## Freak winter storm hits area

The Panhandle region of Texas and eastern New Mexico were hit with a freak winter storm last week that included everything from hail to blizzard-like conditions.
A blanket of snow fell on all the area that ranged from 1 to 6 inches, as was reported in Hereford.
Farwell and Texico received approximately $1.5^{\prime \prime}$ of snow. Lazbuddie, Lariat and the Oklahoma Lane communities re ceived approximately the same amount of snow. Driving conditions were hazardous due to the freezing rain on the highways and roads around the region.
Other than the fact that it was the end of April when this freak storm hit, the strangest thing about the weather was that it was raining and snowing all at the same time for many hours on Friday. The HPUWCD said that av erage precipitation totals fo January to May 1996 wer 3.66 inches below normal However, above-normal pre cipitation during June, July and August of last year re duced this deficit, which al lowed many producers to cut back on irrigation pur

duce their maximum yield. However maximum yield. However, as the season pro gresses, the cone of depres sion created by ground water pumpage grows larger an well yield declines.
