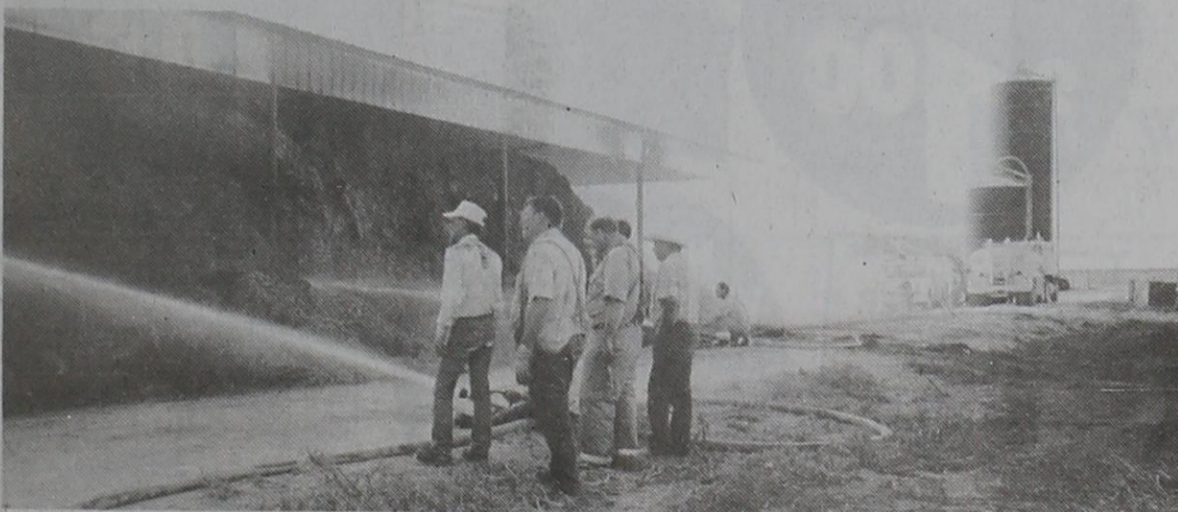

As a reporter, I must try to write objectively and report all the facts that detail a story. However, this story is a tough one to write. It was even harder to be on the scene and see this story in the making because this event literally hit close to home... in fact it was at my home.

On Sept. 7 at approximately 3:15 in the afternoon, a hay barn on the east end of our dairy farm went up in flames. It was a devastating loss to our farming operation. This barn housed the majority of our choice hay that we fed to our milk cows. At the time of

A Homecoming dance, sponsored by the school FFA, will be held from 10 p.m. to 1 a.m. at the Farwell Community Center tonight.

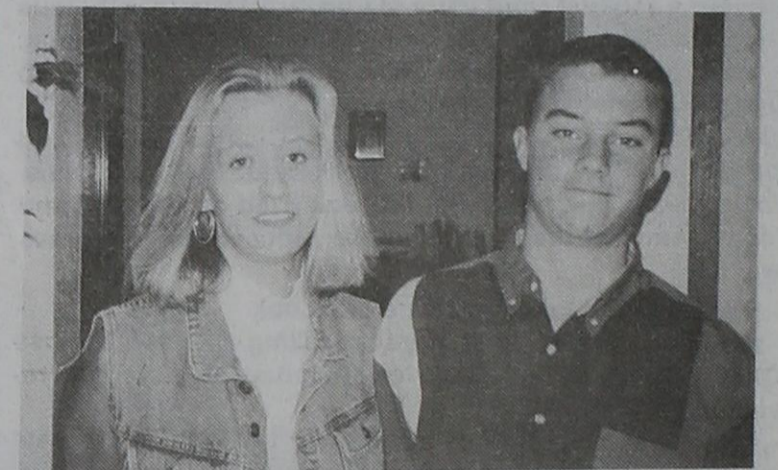

El Cid Futurity, charity auction on tap next week

The fourth year of the El Cid Futurity will be held at the El Cid Ranch northeast of Farwell Sept. 18-24, with a purse expected to exceed \$250,000, of which \$115,000 is added money.

The public is invited to view the competition. Each day begins at 8 a.m. and a concession stand is in the grandstand area. There is a sign along the Amarillo highway just outside Farwell showing where to turn to the ranch.

More than 400 cutters are expected for this year's competition. The \$115,000 added money will be split among the open and non pro divisions of the aged classes: \$35,000 each to Futurity (3 year old), Maturity (4 year old) and Classic/Challenge (5 and 6 year old). Also, \$5,000 each will go to NCHA open and NCHA non pro divisions. Champions in each class will receive a M.L. Leddy saddle and both champions and reserve champions will receive Gist belt buckles. Ten finalists will receive horse blankets.

Two championship cuts will take place on the 15th and 16th and the Futurity will kick off on the 18th. The finals will take place on the 24th.

The National Cutting Horse Association in Fort Worth is the governing body for the cutting horse industry. Lonnie Allsup is a member of the NCHA board of directors. He and wife Barbara own the El Cid ranch and are owner-operators of the Allsup Convenience Store chain.

The El Cid is offered in an outdoor arena that will seat several hundred spectators. Other features are an adjacent outdoor practice arena for live cattle work and a nearby me-

chanical cow for the adventurous cutters.

A cutting demonstration will take place immediately following the auction. All proceeds from ticket and auction sales will be donated to the United Way to support 17 local charities in Curry County.

Ticket prices are \$10 for adults and \$3 for children under 12. Tickets can be purchased at the United Way at 769-2103.

The Texico School Board Tuesday clarified its policy on taking out-of-district students.

When these students sign their contracts to come to Texico Schools, their parents must get the forms notarized.

In other business, the board:

-- Discussed band instrument rental fees. Some students have left these fees accumulate over their school years. The board decided that if a student doesn't pay the rental for the previous year, he cannot rent instruments the following year.

-- Heard a request from Jerry Martin, a parent, that the bus route along Wheeler Avenue be reviewed for safety reasons. The board decided to ask the state to provide a small bus to help improve safety on the highway.

-- Met with Eldon Smith, Terry Rucker, Charles Guthals and Brian Guthals, to discuss the track and field problems. Sprinkler heads will be raised, the leak fixed on the field and the compaction of the ground will be reduced, to help grass grow.

-- Hired Denise Morris as a cafeteria cook.

-- Noted that 24 Texico staffers are taking a computer class at Clovis Community College on Tuesday nights. They receive college credit for it.

-- Noted that Misty Barnes had a dairy heifer make the sale at the state fair. Kelsi Cain had a pig make the sale, too.

-- Discussed its quality of education survey. Supt. Richards will put this together for publication in the Tribune later.

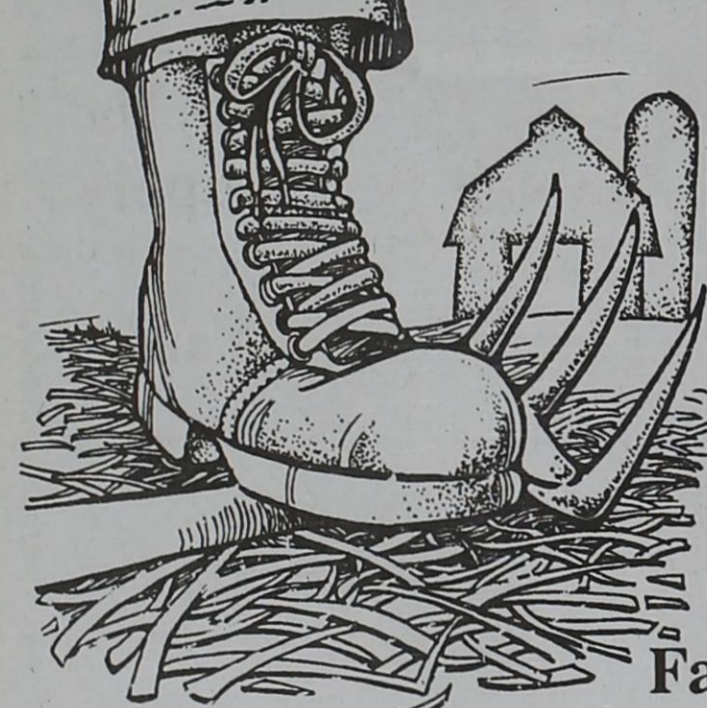

the fire, it had approximately 900 one-ton bales of Alfalfa, Wheat and Haygrazer hay.

As gut-wrenching as this fire was, the good side to the whole thing is that no one was injured or harmed in any way.

The volunteer fire departments from Farwell, Texico, Bovina and Frona all reported to the scene and worked very hard to keep the fire from getting out of the barn. The bad thing about a hay fire is that there is really nothing one can do other than to just let it burn.

And burn it did. In fact, at this writing on Monday, the hay is still burning and smoking.

To the best of our knowledge, the fire was caused by spontaneous combustion. Anyone that deals with hay, knows that a little bit of moist hay and a long period of hot days can cause this freak act of nature.

As a witness to the fire, it was an awesome thing to see. I have never seen a fire spread so quickly or see flames get so big at one time. The fire was one of the hottest that I have ever felt too. It was a hard one for the firefighters to handle as well. Just when they thought the flames were out of a stack, the fire would rage back through. The fire started in the middle of the barn, in the middle of the stacks.

Berny Mesman tried his best to save some of the hay by hauling it out with the front-end loader, but the flames got so bad that he couldn't risk catching the loader on fire. All he and the rest of us could do was stand back and watch.

We appreciate all the hard work and the help that the fire departments gave to fighting this fire. We know that you don't always get the credit that you deserve in what you so bravely volunteer to help with, but our family deeply appreciates your services.

County tax rate, budget hearings scheduled

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday scheduled the annual budget hearing for 10 a.m. on Sept. 25 in the county courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse.

The budget for 1996 is proposed at \$2,704,070.33. The budget approved last year for 1995 was \$2,895,095.40. Thus, the proposed budget is \$191,000 less than last year's.

There will be a public hearing on a proposed tax increase of 7.5 percent on Sept. 18 at 10 a.m. in the county courtroom at the Parmer County Courthouse.

The commissioners voted unanimously on this proposal.

On Page 4 are two legal ads for this public hearing. The ad on the left is for the county's Farm to Market Road account.

The ad on the right is the county's General Fund account.

The commissioners are proposing a tax increase of 7.5 percent for both accounts.

To give an example of how this affects a resident's home, the ads point out that if your home is valued at \$29,000 (which is the average for a home in Parmer County), currently a resident pays \$92.04 (without any exemptions). This consists of \$72.29 from the General Fund tax rate and \$19.75 from the Farm to Market Road tax rate.

If a 7.5 percent tax rate were to be approved, for the same \$29,000 house, a resident would pay a total county tax of \$97.56 -- a hike of \$5.52 over the current rate.

The 7.5 percent is below the rollback figure of 8 percent. If the commissioners went 8 percent, residents could petition for a rollback of taxes.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Voted to re-schedule their Oct. 9 meeting to Oct. 6.

-- Approved a request from the four school districts -- Bovina, Friona, Farwell and Lazbuddie -- asking that the majority of money in the Parmer County Permanent School Fund corpus C.D. be distributed into individual accounts of the four school districts.

The corpus C.D. has \$60,000 in it. The request asked that \$10,000 be left in that fund but the other \$50,000 be distributed according to the 1994-95 refined ADA figures given to the county judge this summer.

This gives the schools access to a larger portion of their funds but they still must get approval from the county commissioners before they spend the money -- on permanent improvements or bonded indebtedness.

The Parmer County Commissioners will hold a public hearing on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in 1995 by 7.50 percent. 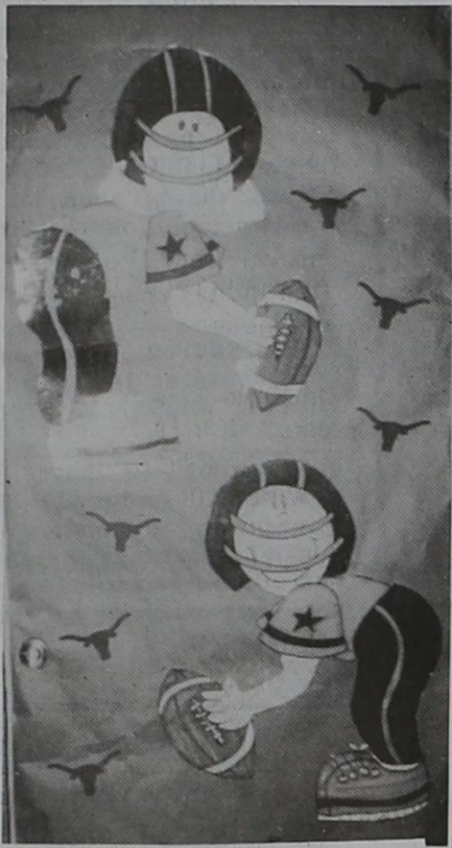

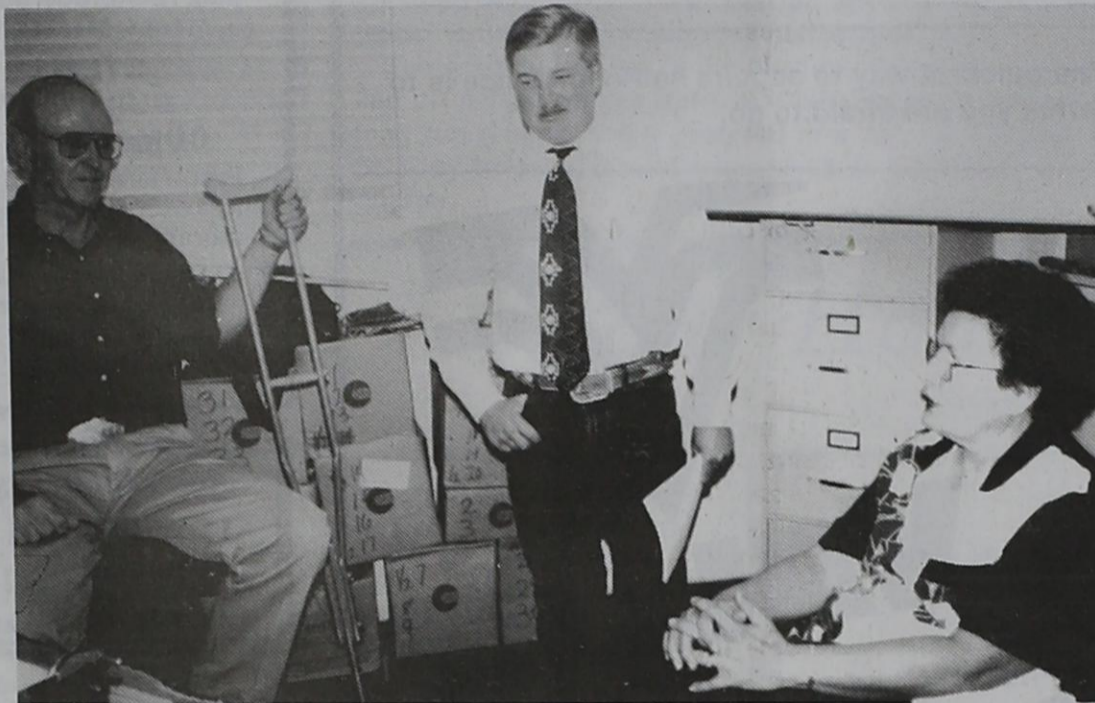

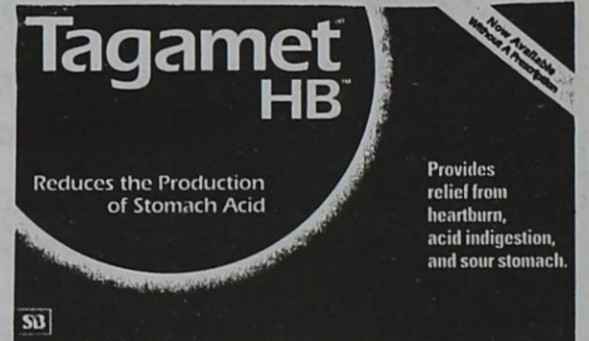
The agency was then sold to Jack Walker in 1989 and has operated as Town & Country Insurance since then.

Texico coach Mike Littlejohn commented that the team played well -- but can and will have to play much better.



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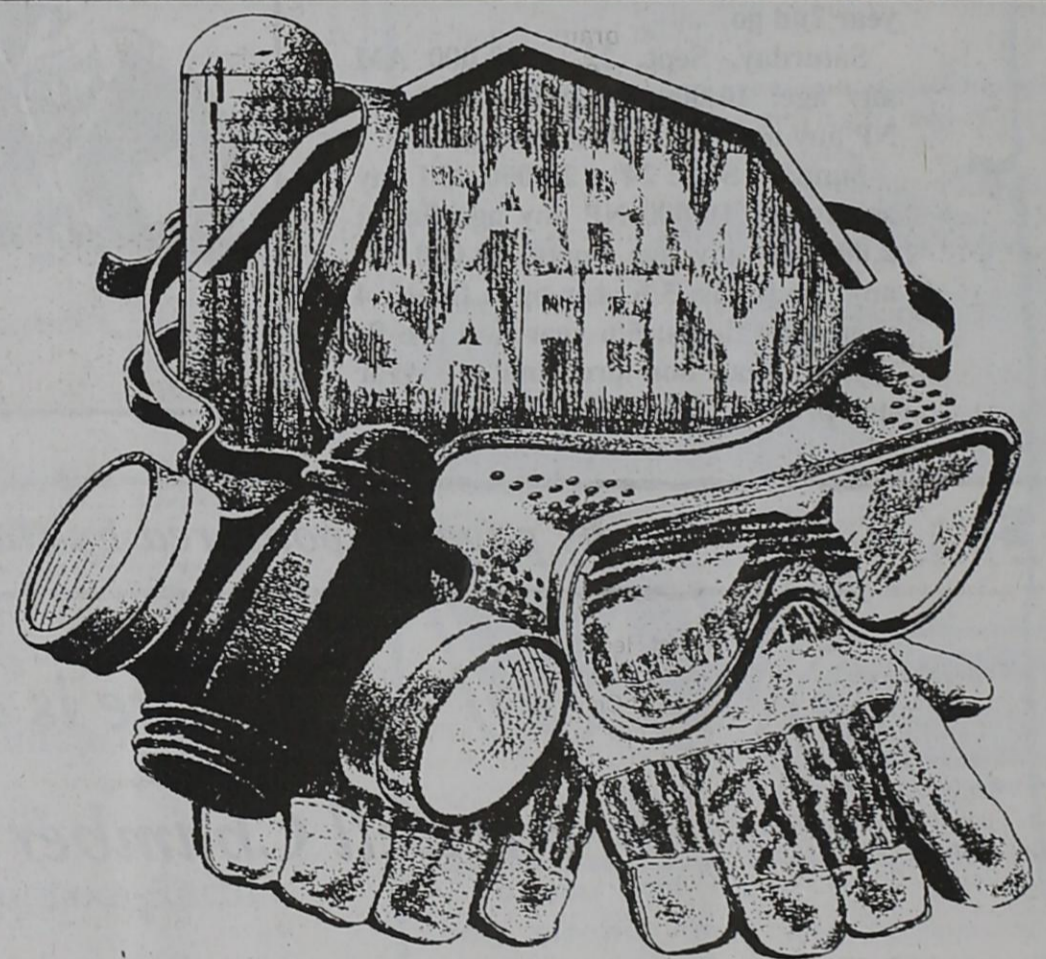

Against Morton, the Steers started slowly, but came on strong in the second half.

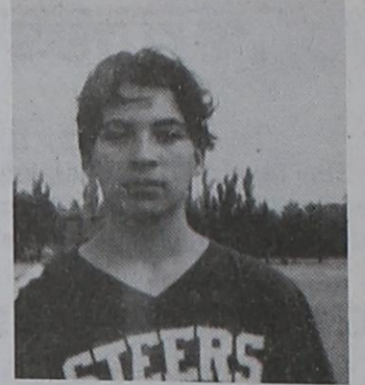
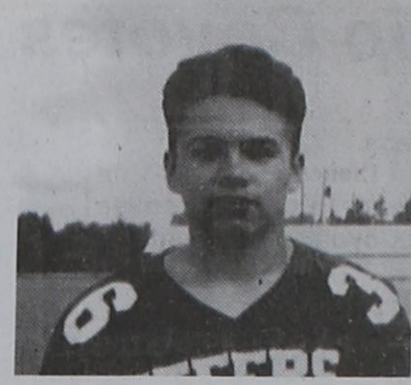

Texico cracks down on code violations

Texico has begun a crackdown on mobile homes that don't meet city codes, it was noted at Tuesday's City Council meeting.

Mayor Butch Tharp said six letters were sent to persons whose homes are not meeting the codes and need aesthetic review permits, with more letters to be sent out.

Two residents who received notices -- Bonnye Black and Ralph Autrey Sr. -- appeared at the meeting with their plans to upgrade their homes to meet the codes. Their plans were approved by the council. More applications are expected to be reviewed at the next council meeting.

The mobile home ordinance was passed in 1989 but Tharp said it had not been enforced completely, but it's time to get every mobile home up to code. This has come about after Tharp met with the building inspector. Texico has a joint powers agreement with Clovis to use its building inspector.

The building inspector looked at Texico's zoning and mobile home ordinances. He stressed that the skirting around a mobile home should match in color and texture.

In other business, the council:

-- Received a request from Mario Montes to move a house from 503 2nd St. in Farwell to Texico on lots just north of the swimming pool on State Line Road. The council will look at the structure before voting at its next meeting.

-- Hired Will Byrd as the new animal control officer.

-- Discussed a Chamber of Commerce request that the city spend \$500 to put electricity on poles along Wheeler Avenue so the Chamber can put up holiday decorations in December. The attorney will check into the legality of this.

-- Decided to replace the cement blocks behind the swimming pool with something more aesthetic.

-- Plans to put school bus pickup sites at Florence and Avenue E, and at Rose and Avenue E -- but will check with the marshal first.

-- Gave the fire department approval to accept land donated by Leon Meeks at the south end of the city for future use as a fire sub-station. The state has said OK to the sub-station but a grant request for the funding was turned down this year. State funds will be sought again. The fire department will pay for the survey and any other costs incurred.

-- Plans to adopt an official zoning map.

Deadline extended for moving building

The Texico City Council held a special meeting on Sept. 8 to discuss a building that had been moved into the community without a permit.

Corrine Ortiz had a building moved to 500 Wheeler and was given two weeks at the Aug. 22 meeting to remove it. She said at that meeting that she had sold the building.

Mrs. Ortiz told the council at Sept. 8 that the sale had not gone through and she still owned it. She asked for more time to move it because of lack of funds and because the mover was busy until the end of the month.

Asked about other movers, she said the one she used was more inexpensive than others.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey asked if she had considered tearing down the building, which would need a lot of work before it could be used for commercial purposes inside the city limits. Mrs. Ortiz said it was to be used to sell second-hand items.

The council voted to give Mrs. Ortiz a new deadline of 3 p.m. on Oct. 5 to have the building moved out of the city. Or if she decides to have it torn down (and the site cleaned up), she is to notify City Hall by Sept. 21.

Mrs. Ortiz said she will place a "for sale" sign on the building.

It was emphasized that if Mrs. Ortiz is found in violation of city codes -- i.e., the building is either not moved or torn down by the deadline --

that the matter will be turned over to the municipal judge.

Mayor Butch Tharp said a violation calls for a minimum fine of \$250 a day and possible 90-day jail sentence -- if the judge so chooses.

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PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 7, 1995

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 50 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature by general law may authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not exceeding \$300 million to finance educational loans to students. The maximum interest rate to be borne by the bonds must be set by law. The legislature may provide for the investment of bond proceeds and may establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation the property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas if the property is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization as defined by general law. The Comptroller's Property Tax Division has identified the Grand Lodge of Texas, also known as the Masonic Lodges, as the primary organization which would qualify for this tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 51 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides that the farm and ranch finance program fund shall be administered by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority and not by the Veterans' Land Board, as provided by current law. In addition, the proposed amendment provides that the proceeds of \$200 million of the \$500 million in bonds authorized by the Texas Constitution for the farm and ranch finance program fund may be diverted to the agricultural fund and the rural micro-enterprise development fund, also authorized by the Texas Constitution, to be used for agricultural and rural economic development programs.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for the expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agricultural products."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 46 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition. In divorce and probate situations, a piece of property may be owned jointly by two

or more people, and each person owns an undivided interest in the property, as opposed to a specific portion of the property. If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the purchase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. Senate Joint Resolution 46 would allow the lending institution to foreclose on the homestead property for an owelty of partition if the purchaser defaulted on the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would allow the refinancing of a lien against a homestead. Finally, the proposed amendment would allow a purchaser or lender to rely on an affidavit that states that the property to be conveyed or encumbered is not the homestead of the affiant.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and for the refinancing of a lien against a homestead, including a federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of the owner."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase by \$500 million the constitutional authorization of the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the state to provide housing financing to Texas veterans. The proceeds from the bonds authorized by this amendment shall be used to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II to be administered and invested as provided by law. The bonds authorized by this amendment shall be incontestable after execution by the Veterans' Land Board, approval by the attorney general, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund II."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 64 proposes a constitutional amendment which would extend the tax exemption under article VIII, section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution for the residence homestead of a person age 65 or older to the surviving spouse of a person who received the exemption. The surviving spouse must be age 55 or older when the deceased spouse died, and the property must be the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the deceased spouse died and remain the surviving spouse's residence homestead. A surviving spouse who already receives an exemption under this section of the Texas Constitution is not entitled to an additional exemption under the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would reduce the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for the superconducting super collider fund from \$500 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment reducing the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for undertakings related to the superconducting super collider research facility from \$500 million to \$250 million."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 80 proposes a constitutional amendment abolishing the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties. In Mills County, the office of constable is abolished, and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff. In Reagan and Roberts counties, the office of constable is abolished and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff only if a majority of voters in each of the respective counties favors the proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia. Currently, such investments are prohibited by article XVI, section 70(r) of the Texas Constitution, which would be repealed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the constitutional office of state treasurer effective September 1, 1996. The transfer of specific constitutional powers and duties to the comptroller of public accounts takes effect on that date. The statutory powers and duties and the property and other obligations of the state treasurer are transferred to officers and agencies of state government as the legislature provides by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of state treasurer."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment requiring that land devoted to wildlife management be taxed on the basis of its productive capacity. The proposed amendment also adds a temporary provision to the Texas Constitution validating the changes to the law made by Chapter 560, Acts of the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1991, which amended the Tax Code to allow land used for wildlife management to be appraised as agricultural land. The temporary provision also provides that a property owner is not authorized to claim a refund of taxes paid unless the tax payment was challenged before the effective date of the proposed amendment. The temporary provision expires on January 1, 1998.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow open-space land used for wildlife management to qualify for tax appraisal in the same manner as open-space agricultural land, subject to eligibility limitations provided by the legislature."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature may exempt from ad valorem taxation income-producing personal property and mineral interests that have a taxable value which is insufficient to recover the costs of administering the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation personal property and mineral interests having a value insufficient to recover the administrative costs of collecting the taxes."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution No. 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 68 proposes a constitutional amendment that allows the legislature to raise the current ad valorem tax exemption for disabled veterans and their surviving spouses and minor children. The tax exemptions would be raised based on a veteran's disability rating as follows:

Disability	Maximum Tax Exemption
10% - 30%	\$ 5,000
30% - 50%	\$ 7,500
50% - 70%	\$10,000
More than 70%	\$12,000
Age 65 and 10% or higher	\$12,000
Loss or loss of use of limb	\$12,000
Blindness or paraplegia	\$12,000



The spouse and children of any veteran who dies while on active duty may be granted an exemption of up to \$5,000. The amounts of the exemptions provided for in this proposed amendment may be repealed by the legislature by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to raising the limits of the exemption from ad valorem taxation of property owned by disabled veterans or by the surviving spouses or surviving minor children of disabled veterans."

My senior year, I was the captain of my swimming and soccer team. My date David was the captain of the soccer and the track team. That meant captains' braids for all four sports. I almost didn't have to wear a top. I could have wrapped the braids around my body and looked just fine.

The braids were in addition

to the 3 flowers, 10 streamers, most of them 6 foot or longer, 10 cowbells, mini horseshoes, track shoes, soccer balls, footballs and little soda bottles - which I still don't know what they were for.

I had to learn how to walk with the added weight and to not trip over the streamers. All my mum was missing were lights - that would have completed the hardware on this special homecoming corsage. I think David had to take out a loan to pay for it, too. But it was what he wanted to give to me and that was fine. I still have it, too.

In college, Homecoming is still a big deal too. I went to Texas Tech and fondly remember the Homecoming Parade and all the activities of the day. I was in Women's Service Organization, a service sorority and was also a little sister in Sigma Nu fraternity. I was also in the Student Senate among other things that I was over-actively involved in.

I was busy during Homecoming. So busy, in fact that my memories of Tech Homecomings are pretty much a blur - a scrambled blur of what I did with what group. Except for one memory that has forever made an impression on my mind. It almost made a permanent impression on my body as well.

I had to be very well dressed, hair and make-up done with my best smile on and ready to roll at 9:30 a.m. No problem, except for the fact that I also had to help finish the Homecoming float that my sorority was entering in the parade. We stayed up until 6 a.m. that very morning finishing it. I was tired, but I made it.

The parade was fun, but terribly hot and I got the most awful cramp in my shoulder from waving. The physical rigors that Queen Elizabeth

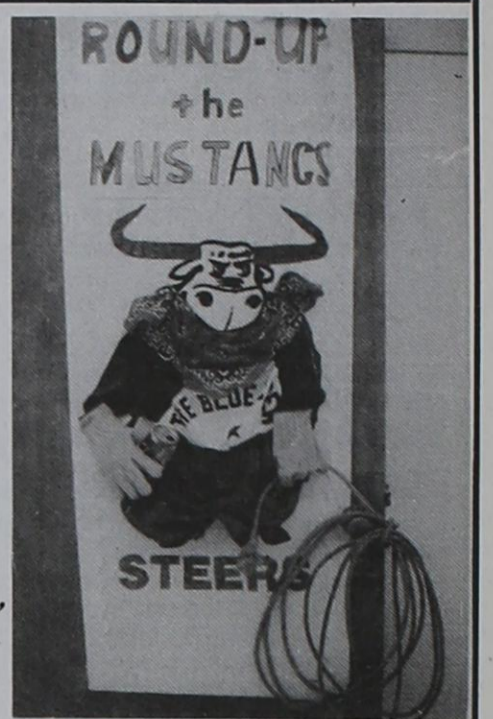

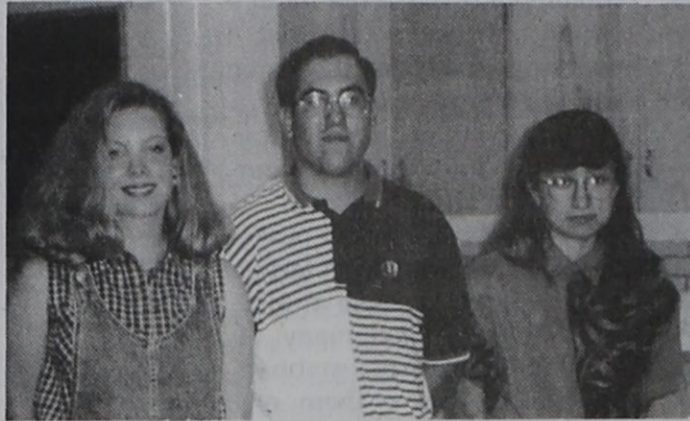

Corn line resistant to spider mites

From the Texas Corn Producers Board:

In a development that could revolutionize insect control in the Panhandle, a Texas A&M University researcher has developed a corn line that is resistant to the dreaded spider mite. The new corn line is "TAM-MITE 1." It was developed by Dr. Tom Archer, entomologist in Lubbock. It's a white seeded, full season corn that flowers about 90 days after planting. Archer says the seed line germplasm is being released to commercial seed companies this fall.

He said he expects the seed firms to breed the germplasm with their best lines to develop commercial, mite resistant hybrids for growers. That means the seeds should be available to growers in about three years.

Archer's research was funded primarily from the Texas half-cent per bushel corn checkoff, which is administered by the TCPB.

Mites are primarily a problem in semi-arid regions of the Plains. They feed on corn leaves. When dry summers combine with hot temperatures, mite populations can explode in numbers and severely damage corn yields.

In Archer's 1993-94 Texas research, TAM-MITE 1 was crossed with two popular seed lines which are susceptible to mites. The hybrid seed was grown and compared to susceptible seed lines. The resistance of the seed lines was rated in a scale of 1 to 10 for feeding damage by mites, with 10 being 100 percent damage.

In one comparison, the first TAM-MITE 1-cross scored a 3, or 30 percent damage, far below the economic threshold where corn is significantly damaged. That compared to a rating of 7, or 70 percent damage from the susceptible line. Similar results were seen in the second comparison, where the TAM-MITE 1-cross was less than 40 percent damaged, compared to 70 percent plus for the susceptible line.

There are no trade-offs of mite resistance for lower yields, says Archer, noting that the resistant crosses had yields at or above normal High Plains irrigated corn production.

The Texico Junior High Football team defeated Tatum 20-0 on Sept. 8.

Shay Norvell scored the first TD with a four yard run. The score was 6-0 into the 3rd quarter. Eric Stanley broke loose for a 15 yard run for a touchdown and Tom Castillo brought the score to 14-0 with a run for the extra points.

In the 4th quarter Frankie Ortiz intercepted and ran for a 30 yard touchdown. The team hosts Bovina on Sept. 14.

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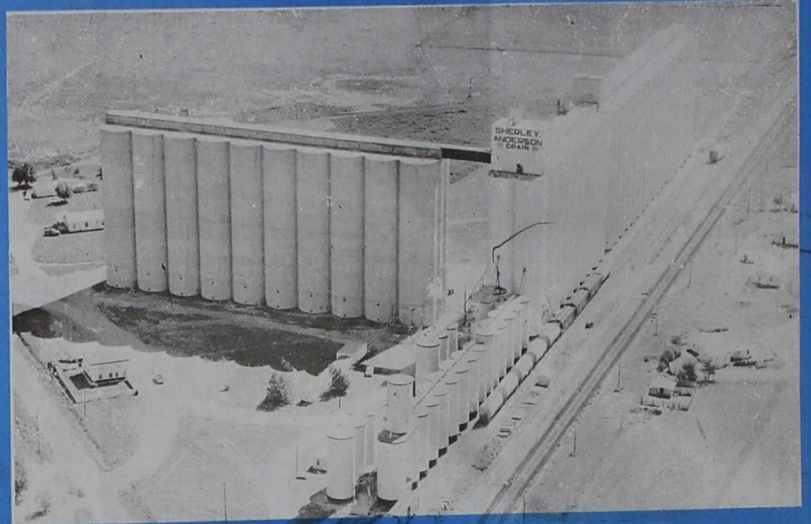


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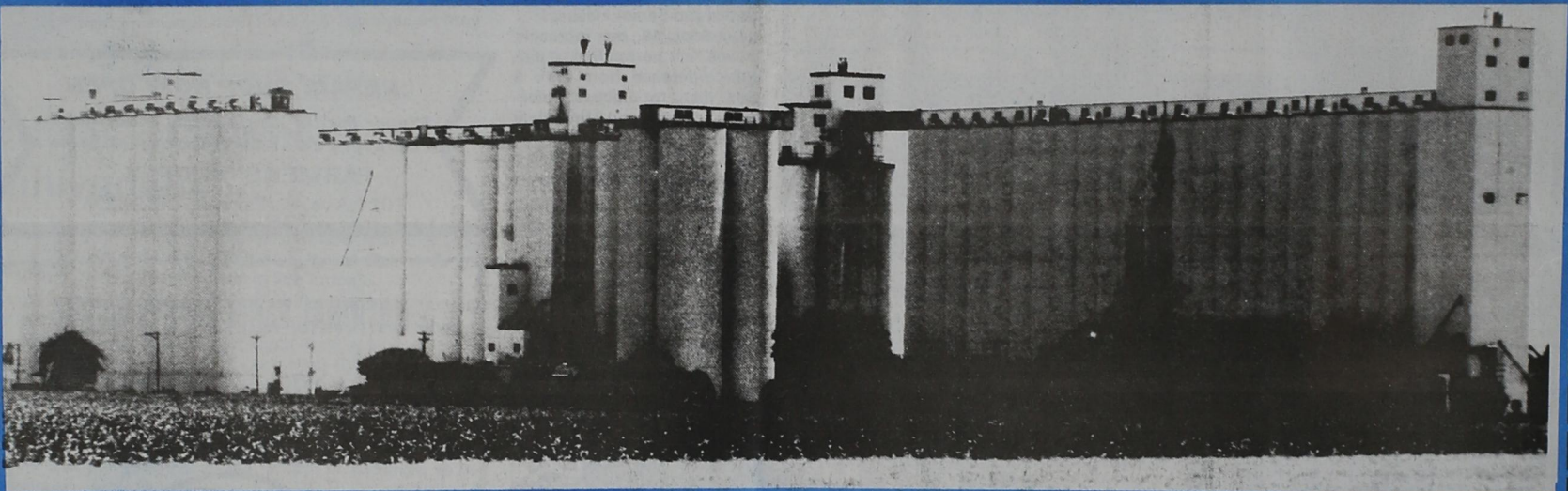

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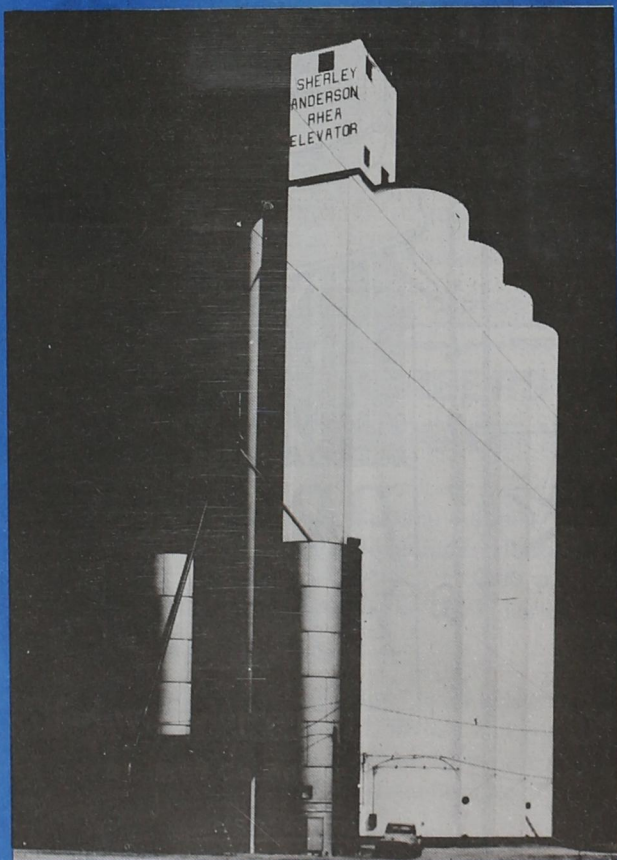
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
