Boling had a deeper calling

When Michael Boling walked across the stage to receive his diploma in 1980 from Farwell High School, he was ready to take on the world. With one of the highest grade point averages ever achieved in Farwell, he had proven his academic ability. He was now setting out to make his dreams a reality.

He had always dreamed of being a doctor and the sciences that were involved in practicing medicine were his favorite subjects. To his family and friends that grew up with Michael, the medical profession seemed to be the perfect calling for him.

But Michael had a deeper calling; one that went further than just "being a doctor." He was called to be a missionary to bring the Word of God and healing to remote countries around the world.

During his teen years, he began to seriously think about going into the mission field.

"I felt God's calling for me, but I wasn't clear as to the exact direction I needed to take," Michael explained. "I thought about going into the seminary, but my calling was in some other way; there was some other way I was to help."

He graduated with a B.A. in Chemistry from Baylor University and them went to medical school at Texas A&M University. He received his M.D. in 1988 and did his residency in Family Practice through a clinic and hospital that was part of the University of Oklahoma. The entire time he was in college and medical school, Michael did short term mission work between semester breaks and in the summers.

The last month that he was in medical school, he travelled to Kenya with the Medical World Mission. There he stayed two months, treating the sick and sharing God's word. This organization is the interdenominational mission outreach program that was founded by Franklin Graham. Through this experience, Michael's interest in Community Health was stirred.

He wanted to see more in the areas of community health and the other mission groups that were involved. He then travelled to Equatorial Guinea and caught up with W.E.C. This stands for Worldwide Evangelization for Christ and it is a large interdenominational missionary organization that has mission posts all over the world.

Michael stayed in Equatorial Guinea for 15 months working with missionary nurses and doctors among the tribes. Then the national government of the country began to throw out the missionary doctors. Before Michael left he was training community health workers from the villages to help take care of their people.

"I saw through this experience that, as a doctor, I was working all day long with the people, but only as a doctor. There was no time or chances to deal with the people on an

evangelical basis. The villagers were animistic, yet they were very curious about God. I felt I needed to do more than just practice medicine," he said.

In Dec. 1992, Michael came back to the states. He practiced medicine in the Dallas area, but he was bound and determined to discover the way that he was to help in the mission field. He soon discovered his niche.

Bible translation was an area of religion and mission work that was of interest to Michael. He saw the need for Bibles written in the native language and text of the villagers in Kenya and in Equatorial Guinea. He had always had an interest in languages as well, and was a pretty fast learner when it came to picking up a new language.

He enrolled in August of 1993 in the Wycliff Bible Translation School. He took one year of classes and then found out about a program between the Wycliff School and the Dallas Theological Seminary. It was a two year program that was shared between the two schools. One year was spent at Wycliff learning how to analyze languages around the world and the other year was spent at the Seminary learning Hebrew and Greek and their foundations. In August 1995, Michael graduated with a Master of Arts in Biblical Exegesis and Linguistics.

He was now prepared to translate the Word of God into the many languages around the world that have never had or, in some cases, never seen a Bible.

He went overseas to the town of Bishkek in Kyrgyzstan (pronounced Keer-shek-stan) which is located in the Russia, near the the western border of China. Here he participated in a Prayer Walk. With other missionaries,

PCG notes ruling is limited

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) a final ruling from the 242nd District Court in Hale County will not stop the operation of the 1996 Enhanced Diapause Control

PCG officials note that the ruling is limited to the ten plaintiffs in the case and does not prohibit the operation of a Program in 1996.

"The Hale County court has ruled the state boll weevil law unconstitutional," explains PCG BWSC Chairman Wayne Huffaker. "This law creates authority for the High Plains program and other producer-led efforts across the State."

Huffaker adds that the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation is in the process of appealing the Hale County decision to the Texas Supreme Court. So far there has been no effort to stop the statewide operation of 1996 boll weevil programs, including the High Plains Enhanced Diapause Control Program.

The TBWEF will continue to process and collect assessments for 1996 programs to the fullest extent possible.

"We intend to take advantage of the promising situation we currently have following our first cold winter in five years," says PCG Boll Weevil Program Coordinator Roger Haldenby. "We have a tremendous opportunity to reduce boll weevil infested acreage and it is important that producers keep moving ahead and make the most of the investment they have already made."

"During the last 3 seasons cotton producers have invested almost 19 million dollars in diapause control on the High Plains," says Huffaker. "We have made an impact and are in a position to begin the final push to rid ourselves of the boll weevil."

In 1996 many producers who have had to treat both early and in-season weevils have so far been able to scale back their efforts as a result of the onetwo punch of 1995 diapause treatments and colder winter temperatures.

In the next 3-4 years the cost of the diapause program appears to be the cheapest route for producers facing boll weevil infestations.

Without an aggressive diapause program Texas Agricultural Extension Service entomologist, Dr. James Leser, predicts treatment costs and yield losses could total over \$250 million each year at the

Michael walked all through the town and prayed over local government buildings, the mosque and several other buildings. This walk was a small part of the international prayer effort called "Praying Through The Window."

This project is the call for prayer for the un-evangelized countries that are located in the 10th degree longitude and the 40th degree latitude of the world, such as India, North Africa, the former Russian Republics and China.

While Michael was in Bishkek, he was overwhelmed by the hospitality and the acceptance from the residents. He knew that the translation of the Bible was what he was called to do as a missionary because he saw firsthand the need for and the desire for the Word from the people.

He came back to Dallas and worked for a short while in a medical practice. He actively sought out groups that were involved in Bible translation projects. He eventually linked up with W.E.C. (World Evangelization for Christ), the group that he was part of when he travelled to Equatorial Guinea. W.E.C. is very active in Bible translation projects all over the world and they are also helping to establish churches in the un-churched countries. Church planting is very important to Michael, so this organization seemed to be the perfect place for him.

W.E.C. required Michael to spend five months in a candidate course for their mission projects. In this time, he learned all about the organization and their policies and goals. More importantly, he was taught how to live "cross culturally." Going to live in a far off land with a tribe of people that eat, live, dress and think differently is something that must be addressed before a person goes into the mission field.

Michael relates a funny story about being faced with a cross-cultural incident:

" It was Christmas and I was going to a remote village in Equitorial Guinea to celebrate the holiday with a church that had been established. The village was 20 miles off the main road and, along with 25 Africans, I hiked the distance to the village. We were welcomed with gifts of sugar cane and lots of singing. A villager had killed an elephant, so the food was plentiful and very good. However, a lady came up to me with a pot full of grubs and offered them to me. To refuse them would have been disrespectful. I took them and thanked her for her gracious gift. She stood there waiting for me to eat them, so I began to eat them smiling the whole time!"

Eating grubs is just one of the cross-cultural styles of living that one must be prepared for, so W.E.C. makes it mandatory for all of the 1700 missionaries that it organizes to prepare for living abroad.

Michael finished the course in May and has been spending time with his family and friends. He is the son of Frances and the late Bill Boling. Frances now lives in Carrizozo, N. M. along with one of Michael's sisters and her

He leaves August 30th for Albertville, France for a 16 month stay at a mission school. Here he will learn to speak and understand French. This language is necessary to know, because he will then be sent to Cote d' Ivoire (the Ivory Coast) in West Africa. This is a small independent country, but it has a very strong French influence and the language is the primary language spoken in the city. However, from the main cities, Michael will be going out to the native tribes to live and work.

He will be translating the Bible into the native language of the tribe with the help of a national; an assistant from the tribe or area that speaks French and the native language. Michael's job is to make sure that the translation i accurate and that it is the true context of the Bible. He will ****************






Approximately 2000 different languages are spoken throughout Africa and from tribe to tribe a similar language can vary to the slightest degree. This fact makes it necessary for Michael to actually live among the tribe with a family so that he can learn the differences and meanings.

Michael is anxious to begin his missionary work. He hopes to, in the future, combine his medical profession with his evangelistic calling. Michael's mission work is completely church and privately funded. Bible translation has been going on for a long time in the mission field, but it is just now being viewed as a primary mission goal. Many long hours must be spent by Michael in listening to and talking with the village people about their language and their tribal ways. Trying to also perform the duties of a doctor would not allow enough time to do any translation.

So for now, Michael is shelving his stethoscope and moving on to another chapter in his life. He will helping to bring the Good News of Christ to many different tribes of people - in their own language, in the Bible. And because of this, the story of Michael Boling's life will have a very happy ending.

A JOURNEY INTO THE AMAZON RAINFORE

When I was notified that the Navy was transferring me again, I decided that I would not leave South America without having seen the Amazon rainforest. So I booked a unique week up there with a friend from the British embassy. We booked a two-day excursion to Manaus, followed by four days of living in the trees in the rainforest.

Manaus was once a wealthy city, with its public buildings and opera house constructed of material imported from Europe, and money pouring into its economy from around the world because it was the center of cultivation of the rubber tree.

That golden period ended early in this century when an Englishman managed to smuggle six young rubber trees out of the country alive, and transplants from these trees were sent to Malaysia, where the production of rubber broke Brazil's monopoly.

After two days of looking at the faded glory of this huge city nestled in the midst of the Amazon, we caught a boat for a 3-hour ride up a branch of the river, up constantly narrowing tributaries, until we reached our hotel, the Ariau Jungle Towers.

The narrow stream on which this hotel sits is part of the larger Amazon system which contains fully one-sixth of the fresh water in the world. Even in Manaus, more than 1,500 miles from the sea, the river is five miles wide and deep enough for ocean-going tankers to navigate with ease, far from the seven seas in which they normally conduct their business.

The origin of the Ariau Jungle Towers was when Jacques Cousteau, the famous diver, arrived in this part of the rainforest to do one of his research films on the life in the Amazon river systems. He was awed by the rainforest, and suggested that an accommodation could be built in which the beauty of the rainforest could be enjoyed in its natural form without altering the environment.

Based on that suggestion, the Jungle Towers hotel was built in the heart of the forest, in the top of the trees or in freestanding towers, with the rooms in the top of the triplecanopy jungle cover. The rooms are connected to each other by bridges through the trees, 60 feet above the floor of the rainforest.

A huge enclosed area has been included, and when Brazil

customs agents catch a smuggler trying to sneak endangered species of monkeys or parrots or toucans out of the country, the animals are brought to the Jungle Towers. In this enclosed area, in the heart of the rainforest, they are given 30 days to readjust to life in the wild, and then they are released to begin their free life again in the Amazon.

Each morning as the sun crept over the leaky roof of the rainforest, the monkeys and brightly colored birds of the neighborhood would gather outside to ensure I awoke early enough to enjoy the view. These little feathered and fuzzy creatures can make more noise than all my nieces and nephews and younger cousins can at a family gathering for the holidays, if that's possible!

The primary danger in the hotel was from thieving monkeys, who would pick up anything not tied down if you left your door open. I only lost the dogtags I have worn for about 20 years. Yes, and one beer to a monkey who could snatch up a beer and escape quicker than any creature I have ever seen, except Brett Hargrove when we were much younger (that's an in joke).

One German tourist had his false teeth snatched off his bedside table, and that made for an exciting afternoon with everyone clambering through the treetops after a spider monkey who eventually got tired of the game and dropped the teeth.

In the evenings, we would go on walking tours of the rainforest with our native guides, and they would show us trees and carious plants, all of which have had medicinal uses for centuries for these people, and which modern science is only now re-investigating.

We also got the chance to watch two villages play soccer matches in the midst of the rainforest, to go fishing for piranha (which we threw back even though they are delicious to eat), and to catch alligators and haul them into the boat for photos. We also threw them back, not wishing to offend their parents who could be much larger and much more dif-

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ficult to handle.

The four days I spent in the trees of the Amazon were an astounding experience, and it's heartening to meet so many people of that part of the world who are so totally committed to preserving the rainforest at the same time that the inhabitants there are not deprived of the right to earn a living.







Recipe of Week

Catfish Jambalaya

Ingredients:

- lbs farm-raised catfish fillets
- lb spicy smoked sausage, such as andouille
- lb smoked ham
- cups chopped onions cups chopped celery
- cup chopped green peppers
- clove garlic, minced
- oz canned tomatoes
- teaspoons dried thyme
- teaspoon dried oregano teaspoon black pepper
- teaspoon dried basil
- cups fish stock or chicken stock
- cups uncooked rice Salt (optional)

Cut catfish fillets into 1/2- to 1-inch pieces. Slice sausage into 1-inch pieces and ham into 1/2- to 1-inch pieces. In a large cast iron pan, sauté sausage pieces until lightly browned. Add ham pieces and continue cooking for 10-15 minutes. Add onions, celery, green pepper and garlic. Mix well and continue cooking for another 10-15 minutes. Add tomatoes and spices and cook for another 5-10 minutes while stirring. Add broth and simmer for 1 hour. Add rice and cook for 10 minutes or until rice has absorbed all of the liquid. Add catfish and cook for another 10 minutes. The jambalaya should be thick, not soupy. Add salt to taste. Serve on large, rimmed dinner plates or soup bowls. Serves 6.

Phillips became famous for writing and recording the No. 1 hit in 1958 "Sugartime." His original version was recorded at the Norman Petty Studios in Clovis. Buddy Holly played the lead guitar on the original recording. It hit the top of the country and western charts, but the McGuire Sisters' pop version gave it worldwide recognition.

In September 1995, HBO cable TV produced a mobie about Phyllis McGuire, one of the McGuire sisters. It was entitled "Sugartime." Phillips' music was used in this movie.

Phillips was a teen-ager at Farwell High when he wrote the hit song while driving a tractor on the family farm. Since then, he has recorded a number of country and western hits. In the 1960s, every record he made was on the national charts. He has performed on the Grand Ole Opry and toured with Johnny Cash, Willie Nelson, Brenda Lee, Jim Reeves and Marty Robbins.



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

So the argument will continue. What's your view?



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




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

The above scores are taken from the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills given Texico pupils in grades 1 through 8. The column marked "core total" is the compilation of language, math and reading scores. Each number refers to how Texico places among the nation's pupils. For example, the 50 in vocabulary that Texico 1st graders received means they are higher than 49 percent of the nation's 1st graders on that test. Likewise,

the Texico 1st graders' score in world analysis (76) means they placed above 75 percent of the nation's pupils taking that test. Texico Supt. R.L. Richards said he would like to see all Texico numbers at least at the 70 mark as a goal. He was especially happy with the math totals since a new math curriculum was introduced awhile ago.

The paintings of Barry McCuan, a Farwell High graduate and son of Tom Paul McCuan, of Farwell, are being featured in Alexandra Stevens Gallery of Fine Art in Taos until Aug. 15.

In 1995, he married Lynne Windsor whose works also are on display at the gallery. They spent half last year traveling and painting the countryside of Great Britan and southern France.

A brochure put out by the gallery notes:

McCuan was born in New

Mexico on the Llano Estacado near the Texas border in 1945. His father, Dale, was an artist before starting his family, and although McCuan's youth was spent on a farm amid horses, cattle and dogs, he said his father "was very interested in keeping us exposed to art."

It is not unusual then that McCuan's early years were filled with art books, sketches and frequent trips to art museums. He later studied art and architectur at Texas Tech, and took extensive trips to South America, Mexico, the Caribbean, the Pacific and the

Orient to broaden and enrich his artistic perspective.

It was a trip to the National Gallery in Washington, D.C., where he visited a French impressionists' exhibit that included paintings by Monet, Manet and Renoir that sealed his future as an artist.

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

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


