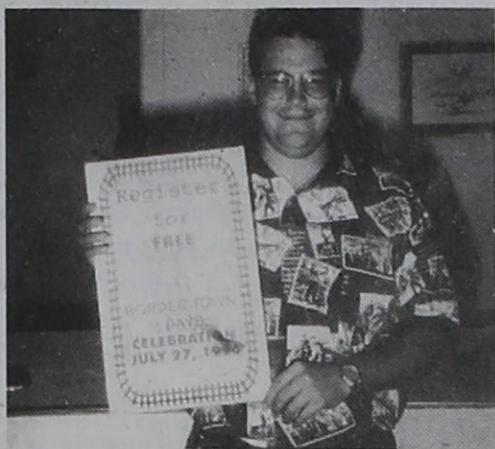
Our theme of "When I Grow Up, I Want To Be..." should make for a good variety of decorations.

BTD Merchants Giveaway starts!

A multitude of Twin City businesses will be participating in the 15th annual Border Town Days Merchants Giveaway program to be held in conjunction with the annual BTD celebration on July 27.

This year's giveaway will take place throughout the afternoon of the Saturday festivities at Farwell City Park. To enter, you must be at least 12 years old and you must be present to win. Drawings start at 12:30 p.m.

Any merchant who hasn't been contacted but wishes to participate, should call BTD Chairman Mike Pomper at 481-3681 immediately.

Each participating business has a box in which customers may register for the prize (or prizes) to be given away by the merchant. Some merchants are having more than one giveaway.

A person may sign up once each time he or she is in a store until July 25, when the boxes will be picked up and taken to the park for the drawings.

Center construction problems addressed

The Texico City Council Tuesday discussed a problem with four low spots in the concrete floor of the new community center.

Mayor Nathan Tharp issued a stop order on construction last Friday because of the problem. He said the sections with problems need to be cut out and replaced.

Architect Eldon Smith proposed to the council that the contractor use a product to smooth out the slabs. He said if sections were cut out, you would end up with more cracks. The council approved his patching recommendation.

In other business, the council:
-- Heard city attorney Marion Ty Rutter report that he had given owners of two mobile homes on Eulie Street 10 days to get their homes into compliance with city codes or they would be cited before the municipal judge.

-- Talked with Barbara Fuentes, who has been given an order by the municipal judge to remove equipment from her residentially-zoned property within 30 days. She asked for an extension to find a place for it. She said she has been operating a business (truckin'g) out of her home for 18 years. She

Bicycle contest registration starts

All area youngsters are reminded that registration starts Monday for the Border Town Days Decorated Bike Contest.

Youths must sign up at Texico City Hall.

This year once again offers a nifty incentive: Ted and Teddy Lopez, of Tedson Trailers in Texico, are donating a brand new bike to the winner of "Best of Show" -- the bike judged as best decorated regardless of age category.

This year's BTD theme is "When I Grow Up, I Want To Be..." It is very important to follow the theme since that is a large portion of the judging.

The three judges are from Clovis -- Tommy Bonner, Ernie Kos and Lisa Noble.

Also, an anonymous donor has provided funds for cash prizes in each category.

Plus, every participant will receive a free train ride on the Border Town Days Express.

"Everything is ready at Texico City Hall for kids to register," said Linda Moss, who is in charge of this year's bike contest. She is being assisted by Joy Stanton.

The registration deadline is 3 p.m. July 26.

Mrs. Moss said that youths planning to enter the decorated bike contest in the parade need to register, giving their name and age, to be eligible for the cash prizes.

The contest will be held an hour before the Border Town Days parade on July 29. After the bicycle contest, all entrants will ride in the parade to the Farwell city park.

Prizes will be announced at the beginning of the Day in the Park festivities, at 1 p.m. at the Farwell city park gazebo.

No motorized bikes are allowed in the contest. All riders must bring their decorated bikes to Anderson Street (between Texico City Hall and the flea market -- across the street from Citizens Bank) by 9:45 a.m. Texas time (that's 8:45 a.m. New Mexico time) and line up for the judging there.

Texico police will be on hand to escort youths across Wheeler Avenue, if needed.

The portion of Anderson Street where the judging will take place will be closed to vehicular traffic during this period.

"You must be on time or you will not be judged," advised Mrs. Moss.

She added, "Contestants need to be sure to stick to the theme -- "When I Grow Up, I Want To Be..." if they are going to be counted. The judges will be looking for adherence to the theme.

The contest is open to youths who live in the Texico and Farwell school districts.

Other rules are:

-- All participants ride in the parade (their folks can go along, too, if they wish) and must continue to Farwell City

Park. There, they can park their bikes in a bicycle rack across the street from the park and in back of the First Baptist Church of Farwell.

Riding bikes in the park dur-

ing BTD is not allowed.

-- You must be present at the park to receive your cash prizes when the announcements are made during the 1 p.m. ceremonies.

-- There will be two judging categories:

1) Division A: Best decorated bike, ages 7-12.

2) Division B: Best Decorated bike, ages 6 and under.

Farwell School Board approves new dress code

The Farwell School Board approved Tuesday a new dress code for students in grades 6 through 12.

The dress code committee had met June 24 to put together the guidelines. Committee members were Teresa Ancira, Patsy Camp, Charles Christian, Hayley Christian, Candy Dyer, Larry Gregory, Merlene Hill, Leslie Lunsford, Jerry Owen and Doris White. New guidelines are:

Clothing should cover and conceal the student's body from the shoulder to 2 inches above the top of the knee.

Tight fitting clothes are not to be worn.

Appropriate undergarments must be worn at all times.

Pants, slacks and jeans are acceptable attire.

Shorts, skirts, dresses and split skirts are not to exceed 2 inches above the top of the knee when standing. This also includes slits in any of the before mentioned.

Bicycle (spandex/latex) shorts, wind/gym shorts are not permitted, except during athletic periods or activities as approved by coaches.

Boxer shorts, tight fitting shorts, short shorts, cut-offs, jogging shorts, shorts with holes or patches are not allowed.

No rolled-up shorts or frayed edges on shorts are accepted.

Pants and shorts (any item of clothing that fits at the waist) shall be appropriately sized at the waist.

Shirts and blouses shall be appropriately sized.

Any tight fitting clothing deemed to be improper will not be allowed.

Texas state law has stated that "any" attire which has obscene, suggestive pictures, slogans or ads of alcohol, tobacco products or gang related connotations are not acceptable.

Any school uniform worn for extracurricular activities will be left up to the discretion of the campus administrator.

If a student violates the rules, here are the consequences:

First offense -- The student will be asked to call home to have someone bring proper clothes to him/her at school. If no one can be reached, the school will provide clothes for coverage to benefit the student by being able to return to class.

Second offense -- The student will lose his/her privileges the remainder of the school year.

In other business, the board:

-- Didn't take action on a new state law allowing governmental agencies to give tax exemptions for vehicles specially equipped for the handicapped. The Parmer County Commissioners last month voted not to implement it here.

-- Hired Dawn Hill to teach junior high math and Roslyn Vastano to be the band director, replacing Pat Henry, who retired. Mrs. Hill replaces Maribel Estrada who has moved to South Texas.

'Sweet news' for Farwell area

The Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association sent this news:

While drought has turned life sour for many area farmers, there's sweet news for Farwell area sugar beet growers.

The regional beet crop is off to an excellent start. Growers can anticipate the highest price in years, says Roger Hill, president of Holly Sugar Corp.

"We anticipate the net selling price for beets to be around \$26," said Hill. "That equates to a price of about \$40 or more per ton of production for most beet growers."

Also, Hill said the initial payment to area growers at harvest time will be 75 percent -- a 10 percent increase from last year.

"The higher initial payment will be something we can really take to the bank," said Ken Frye, of Hereford, president of the Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association. "It's good news for us growers. It will help many of us offset a poor wheat crop and low cattle prices."

Holly's Hereford processing plant contracts for beets grown by producers from Dimmitt to Dalhart and Clovis to Plainview.

Beet acres are down this year, at about 15,000. However, with the crop's sound progress and high prices,

beet producers could be the regional growers who receive the best return per acre when harvest begins in late September.

World sugar shortages and low overall production this year are causing the higher prices. The anticipated \$26 net would be the highest price seen by regional growers since 1990, and only the sixth time in the region's 32 years of beet production that prices have gone that high.

"For growers who produce an average crop of 22 tons per acre with a 15 percent sugar content, gross return for beets would be about \$900 per acre," said Frye. "And if the sugar content was 16-17 percent, the return could be in the \$1,000 per acre range."

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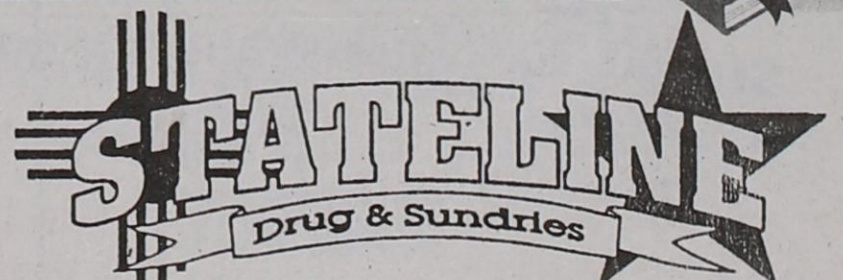
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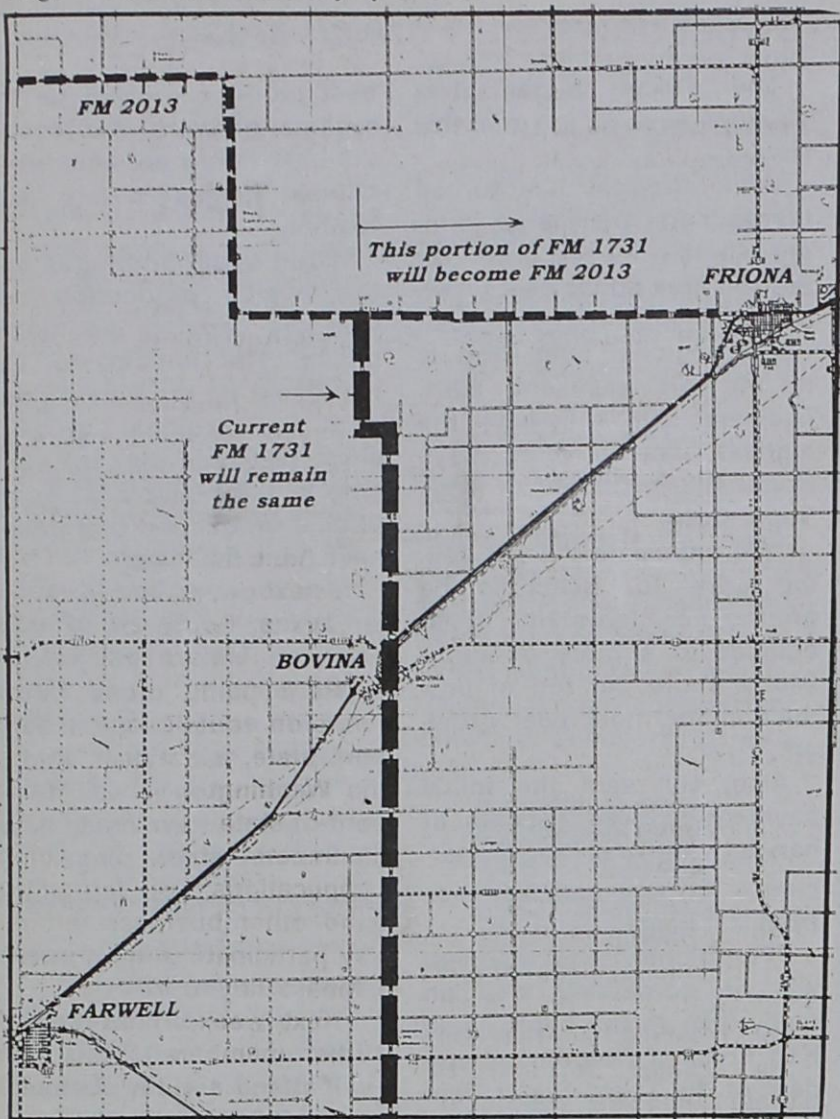

So the state folks asked that the section of road from 10 Mile Corner to Friona be changed to FM 2013.

This means that the north-south road stays FM 1731, but the east-west road (from Friona to the New Mexico line) will all be FM 2013.

The change still needs some state approvals but is expected to become effective in two to three months.

"This change has been needed for years," said county judge Bonnie Clayton.

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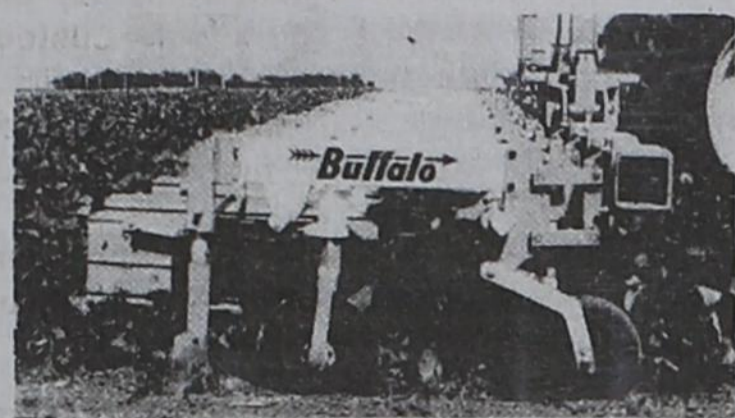
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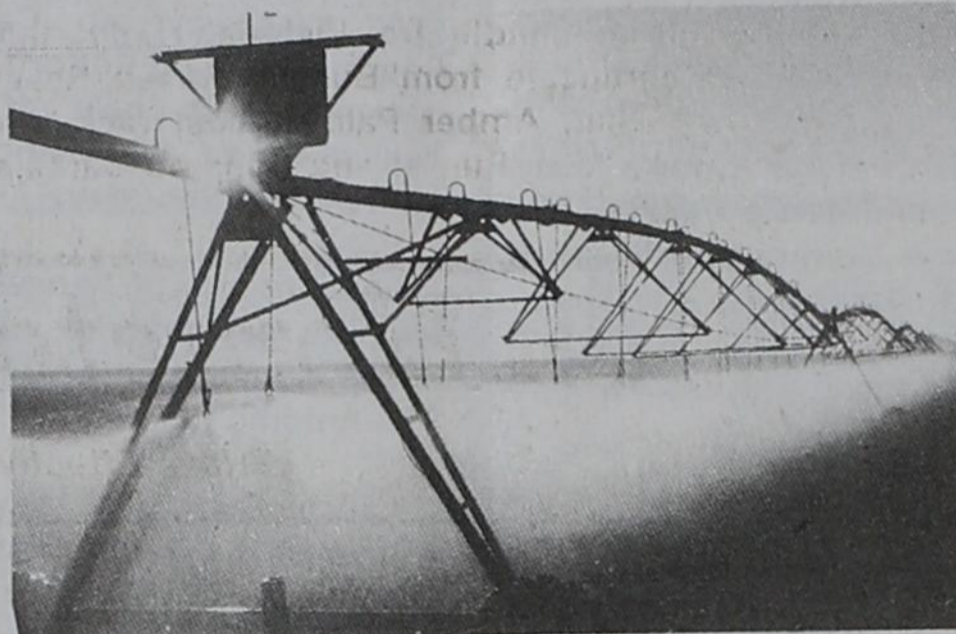

SPS says merger will result in guaranteed savings

SPS says that guaranteed savings of \$3 million a year will be credited to Texas customers' bills as part of a proposed settlement announced July 8 by SPS and virtually all parties who had intervened in its merger case now before the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

SPS has stated that its proposed merger with Public Service

Co. of Colorado will result in significant savings and help hold down future electric rates. The settlement with the commission staff and five other intervenors was announced to the administrative law judge hearing the case in Austin. The judge suspended the hearing, which began June 24, to allow the parties to finalize details.

The minimum \$3 million a year in credits would apply to SPS's residential, commercial, industrial and other retail customers in Texas for the first five years of the merger. The tentative pact calls for a 50-50 sharing between shareholders and customers of non-fuel operation and maintenance savings during the first five years, but with customers guaranteed at least \$3 million in credits regardless of the amount of actual savings. Customers could receive larger credits. After five years, all such savings would go to the customers.

In total, SPS estimates that during the first 10 years of the merger its Texas retail customers will receive about \$100 million in savings through lower fuel costs and other factors that will help hold down electric bills.

For an SPS residential customer who averages 1,000 kilowatt hours a month (representing a monthly bill of \$62.62), the minimum annual credit would be about \$4.

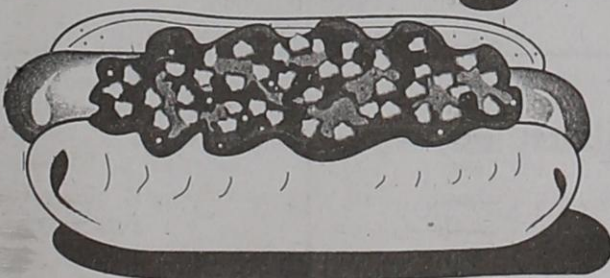
