They answered the call...

Earlier this year, the Tribune received a request from Donald Norton, of Fort Worth, for background information on three U.S. Marines from Parmer County who were killed in combat during World War II.

We sent him information which he combined with other research he was doing in order to write sketches of the three Marines. Those sketches are appearing on Page 1 of today's paper.

Donald Norton is a cousin of Gerald Norton, of Farwell. He was raised in Parmer County when his folks farmed near Bovina. He is now a retired middle school principal.

Norton writes:

"Sometime ago, I became interested in the military history of World War II, especially the Island campaigns in the Pacific Theater of Operations. I especially became interested in the Guadalcanal - Solomon Islands, Eniwetok Marshall Islands, and the Peleliu - Palau Islands battles.

"I focused on the fighting in each of these campaigns where three U.S. Marines from Parmer County were killed in combat.

"I am extremely humble and proud to have been a part of their generation and to have honorably served in the U.S. Navy during this time. Sometime ago, one of my former students paid me a very nice compliment when he said that he considered me to be one of his heroes.

"As I think back on why my heroes were, the words from a stanza of 'America the Beautiful' and from a book of the Old Testament, Ecclesiasticus 44:10, 14, come to mind:

*Oh beautiful for heroes proved
In liberating strife,
Who more than self their country
loved, and mercy more than life...*

These were men of mercy whose godly deeds have not failed.

Their bodies are buried in peace and their names will live from generation to generations.

"I think of the millions of men and women of my generation who so unselfishly and patriotically answered their country's call to service in time of war, but I especially think of Arthur Thomas Parker, Leonard Macysl Roberts and Everitt Louis Gee.

"I knew them personally and had been associated with them at various times. I felt a deep personal loss upon learning of their deaths. Parker was a cousin. Gee was a classmate. And Roberts was a classmate of my sister. "May their souls and those of the thousands of others who died for their country then and in later wars rest in peace."

Parmer County veterans recalled

Arthur Thomas Parker

Arthur Thomas Parker was born to Willis M. and Clara Norton Parker on Armistice Day, Nov. 11, 1923, at Farwell. He attended Farwell Schools, graduating in May 1941. In the fall of 1941, he enrolled at Schreiner Institute, Kerrville, Texas.

On Feb. 12, 1942, Parker enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps in Los Angeles. He was assigned to the U.S. Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, for recruit training. On April 4, 1942, he was transferred to Company D, 1st Battalion, 6th Regiment, Fleet Marine Force, for further training.

On May 8, 1942, he was transferred to Company A, 1st Battalion, 6th Regiment, Second Marine Division. The 2nd, 6th and 9th Infantry Regiments, along with part of the 10th Artillery Regiment, were organized into combat teams for amphibious training.

In June, 1942, elements of the Second Marine Division began debarking from San Diego for the South Pacific. Elements of the Second Marine Division were sent to New Zealand for further training and some were garrisoned in Samoa. The 2nd, 8th and part of the 10th Regiments landed on D-Day at Guadalcanal, British Solomon Islands. It would not be until January 1943 that the Second Marine Division would be united as a fighting force.

The 6th Regiment arrived on Guadalcanal on Jan. 6, 1943, to begin its part in the final push to drive the remaining elements of the Japanese 8th Area Army under General Myakutake off Guadalcanal. On Jan. 13, the 6th Regiment came to grips with the enemy, passing through the 2nd and 8th Regiments to relieve on a new line. In the three days following the Jan. 15 attack, the 6th Regiment made steady progress.

On Jan. 18, the 6th Regiment's battalions were united and relieved the 8th Regiment which had completed its mission. In the next week, the Japanese made their last well organized stand on Guadalcanal. They were attacked and driven back by the 6th Marine Regiment which was joined by the 147th and 182nd Army Infantry Regiments. A new unit came into being, a composite Army-Marine

Center plans presented

The upcoming construction of the Texico Community Center was discussed at Tuesday's City Council meeting.

Lewis Cooper had been asked to report back to the council on where the center should be placed on the large lot just east of KKR Park. The city had purchased this site two years ago.

The council accepted Cooper's recommendation to place the community center near the southern edge of the property, with parking to the west and north of it.

Cooper also presented the architect's plans for the center. Along with this discussion, the council held a preliminary talk on what to do with the current city hall complex on the highway - the community center, City Hall and the senior citizens' center.

A new senior citizens' center will be part of the new community center. Thus, two of the three parts of the city hall complex will be open. And city officials look to move city hall offices to the community center location down the road.

What spurred the discussion was the fact that the city barn is in bad shape and the council needs a new site for its equipment, backhoe, etc.

Mayor Butch Tharp threw out some ideas, such as using the old community center as a shop building and moving some of the city hall offices into the current senior citizens' center.

City water Supt. Matt Meeks presented rough figures on buying a new metal building to be used as a city barn. A 30'x60' building would cost about \$23,000 or more (roughly) and it would be \$30,000 or more for a 40'x60' building (roughly).

Noting the cost of renovating the current city hall site into a city barn, councilman Oran Jay Autrey noted that, in the long run, it's often cheaper to buy a new building than renovate an old one.

No decisions were made.

In other business, the council:

- Said folks can now purchase lots in the new portion of the cemetery. Lots on the west side of the cemetery will be sold first.

- Will apply for funds from the State Highway Rubberized Asphalt Fund for help with street projects.

- Agreed to terminate its lease with the Santa Fe Railroad for the old well property.

- Agreed to let the state pick an auditor for the city. The state is very picky on how auditors are chosen and it's a lot

An Essentials Class will begin very soon. As a part of this class, there will be classroom instruction as well as several nights of practicals. All participants will need to bring their gear.

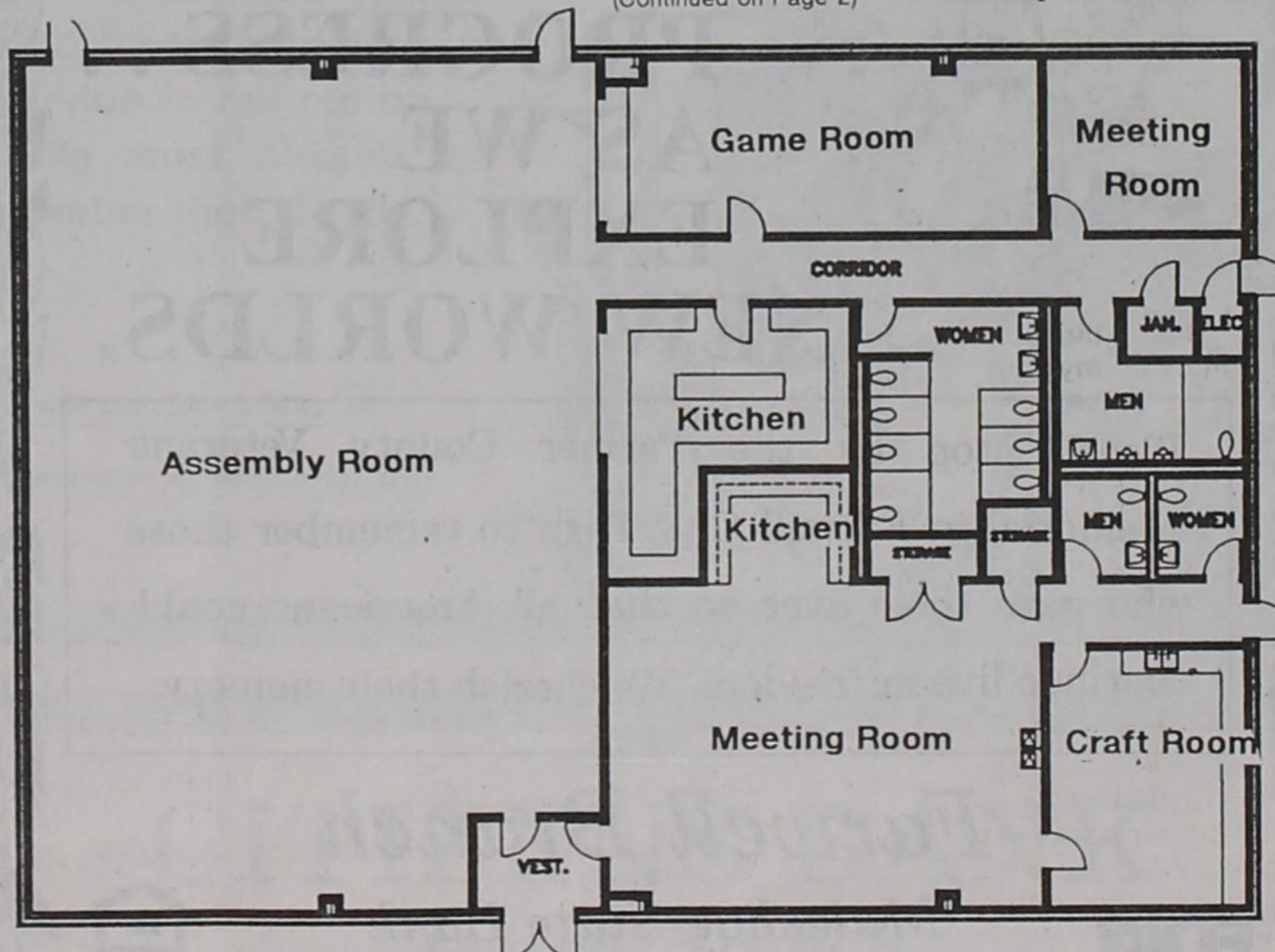
All classes will be held at the Clovis Fire Department.

easier for the city just to let the state pick one.

- Agreed to close South Anderson Street the morning of Border Town Days. This is where the decorated bicycle contest is held.
- Heard City Marshal Gil Holguin report he is checking on what additional school speed zone signs are needed.
- Gave Craig Chumley two weeks to have his "curb cut" get into city compliance.
- Voted to stay a member of Eastern Plains Council of Governments, for \$482 a year.
- Approved the tentative budget for 1995-96, which will be sent to Santa Fe for final approval.
- Heard a request from Vonnie McIntosh that a neighbor's mobile home be checked to make sure it meets city codes. Sharp said if it isn't in compliance, it will be red-tagged. He said Holguin and Meeks will check it out.
- Agreed to seek bids for painting and cleaning at the cemetery. The 4-H Club had said they would do it for \$900 (plus materials), but the city has to seek bids if the total is more than \$500. But the city also agreed to pay the 4-Hers \$90 to fill in nine graves and \$400 for raking and weed burning.
- Sharp said the gate hinges need to be repaired, also. The cemetery association is also trying to set up a system there to allow sprinklers.
- Heard the animal control officer report that, since she has taken the post, 26 citations have been issued and 81 animals now have city licenses. Only 2 or 3 had licenses until an animal control officer was hired last year.
- Discussed buying a new tractor. Meeks will check into it.
- Heard that Sharp is interviewing 4 applicants for the post of swimming pool manager.
- Heard Sharp report that 12 applications have been received for the deputy marshal's post that will be added,

'Florida's Eagle Lady' presents program here

Doris Mager, "Florida's Eagle Lady," presented an unusual and fascinating program on birds of prey and endangered birds to Farwell Elementary students on May 12.

Mrs. Mager's presentation featured birds that she had rehabilitated after being injured or abandoned. She showed a Burrowing Owl and her pet Great Horned Owl, "E.T."

The highlight of the program was "Little Eagle," an American Bald Eagle. Little Eagle was shot in the wing by a hunter and had to have his wing amputated. Mrs. Mager was instrumental in catching him and then rehabilitating him. This Eagle will never be able to survive in the wild again, so Mrs. Mager takes him around on her educational circuit to show children the national symbol of America. She also teaches that the Eagle and other birds of prey must be protected.

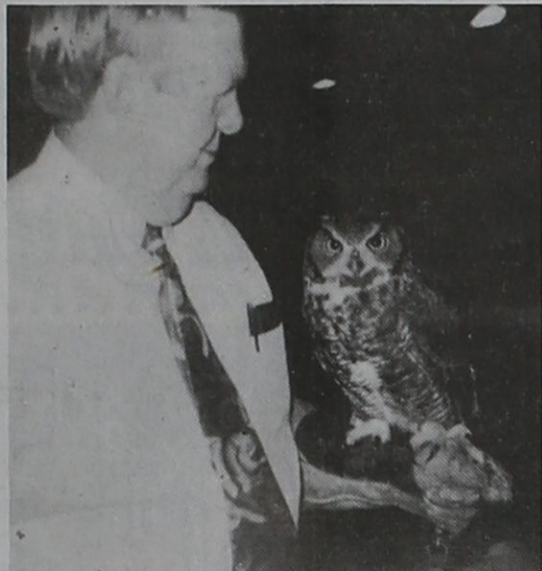
Her program also featured a Golden Eagle and a Crested Caracara bird.

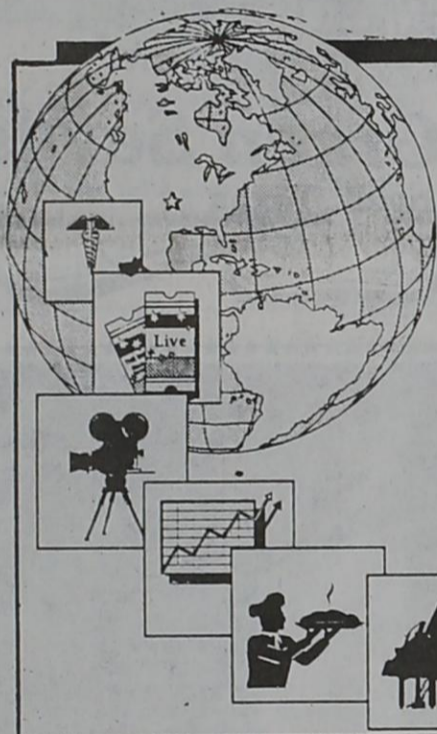

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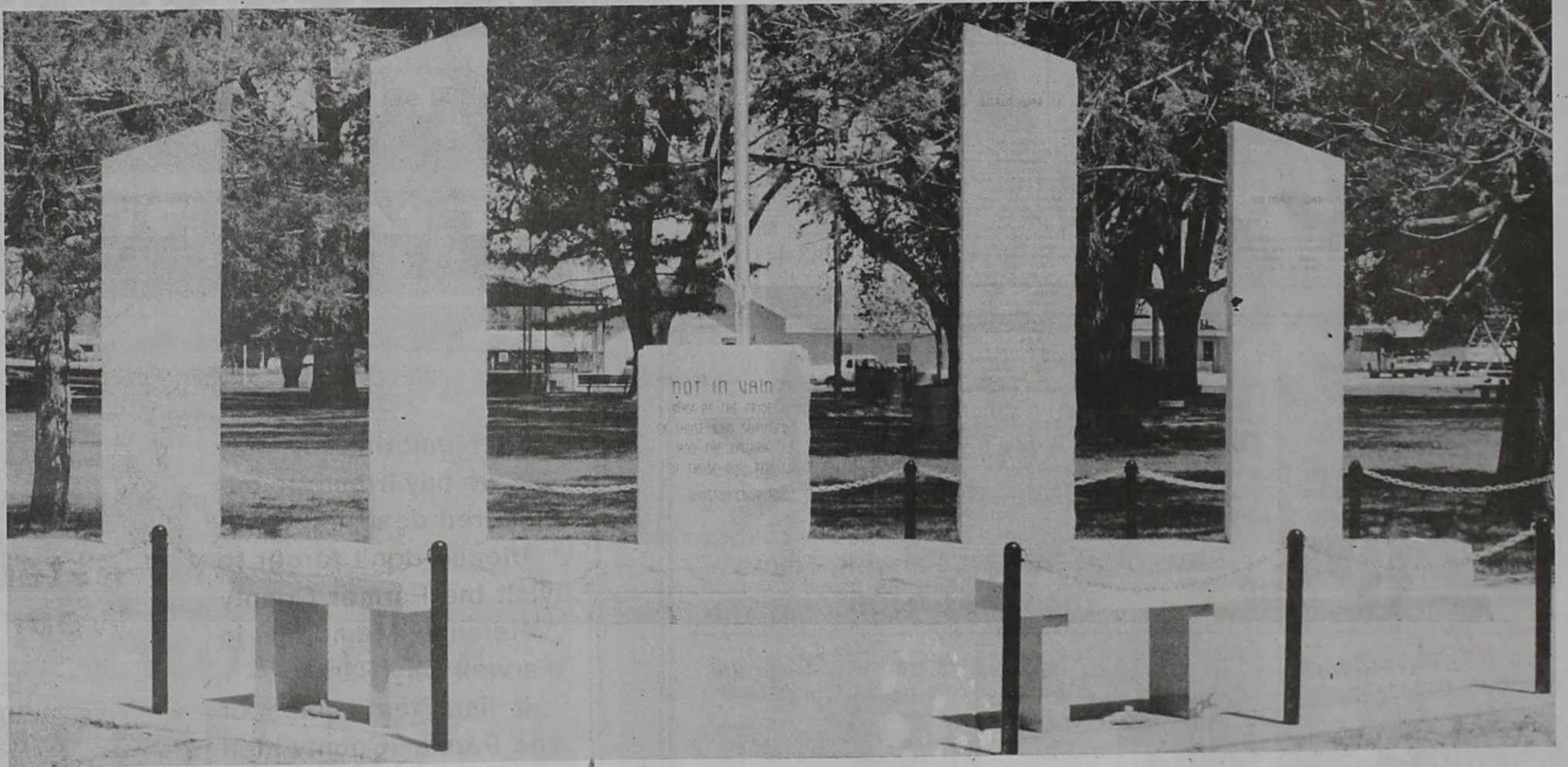

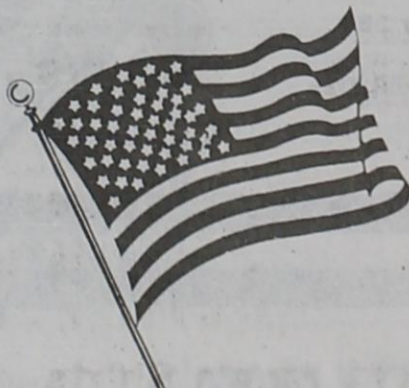

Division formed from units of the Americal and Second Marine Divisions.

On Jan. 26, the CAM Division came under air attack from the last major air raid on Guadalcanal. Following this air raid, which inflicted few casualties, the 6th Marine Regiment and 182nd Army Infantry resumed their attack west of the Poha River.

During this action, the exact time unknown, Pvt. Parker suffered a gunshot wound to the left side of his abdomen, ending his life. He was buried in Annex #1, U.S. Naval Cemetery, located near the Tenaru River, Guadalcanal, on Jan. 28.

Parker was among the 263 men of the Second Marine Division who were killed in action during this final push to secure Guadalcanal, which ended on Feb. 9. He was the first Parmer County serviceman reported to have been killed in action. At the time of his death, he was 19 years, 2 months and 15 days old.

On Feb. 19, the 6th Marine Regiment departed Guadalcanal. The Second Marine Division was later to distinguish itself at the battles of Tarawa, Saipan, Tinian and Okinawa. Eight of its members would be awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.

On March 12, 1948, at Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery in San Antonio, the remains of Parker were laid to rest in Grave 126, Section M, with full military honors. Here he joins other adopted and native Texans to rest in honored glory.

Herman Macyl Roberts

Herman Macyl Roberts, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman W. Roberts, was born in 1924. They moved to Bovina around 1938. Macyl attended Bovina High School where he was a star athlete, excelling in track and field events. In his senior year, he was the Region I 880 yard run champion.

Roberts enlisted in the U.S. Marines on March 15, 1942. Upon completion of recruit training, he was assigned to overseas duty on Wallace Island in the Samoan Islands for 16 months, until October 1943 when he was transferred to the Hawaiian Islands.

In January 1944, Roberts was assigned to the 3rd Battalion, 22nd Regiment, Fourth Marine Division. The

Fourth Marine Division, along with the Army's 7th Infantry Division, made up the V Amphibious Corps under the command of Marine Major Gen. Holland Smith. Their objective was capturing the Marshall Islands in the Central Pacific. These consisted of Kwajalein, Roi-Namur and Eniwetok.

Eniwetok Atoll, about 3200 miles south - southwest of Honolulu, consisted of some 19 small islands arranged in an oblong circle about 28 miles long and some 16 miles wide, with a deep lagoon inside which afforded a safe anchorage for naval vessels. Its major islands were Engebi in the north, and Eniwetok, Parry and Japtan in the south.

The undertaking, referred to as "Catchpole," began on Feb. 17, 1944, after the preparatory naval gunfire. Preliminary landings took place without opposition. On Feb. 18, the 22nd Regiment stormed Engebi where the bulk of the enemy manpower was concentrated, and in a single day, over-ran their objective. After dark, three survivors who were bypassed emerged from hiding to harass the Marines. But on Feb. 19, an organized mop-up put an end to enemy resistance.

The landing on Eniwetok began on Feb. 19 with two battalions of the U.S. Army's 10th Infantry landing first. Eniwetok, an oblong shaped island, was 4700 yards long, 250 yards wide at the southwest and tapering to a point at the northeast end. It was defended by some 803 men of the 1st Amphibious Brigade commanded by Major Gen. Nashida.

It was riddled with underground tunnels and well camouflaged machine gun nests. Reconnaissance had not shown these and its defenders had remained cleverly hidden. When the morning attack by the Army battalions encountered difficulty, the 3rd Battalion, 22nd Marine Regiment, landed in the afternoon to join the drive toward the southern end of the island.

It was during this drive that PFC Roberts was killed in action. He was buried on Japtan Island, some 10 miles north, northeast of Eniwetok Island, and just north of the deep water entrance to the lagoon. Joining him were some 254 other Marines and 94 Army personnel.

On Feb. 7, 1945, the USS Mountrail APA 213 steamed through the deep water entrance into Eniwetok lagoon. As I looked from the starboard side of the ship, I could see the U.S. Military Cemetery on the tiny Japtan Island. I had no way of knowing at that time that a young man from my home town was buried there.

Everett Louis Gee

Everett Louis Gee was born in Oklahoma in 1924. He moved to Bovina in the late 1930s. He attended Bovina Schools for a time but didn't complete high school. He worked as a farm and ranch hand before entering the U.S. Marines in the spring of 1944.

Upon completion of recruit training at San Diego, Gee was shipped to the South Pacific Theater of Operations for duty on April 18, 1944. Upon arriving at the island of Pavuvu, which was at that time the re-fitting depot for the First Marine Division, he was assigned to the 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment.

Pavuvu Island is located about 100 miles northwest of the Solomon Islands. Elements of the First Marine Division had recently completed victorious action against the Japanese forces at Cape Gloucester, New Britain. Preparation and training were now underway for the invasion of Peleliu, Palau Islands.

Located about 600 miles west of Mindanao, Philippine Islands, the Palau Islands were an important part of Japan's defense line which flanked the American thrust toward the Philippines. The island of Peleliu was dominated by a long precipitous ridge called the "Umurbrogal" which was honeycombed with caves and masked by dense jungle growth. The entire island was surrounded by a coral reef. These features were very effectively used by the Japanese under Co. Kunio Nakagawa in constructing exits, fire ports and artillery positions through a network of caves and tunnels.

To secure the island, an expeditionary force composed of two divisions of the III Amphibious Corps under the command of Major Gen. Roy Geiger, USMC, was assigned. The First Marine Division was assigned the task of securing the Island of Peleliu while the 81st Army Division was to capture the smaller Island of Angaur, south of Peleliu.

After intensive pre-landing bombardment, the 1st, 5th and 7th Regiments of the First Marine Division landed abreast over five beaches on D Day, Sept. 15, 1944. The fighting was extremely bloody because of the terrain. The Japanese had the beaches zeroed in with their artillery and mortars. The hard coral made digging fox holes difficult and adequate protective cover was scarce. Daytime temperatures sometimes reached 115 degrees, adding to the discomfort.

Unlike the tactics used at Guadalcanal, which included massed banzai charges, the Japanese remained dug in, controlling the high ground, forcing the Marines to expose themselves, and fourth a battle of attrition, making the Marines pay heavily in casualties.

PFC Gee lost his life on Sept. 28 when the 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, after having fought northward, took Ngesebus Island just off Peleliu's northern end. Gee was 20 years old at the time of his death. His remains were later re-buried in the Bovina Cemetery after the war.

Peleliu was officially secured on Nov. 25. Gee was one of 1,252 Marines killed in action. Another 5,274 were wounded. The Army suffered 277 killed in action and 1,008 wounded. Peleliu was never fully used as a forward operating base because of the rapid advance of U.S. forces.

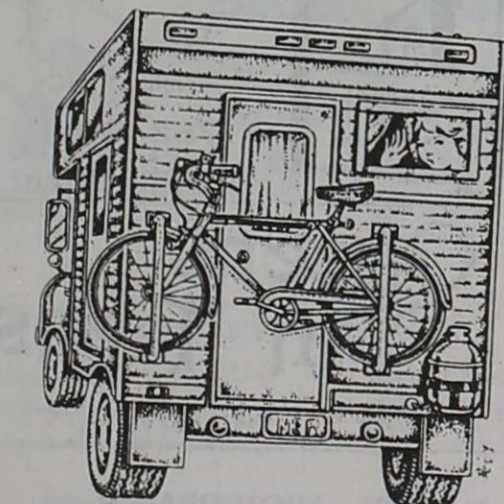
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

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'A mixed bag for High Plains cotton producers'

Announcement of the 1995-crop Commodity Credit Corporation Upland Cotton Loan Schedule on May 8 went almost unheralded in the face of high cotton prices and producer concerns about the weather.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) the new Loan Schedule, with an increase in the Base Loan

rate to 51.92 cents per pound includes a mixed bag for High Plains cotton producers.

On the good side of the coin is the drop in the discount for Bark content in cotton from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. The 1995 Loan schedule has a Level One Bark discount for these states of -195 points, 40 points below the Level One bark discount included in the 1994 Loan schedule. Level Two bark discounts also dropped from -600 points in 1994 to -550 points in 1995.

"This years Loan schedule should be good news for most producers," says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "While there is no identifiable trend toward either higher premiums or lower discounts, loan differences are now beginning to more closely resemble actual market values."

Other changes in the 1995 schedule include revisions to the Strength and Micronaire premium and discount tables.

The 1995 Strength table contains lower discounts for strength readings below 23.4

grams per tex and lower premiums for strength readings above 26.5 grams per tex.

The 1995 micronaire table contains lower discounts for all micronaire readings, outside of the 3.5 to 4.9 base range, for cotton with staple lengths measuring 32 (1 inch) and shorter. Discounts for cotton with staple lengths 33 (1 1/32 inch) or longer were higher for readings 5.0 and above and lower for micronaire readings 2.7 and below.

The table below indicates how the 1995 Premium and Discount schedule compares side by side with the 1994 schedule for selected Upland qualities.

Companies support 'sweetness'

Coca Cola, Blue Bell Creameries, Hershey, Kellogg, Kraft, Wrigley, M&M Mars and Nestle - all are major sugar users. Yet all of those companies have joined forces in an attempt to take what sweetness there is out of the U.S. Sugar Program.

Of course, the sugar program, through its well-organized and fair quota system, provides consumers with a stable supply of sugar at a fair price - and at no cost to taxpayers. And it helps maintain a stable domestic industry vital to this country. Still, through "repeal the sugar program" ads seen on Capitol Hill recently, these sugar users, along with environmental groups and others are bending the truth in claims that the sugar program is unfair to consumers, discourages international trade and harms the environment.

"What they want is unlimited access to foreign sugar dumped on U.S. soil at artificially cheaper prices that are backed by huge supporters from foreign treasuries," says Bill Cleavinger, TSBGA president and chairman of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association public relations committee. "They're using old arguments that have never washed, but which are nevertheless threatening to our industry."

Don't Get Snookered by Snickers - To counter the ad campaign, ASGA, along with other members of the American Sugar Alliance, are making sure the facts are getting out on the sugar program, as well as the profit motives of sugar users.

"We're pointing out that a Hershey or Snickers bar, a bag of M&Ms or bottle Coke each contain only 2¢ worth of sugar," says Cleavinger. "The wrapper even costs more than the sugar."

Also, ASGA and state beet association representatives from every sugar production area are visiting every congressional office this spring.

"The ASGA staff has assembled data from all 435 congressional districts," says Cleavinger. "We can tell every congressman or woman exactly what the sweetener industry means to the constituents and their local economy."

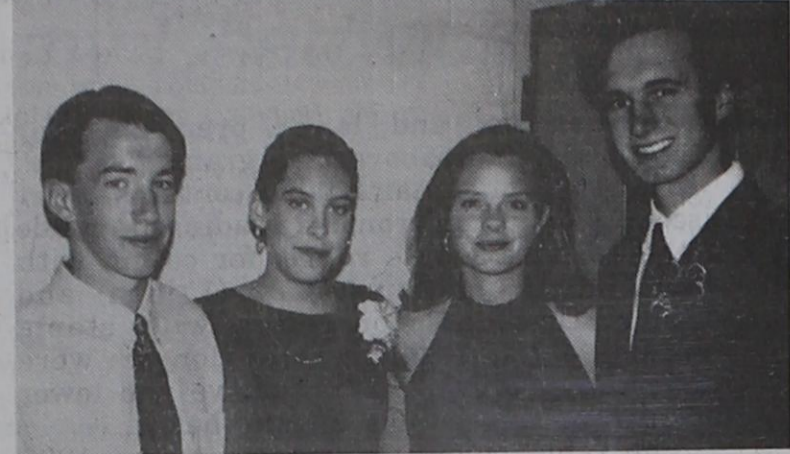

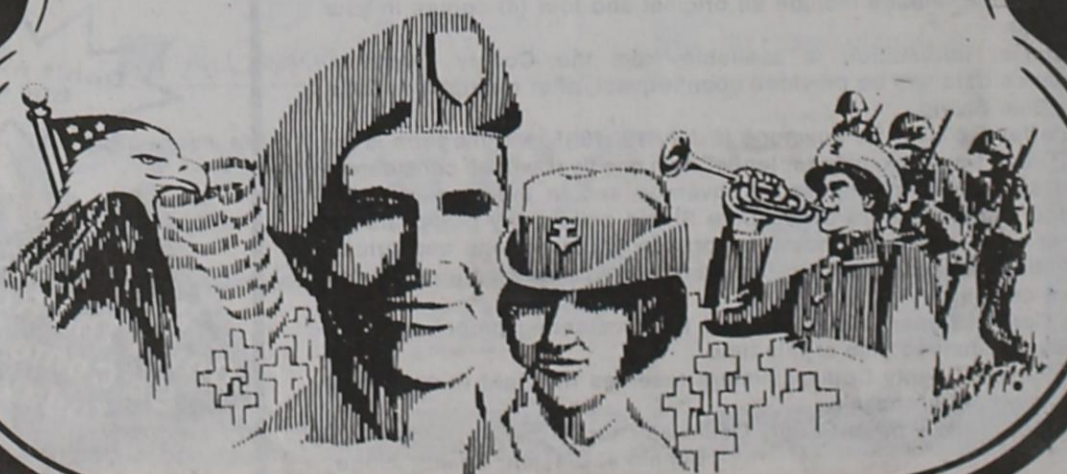

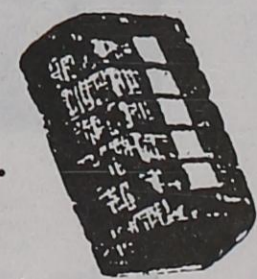

I was also praying and mapping out a plan of action on how to get from my chair to the podium in my new high heeled shoes without slipping, tripping or making that annoying "clack-clack" sound that women can make in dress shoes ... especially when you haven't worn heels since your dress-up in mommy's clothes days.

Graduates, go for the most comfortable clothes and shoes possible that will not choke, squeeze, or bind in any way during the ceremony.

You'll make your parents more proud of the moment if you're not digging or pulling at yourself. Don't worry about the sweat rings under your arms though; everyone else will have them too.

And if you're graduating from a college or university, because the classes are larger, you'll need to identify yourself to your family in some way.

I don't mean to stand up on your chair in the middle of the coliseum and whistle to your group; it needs to be subtle, yet "see-able."

When I graduated from Texas Tech, I put a double-T on my cap. I thought I was being so clever. So did, 346 other graduates. My mother photographed a blond-headed girl sitting in the chemical engineering section for at least 6 frames before she realized that it wasn't me.

I suggest taping an 8x10 color portrait of yourself on your cap, or the amount of money you owe your folks. One of my friends had dared his parents that he was going to wear a certain T-shirt under his gown and at the moment he received his diploma he was going to show it to them (and everyone else) on-stage. He unzipped his gown and his shirt read "I Owe, I Owe, It's Off To Work I Go!"

Graduates, you also need to listen to the speakers. They're not hired to take up time, they're telling you something you really need to know. The common sense things to remember are not to pick your nose, chew gum or read magazines during the ceremony.

And, a very important tip, especially to girls. Bobby pins help to keep your cap on. But remember to remove them before throwing your cap off in celebration at the end of the ceremony. It took several years before the sides of my hair grew back after I had tossed them with my cap. I can still remember the pain.

The last tip to remember is to remember. Remember the fun of your school days and the friends you made. Think back to all the things you've learned and then think ahead to your future.

The years you've spent in school will always be a source of some the best memories you'll ever have.

You all deserve a great big pat on the back for your achievement and a hearty wish for all good things to come to you in your future.

Texas A & M honors Anderson

Gabe Anderson Jr. of Bovina was honored with a Distinguished Alumnus Award during commencement ceremonies at Texas A&M University.

He graduated from A&M in 1941 with a degree in marketing and finance. He was commissioned a 2nd lieutenant and sworn into service with his class on graduation day. Assigned to the 1st Armored Division, he earned the Silver and Bronze Stars in combat in North Africa,

Sicily and Southern Europe during World War II. Returning home as a major in 1947, Anderson established the Sherley-Anderson Grain Co. in Bovina. Today, the firm runs five panhandle elevator operations with a total capacity of 22 million bushels.

His land holdings grew steadily as he pioneered crop irrigation in his farm acreage in New Mexico. In the 1960's, he expanded his interests to include oil and gas exploration in the Texas-New Mexico-Colorado area. At the end of the decade, he teamed with others to create the 38,000 head Parmer County Cattle Feeding Co. He sold this operation and in 1980, he acquired northeast New Mexico's Cross L Ranch, which he has expanded into Colorado.

He is a director of FirstBank Southwest of Amarillo and has served on the boards of four other banks in north Texas. He has served as president of both the Panhandle Grain & Feed Association and the Texas Grain & Feed Association (which awarded him the coveted Lone Star Award in 1987). He was on the board of the National Grain and Feed Association and currently serves on two committees.

His strong support for his alma mater includes serving as president of the 12th Man Foundation in 1987 and as a member of Texas A&M's College of Business Development Council and the Chancellor's Advisory Committee. He was named to the A&M Lettermen's Hall of Honor in 1994.

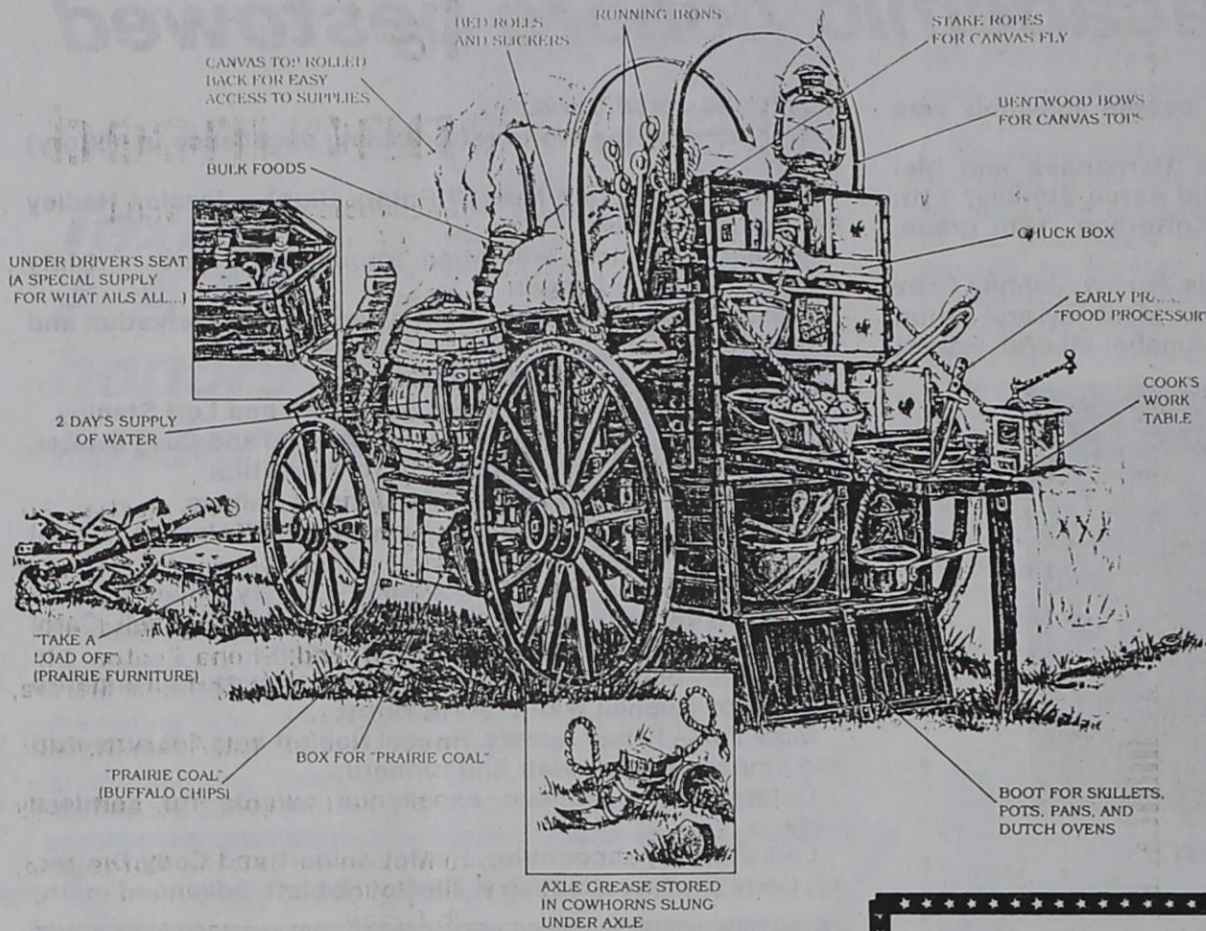

Anatomy of a Chuckwagon

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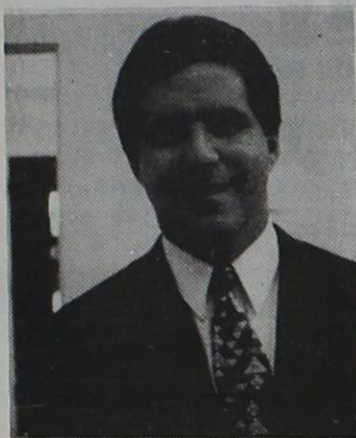

Recipe of Week

Editor's note: With the Cowboy Camp Sunday approaching June 4 at the First Baptist Church of Farwell, here are a couple of recipes to go along with that concept:

Roundup Pot Roast with Black Gravy

5 lbs. pot roast, at least 2 inches thick
 2 tsps. salt
 2 tbs. shortening
 1 kettle of boiling water
 1/2 cup coffee
 3-4 tbs. cornstarch
 Rub meat with salt. Melt shortening in a heavy Dutch oven. Brown roast in hot fat over medium heat, turning once. When browned on both sides, add 1 cup of boiling water. Cover and cook over low heat for about 3 hours, either on the stove or in the oven at 325 F.

Add hot water each time the pot is almost dry. When the roast is done, add hot coffee instead of water. When the meat is well done, remove from Dutch oven and keep hot. Add 2 to 3 cups of hot water and scrape all the tar off the bottom of the pan. Thicken with cornstarch. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer for 5 minutes. Serve with mashed potatoes, fresh vegetables, biscuits, fruit salad and two kinds of pie.

Ranch-style Chicken Fried Steak

2 lbs. round steak, cut into 4 pieces.
 1/2 cup flour
 1 1/2 tsps. salt
 1/2 tsp. pepper
 1/2 cup milk
 1/2 cup oil
 2 cups milk (if no one is counting calories, some cooks use part whipping cream)

Trim fat from steaks and save. Mix together flour, salt and pepper in a small bowl. Sprinkle over meat. Pound each side with a meat hammer until it offers no more resistance. Dip in milk and then flour mixture. Heat oil and trimmed fat in deep frying pan over high heat.

Fry steaks about 5 minutes each side until golden brown. Remove steak from pan and place in a warm oven while you finish the gravy. Pour off fat, leaving about 1/4 cup in pan. Add 1/4 cup flour and cook over low heat until a paste forms. Add milk. Stir and cook until thickened for gravy. Don't mind the lumps. Serve over steak. Makes 4 servings.

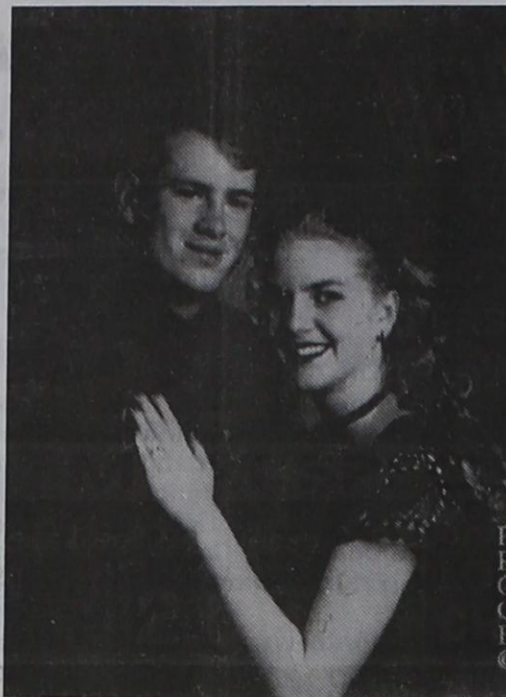
Foster attends seminar
