Did you note that item I wrote in "The Latest" a couple of weeks back in the Tribune? That we had published six charges involving drugs during September-- a record for one month.

And that has continued into October. Just note the adjudications in 287th District Court in last week's paper.

That tells me something. That a drug problem is creeping upon us.

It bothers me when a lady says at the last Texico city council meeting that she knows of local drug dealers.

It bothers me when Farwell police raid a "pot party" earlier this summer and I learn that such "parties" are held here on a regular basis.

Does anyone out there care?

Are we going to sit back and shrug our shoulders, then use the TV channel changer again?

I honestly believe we can fight back. I believe that if our

Red Ribbon activities slated

Red Ribbon Week will be commemorated in Farwell and Texico next week.

All the schools in the Twin Cities will mark the week with a slate full of activities and contests.

In the Farwell Schools the week's activities are as follows:

Monday, Oct. 23 - "Decoration Day" - start of a poster contest and hanging of Drug Free banners in each of the school buildings.

Students will sign pledges to be drug free and will receive a red ribbon to wear throughout the week. Classroom door decorations will also go up.

Tuesday, Oct. 24 - "Reach Out Day" - red ribbons will be distributed to parents and the community by various student organizations.

Wednesday, Oct. 25 - "Wear Red and Rally" - all students and teachers are encouraged to wear red. Students from each of the campuses wearing the most red will receive prizes.

Poster contest entries will be judged in the school cafeteria. The entries will hang in the cafeteria all week for public viewing.

Thursday, Oct. 26 - "Drug Free Awareness Day" - all classes will be learning from a curriculum that teaches self-responsibility. These lessons tie together math, science, language arts, health and more into its program.

Friday, Oct. 27 - "Sports Weekend" - poster contest winners will be announced at the varsity football game and the cheerleaders will decorate the football field and bleachers with red ribbons.

The elementary students will attend a drug free assembly called "Timothy Jones and Friends at 2 p.m. on Oct. 30.

Here's what's happening at Texico:

Monday, Oct. 23 - students

receive red ribbons from Student Council members. Texico Marshal Gil Holguin and his deputies will hand out pens to students and ribbons will be tied onto cars in the parking lots.

Winners of the poster, sack and video/audio contests will be announced.

Tuesday, Oct. 24 - All school balloon launch at the football field.

Wednesday, Oct. 25 - Wear Red Day. Students will attend topic discussions in the Ed. Complex.

Thursday, Oct. 26 - school not in session due to parent-teacher conferences.

Friday, Oct. 27 - A police dog demonstration will be held in the Ed. Complex conducted by the Clovis Police Dept. and Marshal Holguin. During the football game, athletes will wear red tape on uniforms and fans from Texico and Ft. Sumner will release balloons during half time.

The sacks from the sack decorating contest will be used at the Allsupps in Farwell and at Town & Country in Texico. Posters will be available for viewing in all three campus buildings.

The class with the most red ribbons at the end of the week will receive a coke and popcorn party in the concession stand.

Farwell man killed in accident

A tragedy hit Farwell on Tuesday afternoon.

Billy Roberts, 38, was killed in a two-vehicle accident in the eastbound lane of the highway just west of Texico.

He was a passenger in a pickup driven by Randy Cain, who was severely injured.

New Mexico Police said a vehicle driven by William M.

Small communities: Where folks still help neighbors

Dianne Cooper of Texico got to experience first hand one of the benefits of living in a small community and an area where folks still care for one another two weeks ago.

She was on her way to Clovis with her daughter Jaylyn. She was taking her to the pediatrician because Jaylyn was not feeling very well and was running a very high fever.

Dianne looked in her rearview mirror to see Jaylyn going into a convulsive seizure as a result of her high fever. She immediately

stopped and got her out of her car seat to help her.

She was stopped near the intersection of the Pleasant Hill Hwy. and the Clovis Airport road.

Alan Warren, Ivey Bradley, Mary Lee Killian, a man by the name of Foreman and another unidentified woman were all at the intersection as well. They all got out of their vehicles to help Dianne and Jaylyn.

One of the bystanders had some ice tea with them and Mr. Foreman suggested putting it on Jaylyn's face to

help cool her down. At the same time, Alan Warren offered to take them to the emergency room at the Clovis hospital.

They sped to the hospital in his pickup and enroute, Alan made a call to his office at Helton Oil to ask them for assistance in calling the emergency room to alert them to their coming in and need for immediate assistance.

Because of this, upon their arrival at the hospital, the doctor was able to quickly act to lower Jaylyn's fever and to

avoid any further seizing or after effects.

Jaylyn was diagnosed with Roseola, which is commonly known as "baby measles." Her fever had been at 104 degrees. This high of a fever in such a small child is very dangerous and can cause convulsions and seizures.

Roseola is a very common infant and childhood illness, and is not considered life threatening in itself, but the high fevers that can accompany it are cause for much concern and care.

Dianne was shown how

much care this community has by this incident.

Mr. Foreman had followed she and Alan to the emergency room and stayed there with her until her husband, Lynn could get to the hospital.

Mrs. Bradley, Mrs. Killian and the unidentified woman are also to be thanked for their concern and quick action on the scene as well.

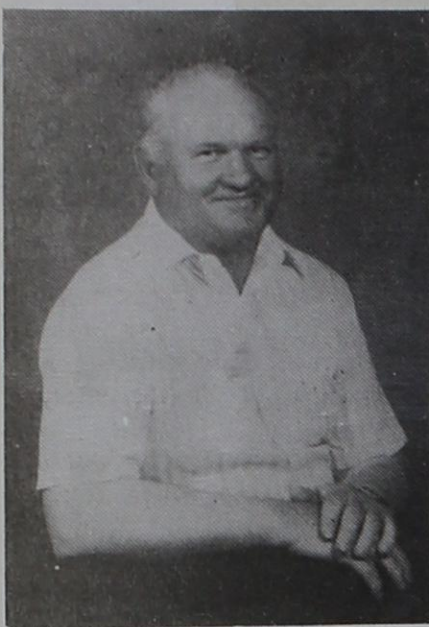
"It's so nice to know that people are still willing to lend a helping hand in a time of need," said Dianne. "It

makes me feel good to know this about our communities and my family and I appreciated all their help and concern."

Jaylyn is reported to be doing fine now. Her twin sister, Jordan is being watched very closely for any signs of breaking out with Roseola. She, interestingly enough, did not come down with it at the same time her sister did.

"We'll be ready for it this time!" stated Dianne.

Roberts was a salesman for Wilbur Ellis and had been employed there for 15 years. He was Salesman of the Year four times and was honored with the Pride of Tide award.

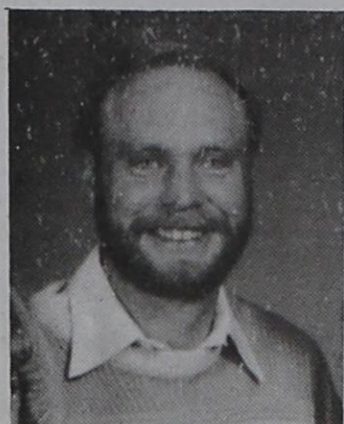
He also was a partner in LCM Swine.

Farwell Council works on hazardous structures

The Farwell City Council continued working on building condemnations at its Tuesday meeting. Letters went out earlier this month to 17 property owners.

Several appeared at the meeting and after discussions each was asked to return at the council's November meeting to discuss progress in solving their problems.

The process is still continuing for those who didn't appear. Letters are sent, then hearings are held later.

Mayor Jimmie Mace stressed that the city wants to work with the property owners on finding solutions to problems caused by hazardous situations. He noted that the fire department can help, too, by using some structures for fire practice.

Those appearing were:
 -- Mrs. Wayne Pierce discussed repair of a structure at 409 Second St. It's being used for storage.

-- Dolly Roberson, who owns a former gas station on Avenue A. The problem involves underground storage tanks. Mrs. Roberson criticized the city's decision to list the structure on its condemnation list.

-- Jimmy Meeks, with a house on Second Street. There's a possibility a man will buy it, he said. If not, he will work to bring it up to standard.

-- Billie Blain, with a house at 7th Street and Avenue D, said she has been waiting on a clear title and plans to sell it. There's a potential buyer, she said.

-- Mike Goettsch, with a storage facility at Second Street and Avenue F. Goettsch said it's beyond repair.

Mace noted that no response was received from several other property owners. But he also said the garage at 406 Seventh St. was being torn down, and the house at 307 First St. will be torn down in November.

In other business, the council:
 -- Met in executive session, at councilwoman Ysleta Kittrell's request, to discuss personnel.

-- Heard Jaquetta Walterscheid discuss a problem her family has with a neighbor, with charges being filed on both sides for harassment. She also said dogs are running loose on Sixth Street and causing a problem.

-- Agreed to have Shot's Tree Trimming get rid of dead tree branches at the city park, not to cost over \$2,000. Mac Heald, in advising the council, said the trees don't need to be topped, but just have the dead branches cleared out.

-- Agreed to pay \$2,000, matching a Farwell Schools' expenditure, to put up 4 flashing lights around the school to cut down on speeding.

-- Heard Mace report on the survey involving speed limits on Avenue A. The state is taking longer than expected on its survey so it will be awhile before anything is heard.

-- Heard Mrs. Kittrell ask if some of the stop signs on 2nd and 6th streets be moved so traffic can flow easier on them. That would relieve some of the traffic on 3rd Street, for example, and help keep repairs down to that heavily-used street.

City clerk Cynthia Thigpen will check on whether the city can take action on this or whether it needs state approval first. A question was raised over whether the state had helped pay for the many, many stop signs.

-- Received the September report from Farwell police chief Roy McGaa. It included 3 traffic accidents, 3 assist other police, 1 suspicious vehicle (unable to locate), 1 vandalism, 4 suspicious persons (unable to locate), 3 thefts, 2 harassment calls and 1 911 call. Twelve tickets were issued, 2 for disregarding railroad crossing arms, 9 for speeding and liability insurance and 1 for peddling without a permit.

-- Gave 2 1/2 percent pay raises to city employees.
 -- Okayed a building permit for Harlin Obenshain to move a stucco house to 609 Ave. B where his mother will live.

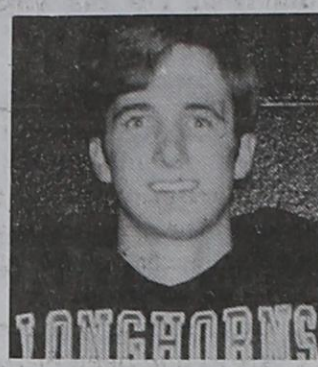
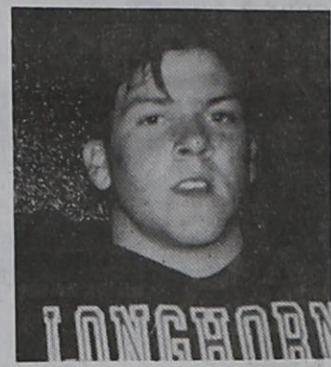

Lazbuddie wins big

The Lazbuddie Longhorns opened district play last Friday by smashing Cotton Center at home, 54-8. The game was stopped in the third quarter due to the 45-point rule.

Lazbuddie is 4-2 on the season and 1-0 in district. They host a tough Amherst squad tonight (Friday) at 7:30.

It was Lazbuddie all the way against Cotton Center, which is now 1-5 on the season. The Elks scored a lone TD on an interception return in the third quarter.

In the first quarter, Lazbuddie scored three times. Justin St. Clair ran it in from the 47, followed by a Jason Thomas kick. Then Junior Lopez tallied on a 4-yard flip from St. Clair, followed by another Thomas kick. And Josh Warren scurried across the goal line on a 45-yard pass play from St. Clair. The kick failed and the Longhorns were ahead 22-0 at the end of the first stanza.

The second quarter was more of the same as Lazbuddie dominated. Juan Reyes raced in for two touchdowns, one for 70 yards and the other for 25. Then Seth Black tallied on a 10-yard pass from Cade Morris. The half ended with Lazbuddie comfortably ahead, 42-0.

After the Elks scored, Lazbuddie answered with two Tds to end the game -- a 48-yard run by Jesse Moreno and a 43-yard punt return by Dustin Weir.

Lazbuddie hit 6 of 16 passes for 59 yards and gained 221 yards on the ground through 23 rushes. Cotton Center accumulated 183 yards altogether.

Coach Mark Scisson said the Longhorn varsity only played the first quarter, and the JV played the rest of the game. Seven different players scored Tds.

Although it was a "no-contest" type of game, Scisson still was happy with how his varsity defense played during its time in the game. Cotton Center had been averaging 350 yards in passing a game. The aerial attack was shut off completely by the Longhorns.

Tonight, the Longhorns will have a tougher time -- Amherst is ranked No. 1 in the state. Lazbuddie is the only team to have beaten Amherst in its last 15 games.

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Marshal's Report

Here is the weekly report from Texico Marshal Gil Holguin:
 About 12:40 a.m. on Sunday, police responded to a prowler call in the 500 block of North Anderson. Holguin said two men were found there at first, intoxicated.

The investigation continued and charges were placed against three men: Allen Hobbs, 19, Farwell, charged with possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia, a minor in possession of alcohol and an outstanding warrant from Clovis; Kelvin Gooden, 20, Texico, charged with possession of drug paraphernalia and an outstanding warrant from Clovis; and Jared Minshew, 18, Texico, charged with minor in possession of alcohol.

On Friday night, Texico police participated in a roadblock in Clovis with the DWI Task Force. Texico police arrested Vincent Lopez, 19, Clovis, on a charge of minor in possession of alcohol.

About 2:45 a.m. on Sunday, Texico police participated in a high-speed chase on Highway 84 through Parmer County. Speeds in excess of 100 miles per hour were recorded. Bailey County police went out to help, but the suspect turned off on Farm to Market Road 2079, then drove back into Parmer County. His vehicle finally stalled about 1 mile west and 10 miles north of Muleshoe.

Luis Sanchez Jr., 29, Muleshoe, was charged with DWI, evading arrest, speeding and reckless driving.

On Oct. 15, police were called to a burglary at 910 County Road C. A 1995 mini-motorcycle (KTM-LEM 50SXR) was stolen. If you have information about the theft, please contact the Texico police.

Also, police are still searching for a white LeSabre that was involved in a hit and run the middle of last month at 319 Garwood. If you have information, call the marshal's office.

Holguin reported that a warrant has been issued toward a Texico man on a charge of possession of marijuana but that the man has left the community and gone to Colorado.

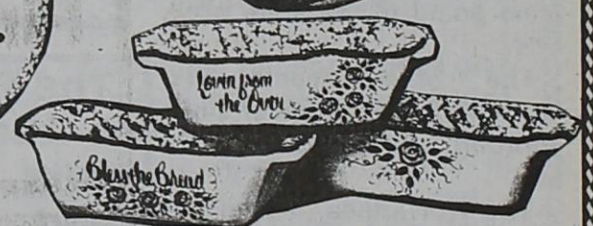

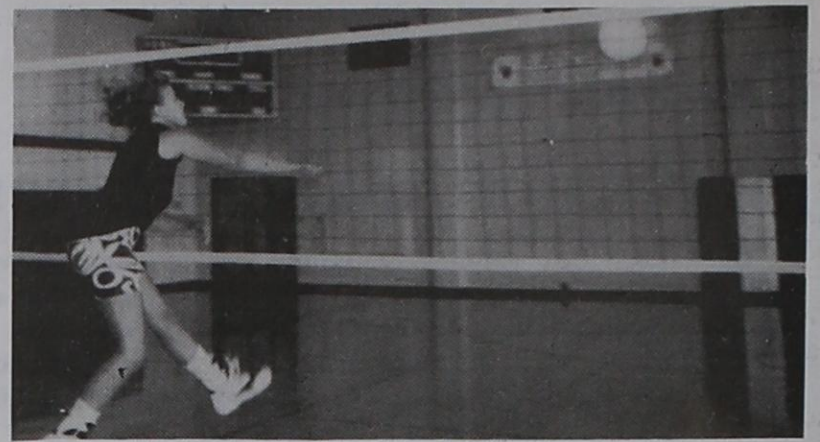
The Chamber had asked the city council to buy the outlets (about \$500 cost), but due to state anti-donation rules the council felt it couldn't.

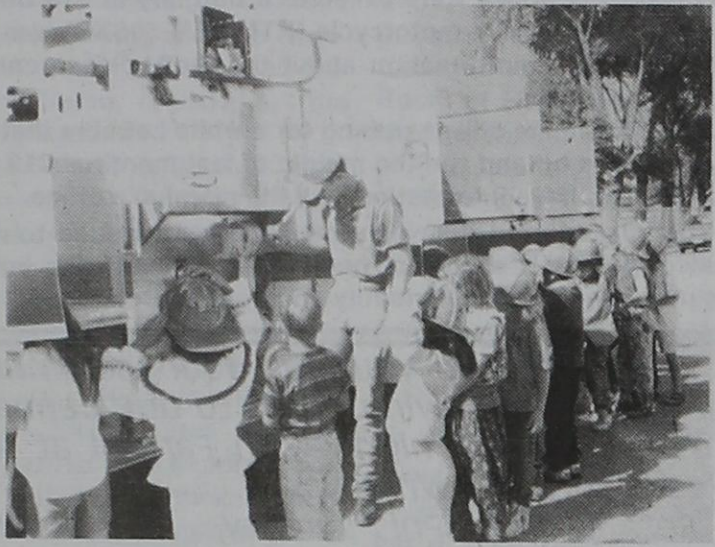

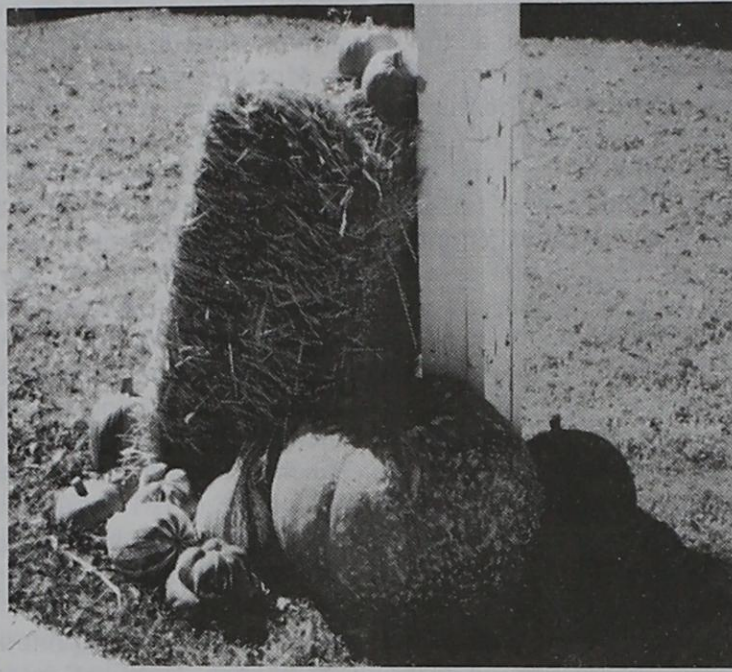

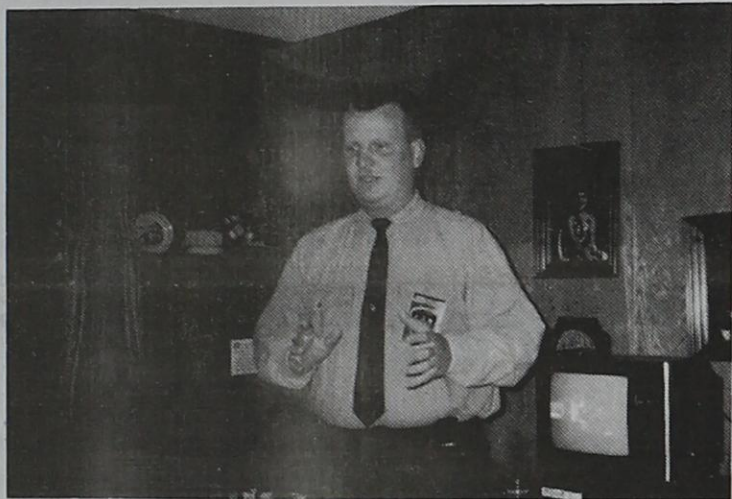
Injured boy takes bad turn

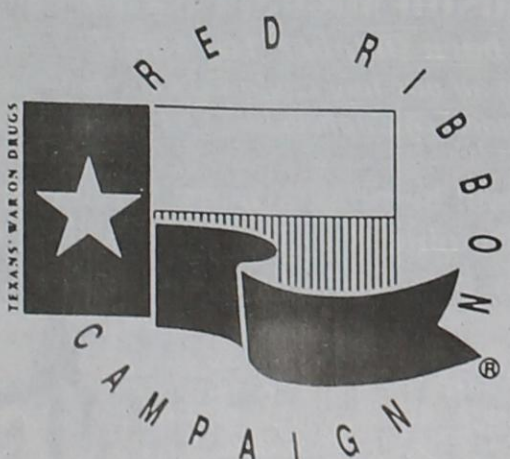

residents say "we're not going to allow this to go on in our community", it can happen.

How do we go about it? There are several steps we can take.

1. When I hear about kids here taking drugs along with their parents, it frightens me.

Don't these parents know they are destroying their children's lives? Don't they love their own kids?

You know of these parents? You're related to them? Then, by God, talk to them. Don't ignore it and hope the tooth fairy makes it go away.

As a relative, a neighbor, a close friend, YOU have a responsibility. Not the cops, not the law, not city government, not the schools -- YOU.

And if you don't take this responsibility, then don't blame anyone else for the problem but yourself.

2. Both Farwell and Texico have police officers. Farwell has one, Texico has three.

Obviously, Texico is in a better condition to attack this problem.

If a lady can stand up at a city council meeting and says she knows who the drug dealers are, then I would assume the police do, too. If not, they can interview the lady.

Police in a small town, like a Texico or a Farwell, know what's happening.

I fully realize that police are involved in lots of things -- making sure folks wear seat belts, helping out at the school ball games, watching traffic when the kids get to school, looking for curfew violators, seeing who has New Mexico license plates, watching for potential vandals, watching for drunk drivers coming back from Clovis, etc., etc., etc.

And when you add in the paperwork that's necessary under our paperwork-crazed legal system, they are kept busy, even in a little town like Texico-Farwell.

But I also believe that when someone has too much to do, they need to prioritize. I would

like to see our local police make it a priority to put any local drug dealers behind bars.

If there are local drug dealers, for example, in Texico as the lady said, then let's put them under surveillance --

and let them know the community is watching.

If there are drug parties held in Farwell, let's raid them.

Police in small towns are under the command of city officials -- councilmen and

mayors. Well, folks, what's your pleasure?

3. Texico-Farwell is fortunate to have some strong community groups, like the Chambers of Commerce, sororities, booster clubs, PTAs, Rotary, fire departments and Lions.

Several of these groups have sponsored Red Ribbon Week ads in today's paper -- to show their support in the fight against drugs.

They can do more. They can contact our city officials about taking a more forceful role in this fight.

And, believe me, it IS a fight. Drugs just won't go away. The Texico-Farwell community must make a strong statement. It can be done if the will is there.

What's interesting here is that every person can get involved. Every person can be part of the solution. It's not a matter of "them." It's a matter of "you."

I don't like hearing about drug parties in my community, or drug dealers giving drugs to 10 year olds.

And I won't sit by silently with my head in the sand.

I say it's time to take a stand.

Although I addressed the above column principally to the Texico-Farwell area, a lot of our readers live throughout Parmer County.

They need to think about their own communities and their relationship to this problem and what can be done.

Wednesday morning, I was very pleasantly surprised. I opened a letter that was simply addressed to Texico Elementary School. When I pulled the contents from the envelope, a crisp \$100 bill fell to my desk. Accompanying the money was a short note from Someone Who Could Be Anyone. This beautiful note mentioned that the author had heard about the recent theft of several dollars from jars our students had been using to collect money for Bianca Vega. Someone felt terrible over the loss and wanted to help make things a little better for Bianca and her family.

When our faith in the basic goodness of our fellow man is tainted with heartless act of stealing from a child in desperate need, it is restored many times over by people who step forward to willingly help. Farwell Feed Yard

Farwell Feed Yard, a 24-hour-a-day custom feed lot operation, is just south of Farwell on State Line Road. The phone number is 481-3324. Bob Tabb has been the manager for the past three years.

The Panhandle cattle-feeding industry began in the 1960's in the Hereford/Friona area when local residents developed feedlots based on the example of those already operating in California. The local operations became very successful and within a few years the industry grew until cattle feedlots began to spring up all across the region. Then a series of complicated buy-outs and mergers developed in which the local feedlots became a part of larger national corporations. AZL Resources, Inc., which eventually became AzTx Cattle Co. is a good example of this process.

As the 1970's progressed, several companies, such as Hereford Feed Yards, which fed cattle, and ProChemCo., which operated oil service equipment, consolidated under larger corporations. They were merged under AZL Resources and spun off the ag-related portion of the acquisition. It was at that point that a group of local Panhandle investors who had been involved in the cattle feeding industry from its beginning, gained control of the cattle feeding portion of the operation through a well-conceived and executed management leveraged buy-out.

Bob Josserand was president of ProChemCo Cattle Co. From 1973 until it merged with AZL Resources in 1980. He then served as president of the AZL Cattle Group until AZL was acquired by TOSCO in 1983. When TOSCO began sending signals that it wasn't interested in retaining the cattle feeding operation, Josserand organized a small group of investors to buy the operation and keep it under local control. In May 1983, the leveraged buy-out was completed and Josserand proceeded to expand the operation to the level at which AzTx currently exists.

In 1988, Josserand and Milton Rudder acquired the remaining stock to complete their ownership of 100 percent of AzTx. Today, the Josserand family is the sole owner of AzTx.

Today, AzTx Cattle Co. has a total feeding capacity of 200,000 head of cattle, which makes it one of the nation's largest independent cattle-feeding operations. Its five feedyards are strategically located to serve the entire Southwest:

- Hereford Feed Yards, dating from 1962, is one of the oldest and most reputable of these facilities still existing. Its 50,000 head capacity is backed by some of the industry's most modern equipment and is combined with a location on a major rail connection.
 - Farwell Feed Yards has a 30,000 head capacity that draws heavily from the New Mexico cattle-producing area, as well as the general cattle-producing region of the Southwest.
 - In 1985, the firm purchased Rocky Ford Feedyard Corp., of Rocky Ford, Colo. The 30,000 head capacity facility is located in the midst of one of the nation's premier cattle feeding areas, on the high plains of southeastern Colorado.
 - Garden City Feed Yard, L.L.C., is located in the southwestern portion of Kansas. The 28,000 head facility has become a pioneer in the feeding of high moisture corn.
 - Farther west, in Arizona, Hughes and Ganz Cattle Co., with a 60,000 head capacity, uses year-round ideal climate for cattle feeding.
- The combination of these facilities, each a specialized feeding concern, gives the company a high caliber operation.

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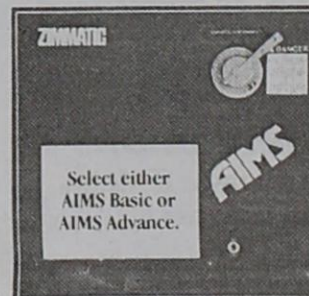


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The stork visits

Take a bow and accept our thanks for always being there, for always doing your best with what you're given to work with, and for somehow always coming up with nutritious meals -- and always on time (that's more than we sometimes can ask for at home!)

Recipe of Week

Jell-O Eyeballs

- 2 (4 serving size) packets lemon gelatin
- 1 1/2 cups boiling water
- 24 blueberries

Pour boiling water over gelatin and stir to dissolve completely. Pour mixture into ice cube trays with rounded bottoms; should fill 2 trays. Refrigerate 30 to 45 minutes or until just beginning to thicken. Remove from refrigerator and press a blueberry into the center of each piece (make certain the blueberry touches the bottom of the tray). Return tray to refrigerator for 1 1/2 to 2 hours.

To unmold, place bottom of ice cube tray in warm water 15 to 30 seconds and run a knife around the edges of each cube. Turn the "eyes" out on a serving plate and refrigerate until serving time. Makes 24.

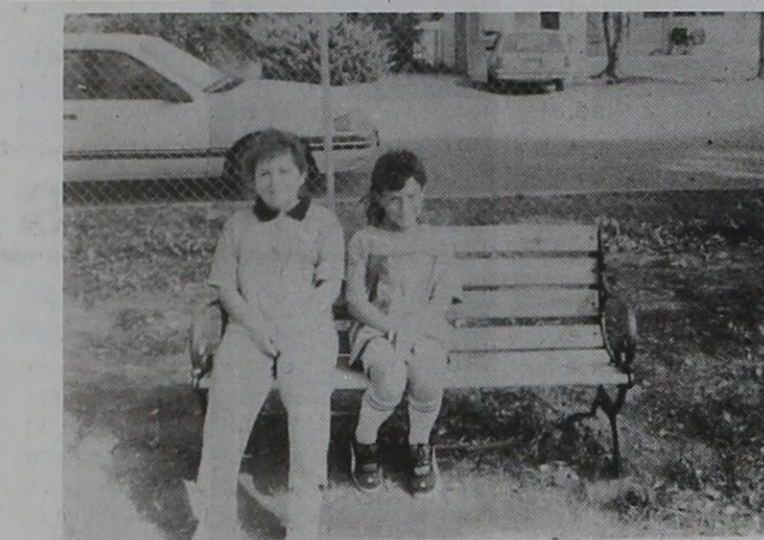

On defense, Nic Ketcherside had a QB hurry, forcing Bovina to punt to its 38. Nic Ketcherside ran for 11 yards. But Farwell was stopped on a 4th and 5 play. Then, at midfield, a Bovina pitch was fumbled and landed in the arms of Preston Ketcherside, who ran it in for a TD. The Jason Miller kick made it 7-0.

Landon Lunsford had a good tackle of the receiver on the ensuing kickoff. Tackles were made by Steve Miller, Chase Hardage, and Preston Ketcherside broke up a pass. Chase Hardage then recovered a fumble at the Steers 42.

Farwell was stopped as the quarter ended. Farwell attempted to punt but a roughing the kicker call against Bovina allowed the Steers to keep possession of the ball.

It appeared the Steers were stopped at the Bovina 30, as they faced a 4th and 15 situation. Bovina dropped three men back, but were surprised when the Steers went for it. Instead, Brock Anderson flipped a pass to Chase Hardage who ran it in for a TD. The kick was wide and it was 13-0.

On defense, David Dannheim had a strong tackle. Bovina moved to the Farwell 27 after completing a long pass. But Nic Ketcherside and Steve Miller both had QB sacks, for a total loss of 15 yards. Bovina punted.

Farwell couldn't move the ball. But on 4th down, from punt formation, Anderson threw a short pass to Preston Ketcherside, who was unguarded, resulting in a 55-yard TD. The run for extra points failed and it was 19-0.

Bovina started from its 37 but Anderson intercepted at midfield. Anderson completed a 20-yard pass to Dannheim and a 9-yard throw to Hardage. The drive culminated in a 14-yard TD pass to Hardage. The Jason Miller kick made it 25-0 as the half ended.

In the third quarter, David Everett returned the kick to the Farwell 40. Runs by Jason Miller and Lunsford gained a first down but Farwell was held. Williams boomed a 57-yard punt to the Bovina 3. Michael Treadway had a strong tackle and Preston Ketcherside had good pass coverage as Bovina was forced to punt.

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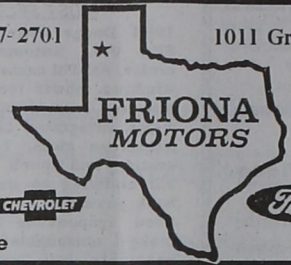


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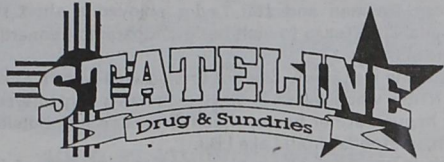

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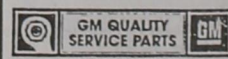
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
