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'Mommy's Little Angels'

Book written about the Lumbrera murder case

"Mommy's Little Angels" is the title of a new book by Mary Lou Cavanaugh that chronicles the story of Diana Lumbrera. The book is subtitled "The True Story of a Mother Who Murdered Seven Children."

Mrs. Lumbrera, a former Bovina resident, was convicted in the serial killings and is serving time in prison. She will become eligible for parole in the year 2012.

The book was published Onyx, Signet Classics, Mentor -- a division of Penguin USA, 375 Hudson St., New York, N.Y. 10014. The phone number is (212) 366-2000. The paperback sells for \$5.99. The author is a former sheriff's deputy in the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department and a professor of criminal justice.

According to a press release from the publisher: "People associate serial killers with deranged men, skulking in the night on a hunt for innocent women. Yet, here is the story of another type of serial killer: a young woman, who in the course of 14 years lived in our area, methodically killed, one by one, her children and almost got away."

"By the time Texas native Diana Lumbrera reached her 32nd birthday in 1990, she had already murdered her six young children and the infant daughter of a cousin. Her motives were varied -- anger, jealousy, greed and the thrill the killings brought. With every victim, she collected a small amount from the child's life insurance policy and relocated,

leaving unpaid bills and suspicious and confused friends and doctors behind.

"Her killings stopped in 1990 in Kansas when a doctor recognized the signs of suffocation on her last child and called the police. This sparked an intense investigation into all seven deaths and culminated in two murder trials. Both trials ended with life sentences that were shifted down by plea bargaining to only seven and 15 years. Diana will be free in 17 years."

The book has four parts -- the Kansas investigation, the Texas investigation, "preparing for trial" and the trial itself.

Parmer County plays a large part in the book, especially featuring then-Parmer County sheriff's deputy Richard Bonham, who still lives in Bovina. He began the Texas probe into the Lumbrera case after the death of a child in Kansas.

Bonham and John Blackwell, owner of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home in Friona, did a lot of the digging into records of Mrs. Lumbrera's children. And District Attorney Johnny Actkinson, who handled the case locally, was prominently mentioned. Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams is also thanked for his assistance.

Parmer County communities may not have come across well in the book. Farwell is mentioned as "a town so small that it has only one traffic light, and it blinks yellow 24 hours a day." Of Friona, the author writes "like all the other towns in this part of the Panhandle, Friona was a town in decay

and had a population of fewer than 4,000." And Parmer County "was rural, sparsely populated and very poor."

The book pointed out the difficulty in understanding that murders were taking place since the children were taken to different hospitals, and the causes of death appeared natural.

But once it was ascertained that foul play could be involved, the book notes that Actkinson reorganized his work schedule to include the investigation and prosecution of possibly four serial killings. And he had his assistant, attorney Luther Thompson, coordinate the efforts of his office with investigators from Castro County and in Kansas.

The book said that Parmer County didn't have enough money in its county budget to pay for capital murder trials; nor did Bailey County. "The county commissioners in both counties told Actkinson that they would impose a special tax on the county residents to raise funds for the trials -- IF he thought the trial were really necessary," the author wrote.

The author noted that Actkinson, aware of the murder verdict in Kansas and the fact that wealthier Lubbock County planned to prosecute, reached a plea bargain with Mrs. Lumbrera's attorney in 1991. Mrs. Lumbrera pleaded nolo contendere to one count of first degree murder (Melinda Garza in 1982) in Parmer County, receiving a life sentence -- equal to seven years or less before becoming eligible for parole.

"Such members would not

be able to enforce the law but would uphold a long-lasting tradition of the law enforcement community.

"In this day and time, Sheriff's Posses are used in parades, searches, crowd control and some emergency situations. It takes loyalty and dedication to become a member of a highly-acclaimed Sheriff's Posse.

"A Sheriff's Posse is completely voluntary. It would have certain guidelines set up before citizens could become members. The Posse would also have to be self-supportive. But with enough community support, we feel this could be a great asset to all the communities in Parmer County and to the sheriff's office.

Recipe of Week

Chocolate Peppermint Ice Cream Cake Rolls

- 3 cake rolls, about 5 servings each
 - 1 package light devil's food cake mix
 - Confectioners sugar
 - 1 1/3 cups water
 - 3 eggs
 - 1/2 gallon lowfat vanilla ice cream, softened
 - 1/3 cup crushed peppermint candy
 - Light (fat-free) hot fudge topping
- Spray 11x7x1 1/2 inch glass baking dish with non-stick cooking spray. Line bottom with waxed paper and spray again. Generously sprinkle 3 clean kitchen towels with confectioners sugar. Set aside
2. Prepare cake mix batter according to package directions using the water and eggs.
 3. Spread 1/3 of the batter (1 3/4 cups) in prepared dish. Microwave at medium for 9 minutes, rotating dish a half turn after 4 minutes. Microwave at high for 1 1/2 minutes.
 4. Let stand 5 minutes. Loosen edges and invert onto towel. Carefully remove waxed paper. Generously sprinkle cake with confectioners sugar. Starting with short end of cake, roll up in towel. Cool completely.
 5. Prepare baking dish again and repeat steps 3 and 4 twice with remaining batter.
 6. For each cake roll, carefully unroll cooled cake but do not lay flat. Spread with 1/3 of the ice cream. Sprinkle with 1/3 of the crushed candy. Roll up and wrap securely in foil. Freeze until firm. To serve, slice and top with hot fudge sauce.

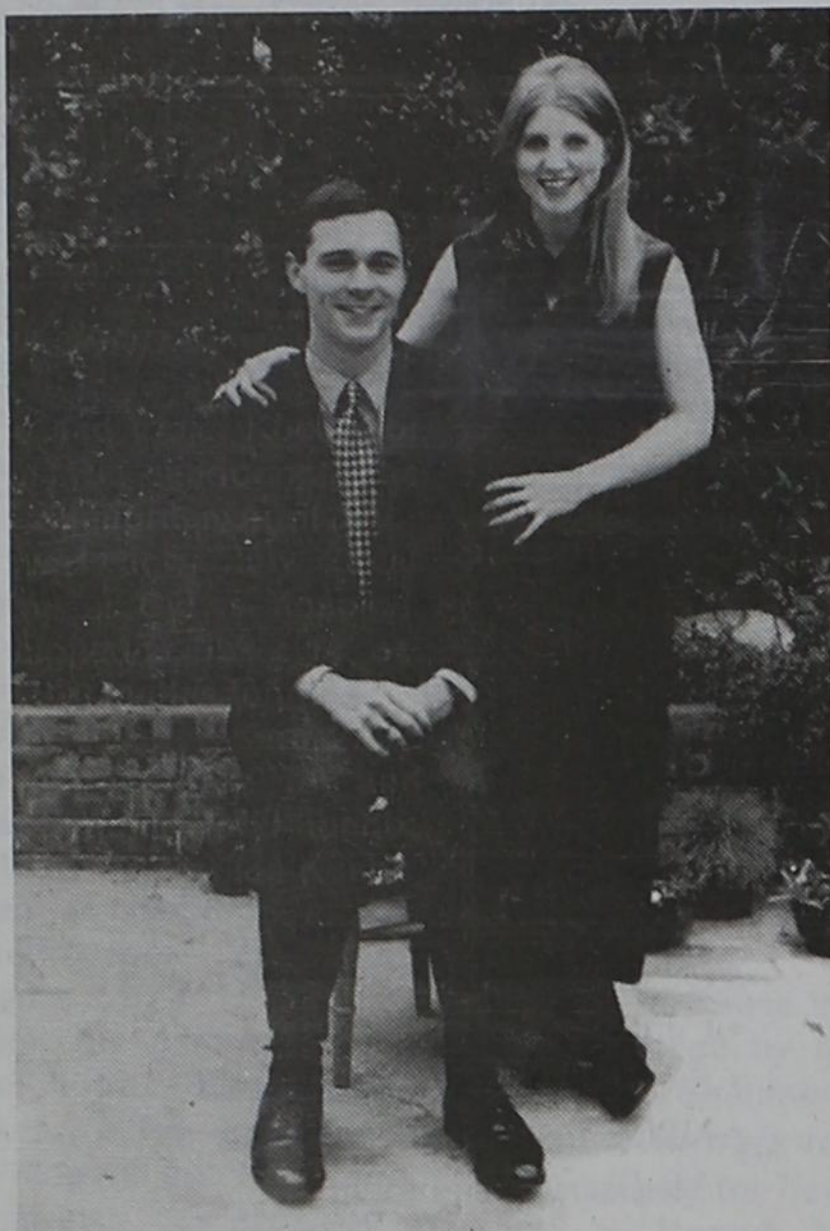

Farwell's TAAS scores improve

The summer has been a busy time for Farwell Superintendent Richard Boothby. He has been doing some travelling and some heavy reading.

Sounds like the ideal summer vacation.

However, the travelling and reading have all been for the benefit of the Farwell School District.

Mr. Boothby has attended several conferences and planning seminars for the school systems in the region and the state. He has met with various Texas State Legislators during these conferences to discuss legislative policies that effect the Farwell Schools, teachers and students.

The reading that he has been doing these days is from a thick spiral bound book that is entitled "Senate Bill 1" and the author is the 74th Texas Legislature.

Senate Bill 1 basically changed the entire school code for Texas schools. The superintendent must learn and understand how to implement all the changes within their particular school system before the school year starts.

"The encouraging thing that is being mandated by the new school code is that the control of our school system has now been given back to the local school district. The state is staying out of most of the issues that directly effect our schools," Mr. Boothby stated.

Farwell Schools are in great shape going into the new school year both from an academic and population standpoint.

One indicator of this are the TAAS test results for the Farwell ISD. Farwell students have shown major improvement in their reading, mathematic and writing skills over the past several years of participating in this test.

"I give all the credit to my staff of excellent teachers for this success," Boothby commented. "This test is a very important gauge for how our students are doing according to the state's standards."

The pressure for this test is not to just perform well on the test. This test actually sets the pace for the education that students receive in the classroom.

"The TAAS test gets students prepared for how to reason; how to think instead of just memorizing what the textbooks say," Boothby said.

The new school code is in sync with theory as well.

The code left the "small school formula" in the area of funding for schools. This formula is a positive aspect for smaller and rural schools. Because of the lower student to teacher ratios, it actually costs smaller schools more to educate their students.

Teachers will benefit more from the new school code, as well. The code includes a revised teacher salary schedule. It also completely does away with the "career ladder" approach to earning a salary.

A beginning teacher will now earn a minimum of \$1850 to \$2000 for a full-time ten month contract. This is based on a work schedule of 183 days for the 95-96 school year and 185 work days for the 96-97 school year. The new schedule is now a 20 year schedule instead of a 10 year schedule.

Doing away with the career ladder offers teachers more opportunity for advancement and does not decrease their pay if they happen to move to another school district within the state. It also gives teachers more of a chance to work together and to foster better working relationships. The career ladder tended to pit teachers against each other, all in the name of "tenure."

Another change in the policy that effects a teacher's work schedule is in the area of time allowed for classroom preparation. The old code mandated that a teacher have 45 minutes a day set aside for classroom preparation. The new code outlines that a teacher is to fulfill 450 minutes every two weeks for preparation. This way, a teacher can better arrange their class schedules and topics, ultimately allowing more time for the students and their lessons, instead of the static 45 minutes a day.

Teachers are also going to see changes in the number of days and the types of days that they are allowed for sick and personal leave. In the past, a teacher was allowed 5 days of state leave and 5 days of local leave to be used in times of sickness. They were also allowed 2 days of personal leave.

The new code is now more in compliance with the Federal Family Leave Act. All state permitted days are labeled personal leave.

In the areas of classroom discipline, the new code is allowing more flexibility for individual discipline programs. A principal and teacher can cater an alternative program of discipline for each case.

The "No Pass - No Play" rules have been changed by the new code as well. It is now a one time ineligibility for a three week period of time. The student may, however, still participate in practice or rehearsals. If the students' grades go back up after the three weeks, they are eligible to participate in competition. If their grades show no improvement, then the policy of ineligibility goes back to

the six weeks of being withheld from games and programs.

The new code also holds a new provision that allows a period of silence at the start of each day. The time limit is to be set by the school and is to be used for personal, silent prayer or meditation.

The new school code also contains many more aspects of administration and education that are too numerous to go into in this article. Many topics have virtually stayed the same, while others have completely changed.

The teachers and staff will have to be taught the entire code through several staff development training sessions. The new code mandates a minimum of 3 days of staff training and then offered a waiver to request 2 additional days to be set aside for training. Mr. Boothby put in for the waiver.

Farwell teachers and staff will be in training sessions periodically throughout the year to learn the new code. However, all of the material is open to the teachers in Mr. Boothby's office for anytime that they have a question or concern during the school year.

Consent form needed

Parents of Farwell High School students: if you desire your student to have an open campus privilege, then you must come to the High School office and sign a consent form.

The signing of this form must be witnessed by either Dollie Villareal, school secretary or by Larry Gregory, school principal.

The form must be signed by the first day of school. The High School office is open Monday through Friday 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4 p.m.
