## BTD planning gets under way

The Border Town Days Committee held its opening meeting of the year Monday night. Planning for the 29th annual BTD, always held the last Saturday in July, is now under way.

This year's theme will be "On the Road - Ways of Travel." Officers were elected: Mike Pomper, president; Maurine Caywood, vice president, and Ann Cooper, secretary - treasurer.

Committee assignments were made:

- \* Arts and crafts - Lynne Mahaney.
- \* Concessions - Cynthia Thigpen.
- \* Bicycle contest - Linda Moss.
- \* Parade - Leigh Ann Woods.
- \* Buttons - Rick Sullivan.
- \* Merchants Giveaway - Ron Kilgore and Willie Dannheim.

Pomper announced that Susan Scioli had resigned as chairperson for the queen's contest. He thanked Mrs. Scioli and her committee for doing an outstanding job last year. A new contest chairperson will be sought.

Once again, the BTD committee will sell buttons as its chief fund-raiser. Last year, the profit on its button sales was \$426.61, compared to \$434.26 the previous year. Also, the arts and crafts show gave a profit of \$505.54.

Because the committee is in good financial shape, the amount of scholarship money given to the queen's contest winner was increased from \$300 to \$350.

Mrs. Cooper gave a detailed financial report, which was accepted. The report is open to the public. Persons interested in seeing it should contact Pomper at the State Line Tribune during regular business hours.

Basically, this year's starting balance is down about \$20 from where last year's starting balance was. Border

Town Days is non-profit and it is the committee's goal to come as close to "zero" as possible each year. The BTD savings account shows \$2,468.71. The committee's by-laws mandate it keep \$2,000 for emergencies.

In addition, there are four separate savings accounts for winners of the recent queen's contests. These ladies receive their cash winnings if they enroll in an institution of higher learning within three years of high school graduation.

Other meeting highlights included:

- Pomper reported that the Society for Creative Anachronism, a group that puts on medieval armour, will perform at BTD this year. The area group has about 20 members. They will be in the parade and also put on a half-hour show at the Day in the Park activities. They will receive free barbeque tickets as a "thank you" from the BTD committee.

Since the "Billy the Kid" play at San Jon was cancelled this year, this popular group of performers will not be at BTD. They have been coming to BTD every year that the plays have been held.

- The group discussed whether the dirt areas under the trees in Farwell City Park, near the gazebo, could be improved. Pomper was authorized to attend the next Farwell City Council meeting to discuss this. He also was authorized to contribute some BTD funds toward any improvements. And Pomper was asked to talk with Mack Heald, of High Plains Pest Control, about this.

- Frances Kube reported that the ever-popular Charlie Phillips of "Sugartime" fame would give his annual fund-raiser for the Farwell Convalescent Center at the Clovis Holiday Inn July 29. It will be held at night after BTD is over.

- Mrs. Cooper said some folks had requested that a place to watch the parade be set aside for senior citizens and handicapped persons. The parking lot of the Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church was suggested. Pomper will talk with Rev. Carl Treat about this.

- Mrs. Cooper also said the Caywood family reunion will be held at BTD this year. About 100 persons will arrive.

- A discussion on rules involving what concessions groups could offer was held. Current policy is for groups to offer different items, but not the same one. For example, "Cokes" would be offered at one booth only.

Since many commodities sell out, it was suggested that this policy be changed and groups could sell whatever they wished to.

The matter was tabled until the May meeting.

- The next BTD committee meeting will be May 1 at 7:30 p.m. at the Spur Restaurant.

### Chamber banquet on tap

There's been a change in the speaker for the Farwell Chamber of Commerce annual banquet.

The banquet will be Saturday at 7 p.m. at the Farwell Community Center. Tickets cost \$10 in advance or \$15 at the door. Tickets are available from Chamber members.

The scheduled speaker, the curator of Texas Tech museum, cancelled out Tuesday because of an illness in the family.

In his place will be Kimberly Batty-Herbert, a speech and communications instructor at Clovis Community College. She will discuss the importance of communications in a small town.

Hors d'oeuvres will be served starting at 6:30 p.m. by Beta Sigma Phi sorority. The sorority also will be honored by the Chamber this year. Each year, a different community group is recognized.

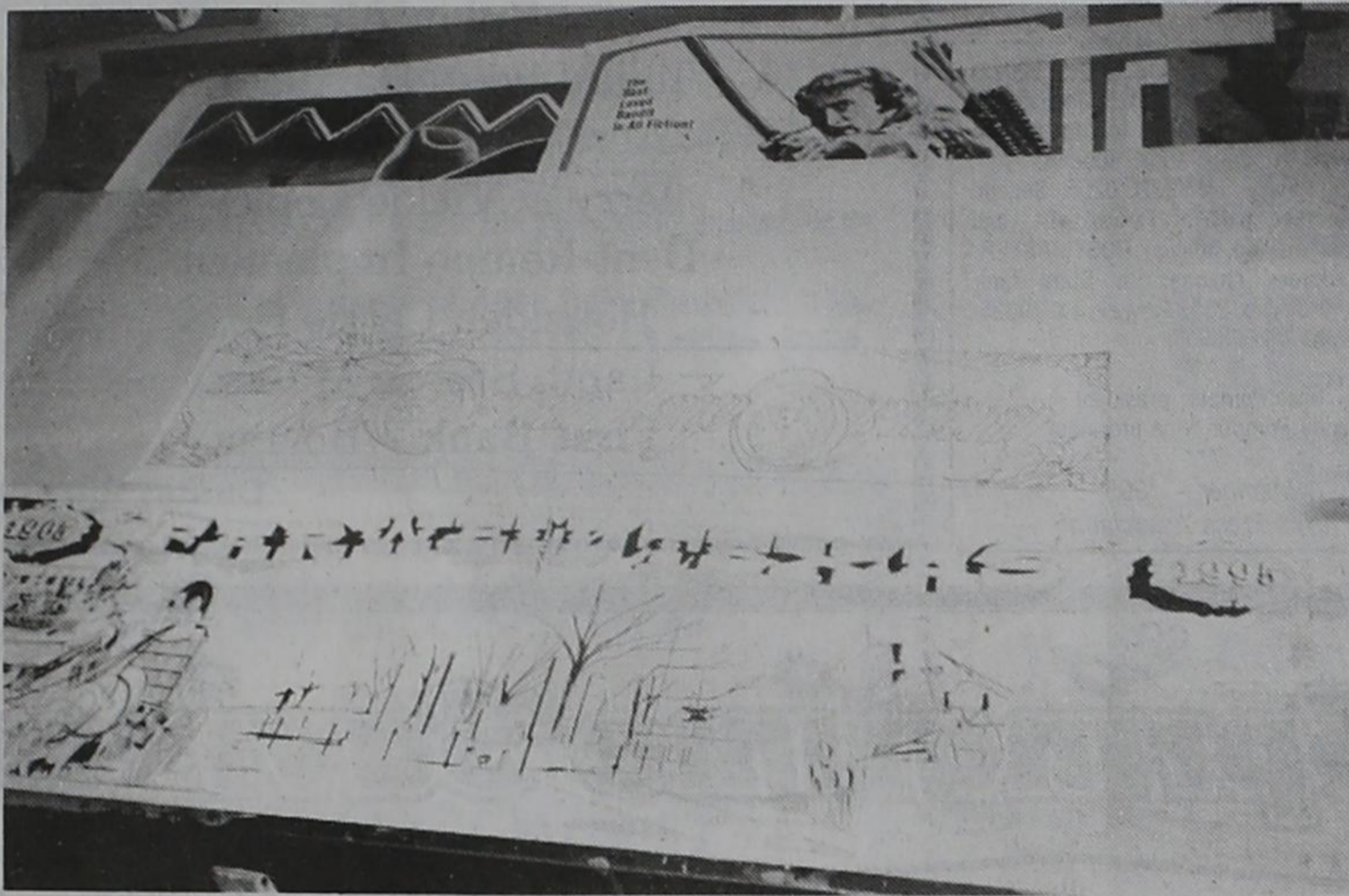
So you haven't heard much about the Cavs. Instead, the Chicago Bulls, led by a fellow named Jordan, three-peated.

He was born in 1927 in LaCenter, Kentucky of Irish, German and yes, Cherokee Indian descent. This combination makes for a very interesting, if not, diverse personality.

As a child in school, Cherokee showed all the signs of being an artist.

"I was always doodling and drawing," he explained. "I

He died March 30 at Clovis hospital.

Surviving are his wife; a son, Richard, of Pleasant Hill; a daughter, Patricia Moreno, of Clovis; 8 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by a son, Richard Jr., in 1945.

Honorary bearers were members of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, friends and neighbors.

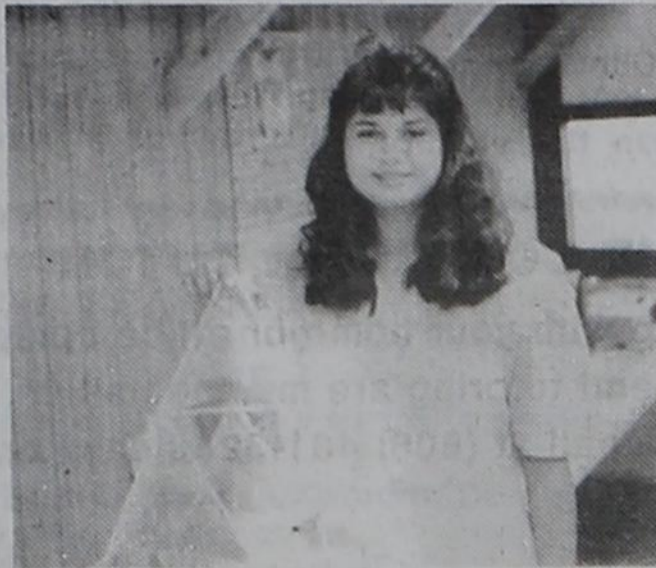

never really paid much attention to the teacher. I was just always sketching something out on my desk or in my books. And, I got through school and out of classes by providing the teachers and classes with great masterpieces of art, like on the chalkboards during holidays! I was doing murals back in the 6th grade already!"

He never had any formal training or special art classes when he was a kid.

"No one ever really thought about art back in Kentucky in those days," he stated.

He grew up and served in the Special Services for the United States Army Air Force from 1945 to 1947 as a commercial artist. He then worked in Chicago from 1954 to 1958 and then moved to Tucumcari, NM in 1959. He continued his artwork and then moved to Phoenix. He remained there until the mid 1960's. He had to come to Clovis in October of 1964 and has stayed there ever since.

He has done artwork for various companies and organizations all over the United States from his studio in Clovis. If you've ever driven down the 500 block of Connelly Street, you've no doubt seen his studio. The yard and the house are surrounded by bits and pieces of "works in progress" or projects in transition.

Cherokee has done just a little bit of everything involved in painting. He paints billboards, signs and sides of buildings. He creates logos for companies and has his signature on some of the finest movie poster design work in the area. But his true love in the art world is in painting portraits. He has a storeroom full of portraits that he has painted for government figures, presidents, and western cowboys.

In 1987, he combined his love of portrait painting and his movie poster work into the type of artwork that has become his specialty. He was raised watching all the great Western Cowboy stars in the movies, so he decided to pay tribute to them by immortalizing them in his artwork.

Cherokee researched all the stars and started with the very first movie cowboy, Bronco Billy Anderson. The rest is history...and show biz!

Kit Parker Films, a movie studio in California, saw some of his work and contacted Cherokee about doing a movie poster for a western film they were working on. They also had him design and do the artwork for a film catalog that they put out.

From this point on, Cherokee started making the film circuit.

"Me and the Lord started going to all the film festivals that we could," he stated. "I always refer to myself as "We" because the Lord is always with me and is a major

part of my talent and success."

Cherokee started painting major western movie posters and cutouts of the famous stars of the classic westerns. You can see an example of his work currently being stored and displayed at High Plains Furniture on Mitchell Street in Clovis.

Cherokee was contacted by the Farwell City Council back in 1986 through the recommendation of Jerry Dee Owen to design and paint the Texas Sesquicentennial Mural that was going to be put up outside of City Hall.

The mural he came up with was a car stopper! However, the theme of the mural had become outdated, so the City Council re-commissioned Cherokee to recreate another mural depicting Farwell and it's history.

This is what brought him to the park that day.

"I didn't even really know about the Veteran's Memorial, until I was driving around Farwell trying to look for ideas and to research the XIT Ranch. I was driving by the park and decided to stop and write some notes down. I was sitting in my car and hadn't even noticed the Memorial," he explained.

"I looked up and saw the Memorial and was drawn from my car to it. The minute I sat down and looked at it, the idea for the mural took hold of me," he said.

And Cherokee's artwork will take hold of you, as well. He has a talent for drawing the viewer into the picture, almost like he had painted you into the scene.

The mural is now completed and is awaiting installation by the City of Farwell. I was very honored to have seen this masterpiece in progress, basically from start to finish. I got to see the sketches he made at the park that day and I've gotten to know the artist.

Cherokee is a simple man, and perhaps what one would even call an eccentric. But, as an artist, he can show the world the beauty of and the best of what this small town of ours has to offer...and that makes him pretty special.

**By-laws' changes rejected**

Some of the recent controversy over suggested by-laws changes by state Rep. Wesley Grau surfaced at Saturday's annual meeting of the Eastern New Mexico Rural Telephone Cooperative at Fort Sumner. The suggested changes were voted down.

More than 500 co-op members attended the meeting which also saw the unanimous re-election of four incumbent board members: Gilbert Ortiz, Shafie Hindi, Bill Freeman and Gilbert Gutierrez.

Farwell and Pleasant Hill are represented by Kenny Wilhite, whose board post wasn't on the ballot this year.

The proposal to no longer allow ENMR employees who live outside the service area to still vote lost 242-224.

A suggestion to allow voting for directors by mail lost 257-224.

A proposal to reduce the quorum requirement from 2 percent to 1 percent of the total membership lost 379-74.

A suggestion involving more rapid payment of capital credits to members lost, 366-86.

And a proposal that directors be elected only by members living in those districts lost, 314-143.

A couple of ideas were tabled: 1) to provide a toll-free calling to all areas served by ENMR and to county seats of those counties served by ENMR, and 2) to have the board mail a quarterly itemized accounting of all expenses by ENMR to all members.

Also, the ENMR Education Foundation announced that 13 high school seniors from the ENMR service area were awarded scholarships. None were from Farwell High this year.
