It's time for the 40th Border Town Days! The 40th annual Border Town Days celebration kicks off the parade, which proceeds down the highway Texico and Farwell Chambers of Commerce, and the

off Saturday and it promises to be another superb family event for the Twin Cities of Farwell and Texico.

The day begins with the decorated bicycle contest at 10 a.m. (all times in this article are cdt – Texas time). It will be held adjacent to the Texico branch of the Citizens Bank on Anderson Street.

The deadline for entering this contest is Friday, July 28, at noon. You need to sign up at the State Line Tribune office, 404 3rd St., Farwell. The theme is "Real Heroes," such as nurses, teachers, firemen, policemen, etc.

Cash prizes will be awarded to the top placers, and the grand champions (a boy and a girl) will receive brand-new bicycles, courtesy of Master Tech Auto Service and Tedson Trailers, both of Texico.

Linda Moss and Joy Stanton are in charge of this contest.

The bicycle contest judging starts promptly with three judges from Clovis, picked by the Clovis Chamber of Commerce, serving in that capacity.

At 11 a.m., the Big Parade kicks off from Griffin Street in Texico. A map showing where participants need to line up is elsewhere in today's Tribune.

This year's parade again will feature a large contingent of antique tractors and cool cars.

Parade Marshal Hal Helton will be assisted by Lupe Loera and Ruth Anne Bennett in lining up the entries. Participants are urged to be at the parade start at least half an hour early.

Because the highway will be closed during the parade, Hereford Street will be used as a bypass for traffic moving through the area. Hereford Street residents are asked not to park their vehicles on that street while the parade is held. The Border Town Days Committee appreciates your help.

Texico Police John Mares will give the signal to kick

(closed to traffic both ways). The parade goes to 5th Street in Farwell, turning south past the Farwell Convalescent Center, and ending at the Farwell City

Helping out in this area will be Ann Cooper, who will be stationed at the railroad crossing, and J'Dan Sudderth, who will be at the end point of the parade to direct participants where to park.

After the parade, which normally takes about 40 minutes, folks will congregate at the Farwell City Park for a large variety of food and entertainment, highlighted by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club barbecue. Walter Hughes & Co. is in charge of the barbecue, which is known for its delectability throughout the area. The BBQ opens immediately after the parade.

Also at noon, the Merchants Giveaway will start. Thirty merchants are participating in giving away goodies to folks who have signed up at their businesses. Debbie Parmer and DeeDee Pomper are in charge of this

Announcements of winners will be made by master of ceremonies Fred Chandler periodically, until the giveaways end. Folks will have a few minutes to get to the gazebo to collect their winnings - or new names will be called.

The opening ceremony starts at 12:30 p.m. at the gazebo with Susan White singing the National Anthem. Then the Twin Cities mayors will give their tradition welcome, after which Honorary Parade Marshals Frances Kube, Liz Kaltwasser, Carrie Anderson and Mary Mesman will be honored for their longtime volunteer work with the Farwell Convalescent Center.

Contest winners will be announced and cash prizes handed out. Providing funds for these awards were Security State Bank, the Texico branch of Citizens Bank, the Farwell Banking Center of Muleshoe State Bank, the

anonymous donor.

-- Senior citizens are invited to park their vehicles in the parking lot at the Hamlin Memorial United Methodist church on 5th Street to watch the parade.


-- An area for handicapped parking is located in back of the county courthouse at is south side (4th Street). Ramps have been added to the park for persons in wheelchairs.

Trey Ellis recalls county's dangerous situations

One would assume that in the small Panhandle towns of Friona (pop. 4,000) and Hereford (pop. 16,000), both over 70 miles from any freeways, there would not be much violent lawbreaking or excitement. Wrong assumption, according to Trooper Frank "Trey" Ellis. He's been a highway patrolman in the area for 22 years. The years have included danger and grief.

In one sad incident, a city police officer in Friona, Trey's hometown, was killed in a highway chase. He was Trey's good friend, and it brought much grief to

In 1987, a county deputy investigating a family disturbance was met with gunfire. He called for "back-up." Trey and his partner Richard Diegelman (now Captain Diegelman, Amarillo) responded.

An angry bad guy had barricaded himself in a shed and was firing at the deputy. The deputy, Trey and his partners and several other troopers tried to "talk him out." He came out shooting, troopers returned fire and two shots killed the man. It is a tough memory for Trey.

In yet another year, DPS Trooper Steve Boothe was shot and killed at a Panhandle highway stop by an offender who wrestled the trooper's handgun from him and used it on him. Trey knew this young trooper. Officers caught up with the killer in nearby Stratford that same day and arrested him. Afterwards, Trey joined over 30 other troopers in searching for Steve's weapon, walking arm and arm in bar ditches. After a three-day search, they found it.

One day, a fellow highway patrol trooper, "Izzy" Carrazco stopped a driver for a seat belt violation. He discovered drugs and \$2.65 million in cash. The offender was headed for Chicago.

Trooper Carasco called Trey and asked, "Have you ever seen a million dollars in cash?" Trey arrived and looked, with other officers. The group spent all night counting \$2.65 million in cash.

Then there was a Friona hostage situation where in a Baptist ministry, his wife and daughter were all taken hostages. Trey was involved, along with other troopers. They were fired upon. A DPS SWAT team from Austin arrived upon the scene. As the SWAT team made entry into the hostage area, the bad guy also fired on them. A SWAT sniper got the man.

Only five months ago, Trey's fellow officer Matt Myrick



He recalls heart-rending moments at the Myrick funeral for the large contingent of Panhandle troops. The five-mile long procession, he says, contained 75 DPS patrol cars and eight motorcycles from the New Mexico State Police. Community schools let out and school children lined the roads, holding posters that said, "God Bless you, trooper." There were no dry eyes among us," Trey says.

Gunfire and grief: veteran Trooper Ellis has experienced them both heavily.

Trey was born in Plainview, but grew up in Muleshoe. There his father, Frank Ellis, owned and operated a funeral home. Trey helped him. In his early teens and 20s, he attended West Texas State A&M at Canyon where he studied Animal Science. He worked for the Ellis Funeral Home.

During these days, he married to Tracy Cowan of Muleshoe, and managed his father's ambulance service, where he became acquainted with several DPS highway patrol troopers. His admiration and respect for them was a career-changing thing. He applied with DPS and became a trooper in October, 1984. Trey was 31. He was assigned to the highway patrol and sent back to his home "turf" - Hereford and Friona. Happily, he has been there his entire DPS career, residing in Friona.

He has occasionally been sent to DPS/Austin as an instructor for recruits. This has included both firearms and driving training. Trey and his wife Tracy have two grown children; Son, Quint, and daughter, Whitney. Quint attended TCU on a football scholarship and is now in Ft. Worth in sales. Whiney is a graduate of Texas Tech and works for the city of Ft. Worth.

What changes has Trey seen over his 22 years HP/Panhandle service? "It's a 'suitcase society' today and more dangerous. More people traveling, more drugs being carried and less courtesy on the road. Some highway offenders are quick to say, "I'll get my lawyer and sue you."

"But I still vote for Panhandle people as the world's best. They still respect our DPS uniform."

Concerning today's troops. Trey offered these thoughts. "With retirement and other factors having taken so many of our veteran troopers, the age is much younger today. Often, we have the young teaching the young. But the young troopers are smart, computer literate and teachable. I also notice that the young ones do not prefer to live in small towns."

Trey concluded his observations with, "I'm the 'old man' out here."

After all the years involving danger and sadness, Trey says he still likes his DPS job - likes working out of Hereford, in Deaf Smith County. "I like the people I work with," he says. "And I have a great wife who makes my life complete. Tracy is my best friend."

Does this veteran have any advice for rookies and other young officers? "Don't be afraid to ask questions."



The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday lifted the county's burn ban, effective immediately.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Received the annual audit from Kirkland, Kirkland PCA, and the report showed the county's fund balance to be in outstanding shape.

The audit for 2005 showed a net increase in the fund balance of \$589,270. Thus, the end of the year fund balance for the county was more than \$5 million. County Judge Bonnie Heald said this shows that county offices didn't spend as much as was budgeted.

The assets of Parmer County exceeded its liabilities by \$7,283,863. The county's net assets increased by \$1,240,350 during 2005.

Parmer County's unemployment rate for 2005 was 4.2 percent, compared to the statewide average of 5.3 per-

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





High Plains cotton production to be lower

From Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Following the passage of the USDA Farm Service Agency's 2006 acreage certification date, it appears that a little more than 900,000 acres of cotton have already been reported as failed across the High Plains region. While still preliminary in nature, the estimate of failed acres clearly illustrates the seriousness of the 2006 Texas High Plains cotton crop situation.

While it is clear that High Plains cotton production will be significantly lower in 2006, nobody is really sure whether it is the dryland producer, with little or no crop left, or the irrigated producer, trying to cope with escalating energy expenses, that is getting the shorter end of the stick when comparing situations.

On one side of the spectrum are dryland producers that have already failed about half of the area's dryland acreage and have a big part of their remaining acres approaching the breaking point.

On the other side are irrigated producers, some of whom seem to have a pretty good crop growing, that have been spared from weather-related losses, but are having to spend significant amounts of money on irrigation as energy costs continue an upward spiral.

Most of the acreage lost to date has been from the non-irrigated side of the ledger and things aren't getting any better as rainfall continues to snub the area. Without a significant moisture infusion over the next two to three weeks the area's abandonment total could climb even higher when federal crop insurance rules allow producers to begin receiving adjustments based on actual boll counts instead of the early season stand count methodology.

The total acreage estimated as failed to date reflects an abandonment percentage that has already eclipsed the area's chin in 2006 from a devastating combination of drought and high-energy costs.

Temperature break forecast

From Monti Vandiver, Parmer County extension agent-

Hot dry conditions continue to dominate the Northwest Plains climatic conditions.

Forecasters are predicting a break in temperatures and chances of scattered showers. High temperatures have recently remained near 100 and lows in the mid-

As a result, heat unit accumulation is progressing rapidly. Crop moisture requirements continue to be very high, most corn has reached peak water use and will begin to decline in the next week or so.

Cotton on the other hand, will reach maximum water use at peak bloom, typically 90 days after planting. Most cotton has began to bloom. Currently the condition of most area crops has a direct correlation to the amount of irrigation applied.

Dryland crops are, on a whole, very poor to non-existent, being in the 30-40% range.

He recruited family members and friends as the cooking staff that included his aunt Alma Lingnau, mother-in-law Anna Janhsen, his wife Mary, and ladies from his church like Marie Kriegel and Esther Sachs. During this time, his own children began their camping years.

Kalbas's experience with the local camping program was a step to a seat with the state-level camping **Board Directors for the Lutheran** Church. He served many vears with Lutheran **Outdoor Ministries of** Texas that supports campina ministries over the entire state.

The local camp board saw a decline in attendance at Ceta Glen in the late 1980's and the program was suspended for a year. Kalbas was part of

its revitalization. He currently sits on the Board of Directors of PSPLCA with his daughter, Sharon May.

AGP Farwell expands operations

The recent AGP News, the newsletter for AGP Grain, was headlined with "AGP on track for successful fiscal '06."

With the close of fiscal year 2006 a little more than two months away, AGP's earnings from continuing operations are projected to be \$62.9 million. Highlights included record crush, vegetable oil refining, and methyl ester production.

In the main article, it was noted:

"AGP Grain is exploring opportunities to capitalize on the growing dairy industry in the Texas Panhandle.

"AGP operates several elevators in the area, supplying feed grains for the feedlot market and handling local wheat and sorghum.

"To serve the rapid expansion in dairy cows, dry roll capability for corn was added at the Farwell location. The Grain Group is also looking at the viability of adding flaking capability to its operations."

AGP's Farwell manager Fritz Friemel said the dry roll capability was added earlier this year at the old Worley Mills elevator. He said they are processing about 30 loads a week of ground processed corn and it's growing. He may need to go to two shifts in a few months.

Bovina was a great town to grow up in, a great town to raise my kids in, and most of all, a great town to teach in."

Mrs. Sudderth moved to Bovina when she was 5 years old and graduated high school in '56. She received her college degree at West Texas State in '59.

"I have actually been teaching for 45 years," said Janie, "but I spent my first year teaching freshman **English at Muleshoe High School.**"

It wasn't until 1961 that she started teaching at Bovina. "'61 was a good year as me and my husband Glenden had our first child, Daryl Ray, that year as well. We had our second son, Blake, in '62 and our last son, Scott in '71."


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Texico students offer community improvement suggestions

Pleasant Hill Baptist Church nears its 100th anniversary

The 100th year anniversary for the Pleasant Hill **Baptist Church is coming** up in January, and there's a lot of history there.

With a combined total of 138 active years in the church, Troy and Nell Lovett have made history, gained faith, and earned respect in both the community and in each other. In fact, Troy and Nell continue to carry on a successful marriage of 66 years and are still active in the church today.

Troy's family came to homestead here in 1904, but it wasn't until 1920 that Troy Lovett was brought into the world.

"I was raised in the Pleasant Hill church with 12 brothers and sisters." said Troy. "I recall spending my first revival service at 2 years old on a quilt ... asleep through the entire long untimed service. Church was like a second home for me."

Right around the corner came 1922, the year when his future sweetheart, Nell, entered the world. She was raised a Ranchvale girl and met Troy during high school at a basketball game.

"It was Ranchvale vs. Pleasant Hill," said Troy. "And I played on the junior boys' Pleasant Hill team."

After the game, Troy and some guys went looking for girls. "The first girl I sat by moved," recalled, "but then Nell came over and sat by me." "It was love at first sight," Nell added.

"Our second date was spent watching 'Tale of Two Cities," said Nell. "However, I do not know how much of the movie I actually saw. My mind was on something else."

During high school, many great memories where made for Troy and Nell, but the most important event happened in 1933. At the age of 13, Troy was saved and then baptized a mile from the church at Running Water Draw.

"Afterwards I prayed all night for Nell," said Troy, "and then she was saved and baptized in a dirt tank that same year."

The couple has been very active in their faith. At age 14, Troy and Nell had their first church date. One day, Troy even let the preacher's wife ride in his racecar. Troy drove a Model T, built by him and

his brother Roy.

Troy had worked at the filling station with is brothers starting at the age of 10, but his first job after marriage was running a dairy. "My fondest memory of the dairy," Troy mentioned, "was when the truck lights would shine in our windows at 3 in the morning to get our milk. It was our permanent alarm clock."

Troy stopped working at the dairy when they stopped collecting his milk, so he started to farm. A friend loaned Troy enough money to start up a farm and at one time he had 1,700 acres. Farming was good for Troy; he stayed in the business until just a few years ago at the age of 82. He still owns the farm and lives on it, but now his land is leased out.

It wasn't long before Troy and Nell's family grew, and they had three girls. Oldest daughter

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A bit of history from the Texico-Farwell News

Famous Postal Highway comes to Parmer County

(Editor's note: This article is part of a continuing series featuring issues of the Texico-Farwell News, published between 1917 and 1920. The issues were discovered a couple of years ago in the basement of the Ruby's Antiques building in Texico.)

Page 1 of the Oct. 18, 1918, issue noted that Clovis needed help in fighting the flu.

"The doctors are worn out and need help" after several deaths due to the Spanish influenza, which was striking the U.S.

Drs. Foote and Presley went to help and Dr. McCuan also came to lend aid.

"The business houses are closed except for an hour or so early in the morning and late in the evening, enabling merchants to help in nursing the sick."

Another article said Parmer County had completed the markings of the Famous Postal Highway through the

These posts are set in concrete one mile apart, giving bearings and distances to both towns on either side of each post, making it impossible for one traveling to lose

This postal highway traversed Tennessee, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico.

Work on the new Texico-Farwell exchange of the Mountain States Telephone Cxo. was nearing completion. Mrs. May Evett was exchange manager. Operators were Mrs. M.E. White and Mrs. Chelsea Davis.

Another article was headlined "The Old Court House Burned." This story noted:

Farwell has camouflaged three buildings for Court Houses before building the beautiful structure that the county now keeps house in. And one of these used last went up in flames Sunday night. This was the second of the number.

The building was used for an office by Dr. McCuan and the Hines Abstract Co., and was the property of J.H.

The fire started in the doctor's officer and was thought to have originated by explostion of some chemicals as Dr. McCuan had a well stocked laboratory.






The ad said assets included:


