And now, their son David Greenthaner is about to help take the entire world "into the future." David and his wife, Gayle are both engineers for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, NASA, in Houston and they are now moving to Moscow, Russia to work with the European Space Agency program on the International Space Station.
David will serve as the lead computer engineer for the Russian command and data handling segment of the Space Station. Prior to this new assignment, he had been the program manager for the computers in the cockpit of the space shuttle.
He was then put on a team from NASA that was sent to Russia to evaluate the computers needed in the Russian
segment of the station. David speaks fluent Russian segment of the station. David speaks fluent Russian and tise, he was asked to lead the NASA team in their cooperative effort in Russia
Gayle will also be part of the NASA engineering that will perform verification activities and coordinate joint testing for the U.S. and Russian equipment on the Space Station.
NASA is the overall manager of the Space Station program and the Russians will be providing the computers that are the navigation and systems control of the station. These computers will actually control the attitude and the altitude of the entire station while.
David and Gayle will be actually working for the Energia Space Corporation and the Khrunichev Space Corporation. These two companies are under contract with the European
