1963 through the present.


Most, importantly, it stated that my records indicate I have enough credits for full Social Security benefits, including retirement, disability, family and survivor.

Evangelist serves huge Pacific area

(Editor's note: U.S. Navy Commander Will Anderson, a Farwell High graduate, is the son of Bob and Carrie Anderson. Periodically, over the years, he has sent articles about his postings as features for the Tribune. Currently, he is stationed in Guam.)

The cultures that remained were far from the idyllic "Garden of Eden" existences which are perceived commonly (and falsely) in literature and movies. They actually were primitive societies based on total inter-dependence and total conformance to the rigid rules of their village. Islanders who deviated from worship of the idols, based on the fears of death, nature and the unknown, were simply killed or forced to leave the island to take their chances in small, open canoes at sea. This spiritism provided the basis for a life of timid acceptance of the widespread corruption, domination, incest and other atrocities of the island monarchies

Even those who accepted these conditions received only the uncertain results of joint efforts to harvest from the sea and the jungles, living at a subsistance level at best, with no chance anywhere of education in any way that might improve their precarious existence. Added to this, inter-island, inter-tribal and inter-family warfare were constant, and life was at its best desperate, brutish and short.

Even whatever influence the Catholic Church had been able to establish here had been distorted over the centuries. What was called the church in Micronesia was now infiltrated by forms of demon worship and had become simply part of the overall corruption, just as it is in large parts of South America that I saw first-hand when I was stationed in Brazil.

The common theme that outside influences destroyed a heavenly existence on the island in this part of the Pacific is naive at best, and an outright lie at worst. Life in Micronesia is accurately seen as a form of warfare - - fighting hunger, ignorance, corruption and disease. This warfare continues to this day.

This is the world to which Kalau brought his wife, Elizabeth, and into which his sons, Norbert and Dieter, and daughter, Ester, were born. Their first three years were spent working from their base camp on Palau, followed by 18 years on Yap, where they established the first Protestant churches. They then moved their base to Pohnepe, where it remains to this day. Today, Rev. Kalau still flies; Norbert is master of PMA's motor vessel; Dieter is one of the pilots for their aircraft, as is Ester's husband, Peter. Elizabeth and Ester teach, nurse and administer.

Rev. Kalau, his family and volunteers from around the world have attempted over the years to improve the lives of the people living on these isolated islands, scattered across more than 3 million square miles of the Pacific (larger than the continental U.S.). There are more than 2,000 islands in this expanse; some inhabited, some not, most receiving nothing in the way of education, medical, dental, spiritual or logistic support from any government or outside agency. Some of the islands PMA serves have as few as 9 inhabitants; others have as many as several hundred.

In 1975, PMA was established to enhance this support.



Today it operates 8 Beechcraft twin-engines, two Cessnas and two Long-Islander aircraft. It operates the Sea Haven, which provides four complete medical and dental clinics on board, and goes from island to island carrying doctors and dentists who come from all over the world at their own expense with their families. It builds schools and churches, and trains islanders to be teachers and pastors to their own people between visits from PMA. It built and operates the Micronesian Maritime and Fishery

Academy, which in the last six years has had more than 300 graduates from islands across the Pacific at a campus it established in a station donated by the government of Yap. Islanders are given training in longline fishing, maritime diesel mechanics and receive qualifications as ship masters and navigators, allowing them to improve the quality of life on their home islands. This is critical because it provides them their first and only defense against the fishing fleets of Assian nations which for years have raped the fishing grounds around their islands, coming ashore to pillage, also.

PMA expanded in 1976 to the Philippine Islands, where as I pointed out early in this article it's called FMS. FMS supports 6 pastors, 3 doctors another medical vessel, an orphanage and a complete program of providing medical services and establishign churches to isolated islands. All of its staff is native Filipino with the exception of one American pilot who retired from the military and believed he heard the call to serve as a missionary pilot in this isolated part of

PMA also offers the opportunity for short-term service to the church community here. I hope to be able to serve on board the Sea Haven later this year



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

As has been the case in recent years, the annual Quality of Education Survey of residents living in the Texico School District indicate general happiness with the direction their school is taking.

The number of respondents who "agree" and "strongly agree" with the positive statements on the survey is very large, showing strong support for the staff and administration.

In the following list, respondents who answered "agree" and 'strongly agree" will be listed as one total -- "agree." Those who responded "disagree" and "strongly disagree" will be listed as one total -- "disagree."

Farwell Junior High

'The Internet Apple Project'

Farwell Junior High School has received a grant from the Telecommunication Infrastructure Fund for \$108,152.23 to bring Internet access to the students and teachers.

Farwell is one of only three schools in the Panhandle, out of several hundred that applied, to receive such a grant. All Texas junior and senior high school who are in a remote, rural area or who have a certain percentage of economically disadvantaged students were eligible to apply.

Farwell decided to call this the Internet Apple Project -- focusing on the new apple industry in our area.

Principal Jerry DeeOwen is the director of the grant project for the junior high. Teachers who put the grant application together were Kay Stanton (technology and budget coordinator), Hayley Christian, Candy Dyer, Dawn Hill and Kay Ray.

Besides these, other teachers and staff members who also developed and wrote curriculum ideas or had input for their particular areas of the project were Pat Owen, Eva Dean Stephens, Kim Cates, Bruce Bryant, Sandy Landers, Tim Allen, Monica Bryant, Tanya Chadwick, Leslie Lunsford, Cindy Littlejohn and Jo Pierson.

A local advisory committee comprised of Gary Patterson, Cody Hill, Aaron Scott, Teresa Ancira, David Norton, Greg Howard and Charla Meeks participated in developing the grant application information.

Supt. Richard Boothby was instrumental in securing ENMR Telephone's agreement to string the T1 line to give the junior high Internet access and monthly service at a price that would be affordable after the grant money has all been used.

With the money from the grant, junior high will be completely rewired for the Internet, technical equipment needed to access the T1 line will be purchased, and a file server will be set up to control and link all computers in the building. The school expects to add new computers and hopes to place at least three computers and a printer in each classroom. New software will be purchased, including screening software to block out undesirable Internet material.

Each teacher will receive Internet training, and Mrs. Stanton, as technology coordinator, will receive advanced technical training as well.

A commitment to correspond over the Internet with Farwell students has been secured from experts all over the U.S. who are associated with every phase of the apple industry. With the grant money and these resources available, the Farwell staff hopes to promote a natural transfer of learning from one curriculum area to another and, ultimately, to real life situations for all their students.

Mike Williams, president of Texas Electric Cooperatives, says a proposal to deregulate the electric utility industry by 2001 may not be in the best interest of electric co-op consumers.

Co-ops are concerned that several key elements of the draft bill are not fully understood and more time is needed to review them, said Williams.

It's not clear that deregula-

tion of other industries has benefitted rural Texans, said Williams.

Pest Management Update

Parmer County Entomologist Mark Logan



It's time to control moths

From Parmer County entomologist Mark Logan:

It's time to control coddling moths in apple and pear trees.

The immature form of the codling moth is the worm that infests your apples and pears every year. They are now emerging from their cocoons, mating and laying eggs on or near small apples and pears.

A small worm will hatch from this egg and begin feeding on small fruit. Codling moth pheremone trap counts show the time to start controlling them is May 24.

Due to the nature of this insect, emergence from cocoons should last several weeks, which means that insecticide applications will need to be made throughout the summer to control larvae from this extended emergence and subsequent generations.

This application schedule does not apply to commercial orchards.

Diazinon has recently been approved for homeowner use to control the codling moth. This product should provide 14 to 21 days of residual control which means that applications will need to be made every 2 to 3 weeks.

If it rains or your sprinklers are hitting the tree, the residual control will be reduced and applications will need to be made more often.

Other products may be labeled for codling moth control in apples and pears that I am not aware of. Always read and follow the label of any pesticide you use.
