A contest also was held for car decorations.


All floats were to be ready for display at the pep rally and at half time of the football game.

Mrs. Cooper's 7th period class planned to paint windows at some Texico busi-





Longhorns whip Dell City

The Lazbuddie Longhorns poured it on last Saturday when they downed Dell City, 8-30, at Wellman.

The Longhorns, now 2-2 on the season, host El Paso Jesus Chapel tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. Next week, Lazbuddie will have its Homecoming.

The game ended in the 4th quarter due to the 45-point rule.

The game was never in doubt as Lazbuddie opened a 24-6 lead at the end of the first quarter. The tallies came on a 50yard run by Juan Reyes, a 10-yard run by Brice Foster and a 38yard run by Reyes. Jason Thomas kicked all three points after.

The second quarter actually saw Dell City outscore Lazbuddie, 24-16. The Longhorn scores came on another 10-yard run by Foster and a 50-yard pass from Justin St. Clair to Reyes. So Lazbuddie led at the half, 40-30.

The second half belonged to Lazbuddie as they outscored Dell City 40-0. Here's how the scores came:

A 58-yard punt return by Foster; a 30-yard pass from St. Clair to Guy Nickels; a 15-yard run by St. Clair; an 8-yard pass from St. Clair to Brice Redwine; and a 47-yard run by Foster.

The Lazbuddie defense held Dell City to a minus 16 rushing yards, and 358 through the air. Meanwhile, Lazbuddie gained 514 yards overall. Lazbuddie hit 10 of 12 passes; Dell City was 30 of 60.

Coach Mark Scisson noted that Dell City is a young team with potential and gave Lazbuddie a tough time in the second quarter. This week, the Longhorns will have their work cut out for them as they face an undefeated El Paso Jesus Chapel squad. And next week is Homecoming.

The Texico Wolverines went head to head with the Capitan Tigers at Texico's Parents Night last Friday, falling 24-20.

Texico, 2-4 on the season, hosts Hagerman at Homecoming Friday (today) at 7:30 p.m. mdt.

The game opened with another fine kick by Luis Trillo, with the ball downed on Capitan's 5 yard line. Michael Shelton made Texico's first tackle as the Wolverine defense played a tenacious first half, keeping Capitan off the scoreboard.

Brandon Autrey had a fine tackle on defense. And Dominic Gutierrez stopped a runner for a big Tiger loss. The Tigers punted. Just a few plays later, Tobie Askew broke loose for an awesome 85-yard TD run early in the first quarter. Trillo kicked the point after and Texico led 7-0. That was all the scoring in this period.

He was quoted as saying that "Jesus Christ is the reason for the event and that's the only thing that can make a difference in the quality of our kids' lives."

The activities didn't just stop with the prayers around the flagpole either. An evening celebration called "Saw You At The Pole" was held the night of Sept. 18 at the Lyceum Theater in Clovis. Students representing Farwell and Texico also attended this event which was highlighted by students singing songs and giving their personal testimonies.

The success of these two events gave momentum to the upcoming Student Impact Week which will be held Oct. 15 -



he made some players cry.

In Virginia, another basketball coach is starting over. Shortly after she coached her girls team to the state title, she was relieved of her duties because players -- and their parents -- complained she was "verbally abusive."

According to the unhappy players, "A sport ... should be fun and coaches shouldn't interfere and make life miserable."

With increased frequency, the plays -- and their parents -want to run the locker room.

An article in USA Today cited 11 recent cases in which high school or college coaches faced open rebellion from their players. Along with "verbal abuse" and "making them cry" the coaches were accused of "favoritism" and "poor communication with players and parents."

In my career as a sports parent, four of my kids were on the high school athletic teams. I'm not sure how many of their coaches played favorites. I can't say whether or not they had poor relationships with their players. My communication with their coaches was pretty much limited to trying to find out what time they thought practice might end, if ever.

Which doesn't mean I wasn't interested in my kids' athletics.

I went to every one of their games and plenty of their practices. I sat in rainstorms and watched them roll around on muddy football fields. I stood at the edge of lumpy soccer fields and watched them kick each other in the shins. I drove through hail to find basketball courts that had no heat or zip codes.

Just about the only place I never went was into the coach's office to fight my kids' battles for them.

Not because I didn't care about my kids. But because I did.

My feeling was that there comes a time when parents have to let their kids learn about life. And high school sports is a great time to start. High school sports does a lot more than teach kids how to pass, punt and dribble. It has a lot of other valuable lessons.

It teaches them that not all coaches are fair. Which might ease the shock when they find out that not all bosses are fair.

It teaches them that coaches don't always have the time, or inclination, to worry about whether something they say might bruise a player's feelings. Which might prepare them for a world that does not always have the time, or inclination, to worry about bruising their feelings.





Applications for loans accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by hail, high winds and drought are being accepted at the Rural Economic Development office located in Farwell.

Parmer County is one of four in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the hail, high winds and drought.

Taylor said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an RECD emergency loan," said Thomas S. Taylor, RECD County Supervisor. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance Program will have to figure in proceeds from these programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until 4-24-96, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," said Taylor.



Letter To The Editor

I feel I must respond to the allegations about schools in Parmer County who are supposedly participating in a national Gay and Lesbian History Month in October. As president of the Parmer County Texas State Teachers Association, I would like to dispel this rumor. There will be NO month long celebration, NO classroom and hallway displays, NO films or guest speakers, NO observance of gay and lesbian history!

Neither TSTA nor the National Education Association have ever planned such an observance.

NEA did pass a resolution advocating tolerance for the lifestyle choices of others and counseling for gay and lesbian teenagers whose suicide rate is substantially above that of their peers. The resolution called for no action on the part of NEA or its affiliates. The Texas delegation opposed this resolution. Proponents of vouchers and privatization misunderstood the resolution and have attacked our public school system. The resolution was needless because our rights are already clearly stated under the Constitution. Our public schools already observe a tolerance for all people regardless of color, gender, handicap, national origin or marital status.

I encourage parents and community members to get involved in their public school system. We have a great need for volunteers on committees and in the classrooms. Then they may judge the curriculum and the faculty and staff for themselves.

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

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

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
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
