Texico candidates answer questions

There was a good turnout at Monday night's Candidates Forum sponsored by the Texico Chamber of Commerce at the Texico firehall. Moderator was Doyal LaRue.

All nine candidates appeared. Running for judge are incumbent Carol Snider, George Herrington and Willie Ronquillo. Seeking three council posts are Max Carter, Ron Pageau, Art Salguero Jr., Dean Henninger, and incumbents Ronnie Warmuth and Rick Queener.

The councilman candidates were asked how can Texico cleanup its junk problem. Responses included:

- Warmuth: Continue what the city has been doing, enforcing the ordinances on the books.
- Queener: Bring new businesses to Texico. If you had a demand for lots, folks would take better care of them. Also, the No. 1 problem is lack of water facilities. Recently, the town was passed up by a cheese factory because of it.
- Henninger: Someone's junk may be what someone else needs to do their job. It's up to the individual to handle his junk problem.
- Pageau: I support a town cleanup, but there's good junk and there's bad junk. The council has done what it can and is doing a great job.
- Salguero: The current system isn't working. We need a better solution, such as forming a committee of volunteers to help do cleanup for the elderly.
- Carter: I have had a bout over this with the city council. You need to try to gain folks' cooperation, not ram it down their throats.

All the candidates were asked how to promote Texico or make it a better place to live. Responses included:

- Warmuth: He noted he has chaired recent cleanup campaigns and the million-dollar golf shootout fund-raisers.
- Herrington: He pointed out the fine school system.
- Queener: The best promotion is our schools, but we need more housing. Currently, 78 out-of-district students attend Texico. Also, the city needs to get as much state funds and grants as possible for civic improvements.
- Henninger: He likes the closeness and friendliness of a small town.
- Pageau: More activities for youths are needed. He noted the flea market he owns has been broken into several times and he hears from kids "there's nothing else to do."
- Salguero: Bringing in more people to town isn't the answer. Make the friendly people who live here now the priority.
- Ronquillo: We need something for the kids to do.
- Carter: Keep folks happy and they will promote the town.
- Snider: The biggest promotion are the people who live here and our great school system. We need more businesses.

All the candidates were asked what their priority was for Texico. Responses included:

- Pageau: The community building, which is in the works, is needed.
- Henninger: I want to make sure we get what we pay for. Some contractors do shoddy work. I would be watching them.
- Queener: Short-term -- businesses; long-term -- better water facilities. The council is currently meeting in executive session on land deal possibilities to get water rights.
- Herrington: A lack of housing.
- Warmuth: Water.
- Snider: Not enough movers and shakers; need to get more people involved in the community.
- Carter: He noted the solid waste problem; also we need more businesses. He said Texico houses are appraised 20 percent lower than similar structures in Clovis.
- Ronquillo: Water.
- Salguero: We need to upgrade our housing and need zoning ordinance continuity.

Several comments dealt with the judge's office. Individual responses included:

- Herrington, who resigned last year as municipal judge, said he was seeking it again because he missed it a lot. He said he would follow city ordinances as best as he could, but that each case is individual.
- Queener: He asked what good the ordinances are if the judge doesn't enforce them. "There always seem to be extenuating circumstances and it doesn't get done. Judges need to enforce more."
- Warmuth: It's discouraging for the city's police to give out tickets and have them thrown out.
- Snider: Asked if the myth of "he's a good ol' boy so he doesn't get fined" happens, she replies that it doesn't take place. She noted she has even fined a member of her own family.

Other individual comments included:

- Resident Lewis Cooper: If we could instill community pride, you could eliminate 50-75% of the town's problems.
- Resident Ann Cooper: The new community center will have year-round activities for kids, such as a game room, pool table, etc. The TCAO needs more help from folks. Currently, it consists of about 10 sets of parents.

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Two youths die in area fire

Fire, believed to be caused by an electrical problem, destroyed a house at the north end of the Texico School District in the early morning of Feb. 8, resulting in the death of two young boys, injuring a third brother and his grandparents.

The fire occurred at the home of Arnold and Letha Cross. Their house was on the road dividing the Grady and Texico school districts.

Broadview Volunteer firemen found the body of Dillon Cross, 3, in the boys' bedroom. The fire apparently started in a wall adjoining it.

His two brothers, Clinton Worley, 5, and Marcus Worley, 6, were taken with the Crosses to University Medical Center, Lubbock.

On Monday night, Marcus, who had been critically injured in the fire, died.

Marcus had been a kindergarten pupil at Texico. Clinton is a pre-kindergarten pupil at Texico.

Clinton and Mrs. Cross were sent home from the hospital last week. Arnold Cross is in satisfactory condition, but is expected to remain hospitalized for six weeks after receiving skin grafts.

The Cross's house was totally destroyed. Fortunately, Mrs. Cross owns another house in Grady. That house isn't liveable yet but is being renovated by Grady folks and other volunteers.

The house needs windows, paint, sheet rock, etc. Persons

or businesses which can donate items are asked to take them to the Texico educational complex.

Also needed for the family are food, clothes, etc. Clinton's size is 4 or 5. Mrs. Morris needs medium to large clothes. Mr. Arnold is of average height and size.

Smaller items can be dropped off at the Texico nurse's office at Texico Elementary School.

Folks in Clovis can drop off items for the family at the Buena Vista Rehabilitation Hospital, 1501 W. 7th St.

Another drop-off site is Grady Schools.

Folks who would like to contribute funds for the family can take them to Citizens Bank, Texico branch.

Any donations will be appreciated because the family can use them, said Texico officials.

State affirms offices will locate in Farwell

(Editor's note: The following article, written by Kay Ledbetter, Farm and Ranch Editor of the Amarillo Globe-News, is reprinted with her permission.)

The Parmer County U.S. Department of Agriculture Service Center will be located in Farwell as originally planned, in spite of a plea by the Friona Chamber of Commerce, said Harold Bob Bennett, Farm Service Agency state director.

The decision of the State Food and Agriculture Committee was made at a Jan. 9 meeting, said Bennett, the state FAC chairman.

The meeting was attended by a representative of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, he said, but the Parmer County FAC is the entity that must make a unanimous request for change and it did not.

Both the local and state FAC are made up of representatives of the Farm Service Agency (FSA), the Rural Economic Community Development (RECD) service and the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

"The county FAC sent us a letter stating they would prefer as little disruption as possible, leaving things as they are now," Bennett said. Currently, Parmer County does not have an RECD office; the FSA offices are in Farwell, and the NRCS office is in Friona.

Under the new U.S. Department of Agriculture reorganization plan, Bennett said all the offices must be houses in one Parmer County service center by September 1997.

"The decision is that the USDA Service Center will be in Farwell," said Bennett.

Teresa Buske, Friona Chamber of Commerce executive director, said the chamber asked the FAC to reconsider its decision and allow for a competitive bidding process.

"The only way they would consider that is if we had a unanimous vote from the local FAC committee," said Mrs. Buske. But she said she has not given up.

"We're not sure what our next step will be. The state FAC gave us a deadline of April 9 to get the local FAC committee to make that request. We have met with the local FAC and explained the situation and they were receptive and understood the reason for putting it up for competitive bid," she said.

Curt Miller, Parmer County FSA executive director, said he has met with his county committee and the local DCA is not considering opening the service center up for bid process. He said the committee met Jan. 18 and concluded it had not changed its position.

Mrs. Buske said the Friona chamber is looking to see what alternative action it can take on the matter.

"The main thing that concerns us now is the lease of the building they are in now," she said. "They are paying \$9.55 a square foot, or \$3,908.34 a month, \$46,900 a year. We feel like they are not offering the taxpayers a fair shot at this when there is an alternative available."

Mrs. Buske said the Friona Chamber is still working on a bid package. "It looks like we can come in at about half of that price," she said.

Miller said the bidding process for one Farwell site for the Parmer County agencies will start in the end of 1996 but since the NRCS office has a lease in Friona until September 1997, the offices won't be combined until that lease ends.

Although the family's house that is being renovated is in the Grady school district, Clinton is expected to stay at Texico Schools where therapy facilities are available for him.

The reason for the different last names for the brothers is that Dillon Cross had been adopted by the Crosses, while Clinton and Marcus Worley were in the the Cross's legal custody.

Clinton was able to escape the fire's ravages because he had gone to sleep on a couch as he sometimes does.

Farwell Convalescent Center offers outpatient therapy for the area

The Farwell Convalescent Center and the Farwell Hospital District have taken an innovative step to provide the community and surrounding area with professional therapy services.

The Center is now providing outpatient therapy in the areas of physical, speech and occupational therapy.

In the past, when a patient was released from a hospital but was still in need of physical or occupational therapy, the patient and their families were faced with a long drive back and forth between Lubbock, Amarillo or Albuquerque to receive the proper therapy.

The Farwell board and Ron Kilgore, administrator of the Farwell Convalescent Center, put together a plan to bring in professional therapists to the center and the services began in mid-January. These services are available to people of all ages.

"The Convalescent Center has had these therapies available to our residents since September, but we saw that there was a real need for these therapies in this area," said Ron.

Ron and the board members are informing doctors in the region of the services. Dr. Nancy Chasteen of the Farwell Clinic has been very pleased with the Outpatient Therapy Services and has been "prescribing" them for several of her patients.

Outpatient Therapy Services are available to patients who have had therapy prescribed by a doctor. Speech therapy can also be recommended for students by a teacher or counselor. The services can be paid for either by private pay or insurance. Medicare can also be billed for therapy for elderly patients.

The Farwell Convalescent Center is setting a new standard for convalescent centers by providing a place for the outpatient services.

"I have never seen another facility that provides a place for such services in the state of Texas," said Ron. "This really is a new idea and the Hospital District board is setting a precedent for providing diversified care to residents in small towns."

Some people may have a few qualms about entering a "nursing home" to receive therapy and the Convalescent Center has put much thought into the fact of the negative stereotype that nursing homes may have with some individuals. The Outpatient Therapy Service area is accessible from the street and a patient will not ever have to enter or exit through the main doors of the nursing home section.

Outpatient Therapy Services are available Monday through Friday. The Physical Therapist is Hugo Barria, L. P.T. Occupational Therapy will be provided by Cory Chacon, C.O.T.A. and the Speech Therapist is Linda Lawlis, S.L.P.

An exciting aspect of the speech therapy availability is the access that students have to the services. Many children are enrolled in speech therapy in the area schools. The availability of additional therapy will be beneficial to their education and advancement in the programs that they are involved in.

Student athletes are also going to benefit from the close proximity of a physical therapist. Many times, after an injury, an athlete will be prescribed physical therapy. Because of the distance that the student and the parent had to once drive to get the physical therapy, the student would miss a lot of classes or a day of school completely. This scenario will no longer be the case because of the physical therapy available to them right here in Farwell.

Registration will take place at Farwell Elementary School on Wednesday, March 6, from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

All children who will be four and five years of age as of September 1st and live in the Farwell District need to register for the next school year.

To register, parents need to come to Farwell Elementary with their child's immunization records and official birth certificate. Only official copies of the birth certificate are accepted and they must have been obtained from state offices. Social Security numbers are also required for registration.

Rebecca Smallwood, school nurse, will be available to review immunization records during registration and the Texas Health Department will be on site for any child requiring immunization. For more information, call Mrs. Smallwood at the school, 481-9131.

Pre-Kindergarten & Head Start Requirements

To be eligible, a child must be 4 years old as of Sept. 1st, is unable to speak or comprehend the English language, or is from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced price lunches) and is a resident of the Farwell School District.

Head Start requires proof of participants meeting federal income guidelines so income verification, such as check stubs, should also be available for review. Verification or other types of public assistance should also be available for review.

Head Start also extends its services to handicapped children.

Texas school districts are required to provide Pre-K if 15 or more students are identified.

Cool in the pan on a wire rack 10 minutes. Remove from pan and cool completely before slicing. Makes 1 loaf, or 18 1/2" slices.

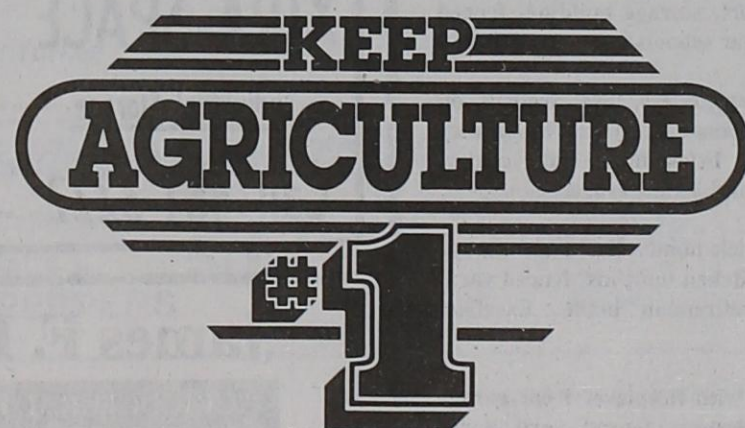



Lazbuddie Schools hire Robin Ray to teach Spanish

In other business, the board:

-- Set the school board election for May 4. The seats currently held by Steve Foster and Robert Gallman will be on the ballot. Applications can be picked up at the school business office between Feb. 19 and March 20.

-- Appointed Marvin and Jo Mimms as election judges. They will pick three helpers. Under a new law, the office where applications can be picked up just have clerks available throughout the filing period. Named as clerks were Kim Puckett, Susie Sterling, Carolyn Scott and Jack Lennon.

-- Planned two special meetings on the school's \$500,000 remodeling program. The first will be Feb. 20 with the architect to finalize the plans. The second will be March 18 when bids will be opened.

-- Took no action on salaries because a couple of the board members were absent.

-- Hired Robin Ray, a Farwell High graduate, as a fulltime substitute in the Spanish department, replacing Sandra Garza, who moved away. Ms. Ray will not be fully certified until this summer; that's why she was hired as a sub.

-- Hired Deborah Redwine as a part-time homebound teacher.

-- Re-hired Hardy Carlyle as high school principal for two more years.

-- Named Carlyle as "504 liaison" -- this is mandated so a person is available to help students who have a learning disability but aren't in the special ed program.

-- Approved the summer food service. Summer school classes will be offered in grades kindergarten through 12th. The U.S. Department of Agriculture will provide breakfasts and lunches for students during a 6-week summer school.

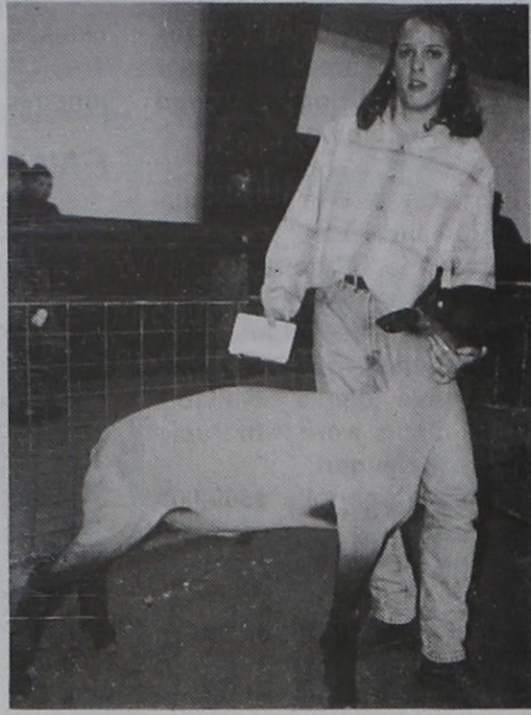

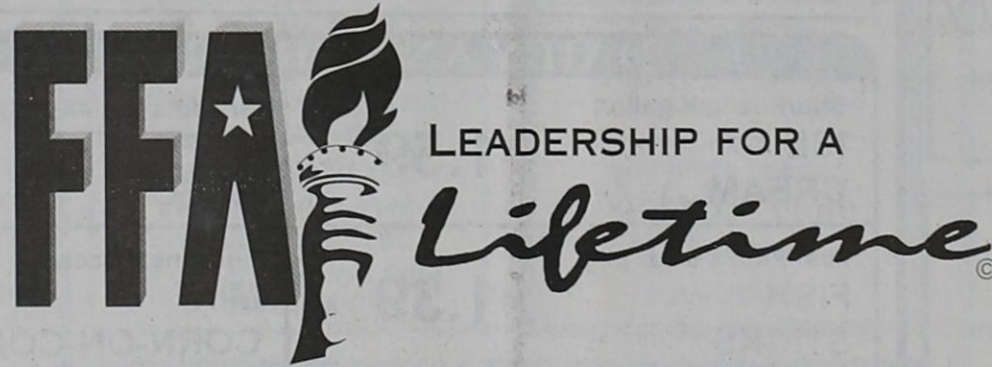
