The day came when we were being taught to clean our recorders. Mrs. Davis showed us how to beat them against our hand with the mouthpiece off.

I was in the back of the room and wanted to make sure that my recorder was sparkling clean. I beat a little too hard and let go of my recorder.

The world stopped and went into slow motion. I think I even recall the "whoosh - whoosh" sound that the plastic projectile made as it went zipping up toward the chalkboard.

I think Mrs. Davis screamed. The recorder beamed her right smack in the middle of her forehead. A perfect imprint of the air holes swoll up and a clear reading of the word "Deluxe" autographed itself over her right eyebrow.

My P.E. teacher would have been proud of the speed, distance and accuracy of the hit. The class erupted in laughter, ooh's and aah's. Marcus Guy shouted a loud "way to go!"

A stunned and swollen Mrs. Davis sank to her chair and burst into tears. I crawled all over myself trying to get up to her and repeated the phrase "I really didn't mean to..." 600 times.

## Sullivans to be honored

The Border Town Days Committee Monday voted to honor Rick and Carol Sullivan as Honorary Parade Marshals during the annual festivity this year.

The Sullivans will ride in the parade, then be honored with certificates at the park. They were picked due to their outstanding community and church work.

Rev. Sullivan is pastor at the First Baptist Church of Farwell. He has been instrumental in initiating a cowboy outreach program, helping with starting a Spanish mission program, and being a leader in communitywide religious services.

Mrs. Sullivan, the counselor at Farwell High School, is in charge of a successful English as a Second Language program that meets at the church.

In another important development, the committee made a change in its policy involving the concession stands.

At the last meeting, some groups asked that the rule that groups could not offer the same refreshment be lifted.

So the committee voted to have a one-year trial to allow groups to sell any drinks they wanted.

## Texico Booster Club may be restructured

The Texico Booster Club is still in existence, but barely.

A meeting was held Monday night to determine whether the club should continue and it was voted to do so.

But no one stepped forward to take the club presidency at what should have been the meeting for the annual election of officers. Current President Rick Ketterling and vice president L.K. Jones didn't seek re-election.

About 15 parents, teachers and coaches attended. A lengthy discussion was held about the club's future. Fund-raisers during the past year didn't do well (for example, only 35 persons attended the chili supper), and the club is about \$1,000 in the hole. The problem of the community not supporting fund-raisers, especially since Texico is just a "bedroom community" for many, was discussed.

Part of the deficit is due to contracting for sports videos of the Texico High teams during the year. This is the third year it's been done. The first year went over very well, but the current year has seen a big drop in planned purchases of the video by students.

The club will not give plaques to athletes at the high school athletic awards meeting this year. The athletes will receive paper certificates. Also, the refreshments held afterward will be dismissed with.

Coach Michael Littlejohn stressed that no new expenses should be incurred until the current deficit is eliminated.

Toward that end, the club plans to have a concessions booth at Border Town Days this year. They will offer cotton candy, and souvenir license plates, hats and cushions, and may add a raffle.

Some of these items also may be sold at the Texico 4th of July celebration. The TCAO will be contacted about helping with this.

Other suggested fund-raisers were basketball and volleyball tournaments, a turkey shoot and a raffle.

Club members are confident that the debt will be eliminated this summer.

In discussing the club's future, Nancy Barnes, suggested that a restructuring may be needed to get more parent involvement. She pointed out that parents are involved in other school activities. Supt. R.L. Richards also thought this was a good idea.

The Booster Club is an all-school club, supporting youths in all grades and all activities.

## Letter To The Editor

### A fickle partner

Dear Editor,

Mother Nature is proving a fickle partner to High Plains cotton farmers. Several years of mild winters have invited the nation's No. 1 pest to establish a home in an alarming and increasing number of cotton acres. In the past, we've been able to keep the few weevils in check through a diapause program, along with our traditional wicked winters. Today, however we must take matters into our own hands by approving boll weevil eradication. I urge all 20,000-plus of you to join the Boll Weevil Eradication effort by voting yes.

Each year, farmers watch the cost of boll weevil control rise - \$22.5 million last year across the state - and see the pest take a bigger bite out of their cotton production - \$20 million in annual crop losses. But it doesn't have to be that way; the technology is available to eliminate their losses.

Cotton sales generated \$1 billion last year in the High Plains. That money travels through the community in many ways, multiplying its effect as it goes. When farmers make more money, their entire community benefits. What's more, the eradication program will create jobs during the programs' duration.

By approving this measure, an enhanced pre-eradication diapause program will be conducted by Plains Cotton Growers under a cooperative agreement with the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation. In 1998, an actual eradication program is set to come on line.

Of course, there are costs associated with the program. But I believe the benefits outweigh these costs. Without the program, we'll continue to struggle against this devastating pest and see more farmers unable to stay in business. Vote yes for boll weevil eradication.

### Why compacts were signed

Dear Citizens of New Mexico:

Do you really understand what occurred when Governor Gary Johnson signed the Indian Compacts? The number of calls I have received concerning this matter suggest that a large number of you are confused or more than likely misinformed, so let me tell you the rest of the story.

In 1988 the U.S. Congress passed the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act which gave Native American tribes the right to offer gambling on sovereign land. Though many states entered into agreements with the tribes, a few tried unsuccessfully to fight the tribes in court. In fact several federal courts have found in favor of the tribes and ordered states to either enter into compact negotiations with the tribes or have the U.S. Department of Interior negotiate the compacts for them, leaving the states to accept whatever the federal government had negotiated.

Seven years passed and New Mexico still hadn't come to any kind of an agreement with the Indians. In fact, six lawsuits were pending against the State of New Mexico, not to mention two other lawsuits which the state had already lost at a cost to the citizens of a half million dollars. The Johnson/Bradley Administration decided it was time to make a decision. Since the past administration wouldn't sign an agreement, we felt it was time, thus Governor Johnson negotiated and entered into two types of agreements - the "compacts" and the "Revenue Sharing Agreements." When Governor Johnson signed the compacts, four important things took place:

First, the lawsuits should be dropped, thus saving New Mexicans hundreds of thousands of dollars which would likely be spent in court on a losing battle.

Second, by entering into these agreements, Governor Johnson has protected every New Mexican's right to continue their current legal gaming operations and the New Mexico Legislature's right to pursue whatever course it decides in dealing with the gambling issue. Now it is as it should be, up to the citizens of New Mexico, working with the legislature and the Governor to decide if they want more or less gambling on New Mexico land.

The third important point is that by signing the compacts there will now be regulations and controls in place. The

compacts identify the type of gambling to be allowed and set strict standards for the maintenance, liability insurance, and operation of all gambling facilities and equipment.

Fourth, the "Revenue Sharing Agreements" guarantee the state a portion of the profits from Indian gambling while at the same time protecting New Mexico's fraternal and charitable organizations and the horse racing industry. The revenue sharing is something extra New Mexicans received because the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act states that the Governor cannot withhold his signature on compacts for the lack of revenue sharing agreement. The State of New Mexico could have ended up with nothing.

The reality is Native American gambling is here to stay unless the U.S. Congress repeals the 1988 Indian Gaming Regulatory Act. With the signing of the compact agreements, Governor Johnson has protected all non-Native American New Mexicans' right to decide their own destiny while at the same time giving us a "Win-Win" opportunity.
