Rules for the 1995 contest will be the same as in the past. A person must be at least 12 years old to enter. Entrants must choose 12 teams they think will win the selected games.

Games will be divided by high school, college and professional ranks. In case of a tie game, unless the tie was predicted by the entrant, that game will not be counted.

Each entrant must remember to pick a tie-breaker score, a very important feature of the contest since many weekly winners (and overall winners) have been determined by the tie-breakers.

The person naming the most games correctly each week will receive a check for \$10. The second place winner gets \$5.

Each week's scoring is tabulated and kept on record at the Tribune office. The standings are posted each Monday and may be seen during regular business hours.

## Farwell, Texico enrollments down; Lazbuddie's is up

Here's a look at our local schools' first day enrollments:

Enrollment at Farwell Schools is down from the past two years.

Farwell reported 526 students, down from 550 in 1994 and 556 in 1993.

The high school enrollment increased from 139 to 143. Principal Larry Gregory said some students haven't returned yet from summer vacation and overall enrollment is expected to be in the high 140s.

This is the year decisions are made as to what athletic class to put schools in. Farwell has been in Class A for several years. It's determined

by how many students are in high school. Last year, the line to decide between Class A and Class AA was 144. This year's boundary won't be announced until February. So there's a good chance Farwell will move up to Class AA.

A breakdown of Farwell first-day enrollment stats shows: elementary, 249; junior high, 134; and senior high, 143.

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Lazbuddie's first-day enrollment figures show an increase in student population, from 230 last year to 247 this year.

## Texico council seeks to re-negotiate contract with state

The Texico City Council on Tuesday, upon the recommendation of Mayor Butch Tharp, didn't accept a contract with the state to improve Highway 108 (the Pleasant Hill highway).

The contract called for Texico to pay \$76,000, with the state paying \$225,000 as its share.

The work included reconstructing the intersection of Hwy. 108 and Wheeler Avenue, and the widening and cubing and guttering of the highway from Wheeler to Craig Street.

But the kicker was that, if the improvements were done, then Texico would be responsible for maintaining the stretch of state highway within the corporate limits.

This highway gets a lot of truck traffic.

"I oppose the contract. It's not a good deal for Texico," said Tharp.

Also, the city would have to pay more costs than just in the agreement.

So the council authorized Tharp to meet with state officials and try to negotiate a better contract.

In other business, the council:

-- Allowed Ignacio Olivas to move a structure onto lots at 118 Opal.

-- Heard Tharp say that he will interview two applicants for the post of animal control officer on Friday.

-- Rejected allowing Corrine Ortiz to place a building at 500 Wheeler.

She had moved the building into the city without a permit. She said that she thought a portable building didn't need a permit. She said a city employee had said it was okay to place the building at the site when the mover brought it into the city.

It was said the building needed some work inside, plus a foundation, electricity, crawl space and a bathroom.

Mrs. Ortiz also said she had sold the building to Bob Pullings and it was to be used to sell used merchandise.

Mrs. Ortiz was given two weeks to remove the building.

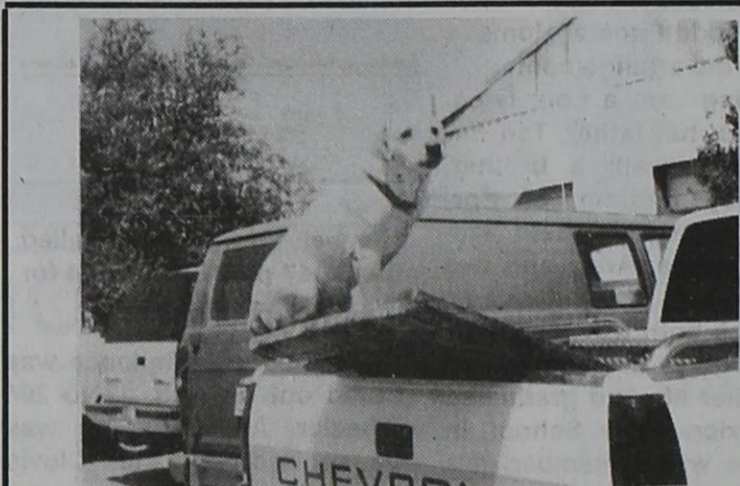
-- Approved the plan for the new Texico Community Center as prepared by Terry Rucker. It now goes to the state and federal agencies for their approvals.

-- Allowed the marshal's office to buy new vests and tactical weapons.

-- Placed on the next agenda a request by the school system to put two school bus stop signs on the south side of town.

-- Placed on the next agenda a request by the Texico Chamber of Commerce to have the city help pay for running electricity to 12 poles on the north side of Wheeler

so Christmas lights can be set up on that side of the street. The south side already has electricity for the lights.

## Here's how ag building site will be chosen

About 30 persons attended an information meeting Tuesday about the future of Parmer County's three ag agencies -- Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Agriculture Stabilization & Conservation Service (ASCS) and Soil Conservation Service (SCS).

The federal government has mandated that the three agencies be put into one building. Currently, SCS, with 3 employees, is in Friona. FmHA and ASCS, with 13 employees, are in Farwell.

The meeting, held at the ASCS office in Farwell, was conducted by Jerry Don Glover, head of the Parmer County ASCS committee, and John Fuston, district director for ASCS.

The state has designated ASCS to be the "lead agency" in this co-location.

Also present at the meeting were officials from Farwell, Bovina and Friona. Each community is expected to make a bid for the building which will house the three agencies.

The process is expected to begin next year and to be completed by Sept. 30, 1997, when the SCS office lease expires.

Fuston passed out information to those present on the space requirements and guidelines to be used for selecting a building. About 6,000 square feet will be needed to house the three agencies.

The building which houses the ASCS and FmHA (which merges with the ASCS on Oct. 1, 1995) has about 5,500 square feet. There is room for expansion. And the owners of this building plan to bid for the 3-agency site.

It was reiterated that information on how the process should go hasn't been put in "concrete" and changes continually occur. So it seems that a FAC (Food & Agriculture) county committee, comprised of Curt Miller, ASCS head; Tom Taylor, representing FmHA; and Tom Reed, SCS head, will delineate which areas can bid. But it also seems that they have to pick the areas from which bids come -- Bovina,

Parmer County right now deals with the government dictate that three ag agencies -- FmHA, ASCS and SCS -- be placed in one building.

The problem is that all the discussion deals with "moving the offices" or where "they" or "it" should go.

Folks, we're talking about people here.

What I believe should be the focal point are the people involved. Ideally, I would like to see the offices stay where they are -- because that way no hardship affects the folks involved.

But if the government insists on co-locating the three offices, then I feel the next criteria should involve creating as little hardship on the employees as possible.

Right now, there are 3 employees in Friona and 13 in Farwell.

Now you tell me, what's the best way to go to keep hardship to a minimum.

Common sense says that the 3 should go where the 13 are.

That's common sense. Unfortunately, we're dealing with politics here. And common sense sometimes

goes outside the window.

I wish the folks involved would remember that we're dealing with people in this situation, not "offices."

Instead, I heard talk of bigger buildings, of lower rent, or central site, etc.

Why don't we talk about what's best for the hard-working and veteran employees involved?

Let's put the focus where it belongs.

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**Oops Department:**  
In last week's Farwell City Council report, we reported that Mayor Jimmie Mace had shown the council statistics noting how very inexpensive Farwell's water rates were, and also that the city would look into raising those rates.

It should have been clarified that the two aren't "cause and effect."

Mace is happy that the city's rates are low.

But a new water well is being planned for the next budget year, and taxes might have to be raised.

I apologize for indicating that the low rates and a tax rate hike might be "cause and effect."

mentary, 103; junior high, 59; and senior high, 85.

The breakpoint for moving up from Six-Man football to Class A has been 84.9. So it appears that Lazbuddie is right on the line. But Supt. Phil Warren said that state rules allow an extension for two years to stay in a class. And since the biggest group of students in the high school are seniors, that means Lazbuddie will move back below the 84.9 figure next year.

Texico Schools showed a decrease in first day enrollment from 563 last year to 544 this year. In 1993, the number was 519.

This year's breakdown includes:

High school, 175; junior high, 128, and elementary, 241.

Friona and Farwell.

Glover said he plans to expedite the process.

Thus, in the final analysis, it appears bids will be asked. They will be taken by the county FAC committee. The committee will discuss the bids with the bidders, then allow the bidders to make a final offer later. Their recommendation then goes to the state FAC committee.

Fuston noted that things can change. He said that due to budget constraints, the whole process might be put on hold.

It also was stated that the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture has designated Farwell to be the site for the three agencies - but no one had seen that in writing. So this is questionable.

During the meeting, Fuston was called to the phone to discuss the rules with state officials. Miller reported later that Fuston found out:

1) Parmer County Extension Service Agent Gary Patterson is not a voting member of the county FAC. This had been in question since Patterson earlier had been told he was.

2) The area to be delineated for bidding purposes will be decided by Miller, Reed and Taylor.

3) In viewing the bids, in addition to looking at the space requirements, the county FAC also must take into account the working conditions of the employees (i.e., hardships involved in moving or commuting to a different community), and improvement of the delivery of services.

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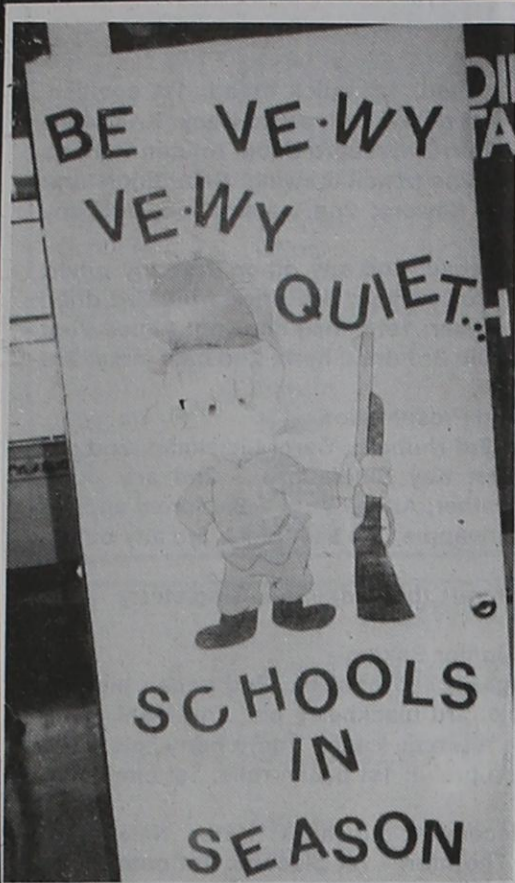

This was partially offset by higher teacher salaries, as mandated by the state. They rose about \$47,000, from \$747,000 to \$794,000.

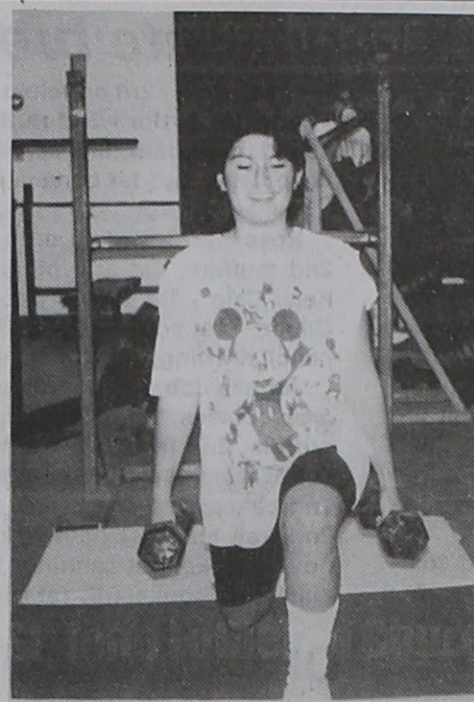
Farwell Elementary School has openings in its Head Start pre-kindergarten class.

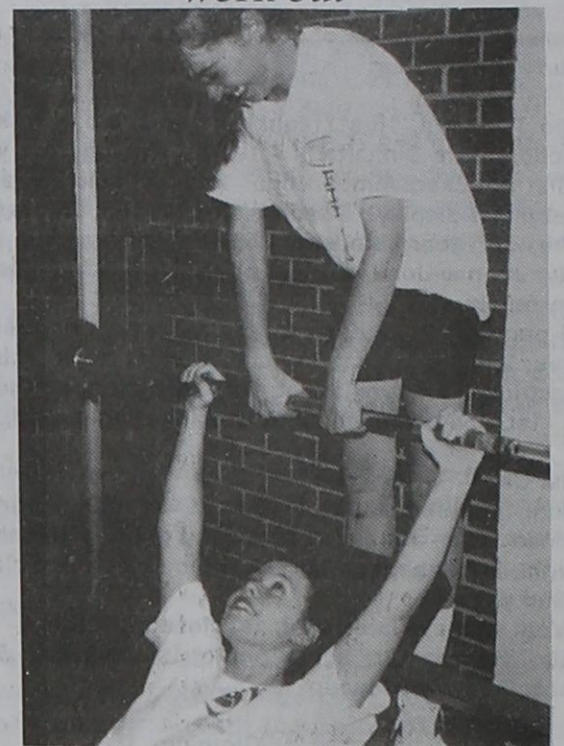
As of Tuesday, the enrollment for the Farwell Schools is at 548 students.

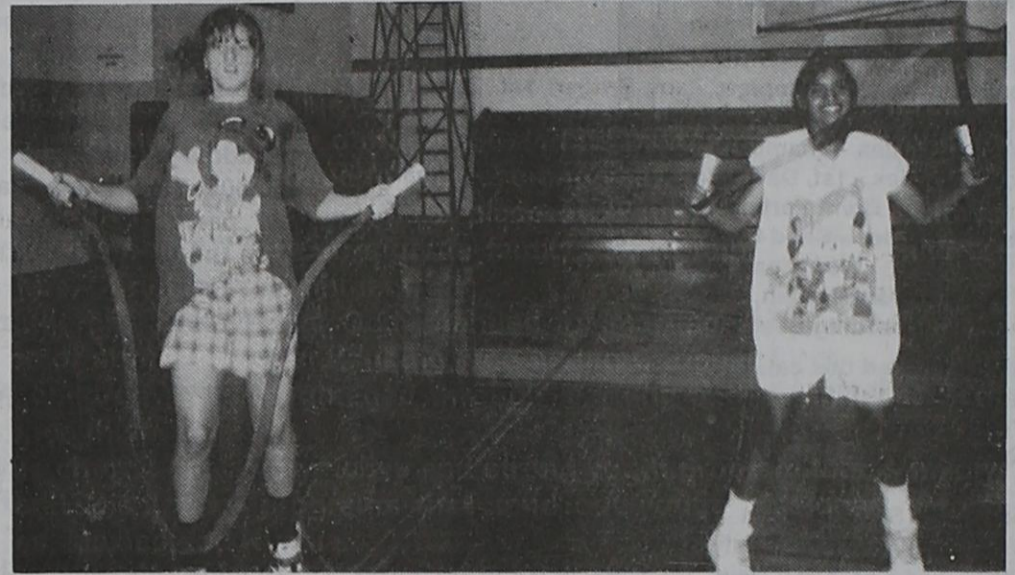


Felicia Durango works out with weights during a work-out for the Texico High School volleyball teams.

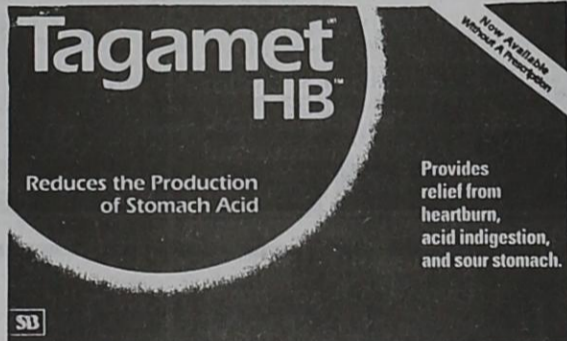
After coming back to the states, he and Arlene started new churches in Nebraska and around St. Louis, Mo. They came to St. John Lutheran Church in Dec. 1991.

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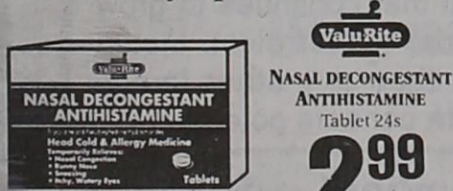
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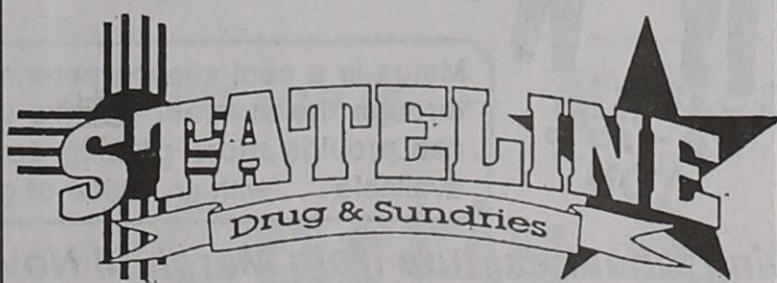

## Okay given on Lazbuddie well

Lazbuddie School Supt. Phil Warren reports that the state has given the okay for the school to build a backup water well.

OJD Engineers, of Welling-ton, Texas, have been hired.

The well will cost between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

The state will provide the funds for the well because Lazbuddie qualifies for up to \$500,000 (including Lazbud-die's part) in state aid because the school's tax rate is high.

This is one of those occasions where a higher tax rate is helpful.

Due to that rate, Lazbuddie can receive up to \$407,000 in state funds if it matches the remaining \$93,000.

Warren said some of the funds Lazbuddie spent this year on renovations (\$80,000) can count toward its matching fund total.

This means Lazbuddie can get state help with more bathroom and roof renovations at the school without more local cost.

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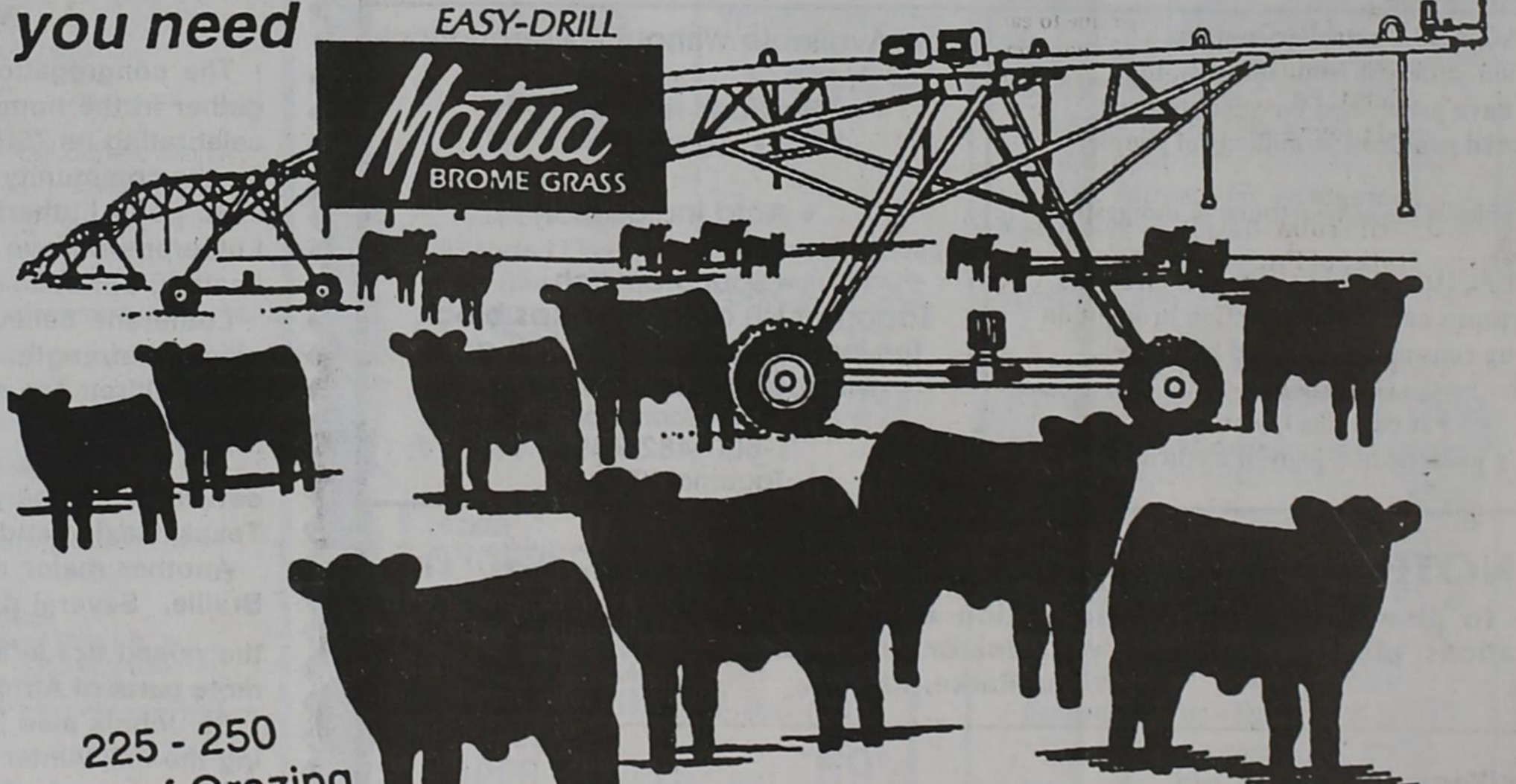

**Nitrate's movement a concern**

Researchers are hoping to maximize a farmer's profit and minimize any excess nutrients that might harm the environment.

One of the concerns that has arisen is the movement of nitrate, a form of nitrogen, to non-target areas. Dr. Art Onken, a professor of soil chemistry with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, is trying to develop a methodology by which producers can improve the management of nitrogen fertilizer.

"The goal is to be able to apply just the amount of nitrogen necessary for the crop and be able to monitor that crop and to make any corrections that we might need to make from the standpoint of additional applications during the growing season if the crop is showing any signs of running out," said Onken.

If a producer applies nitrogen just as it is needed by the crop, and if he applies the correct amount, he can minimize the amount of nitrogen in the soil that would be subject to movement to non-target areas.

Assessing the nitrogen status of plants has been hindered in the past due to wide fluctuations and the stress-nostress cycles. It greatly improves the condition for using tissue analysis to determine the nitrogen status of crops, Onken said.

"We have a better opportunity to analyze the plant and determine what its nutrient status is," he said.

There are several potential methods for measuring nitrogen in a crop such as corn during the growing season. Two methods that hold promise are the chlorophyll meter and nitrogen in the plant sap.

When taking chlorophyll readings, test the lowest live leaf, and the uppermost mature leaf, the scientist advised.

"Most people have looked at the top because it's easiest," said Onken. "We know from previous work that corn will translocate nitrogen from the bottom leaves to the top leaves as the plant becomes nitrogen deficient."

Reading the lower leaves helps to determine nitrogen deficiency symptoms sooner than if measuring the top leaf. The symptoms should appear in the lower leaves first due to its translocation to growing tissue when plant nitrogen levels are limiting, Onken explained.

The chlorophyll meter does no harm to the corn plant, he said. It beams light of specific wavelengths through the plant leaf and reads how much is transmitted. Chlorophyll content of leaves is influenced by the nitrogen status of the plant.

Nitrate-nitrogen in the plant sap is also said to determine the nitrogen status of the plant. A corn plant is cut off a few inches above the soil line, and a drop of sap is placed on a portable nitrate meter for determination of its nitrate-nitrogen concentration.

The nitrate meter is a small, hand-held battery, operated meter about the size of a pack of cigarettes.

The measurements taken with the chlorophyll meter and the nitrate meter have been correlated to the nitrogen fertilizer rate and crop yield.

"We need to be able to determine not only that the crop is deficient, but we would like to know how much nitrogen we have to apply to correct that," said Onken.

"When we maximize profit for fertilizer application, then we also minimize any environmental impact," said Onken. "If we optimize the profit from fertilizer application, we leave no more residual fertilizer in the soil, than if we had grown a crop without fertilizer."

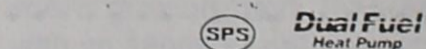

Here is the weekly report from Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa;

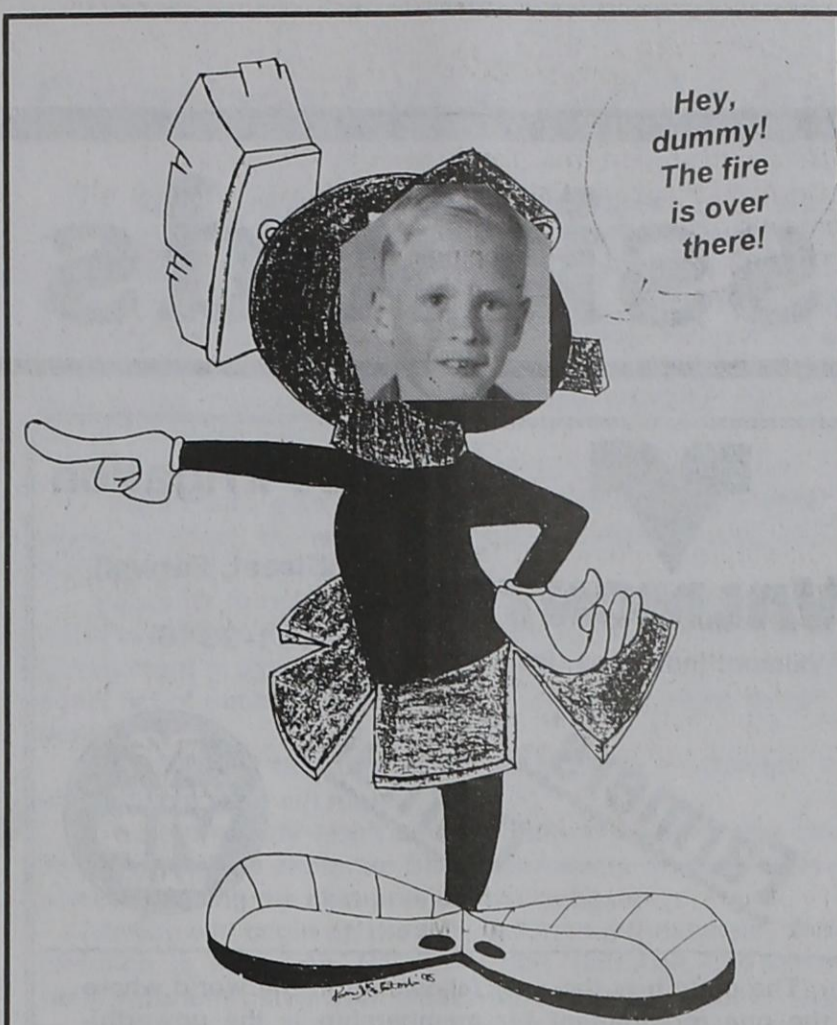
A dog bite case was reported in the 500 block of Seventh Street on Aug. 20.

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

## Combest speaks in Farwell

U.S. Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, spoke at a Town Hall meeting to about 50 persons in Farwell Wednesday. Discussing the request for federal aid when the tornado struck Friona in June, he said that FEMA rejected Farmer County's seeking to be eligible for disaster aid because most of the businesses suffering hardship were injured. He later noted, "Government penalizes the efficient and rewards the inefficient."  
The conservative congressman spoke on several topics:  
-- Agriculture gets a bad rap for "deficiency payments" when, in effect, many such payments (cotton, wheat, etc.) were not paid this year.  
-- He wants to reduce the growth of federal government in order to balance the budget. He showed a list of hundreds of government programs being eliminated and said he has an equal list of such programs that are suffering major deductions.  
-- He opposed the foreign aid bill because he thought it should have been cut more.  
-- There probably won't be a tax reform bill this year because committee chairman Bill Archer wants to focus attention on it during the next presidential campaign.  
-- Action will begin on the farm bill in mid-September. The direction is uncertain. He noted that, although the basic farm programs have been intact for the past 10 years, the government has substantially reduced the amount of money on them.  
-- If nothing is done, Medicare will go bankrupt in 7 years. This is an issue Congress is tackling.  
-- During this tenure in office, he has received more letters asking for welfare reform than on any other topic. "We have

to increase money to those who need help and reduce it to those who don't," he said.  
-- The House of Representatives has moved forward on its campaign promises but they are very frustrated with the Senate on its slow progress.  
-- Asked if Congress would hold hearings on the Oklahoma City bombing tragedy, he said nothing will occur until legal matters are dealt with.  
-- Asked about the accounting of money paid back on farm deficiency loans, Combest said they might not be paid out in the same year that it's paid back. It's a liability when the loan is made, and a credit when paid back.  
-- Said he would support repealing the Brady Bill.  
-- Asked about the sugar loan program, he said in the long run it saves money for the taxpayer. He said he thought sugar, peanuts and tobacco would be in a separate program this year.  
Combest told a joke to illustrate how differently conservatives and liberals view "cutbacks." He told this anecdote: A man he knew ate 5 cheeseburgers each day. He told the man that was too many to eat a day; that it wasn't good for him.  
He saw the man several months later and the man told him he had he had "cut back" on the number of cheeseburgers he ate. Now, the man said, he was eating 7 cheeseburgers a day.  
"You call that a cutback -- to jump from 5 to 7 a day?"  
"Oh, yes. Because I was could have been eating 8 cheeseburgers a day, but am keeping it at 7. That's why it's a "cutback."
