Barbro Fostad knows what it's like to live on the "Nordic Track" of life. It's not because she's a fitness maniac or anything of the like, it's because she is a true Norwegian that likes to experience life to the fullest.

Barbro, 17, has been living in Farwell as a foreign exchange student. She comes from the suburban town of Levanger, Norway. It is a suburb of the city of Skogn.

She found herself coming to America on an almost spontaneous whim that began when a good friend of hers posed the question of "Want to go to America?"

She asked her parents and they said that they would think about it. She went through a formal interview and the next thing she knew was that she was on her way to a small town called "Farwell" in America.

"I had requested to live in a small town because I wanted to go to a small school," Barbro said.

School is very different in America from what Barbro is accustomed to in Norway. "In Norway, we have much more homework that we are responsible for and many of our academic tests last for a full day, just for one subject," she

When she returns home, she will complete another two full years of school and then will continue on to the university level. She is extremely interested in Veterinary Science and hopes to have her own practice someday. Her mother, Ingebjorg, is a Veterinarian with an established small animal practice in Levanger. "If I can keep my grades up in Norway, I'll go to a university there; otherwise, I'll study in a foreign country - perhaps, Germany."

Barbro's father, Geir Ketil, is a medical doctor specializing in ear, nose and throat problems. She also has a younger sister, Ida, 12 and a younger brother, Greger, 14.

Barbro enjoys being with her friends at home. "I spend a lot of time just hanging out with my friends, talking and laughing," she said. She also enjoys horseback riding, playing the piano and singing - but only when she is all by herself and no one can hear!

For entertainment on the weekends, she and her friends spend time at a youth club that is in her hometown. They listen to music and dance.

"Going to the movies is very expensive in Norway, so we usually get together with our friends and families at private or public parties," she said. She also noted that Americans have it pretty good when it comes to the price of movies, restaurants and other "fun things" to do for entertainment.

She was extremely surprised at how strict our TV shows were in certain areas. She expected American TV to be extremely liberal. She was also surprised to learn that American kids "didn't get to do whatever they wanted."

The issues that face American teens are very different from those facing Norwegian teens. "Drugs are not a big problem in my hometown. They are found more in the large cities, but they're not a real big issue at home," she said. "Teen drinking is not a problem either," she commented. "We're raised from a very young age around alcohol as a part of our lifestyle, so it's not a big deal to go get drunk when you're a teenager."

Barbro has been in Farwell since the end of last summer. She spent the first half of her year here with Craig and Deon Hunt and family. She has been living for the past several months with Mike and Pam Haseloff.

She has enjoyed getting to know all the people in school and the community. Some highlights of her stay here thus far have been learning to ride horses with a western style saddle, bowling and going shopping in a mall. "I was blown away by the size of Wal-Mart and having so many stores in a

mall. I almost got lost!" she exclaimed. She has been an actively involved member of the St. John Lutheran Church youth group for many months and is looking forward to an upcoming church trip that the youth group is putting together.

Barbro will be returning to Norway on July 8, so she hopes to get a little traveling in before she goes home. "I really like Farwell and the people here, but I think I'd like to see what other places in America are like as well before I return to Norway. America is so big and has so many different types of people and places that I'd like to experience as much as I can!" she said.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Mike,

Since the end of school is very near, and that means parties and proms, I feel compelled to write this letter to inform teens and adults alike of the penalties involved with alcohol and drugs.

If a person 17 years old or older is found guilty of public intoxication, a Class C misdemeanor, the fine can be anywhere from \$25 to \$200 for a first offense. If it's a second offense, it can be from \$500 to \$1,000 and the person can be asked to take an alcohol awareness course. If that person is under 18, parents also must attend.

The fine for purchasing alcohol for a minor runs from \$100

For driving while intoxicated, first offense, it's \$100 to \$2,000 plus a possible jail time of 3 days to 180 days, plus 90 days to a year's driver's license suspension.

If an open container is found in the vehicle, 3 days will be added to the sentence. And this stays on the driver's license record from for the next 10 years. A second offense brings a fine of \$300 to \$4,000, plus jail time of 15 days to a year, and a driver's license suspension of 6 months to 2 years.

Imagine being without wheels for these periods!

Drugs are even more costly. Most offenses are at least Class B and C misdemeanors, such as 2 oz. or less of marijuana, and that brings a fine up to \$2,000 or jail time of up to 880

Delivery of marijuana, 1/4 oz. or less, means a fine up to \$4,000 and a year or less in jail.

Possession of a controlled substance, such as cocaine or amphetamines, is a felony charge. They carry penalties according to the amount in possession.

I hope that our readers have some idea how costly it is to be convicted of any ot these offenses. Each person must accept the responsibility of his or her own actions. Nobody wants to face these possibilities and the troubles that come with them.

Parents, please let your children read this. Take some time to discuss with them your views on the subject.

My goal as someone involved in the legal process is to help you anyway I can. I want you to be informed and hope no accidents or tragedies occur because you are now aware of the consequences of your actions.





She also sat with us in the gallery while we watched the legislative session at work. Once, Mr. Laney paused on the floor, asked us to stand up, and introduced us to the entire legislature.

A Laney assistant then offered to take us to the top of the capitol building. This area is not open to the public but it is an incredible view. Lindsey, Mrs. Risher and myself were the only ones brave enough to climb the 300 some odd steps required to reach the very top of the dome but it was well worth the effort. Despite the fact that it is cooler on the equator than it was at the top of that dome, it was an awesome experience.

Nelda offered us refreshment and we chatted in their apartment a little more. Pete Laney came off the floor for a few minutes to take a picutre with us and was very hospitable. They also suggested that we view the XIT exhibit in the General Land Office which turned out to be a very valuable learning experience.

Everyone in Farwell needs to go to Austin and see this exhibit. It was about how the capitol building was built and the XIT's role in it. There was a huge room filled with information about the Farwell brothers and even maps of Parmer County and Farwell around the turn of the century. We were just amazed, never knowing the role our little town had played in this historical event.

Imagine our astonishment when we were casually looking at the deed of trust that sold the last 39 acres of the XIT ranch in 1963 to pay for the capitol and saw Karen Schell's (Lindsey's grandmother!) at the bottom as a witness. This historic event took place in Farwell at the Parmer County courthouse. So after that we felt a little smug when asked where we were from and answered Farwell. Most people hadn't heard of it or didn't care but little did they know that had it not been for our town's founders the majestic capitol might not exist.

We had been calling the contest headquarters periodically to check on results and were ecstatic to learn I was in the top six but they would not reveal the exact placement until the awards ceremony that evening.

The ceremony was in the LBJ Auditorium and was filled with contestants and sponsors from all four journalism events. Fortunately, Class A Editorial Writing was announced first so the wait was not long. They began with sixth place and went up. When each name called that was not mine, I got very anxious, thinking our information had been incorrect. I about fell out of the chair when my name was announced as the first place winner.

It was rather embarrassing because after a day of climbing capitol buildings and traipsing all over Austin since 7 that morning, I was hardly the picture of freshness and beauty. I went up in front of these millions of people looking like I had just finished a ten course obstacle course (when it was actually a ten course meal) and they draped me with the gold medal and took my picture for all posterity. It was as close to the Olympics as I'll ever get anyway.

I was already completely overwhelmed but when they announced me as the winner of the Tops in Texas award given to the overall winner of Classes A-5A, there is not a word to describe that feeling. Overwhelmed does not even begin to cover it. It was great. I then received a plaque for being the overall state champion.

The day was not over yet. We had another tremendous meal and then went down to the river. Every evening at dusk, an estimated 1.5 million bats emerge from the bridge. People line the bridge and the grassy riverbank to view this phenomenon.

Lindsey Rich's spelling contest was Saturday morning.

Spelling is a very difficult contest because not only was she required to know the exact spellings, accents, and captilizations of words but the definition and roots. These are not easy words either; I dare say even Mrs. Merritt, our very proficient English teacher, would have a hard time with some of the words.

Lindsey is a freshman and to make it to state was a phenomenal achievement. I knew Lindsey had worked extremely hard but when we were studying the night before in the hotel, I was amazed that she invariably knew each word perfectly.

Lindsey got 85 out of 100 correct on her test which is absolutely great. She did not place in the top six but being so young, we know she'll be back next year in full force and I feel confident that we will have a state champion speller on our hands for possibly the next three years. The ones who did place only scored around 9 or 10 points above Lindsey so she definately was in range of a medal.

Finally we headed for San Marcos where we could get to the real meat of the trip -- shopping! We spent the remainder of the day there and headed back to the hotel to pack up. We had a safe trip home with many enjoyable memories and souvenirs of our adventures. We really appreciate our sponsors for taking us and the school officials for their support.

A lot of times things like UIL fade in the shadow of athletics and sports events but Lindsey and I learned that while the state meet is basically a nerd convention, it really can be a lot of fun and a wonderful educational experience too.

Not everyone is going to excel at sports but UIL gives students an opportunity to compete and excel and stay in nice hotels just like the athletes. I am grateful for this experience and hope to do it again next year but with about 20 more students. Trust me, it really was cool!

Myofascial massages explained

The Texas-licensed business has been open for about two years. The telephone number is 481-3673.

One of the business' specialties is myofascial massages. Myofascial release is a highly interactive stretching technique that requires feedbadk from the patient's body to determine the direction, force and duration of the stretch and to facilitate maximum relaxation of the tense tissues. The technique recognizes that a muscle cannot be isolated from the other structures of the body. All organs of the body are covered by fascia down to the individual myofibrils. Therefore, all "muscle stretching" is actually stretching of myofascial units. It is the philosophic base which separates myofascial release from other stretching techniques.

While using myofascial release techniques, the therapist monitors tissue tension by developing a kinesthetic link with the patient through touch. As the therapist becomes more adept at matching the patient's tone and tension, the therapist is able to detect subtle restrictions within individual myofascial units. As these areas are identified, gentle localized stretching is performed.

In this manner, restrictions to efficient movement are located which cannot be either identified or eliminated using any other stretching technique. Mal-alignments, which may predispose the patient to future injury, are removed, while treating the patient's current problem. Thus, the therapist works with the patient, not on the patient.

The goal of the treatment is to faciliate the most efficient posture and movement patterns the patient can maintain. Progress is measured by improvement in postural symmetry, reduction in active myofascial trigger points, and increased fluidity of movement.

mail in their home mailboxes from such exciting places."



Pest Management Update

Weed control in corn is off to a poor start due to the weather in April. Cool soil temperatures have slowed crop emergence, wet soil has delayed planting while creating ideal moisture conditions for weed seed germination, snowfall disrupted key field work for several days, and untimely rainfall has created havoc with herbicides already applied or delayed herbicide application in other cases.

The recent record amount of rainfall may have leached preemergence herbicide out of the weed zone, making the herbicide less effective on germinating weeds. Injury to the

emerging crop may also occur as a result of herbicide leaching into the crop root zone and slow crop emergence. If the herbicide is leached and rendered not effective, weeds will emerge with the crop and additional post emergence herbicide applications may be required to control small weeds where tillage is not an option.

If weeds and corn have not emerged, apply pre-emergence herbicides as soon as possible. If corn has emerged, most pre-emergence herbicides may still be applied. In most cases, apply pre-emergence herbicides immediately, then look for the first flush of weeds to emerge and apply post-emergence herbicides as needed.

Tillage and non-selective post-emergence herbicides may not be an option for control of emerged weeds. Selective postemergence herbicides applied with those having soil activity will be required in most cases. Most of the herbicides that are normally applied prior to corn and weed emergence can still be applied for control of later emerging weeds. However, many of these such as Dual II and Harness will have no activity on emerged weeds and must be tank mixed with other herbicides. Atrazine, which is often applied pre-emergence, will also control many small emerged broadleaf and grassy weeds with the addition of crop oil.

We have available the 1997 Texas Panhandle and South Plains Guide for Weed Control in Corn at the Parmer County extension office. This publication lists the corn herbicides available to the producer and the method of application along with restrictions associated with the herbicide.
