





Notice of Property Tax Reporting Requirements

Property which was valued in 1995 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1996 or subsequent years EXCEPT FOR:

1. mobile home

2. livestock, and

3. land used for agricultural purposes. If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is

subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office. All non-governmental entities (property owners) which claim to be

exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1996 if the exemption was not claimed in 1995. Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions

by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February. If you made improvements to your real property and:

1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and

2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued; you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by that assessor.

If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which:

1. describes the property affected,

2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and 3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased.

This statement must be filed with the county assessor no later than the last day of February. If the veterans' exemption was claimed and allowed in 1995, no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that

exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1995 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor. If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1995, no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1995 and it is not

claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor. Beginning in the 1982 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for deolaring their property classification to the assessor, as residential or nonresidential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain as such and need not be made in subsequent years unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their property to be residential in 1995 and desires that classification for 1996, they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's of-

fice by the last day of February 1996. Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division of the State of New Mexico in Santa Fe. 

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

Revised Texico Community Center plans approved

The Texico City Council on Tuesday agreed on revised plans for the proposed Community Center building.

Architect Terry Rucker presented revised estimates that lower the cost of the structure. When plans first went out for bid last fall, bids were too high to accept. State grants are paying for the project and they didn't equal the low bid.

Rucker's new plans cut costs by \$33,500, plus offers several alternates totalling another \$18,100. These totals are esti-

This means some work inside the structure will be put off until more funds are available, such as millwork in the main kitchen, splash blocks, a game room and meeting room, mechanical items, etc. Also, the building height was changed to

Among the alternates -- which means they can be accepted if funds are available -- one calls to shorten the structure by 10

Bids will be taken on Feb. 22.

In other business, the council:

-- The hearing on seeking Community Development Block Grant funds was not held at 6 p.m. because of lack of quorum.



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

Space Agency, (ESA), to provide the Russian Segments of the Space Station.

The ESA is made up of most of the European countries. The nations of Holland, Germany, Belgium, France and Italy are currently trading off with the Russians to build the ESA segments of the Space Station. These countries are building the computers for the Russians, while the Russians are building the docking rings for the station. This is why David's language skills are so vital to this assignment. He will be making sure that all of the computers on the Space Station can communicate with each other.

The Greenthaners are excited about the move and the project that they will be working on. The only negative to the move, they feel, is having to leave their daughter Kristi, age 17, behind in Houston. She is a senior in High School and wants to complete her schooling.

Their son, Benjamin, age 13, is looking forward to moving to Moscow and attending school at the Anglo-American School. This is a Canadian, British and American Embassy supported school. For his high school classes, he'll attend classes held on the American Embassy compound in Moscow. He is also looking forward to learning how to play ice

The cooperative effort between the two space agencies is a very big step for the two nations that were, at one time, in a cold war with each other.

"The Russians are still getting over the secretive aspect of their space program," David said. The Russian people are typically very warm, caring and incredibly friendly people."

David and Gayle are quite honored to be part of the Space Station program and look to this assignment as the chance of a lifetime. David stressed that the Russian's do not need any help in advancing their technologies.
