





Some likely recall when typhoid raged over the country. It was necessary to be vaccinated (usually three shots) to build up immunity. By injecting a limited amount of typhoid virus, the body built resistance to the disease.

In similar fashion, one may build resistance to Christ. When the gospel is presented, many people resist it. Again and again, as the message of divine grace is offered, it is rejected. This rejection process may continue until the heart is fully hardened; then it is impossible for the individual to repent. Hardness and impenitence go hand in hand (Rom 2:5; Heb 3:15).

The gospel will soften or harden one's heart. Whether one is soft-hearted or hard-hearted depends on the individual. God is not willing that any perish; He wishes repentance for all (2 Pet 3:9). The same sun, shining upon butter will melt it; shining on clay, will harden it.

Pharoah is a classic example. God hardened Pharoah's heart as Pharoah hardened his own heart. God's appeal was made to free the Jews. Five times it is stated that Pharoah refused; he hardened his heart (Exod 7:13,14,22ff). Then five times it is stated that God hardened the heart of the king (Exod 9:12; 10:1,20,27f). The same principle is true today. God hardens one's heart as the individual hardens his own heart.

Hardness is due to the deceitfulness of sin (Heb 3:13). Make no mistake about it. It is possible for one who has obeyed the gospel of Christ or for one who has not to spurn divine truth and arrive at the point where hardness makes it impossible to repent.

"Oh, sure, yeah. You've got to have your spark plug wires and...you know, that thing's worked loose."


