Recipe of Week

BBQ SHRIMP WITH OLD BAY

Barbecue Sauce: 1/4 cup mild barbecue sauce

1 1/2 tsp. prepared horseradish 1 tsp. lime juice

1 tsp. Dijon mustard 1/2 tsp. OLD BAY Seasoning

For Shrimp: 20 jumbo shrimp (10-15

count), peeled, leaving tail shell on & deveined 20 slices thinly sliced

lean bacon 1/4 cup white wine

1/4 cup lime juice 4 tbsp. olive oil, divided 4 tsp. OLD BAY Seasoning, divided

10 metal or wooden skewers

1. Combine sauce ingredients. 2. In a non-reactive (glass) bowl, place shrimp, white wine, lime juice, 2 tbsp. of the olive oil and 2 tsp. OLD BAY. Marinate shrimp 15 minutes. Pat shrimp dry.

3. Starting at tail end, wrap the bacon around the shrimp being careful not to tear the bacon. Using 2 shrimp per skewer, skewer each shrimp once near the tail and once near the head. Season with 2 tsp. OLD BAY.

4. Just before cooking, brush shrimp with remaining olive oil. Broil or grill for 5 minutes per side or until bacon is cooked and shrimp is pink and firm to touch. Serve the shrimp with sauce for dipping.
