

She has been National Honor Society vice president, Student Council representative, yearbook staff member, FFA member, FHA member, 4-H member and cheerleader.



Judge rules individual school board members can't be sued

Farwell School Supt. Richard Boothby announced at the May 8 school board meeting that the judge in the Charlie Gustin case has ruled that the school board members cannot be sued individually. Boothby said the board's Houston attorney had notified him that U.S. District Judge Mary Lou Robinson had agreed to the board's attorney's request to eliminate the individual suits from the lawsuit. Charlie Gustin, a Farwell High School senior, has filed suit against the school district's new drug-testing policy for students participating in extra-curricular activities, saying it was unconstitutional. When the suit was filed, it was against the school board and the individual board members. That latter part has been stricken. The Gustins' case is being handled by the Texas chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union. The lawsuit is expected to be heard by Judge Robinson in October.

New dairy co-op discussed

Four of the nation's largest dairy marketing cooperatives have signed a memorandum of understanding to continue discussions that could lead to the formation of a new dairy marketing cooperative that would market about 25 percent of the nation's milk.

Cooperatives involved in the consolidation discussions are: Associated Milk Producers, Mid-America Dairymen, Milk Marketing and Western Dairymen Cooperative. Together, the four marketed more than 42.5 billion pounds of milk for their 27,300 dairy farmer-owners in 1996.

The milk cooperatives began discussing the possibility of consolidating operations shortly after all members experienced a steep drop in milk prices as a result of the sharp drop in cheese prices last November.

Government deregulation has increased farm price volatility. Other factors are involved such as the fact that international dairy product competition is forcing extremely competitive pricing and there is a growing need for capital to increase manufacturing efficiency and expand production of value-added products.



- Chris Smith, 3rd place, manufacturing systems exam. - Dustin Weir, 1st place, research and development exam; and 2nd place, database.





Texico discusses a new city hall; Warmuth resigns

The Texico City Council tackled a number of important topics at Tuesday's meeting, including moving ahead on a new city hall. But it also received a resignation.

Ronnie Warmuth, who has served as a councilman the past 7 years, resigned, effective in June, because he is moving out of the city. He said he has sold his home to the new high school principal who is coming from Ft. Sumner.

Mayor Nathan Tharp said that city residents who are interested in serving on the council should contact City Hall by June 1.

Councilman Rick Queener said he checked into buying building shells for a new city hall which could be attached to the south side of the community center. Prices were \$12,000 for a 40'x70' unit and \$5,900 for a 30'x60' unit.

The current city hall building is very old and badly in need of repairs. The cost of such repairs is so high that the council feels it makes more sense to put the money into a new facility.

The council agreed to ask city engineer Robert Lydick to meet with councilmen Queen and Oran Jay Autrey to see if adding an area to the community center would work out.

So the council also tabled bids it had received for a new parking lot at the community center, pending the outcome of the city hall talks.

To pay for the city hall project, a general obligation bond was discussed. The earliest it could be voted on would be the March 1998 election. A new swimming pool might be part of this bond issue.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard City Marshal Gil Holguin express the need for crosswalks near the school. The topic will be put on the next agenda. Meanwhile, state officials will be asked if the city can put in crosswalks. The state has significant control over the traffic flow in cities.

-- Dropped the policy of requiring groups that rent the community center for dances to have police periodically stop by. If the policy was kept, it meant higher costs to the city through opening a new city bookkeeping account. This means that parents will handle the security at dances.

-- Heard Tharp report he ordered a telephone for the community center at a cost of about \$1,500. The city also will pay the monthly cost. Long distance calls and collect calls will be blocked out.

-- Plans to seek hiring a janitor for the community center, but will wait until the parking lot work is finished.

Cloud-seeding to start soon

--- Plans to discuss at its next meeting revisions to the zoning ordinance and the trash and debris ordinance.

-- Discussed problems with youths and traffic. This included (a) students rushing in vehicles to local restaurants during school lunch periods. Holguin has asked school officials to expand the lunch periods to give kids more time; (b) youths playing in streets and riding their bikes and running in streets. City attorney Marion Ty Rutter and Holguin will work on a loitering ordinance to prevent some of this; (c) Tharp said he watched a youth who was on a motorcycle, jump off and then see the cycle smash into a mobile home; (d) noted that the speed limit is 30 miles per hour near the schools but is unable to lower it because the state won't let Texico do it. Texico has tried more than once.

-- Had several truck drivers attend to voice their need to park their trucks near their homes. Tharp said there are no plans to force them to keep their trucks out of the city. Several years ago the city council discussed this option but backed off when a large crowd of truckers attended the meeting.

-- Questions were raised over the city ordinance that doesn't allow folks to park their vehicles in the front yards if they have a mobile home there, but it's okay for other residences.

-- Agreed to let the First Baptist Church close part of Turner Street during its Vacation Bible School.

-- Approved the 1997-98 tentative budget and sent it to Santa Fe for approval.

-- Told Clark Collins it was okay for him to move a new trailer on the same site he has had another one. Ten letters were mailed to nearby property owners. Three were returned

without any objections.

- Accepted the bid of K Barnett, Clovis, to do the Highway 108 work. It had the low bid of \$291,526. There will be four lanes at the intersection of Highway 108 (College Avenue) and Wheeler Avenue, with a widening to the school. There will be some curb and gutter work at the Wheeler and College intersection. A new culvert will be put in. The road will be raised a foot.

-- Voted 3-1 (Queener opposed) to have Lipham Construction, of Hereford, do the annual street sealing project. Work will be done on parts of Hamlin, Opal, Hereford, Lamar, Anderson and Turner streets this year. Lipham was the low bidder, about \$2,600 under the bid of Eastwood Construction, Clovis.

-- Received four bids for an ambulance. The low bidder was accepted. A 1996 demonstration Ford ambulance will be delivered this week.

-- Adopted an ordinance giving Roosevelt County Rural Telephone the phone franchise for Texico.

- Passed a resolution condemning the structure at 401 Wheeler Ave. This is the building east of city hall which has been partially demolished. If the work isn't continued in a timely fashion, the city plans to knock it down. Tharp said kids have been playing in the building, which has a safety problem.

-- Voted 3-1 (Queener opposed) to stay a member of High Plains Waste Management Association and pay a one-time assessment of \$1.50 per capital -- about \$1,500 from the city's general fund will help keep the HPWMA office open. This has been discussed in executive session.

Funds asked for cloud-seeding

Rusty Rucker, of Pleasant Hill, stopped by the Tribune this week to urge folks to support the upcoming cloud-seeding program.

Rucker is a member of the Llado Estacado Weather Modification Association, a group of Roosevelt and Curry county folks, backing the upcoming cloud-seeding projedt.

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, which represents 15 Texas counties including Parmer, is spending \$450,000 this year to hire a firm from North Dakota to seed the clouds.

The Llano Estacado group wants to participate in this venture -- but they need to come up with \$200,000.

So far, Rucker reported, folks in Roosevelt County have pledged \$90,00 toward a goal of \$126,000. And folks in Curry County have pledged \$38,000 toward a goal of \$72,000. The cost is based on an 8-cents per acre charge.

If the New Mexico folks come up with the \$200,000 -- and the deadline is next week since seeding operations start in May -- then the cloud seeding would be performed far enough to the west to help improve precipitation in Roosevelt, Curry and part of Quay counties.

Rucker said folks can send donations or pledge amounts to the Roosevelt Soil and Water Conservation District 705 E. Canadian, Portales, NM 88130.

Rucker also brought by the Tribune a rainfall assessment of the West Texas Rain-Enhancement Program of 1996 which involved eight counties in west central Texas, including Reagan, Crockett, Sutton, Schleicher, Irion, Glasscock and Terrell. To sum up, the assessment said that the rainfall during the 5-month period, May through September, when seeding was performed ... exceeded the normal in some locales by as much as 30 percent.

The benefits from more rainfall are obvious -- higher crop yields, extending the life of the aquifer, less hail damager and more forage production.





The mission in this part of the world is to bring medical and dental care, education and the word of God to people who would otherwise live and die without them.

Evangelism in the South Pacific

(First of Two Parts)

(Editor's note: U.S. Navy Commander Will Anderson, a Farwell High graduate, is the son of Bob and Carrie Anderson. Periodically, over the years, he has sent articles about his postings as features for the Tribune. Currently, he is stationed in Guam.)

My office is located at the Navy Computer and Telecommunications Area Master Station, Western Pacific, which is simply called NCTAMS (nic-tams) WESTPAC for brevity sake.


I've found a major part of my "Navy adventure" on this island, oddly enough, in the NCTAMS Base Chapel, through the chapel support of Pacific Missionary Aviation/Flying Medical Samaritans (PMA -- FMS).

PMA Aircraft and its ship, Sea Haven, bring medical and dental care, building supplies, education and religious support to thousands of people in "Micronesia" and provides these same services in the remote and scattered islands of the Filipino Archipelago. The group must called itself "FMS" in the Philippines because "PMA" is also the designation of the Philippine Army. Thus, two names are used by the same group.

This story is about the massive responsibility shouldered by this group, and also a story of the path that led to its founding by Edmund Kalau.

Kalau was born in a Germany which had been shattered by defeat in World War I. He grew up in the period when the Nazis came to power, and he was a member of the Hitler Youth prior to World War II. As a result of the four years of pilot training he had received as a boy in the Hitler Youth, he became a fighter pilot in the Luftwaffe and was swept into the life-and-death struggle in the air against the advancing armies of the Soviet Union in the blast furnace that was the Eastern Front in World War II.

Following Germany's surrender, he found that he had lost his mother and younger brother and sister in the chaos, plus his father, who was a career officer in the German Army. The British captured Kalau and imprisoned him in one of their post-war POW camps in Germany. The U.S.A.'s Marshall Plan allowed him to be released to work as a farmer, and in the months that followed, he found his mother and younger brother and sister in the Russian sector of Saxony. He managed to get them into the Western part of occupied Germany, and then learned that his father also had been made a POW by the British. After his release in 1946 the whole family was reunited to live in Hamburg. Their meager rations were supplemented by the fresh produce that Kalau was able to bring home from his work on the farms.

The so-called "sea gypsies" build temporary homes on remote and lifeless atolls with a maximum elevation of about 3 feet above sea level. It is a precarious and unpredictable life.



It's at this point that Kalau really wants to begin the story of his life. The memories of the rise of the Nazis and the carnage in World War II bring a saddened and dark cast to his features. He prefers to begin his narrative with the time that he began taking night classes, to try and build some life in the future.

Through these classes, he came into contact with a former enemy, a Russian who had been raised as a Communist but who had renounced his previous life to become a Christian. Kalau seems to relish the fact that he had spent his whole life being taught to hate the Jews and to kill Russians, and that it was in this period that a Russian introduced him to a Jewish saviour, and it changed the course of his life completely and forever.

Within 18 months, he had been called to four years of study at seminary, and he was able to further his studies when he came to the U.S. in 1954. From there, he traveled to Micronesia in 1956 under the sponsorship of a German Christian organization called Liebenzell Mission (the missions in Europe are organized and called by their location, not their denomination). This part of the Pacific was in effect a wasteland, still reeling from the ravages of the Japanese occupation forces and their annihilation as, one by one, these islands were invaded or bypassed by the U.S. forces in World War II.







Lazbuddie looks to cutbacks

The Lazbuddie School Board on Tuesday discussed the lower school enrollment and the cutbacks it needs to make due to less state funds.

Since January 1996, the school enrollment has dropped from 238 to 210. So the board will need to cut out about \$90,000 from next year's budget.

Toward this end, the board decided to go with 3 administrative secretaries next year, down from 4 this year. Susie Sterling has resigned. Cheryl Morris will move into her spot in the administrative office.

In other business, the board:

-- Held the annual board election. Gail Morris was re-elected president; Robert Gallman, vice president, and Rick Seaton, secretary. Donny Coker was sworn in as a new board member. -- Let bids for its annual insurances and supplies.

-- Approved participation in the Job Training and Partnership Act summer program. The federal program is handled through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

The Chief's Corner

From Police Chief Roy McGaa:

I would just like to take a minute to explain to parents and children that there are two types of individuals who write on tables, benches and playground equipment.

The first type will just write their first name or initials, or somebody loves somebody. They are simply ignorant and demonstrate a lack of home training. They probably do not realize that it costs the city of Farwell in excess of \$650 a year to clean the benches, tables and playground equipment.

The other type of individual is a vicious, demented, social misfit. This is the type of person responsible for calling others profane names, who draw gang signs and sexually explicit pictures where toddlers play.

Regardless of the intent, writing on park equipment is illegal. Municipal Judge P.C. Howard has advised me that the first offense fine is \$250, second offense is \$500 plus a substantial community service sentence. This does not include restitution.

The park is open to everyone, however it is the Farwell city park and it is intended for church/civic groups, family picnics and outings, little children playing on the equipment and older children playing basketball. It is not for gang meetings, defacing public property, alcohol/drug use, profanity or any other behavior that will embarrass or cause discomfort to the citizens of Farwell or out of town visitors.

Graffiti and Vandalism are the first steps in losing control of your city park to the criminal element. I ask for your help in keeping the park a safe and enjoyable place, please report those who would destroy it immediately.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor.

In the past three years, the farmer-owned Farm Credit Bank of Texas and seven Production Credit Associations across the state of Texas have provided financing for the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Program to the tune of \$37 million.

The money to repay this debt comes from assessments of local cotton farmers, collected by the Texas Boll Weevil Foundation, which administers the program under a Texas law passed by the state legislature in 1993. Last week, a Texas Supreme Court rulling, however, struck down the law -- leaving cotton farmers in limbo, and us as their lender holding the bag.

The boll weevil's eradication means higher cotton yields and less pesticides -- ultimately leading to a stronger local and state economy with more jobs and an increased tax base. In states where eradication efforts have been successful, production has increased many fold and insecticide use on cotton has been reduced 40-85%. The National Cotton Council estimates that every \$1 spent on eradication costs returns approximately \$12 in benefits to the economy.

We applaud the efforts of Senator Robert Duncan of Lubbock, and others, who are working on a bill to restore the legality of the boll weevil program before the end of the current session -- and legislators appear willing to expedite a remedy. Unfortunately, however, early drafts appear to focus more on continuing eradication efforts, without fully appreciating the need to ensure the Foundation's existing financial obligations are met.

It is imperative that the legislature include provisions to ensure the repayment of its present debt obligations -- loans that Farm Credit institutions made in good faith to the Boll Weevil Foundation based on enabling legislation passed by the Texas Legislature. Will any financial institution provide funding for this, or any similar program in the future, if the existing debt on past obligations cannot be collected? In other words, without a financial partner for the Boll Weevil program, the



Protection against boll weevils urged

From the Texas Ag Extension Service:

Unless each farmer protects his fields, boll weevils may take a big bite out of yields and profits in the more than 3 million acres around Lubbock which is annual planted for cotton, warn entomologists.

Farmers with weevil problems will have to pay from \$32 to \$60 an acre, depending on the number of times they have to spray, said Dr. James Leser, extension service cotton entomologist. "Even with this level of control, we will still have yield losses from the weevil. On 75-cent a pound cotton, that could average \$31 an infested acre."

Dr. Don Rummel, experiment station entomologist, said, "we're seeing a more cold-hardy weevil. All early indications are that this may be the greatest boll weevil population ever on the High Plains.
