The filing period closed Wednesday.

City of Farwell

Two city council posts are on the ballot this year, plus that of the mayor.

Incumbents are Mayor Jimmie Mace and councilmen Jerry Stover and John Carlson.

All three signed up for reelection.

Since there was no opposition, a special city council meeting likely will be held next week to cancel this year's city election.

There was no city election last year for the same reason - - no opposition to candidates seeking re-election.

Farwell School Board Three Farwell School Board posts are on the ballot. Incumbents are Teresa Ancira, Katherine White and Steve Kaltwasser.

Six candidates filed -- Paul Fulcher, Vick Christian, Doug Crawford, Mike Woods, and incumbents Mrs. Ancira and Kaltwasser.

Mrs. White is retiring from the board and didn't seek reelection.

Lazbuddie School Board The Lazbuddie School Board will have three positions open.

Randy Incumbents are Thomas, Gail Morris and

Tommy Martin.

Eight candidates filed --Donnie Coker, Kyle Kimbrough, Ricky Black, Garvin Thorn, Charleston Steinbock, Vernon Turner and incumbents Morris and Martin.

Thomas didn't seek reelection.

Farwell Hospital District

Five posts on the Farwell Hospital District board of directors are on the ballot.

Incumbents are Jack Allen Kirkland, Joe Haseloff, Jerry Monk, Mike Ratke and Troy Christian.

Six candidates filed -- Paul Adams and incumbents Christian, Haseloff, Kirkland, Ratke and Monk.

Wolverines fall an eyelash short in state final tilt

Despite a strong comeback in the final quarter, the Texico Wolverines fell to the Mesa Vista Trojans, 55-49, in the state Class AA championship basketball game Saturday in Albuaueraue.

The Wolverines finished the season with a 23-6 mark. Mesa Vista was ranked No. 1 in the state in its class.

Scoring were Tobie Askew, 10; Clint Hamilton, 11; Matt Holguin, 17, including 12 in the final quafter; Leroy Salinas, 3; Aaron Stanley and Eric Stanley, 1 each; Ronnie Clark, 2, and Seth Ketterling, 4.

Texico hit 6 of 20 3-point tries -- 3 by Hamilton and 3 by Holguin. Texico had 36 rebounds, led by Salinas with 7. Holguin led with 4 assists. Texico had 22 turnovers to Mesa Vista's 16.

The first quarter proved to be a hurdle that Texico couldn't overcome. After Holguin hit a 3 pointer in the first minute of play, the Wolverines didn't score until a minute left in the quarter, a free throw by Salinas. That allowed the Trojans to jump out to a 16-point lead, 20-4.

But Texico scored 6 straight points, on buckets by Askew, Hamilton and Salinas to start cutting into that margin. By haltime, the deficit was only 7 points, 26-19.

A basket by Askew at the start of the third quarter made it a 5-point ballgame before the Trojans steadily increased their lead to 36-25 by the quarter's end.




