, and reckless driving and criminal damage.

Once Stephans is returned to Parmer County, Williams said Texas charges will include aggravated assault on a police officer. And Williams also will ask what Stephans was doing in the Lazbuddie area.

Williams said the incident started at Glen Scott's general store in Lazbuddie where Stephans allegedly caused a

problem after getting some gas and waved a gun. Williams said Stephans has been in a drug rehabilitation problem in the Fort Worth area.

Parmer County Deputy Tracy Bridges tried to stop Stephans east of Bovina. Also involved in the chase was Bovina Police Chief Leon Saddler. Police from Texico, Clovis

and Curry County also were involved. Williams was riding in a police car driven by deputy Gary Blair when he used a shotgun to hit the two front tires of Stephans' GMC Blazer. For awhile, Stephans was driving in the eastbound lanes of the divided highway toward Clovis.

Stephans surrendered without a struggle.

Federal aid for Parmer rejected

Parmer County Judge Bonnie Clayton reported July 7 that the request by the Texas Division of Emergency Management (DEM) for additional federal assistance for 15 counties, including Parmer, has been denied.

Parmer's request was due to the tornado that struck Friona last month.

DEM officials were to meet over the weekend with Gov. Bush to discuss trying a different approach to get federal assistance to counties adversely affected by the late spring weather system that caused extensive damage to infrastructure and private properties.
