

Will overpass be needed here?

An overpass over the tracks between Texico and Farwell was discussed at Tuesday's Farwell Chamber of Commerce meeting.

Chamber President Ralph Franse reported that when the Santa Fe is 4-tracked, he's heard that it will mean well over 100 trains crossing through the Twin Cities each day -- an estimated 25% to 50% more train traffic than currently.

The Chamber voted to have Franse and the members of the Chamber's industrial development committee to meet with the Farwell City Council at its April meeting about this. The council will be asked to be take the point in dealing with governmental and railroad officials on possibly building an overpass.

Since both Texas and New Mexico are involved, Texico officials will be asked to work with Farwell on this project. Mike Pomper was asked to discuss this with the Texico City Council and Texico Chamber of Commerce.

In other business, the Chamber:

-- Picked the State Line Tribune as the Business of the Month to be publicized in April.

-- Re-elected board directors Franse, Donna Ratke and Mary Gustin.

-- Decided to leave the dollar amount for the Chamber scholarship fund at \$500 but will take another look at it next year. Currently, one senior gets \$500. Next year, the Chamber may give out two such scholarships.

-- Finalized plans for the Saturday banquet. Mrs. Ratke pointed out that the social hour starts at 6 p.m. Mike Ratke will serve as emcee. The Chamber is setting up to feed 300.

The commissioners won't vote on this request until budget discussion time this summer.



Farm Bill details outlined

The 7-year farm legislation contains provisions Combest pushed for -- a fair market value for land protected by the CRP, opening the peanut market away from a government monopoly, as well as flexibility for producers to also grow vegetables as alternative crops. Also, operating and marketing provisions of the three entity rule and marketing loan program remain intact.


Researchers will extract information on climactic conditions associated with historic precipitation events in the Lubbock area from the National Weather Service data base compiled from weather balloon releases. The data will then be used to identify weather parameters of precipitation events where enhancement operations are most likely to prove effective.

total. New enrollments and re-enrollments of existing CRP contracts will receive CRP payments at a cash rate based on the share-rental value that most farmland is rented when used for crops. During the most recent signup, CRP payments were inaccurately calculated on the lower cash-rental arrangements, which gave little incentive to landowners to participate in CRP, because cash-rental arrangements are usually made only on poor quality land.

More valuable and highly-erodible lands which the government pays landowners to protect under CRP would otherwise be rented out for the more profitable share arrangement of the tenant farmer's profit in the harvest on the landowner's acreage.

The crop flexibility provision allows any producer to grow vegetables on their farm program acreage, as long as the region has a history "double cropping" vegetables with commodity crops. So producers will be able to grow for vegetable processing plants without being prevented from continuing to receive full farm program aid.






Several Clovis ladies are putting on an "Easter Expo" Sunday from noon to 5 p.m. at the Texico Community Center.

Reports were given on stock shows. Members signed up to work shifts at the health fair.




