This instead of a holiday season filled with "thrills and chills," the season was marked by "ills and chills." The cold and flu season hit the region with a vengeance and is still rampaging.

Doctor's offices and pharmacies around the area are filled with patients needing help with a variety of illnesses.

Typically, a few strains of a viral infection will infiltrate an area, causing similar symptoms and reactions in the people that catch them. However, this year has proven to be the year of the mystery viruses.

New strains of influenza are now showing up in many doctor's offices with symptoms ranging from low grade fevers to borderline meningitis.

Along with the influenza outbreaks, doctors are also treating patients with stomach viruses, upper and lower respiratory infections and several varieties of viral infections.

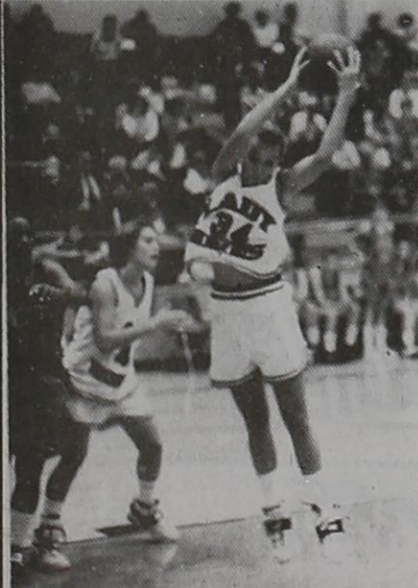
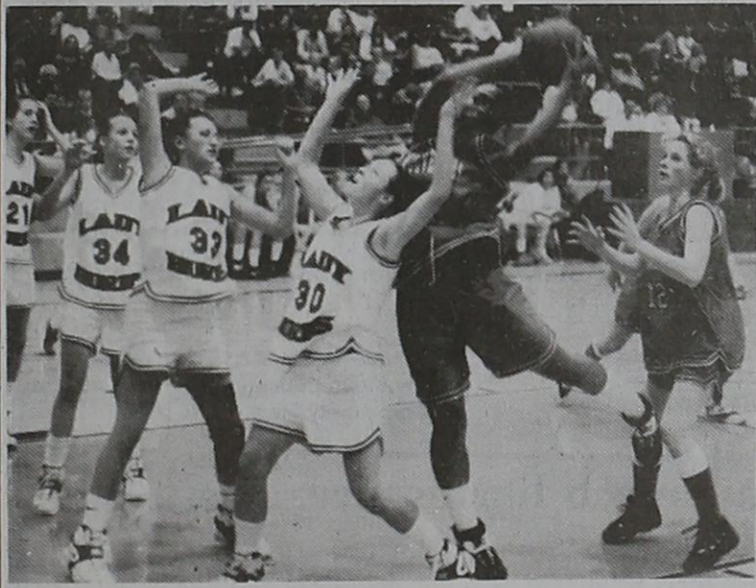
According to Sharon Armstrong, head nurse at St. Mary's Family Health Care Clinic in Farwell, patients are being treated by the dozens on a daily basis.

# Junior Livestock shows upcoming

The 29th annual Farwell Junior Livestock Show will be held at the Farwell Community Center starting at 1 p.m. on Jan. 4.

Farwell staffers, 4-H and FFA students and their parents will set up pens and make arrangements for the livestock show on Thursday, Jan. 2 at 7 p.m.

Weights on all animals must be turned in to the Parmer County extension office in the county courthouse by 5 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 3.

Judge for the event will be Kenneth Lujan, a former ag teacher at Estancia, N.M. He also served as judge here last January.

Farwell ag teacher Jon Cullison said he expects a few steers, about 25 lambs and about 50 pigs to be entered this year in the show.

Also, belt buckles will be given to the champions and showmanship winners.

Robert White will again be ring steward.

A concession stand will be available. The public is invited.

The Lazbuddie Junior Livestock Show will be held in mid-week this year, a departure from the usual Saturday date.

The show will be held on Wednesday, Jan. 15, starting at 1 p.m. at the Friona Community Center.

School Supt. Phil Warren explained that the change was made because the county show starts the next day. This means the youths can keep their animals handy for the next show at the same site.

Participants will have the day off from school (it will be an extra-curricular day). All other Lazbuddie students will get an "early out" at 1 p.m., said Warren.

The Friona junior livestock show will be Jan. 6 at the Friona Community Center.

\*\*\*

The Bovina junior livestock show will be Jan. 11 at the Bovina show barn.

\*\*\*

The Parmer County junior livestock show will be Jan. 16-18 at the Friona Community Center.

Judges will be Conda Maze, barrows; Bill Binder, lambs, and J.D. Ragland, cattle.

Here's the schedule:

Jan. 16 -- 1 to 5 p.m., weighing of all animals. Barrows will be classified as weighed. At 5 p.m., steers will be classified followed by lambs.

Jan. 17 -- Lamb show starts at 8 a.m. Barrow show starts at noon.

Jan. 18 -- Steer show begins at 8 a.m. followed by heifer show. Premium sale starts at 5 p.m.

## County volunteer fire departments report activities

At the Dec. 23 meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners, the annual reports from the county volunteer fire departments were received.

The fire departments receive county funds based on how many calls they handle, with one exception -- the Rhea-Hollene Volunteer Fire Department.

Rhea-Hollene gets a flat \$5,000 stipend.

Also, there is a \$5,000 "floor" for the other departments. In the past 12 months (December 1995 -- November 1996), Bovina recorded 13 calls, Farwell 24, Friona 43 and Lazbuddie 38. Thus, Bovina got \$5,000 (the minimum because their actual number of calls came out to \$4,957); Farwell, \$9,152; Friona, \$16,398, and Lazbuddie, \$14,491.

Here are some of the highlights from their reports:

### Farwell

December -- Called out 4 times to cotton module fires, plus a burr pile fire and a car fire; January - truck fire; February - railroad fire; March - grass fire; April -- grass fire; May - truck fire; June -- 3 grass fires; July - motor home and grass fires; August -- none; September - grass and car fires; October - 2 grass fires; November -- 4 cotton module fires.

### Lazbuddie

December -- Cotton stripper, car and cotton burr fires, plus rescuing a pheasant hunter stranded in a blizzard on Dec. 17. The hunter was stuck for about 5 hours in freezing weather; January --2 house fires (Tommy DeLeon and Gary Sweat), hog barn fire (Joe Tarter), and 2 car accidents, where the Jaws of Life were needed.

February -- 2 cotton burrs fires, grass fire, barn fire and pasture fire; March -- utility pole, grass and burrs fires, and house fire (Dan Smith); April -- 4 grass fires, hay truck fire and ensilage fire (Lazbuddie Feeders). One of the grass fires, started by a burning hay truck, caused at least 65 different small fires spread down Hwy. 145; May - car accident and weather spotters called out during tornadoes; June -- house fire (Gloria Gullien), 2 grass fires, tractor fire, severe weather watch and hay fire.

July - trash fire; August - burning object in sky; September - man injured by tractor; 2 combine fires; corn dryer fire (Easter Grain), and gasoline spill (Treider Electric); October -- none; November - wood fire (Lazbuddie School), grass fire, house fire (Travis Nell), cotton stripper fire, combine fire and 2 cotton module fires.

### Rhea-Hollene

December - 2 grass fires; January - none; February - grass fire; March - grass fire; April - none; May - 2 grass fires; June - weather spotting, and 2 grass fires; July - wheat stubble fire; August - 2 grass fires; September - none; October - none; November - grass fire.

### Bovina

December - trash fire (county dump box); January - vehicle and grass fires; February - grass fire; March - barn fire (Dale Berrgrien) and 2 grass fires; April - structure fire (Caprock Industries); May - grass fire; June - none; July - none; August - none; September - none; October - none; November - 2 cotton module fires; grass fire and electric motor fire (Bovina Gin).

### Friona

December -- 2 grass fires, oil on roof (Excel) and rescue required; January -- 4 grass fires, boxcar storage fire (Charles Hamilton), and house fire (Gary Sweat); February - 6 grass fires, and tractor tire fire; March -- 3 grass fires; hay and barn fire (West Plains Feed Yard), structure fire (1105 Main); barn fire; April - grass fire, row fire, car fire (Godberto Morales), hay fire, and barn and hay fire; May - junk pile fire, wreck and truck fire.

June - 2 grass fires, dumpster fire, car fire (Excel), electrical fire (Excel), railroad cross ties fire, trash fire, house fire (Mark Voggeser), hay trailer fire, and building fire (Bunger Airport); July - dumpster fire, 2 car fires and 2 grass fires; August - grass fire, gas leak and accident; September - power line down, car fire; truck-train, and search; October - accident (Affiliated Foods), car accident, 2 grass fires, false alarm (Friona Schools); November - wash down highway, accident, burr fire (Friona Farmers Co-Op Gin).

### DEAD MEN DON'T OBJECT

People would be horrified at the thought of being buried alive. Dead men do not object to being buried. Who would bury a living person!!

Death means separation. Our first parents were separated from God on the day of sin (Gen. 2:17). As long as the spirit and body are together, one lives. When the spirit leaves the body, that person is dead (Eccl. 12:7). Stephen prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit" (Acts 7:59; cf. 2 Pet. 1:14; 2 Cor. 5:1). Death is as real as life.

One who has not accepted Christ is spiritually dead. He is separated from God. "And you did He make alive when ye were dead through your trespasses and sins" (Eph. 2:1; cf. 1 John 5:12).

In accepting Christ one dies to sin. That is, he determines to be done with sin. Faith leads to repentance and repentance is resolution to "put away" sin -- to do right, to abstain from wrong. So the unbeliever, dead IN SIN, resolves to do right. He dies TO SIN.

But simply having faith and good resolution are not sufficient. What about the backlog of sins committed? These will be "washed away" in the valid act of baptism. "Arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins, calling upon the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:16). A vivid picture is presented by Paul: "For if we have become united with Him (Christ) in the likeness of His death, we shall be also in the likeness of His resurrection" (Rom. 6:5). As Christ died, so the individual, in repentance, dies to sin. As Christ was buried and arose, so the dead (to sin) person is buried and raised in baptism to walk in "newness of life" (Rom. 6:4,17,18).

In this context, the dead (to sin) person desires burial. He will not resist burial; he will not object to being buried. Rather, he will insist on burial, in the likeness of Christ's burial, and resurrection as Christ was raised.

Who would ever want to bury a living person? Those who claim salvation at the point of faith and proceed to baptize the saved (living) person, are practicing burial of the living! Horrors! Cf. Mark 16:16.

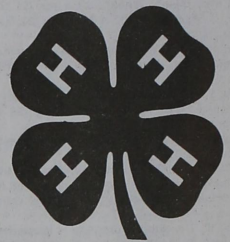

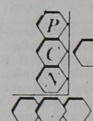
