## Blackwell nabs 4th grid contest

### License crackdown coming

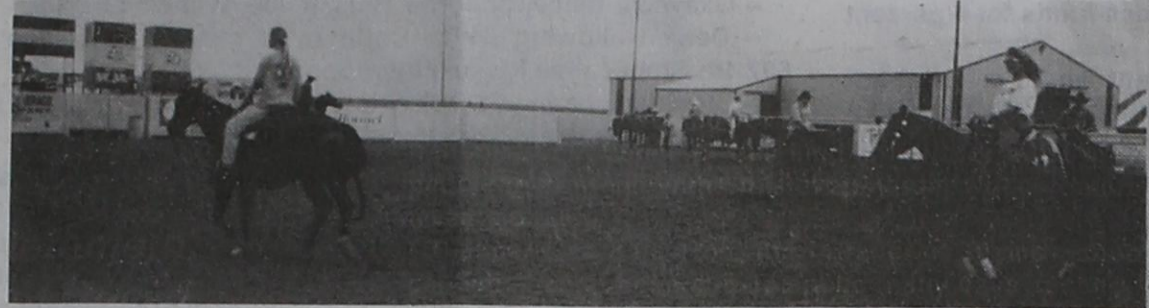
Farwell residents will be getting notices soon to the effect that if they don't have Texas licenses on their vehicles they ought to get them.

The Farwell City Council voted 4-1 (Don Geris opposed) on Tuesday to send out notices with the water bills in October.

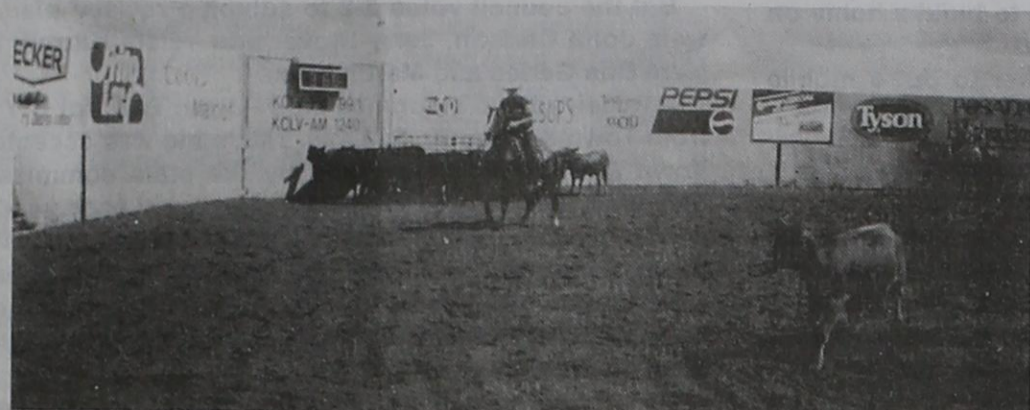
A couple of years ago, the council voted to urge residents to obey this law. But there was no follow-up.

This time there will be. After Nov. 1, Farwell Police Chief

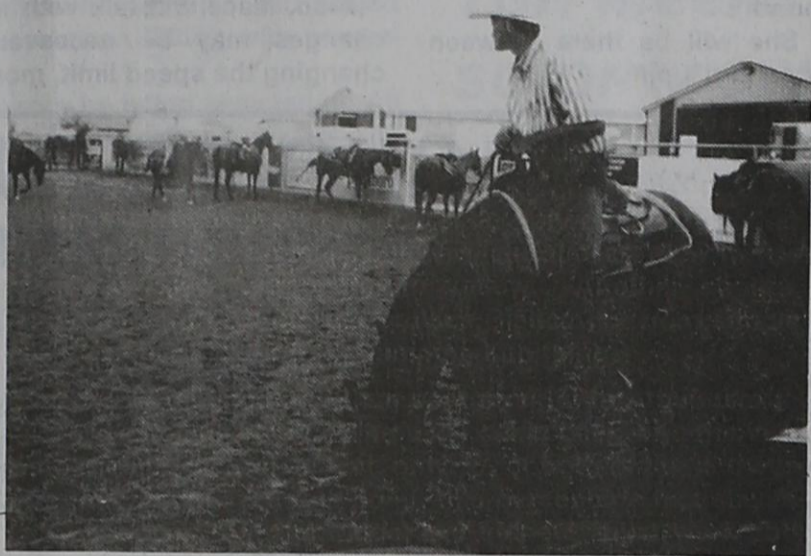

## Texico 3rd grader waits patiently for kidney transplant

Bianca Vega is learning a lot about patience these days. She is patiently waiting for the go-ahead word for a kidney transplant. Patience of this kind is hard for most grown-up people to contend with. It is even harder when you are only 8 years old.

Bianca is an 8 year old third grader at Texico School, except she hasn't been able to spend many days in school this year because her condition makes it very hard for her to stay at school.

She is suffering from a condition call "In-Stage Renal Failure." This means that her kidneys are giving out and that failure is imminent, unless she can get a kidney transplant.

On July 10, she went through an operation to help stall the kidney failure. The doctors inserted a tube into her stomach and renal system for dialysis. This tube allows for the dialysis to be done at home each night for 10 hours.

Bianca had never displayed signs of being sick as a toddler or into her 6th and 7th years. She had always been very healthy and extremely active. But when Bianca went into the 2nd grade, she began to slow down and complain of being too tired to do anything.

Her mother Darlene Gutierrez tells of how she began to notice the change in her little girl.

"Bianca had always gotten good grades in school and was always really happy and energetic, but then she started getting very poor grades and coming straight home from school and going to bed," she said. "She would sleep all afternoon and evening. We would wake her up to eat, but she would just say that she wasn't hungry because she had eaten the day before."

Bianca was taken to the doctor in Farwell. Her mother suspected it was anemia, but was curious as to why her daughters' skin had begun to yellow. Another strange symptom were how big the bruises Bianca got from simple falls off of her bike or from bumping into things.

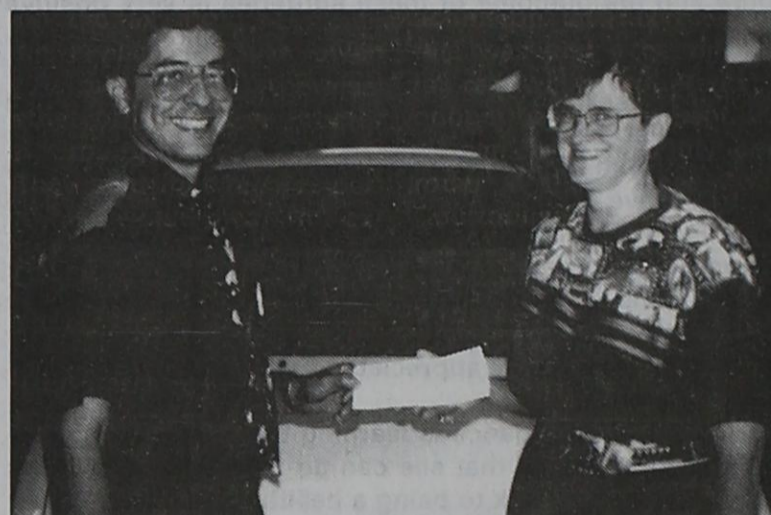
She was examined and then sent straight to Albuquerque for more extensive tests. The tests came back with the verdict of kidney failure. In fact, only 5% of both of her kidneys were functioning. To this point, this percentage has stayed pretty constant, but the longer her kidneys must work and be on dialysis, the weaker they'll get.

Bianca and her family take one day at a time with her condition. She had to undergo another surgery on Aug. 24 to replace the dialysis tube in her stomach. Currently, her color is fairly good and her spirits are holding. She has had to fight bouts of depression and moodiness because of the powerful medications that she must take in addition to her dialysis. She also receives three shots a day.

The family has also learned that tests that were taken on her bladder and urinary tract have come back with abnormalities. These conditions may be related to the kidney failure, but are going to be looked at after the primary problem of her kidneys are taken care of.

Darlene and her ex-husband were called by the doctor in Albuquerque on Sept. 12 and were told that they were both considered compatible donor options for Bianca. They must go through more extensive testing to determine if they are healthy and strong enough to be considered as donors for their daughter. Just because they have been tested as compatible doesn't assure that the transplant can be done

## Parmar County Commissioners conduct tax hearing

The Parmar County Commissioners held their tax hearing Monday.

The commissioners have proposed a 7.5 percent tax increase, which would add just

under 2 cents to its current tax rate of .3246 cents.

Residents attending were DAVIS SEARS, Gene Sterling, Faye Ford and Ruddene Pulliam. They asked questions about the tax rate.

An explanation was given by Parmar County Appraisal District officials Ron Proctor and Kirby Brantley.

They said that the 7.5 percent hike would mean, for ex-

ample, that the county tax rate on a house valued at \$29,000 (the county average) would be \$5.52 a year.

County taxes on a home valued at \$50,000 would go up about \$10.

One question dealt with the legal ads that appeared misleading. Brantley explained that it was a state form that had to be followed.

The commissioners took no action on the tax rate since this was just a hearing. The tax rate will be adopted at the budget hearing on Sept. 25 at 10 a.m. in the county courtroom at the Parmar County Courthouse.

In other business, the council:

-- Increased the tax rate for 1996 by 3 percent, from .3376 cents per \$100 valuation to .3477 cents per \$100 valuation (about a penny hike).

-- Discussed pay raises for employees. A decision was tabled until next month. The budget includes funds for 5 percent raises.

-- Heard a complaint from a resident about a neighbor shining a light onto her home. Police Chief Roy McGaa said a criminal complaint had been filed with the district attorney's office and the person was warned to do something about his light. Now a second complaint has been filed and it's going through legal channels.

-- Discussed getting rid of dead tree limbs at the city park. An Amarillo firm wants \$4,500 for the job. A decision was tabled.

-- Allowed a variance for David Cochran to build a home on Fifth Street across from the Baptist Church.

-- Approved a variance for Buddy Prather to put a mobile

home on the former Nutri Tech property. He will have some horses there, too, he said.

-- Okayed Mike Sosa to bring a house from Friona to the 200 block of First Street. It needs work.

-- Okayed a fence for Jerrie Tims at 406 Ave. G.

-- Denied allowing Joyce Coffman to change her fence at 602 4th St. because it's on city property.

-- Revised cemetery rules to allow burying cremated remains on plots already occupied by family members.

-- Voted to send a revised site plan to the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department on the walking trail that Farwell asked for several years back. Mayor Jimmie Mace said he was concerned about maintenance and upkeep, that most residents oppose the project, and noted that eventually the school will have a rubberized track around the football field.

But the council voted 3-2 to submit a revised plan. In favor were John Carlson, Jerry Stover and Ysleta Kittrell. Opposed were Don Gerles and Martin Kube.

-- Received two insurance bids -- from TML, for \$17,488, and from Town & Country, \$23,426. TML's bid was accepted. Since Town & Country is governed by the state commission, and TML isn't, TML is able to submit a lower bid each year.

-- Received recommendations from McGaa on traffic control devices around the school. He said the current speed is unrealistic (it's 15 mph and he supported 20 mph), the current time doesn't start early enough and the current warning are inadequate.

He offered several recommendations. The one the council picked was to move 8 "school" signs from their current sites in mid-blocks to the corners of those blocks.

Also, Mace will talk with school officials about what other changes may be necessary, such as flashing beacons, changing the speed limit, more signs and painting the street.

For now, though, Bianca is learning that patience and living day by day are all that she can do until she can get her transplant and get back to being a healthy and happy 8-year old little girl.



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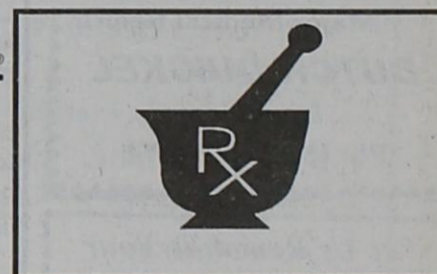

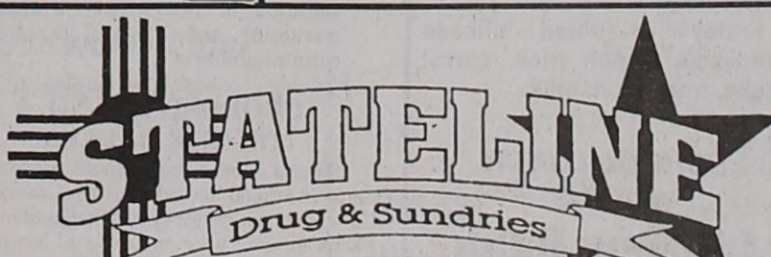

my assessment, and that more reform can be achieved. It does look promising for reforms with the budget, Medicare, etc. I'm always optimistic.

An update on another topic I've been harping on for several years:

As longtime readers know, the real bug I have under my cushion relates to what I see is the crushing of the middle class and the turning of the U.S. into a two-tier society -- rich and poor.

I've been writing about this for about four years now. And how disastrous this will be for American society and economic life.

That's why I got a kick that the national media made a big story last week of a large daily newspaper that trumpeted a story of that same message. I guess I get no respect.

Anyway, I had thought by now, the mid-1990s, that we would be seeing pressure points simmer or explode. That hasn't happened yet. How come?

Several factors have occurred to postpone for a few years the oncoming deluge:

-- Americans have run up credit borrowing to the largest degree ever.

-- It's now the norm for both husband and wife to work fulltime jobs -- yet earning what one spouse used to make.

-- Many bread-winners are now working two jobs.

-- Most importantly, the

government "safety net" has expanded.

To use just one example, check to see the number of students in school who now get free breakfast and lunch. And this also occurs during the summer break. The number has risen dramatically.

I predict that in a few years youths also will receive free dinners.

Thus, the government will be feeding most of our kids all three meals virtually 365 days a year.

That's why I get a kick out of the verbiage that emanates from Washington on government cutbacks. That language may sound good for publicity purposes, but the reality is quite different.

What we're seeing is that the way our government is dealing with the two-tier situation is to increase the lower tier's dependence on government assistance.

Am I wrong?

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## PUBLIC NOTICE

### BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 7, 1995

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 50 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature by general law may authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not exceeding \$300 million to finance educational loans to students. The maximum interest rate to be borne by the bonds must be set by law. The legislature may provide for the investment of bond proceeds and may establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation the property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas if the property is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization as defined by general law. The Comptroller's Property Tax Division has identified the Grand Lodge of Texas, also known as the Masonic Lodges, as the primary organization which would qualify for this tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 51 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides that the farm and ranch finance program fund shall be administered by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority and not by the Veterans' Land Board, as provided by current law. In addition, the proposed amendment provides that the proceeds of \$200 million of the \$500 million in bonds authorized by the Texas Constitution for the farm and ranch finance program fund may be diverted to the agricultural fund and the rural micro-enterprise development fund, also authorized by the Texas Constitution, to be used for agricultural and rural economic development programs.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for the expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agricultural products."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 46 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition. In divorce and probate situations, a piece of property may be owned jointly by two

or more people, and each person owns an undivided interest in the property, as opposed to a specific portion of the property. If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the purchase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. Senate Joint Resolution 46 would allow the lending institution to foreclose on the homestead property for an owelty of partition if the purchaser defaulted on the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would allow the refinance of a lien against a homestead. Finally, the proposed amendment would allow a purchaser or lender to rely on an affidavit that states that the property to be conveyed or encumbered is not the homestead of the affiant.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and for the refinance of a lien against a homestead, including a federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of the owner."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase by \$500 million the constitutional authorization of the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the state to provide housing financing to Texas veterans. The proceeds from the bonds authorized by this amendment shall be used to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II to be administered and invested as provided by law. The bonds authorized by this amendment shall be incontestable after execution by the Veterans' Land Board, approval by the attorney general, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

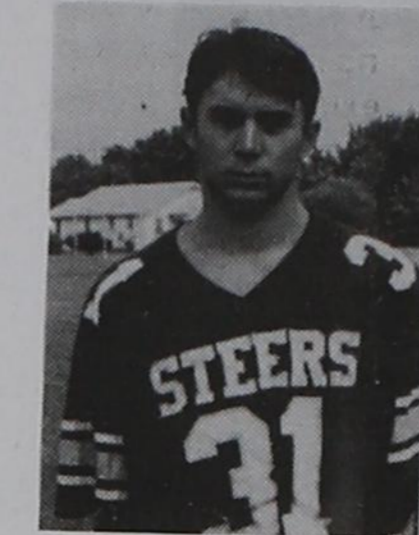
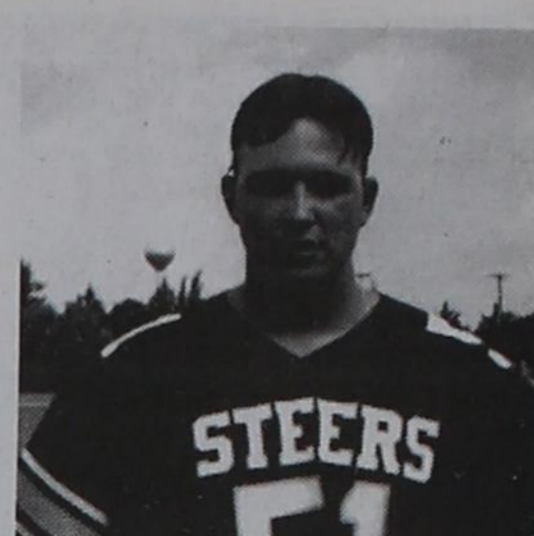
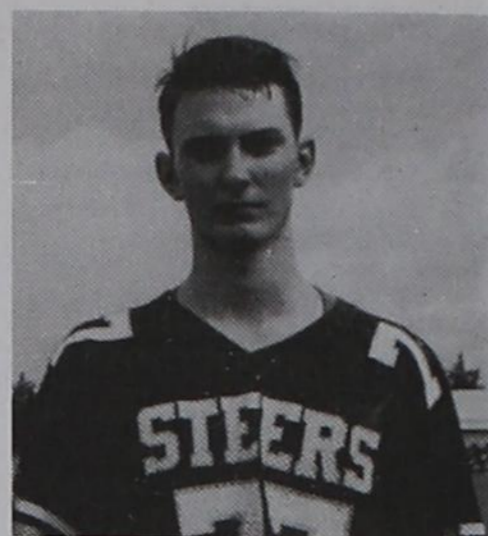
"The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund II."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 64 proposes a constitutional amendment which would extend the tax exemption under article VIII, section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution for the residence homestead of a person age 65 or older to the surviving spouse of a person who received the exemption. The surviving spouse must be age 55 or older when the deceased spouse died, and the property must be the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the deceased spouse died and remain the surviving spouse's residence homestead. A surviving spouse who already receives an exemption under this section of the Texas Constitution is not entitled to an additional exemption under the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person."

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#### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would reduce the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for the superconducting super collider fund from \$500 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment reducing the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for undertakings related to the superconducting super collider research facility from \$500 million to \$250 million."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 80 proposes a constitutional amendment abolishing the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties. In Mills County, the office of constable is abolished, and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff. In Reagan and Roberts counties, the office of constable is abolished and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff only if a majority of voters in each of the respective counties favors the proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia. Currently, such investments are prohibited by article XVI, section 70(r) of the Texas Constitution, which would be repealed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the constitutional office of state treasurer effective September 1, 1996. The transfer of specific constitutional powers and duties to the comptroller of public accounts takes effect on that date. The statutory powers and duties and the property and other obligations of the state treasurer are transferred to officers and agencies of state government as the legislature provides by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of state treasurer."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment requiring that land devoted to wildlife management be taxed on the basis of its productive capacity. The proposed amendment also adds a temporary provision to the Texas Constitution validating the changes to the law made by Chapter 560, Acts of the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1991, which amended the Tax Code to allow land used for wildlife management to be appraised as agricultural land. The temporary provision also provides that a property owner is not authorized to claim a refund of taxes paid unless the tax payment was challenged before the effective date of the proposed amendment. The temporary provision expires on January 1, 1998.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow open-space land used for wildlife management to qualify for tax appraisal in the same manner as open-space agricultural land, subject to eligibility limitations provided by the legislature."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature may exempt from ad valorem taxation income-producing personal property and mineral interests that have a taxable value which is insufficient to recover the costs of administering the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation personal property and mineral interests having a value insufficient to recover the administrative costs of collecting the taxes."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution No. 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 68 proposes a constitutional amendment that allows the legislature to raise the current ad valorem tax exemption for disabled veterans and their surviving spouses and minor children. The tax exemptions would be raised based on a veteran's disability rating as follows:

Disability	Maximum Tax Exemption
10%-30%	\$ 5,000
30%-50%	\$ 7,500
50%-70%	\$10,000
More than 70%	\$12,000
Age 65 and 10% or higher	\$12,000
Loss or loss of use of limb	\$12,000
Blindness or paraplegia	\$12,000

The spouse and children of any veteran who dies while on active duty may be granted an exemption of up to \$5,000. The amounts of the exemptions provided for in this proposed amendment may be repealed by the legislature by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to raising the limits of the exemption from ad valorem taxation of property owned by disabled veterans or by the surviving spouses or surviving minor children of disabled veterans."

# Combest introduces agricultural bill

U.S. Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, who represents Parmer County, has introduced "The Agricultural Competitiveness Act" which he said maintains essential tools of farm policy so U.S. farmers can be secure from unfair foreign government trade practices.

The legislation was introduced last week with 12 co-sponsors. The legislation is patterned from the successes of current farm policy while meeting its share of balancing the federal budget, said Combest.

If passed and signed into law, the bill would allow non-paid base acres to increase from 15 percent to 30 percent. Producers would be assured of having target prices kept at their current levels and a continuation of the marketing loan programs for wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice. The bill also would keep the link of deficiency payments to production and prices so farmers can have a safety net if the bottom drops out of the market.

In the bill, producers also would have 100 percent flexibility to expand into other commodities while foregoing government payments and maintaining their program base.

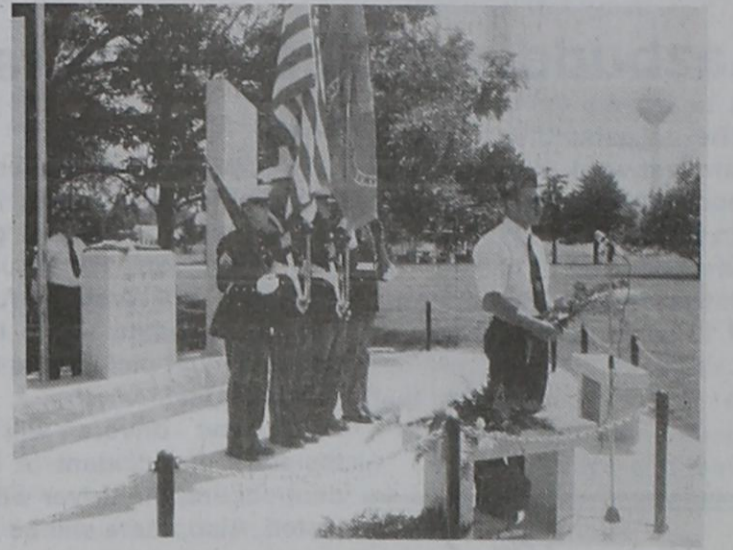

## Lazbuddie increases tax rate 3%



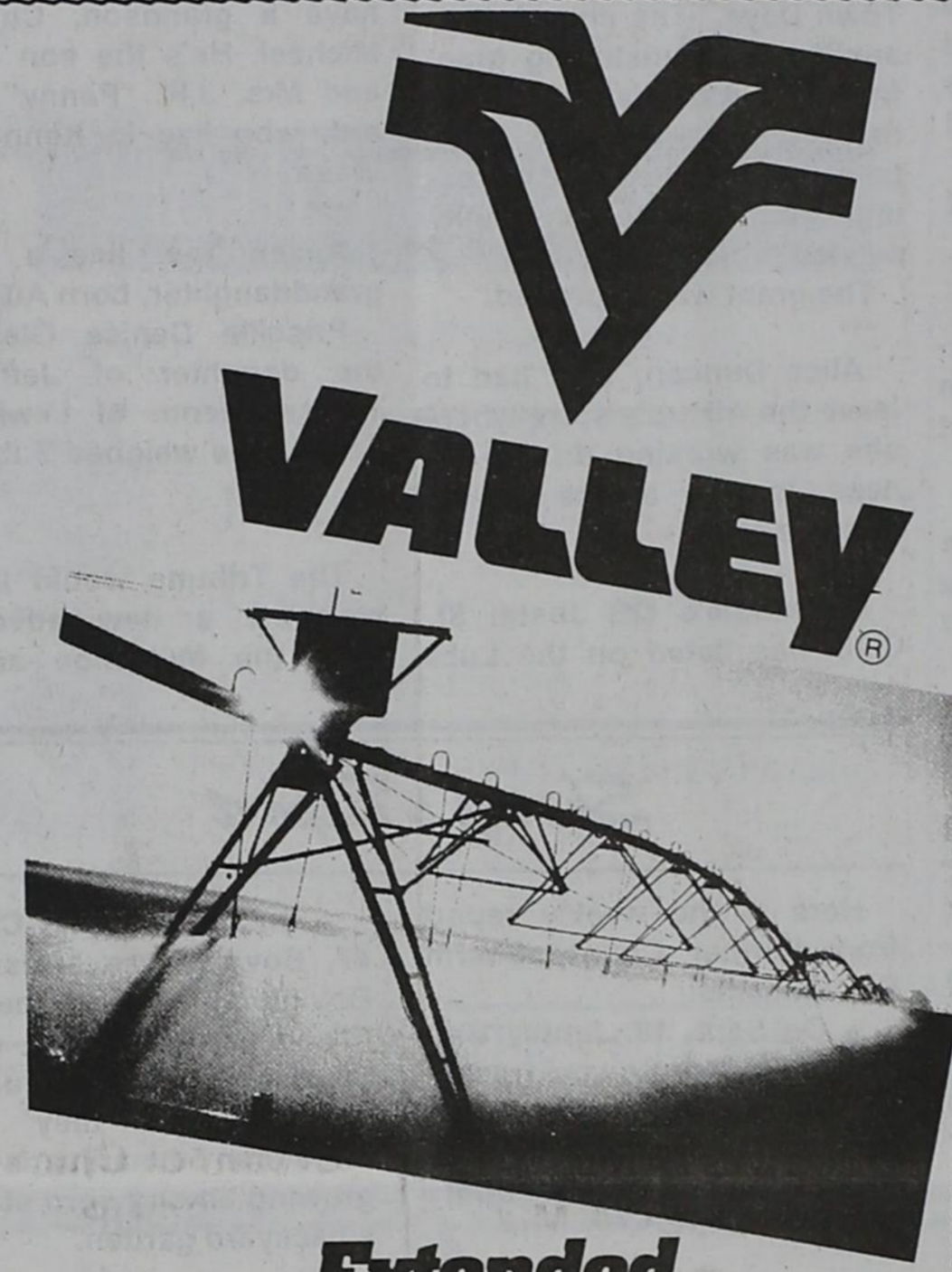

Lazbuddie fought back when Josh Warren took a short 1-yard pass from Justin St. Clair. Warren kicked the points after and the margin was now 13-8.

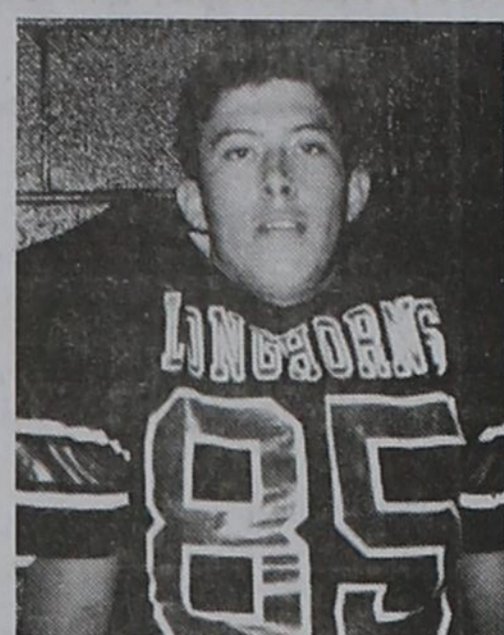
